

(P)—Boldiers guarding the vault where the body of President Harding is ententhed have been given orders to shoot directly at persons who have been causing disturbances around the tomb of the late president at night. Lieutenant R. H. Harriman in command of the soldier guard station at the tomb, announced to-day.

Licentegant Harriman said that ever since the guard has been stationed at the temb certain individuals have annoyed the detackment. At first it was thought it was small bega, but when the disturbance kept up the guards took it more serious-

The disturbances have consisted of throwing stones at two small guard houses on each side of the antranch to the vault. At various times a hugle has been blawn in remote parts of the cometery about the midnight hour and of late has happaned almost nightly.

Riot guns have been sent from Fort Hayes, Columbus, handquarters for the guns datachment here, and these londed with buckhot will be used if the disturbances continue, Lieutenant Harriman said.

No cause for the disturbances is known, Lieutenant Harriman said.
