Report Southern Part of Republic Now Entirely Controlled by Revolutionists.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4. (AP)—The United States government has held 5,000 British rifles, model 1917, 1,000 rounds of cartridge rifle ammunition and eight airplanes to the Obago government of Mexico. Secretary Weeks in a brief statement today said the terms of the sale called for one-half of the purchase price in cash and one-half within 90 days.

BROWNVILLE, Texas, Jan. 4. (AP)—A severe defeat was administered today by federal troops which had mobilized to enter the state of Campeche and Yucatan to rescue Carrillo Puerto, former governor of Yucatan, according to private advices received here this morning from Vera Cruz. Heel forces under General Ricardo Flores met the federals on the Campeche border, completely dispersing them, report stated.

NAMED EASTERN MANAGER FOR W. G. HEADQUARTERS CAMPAIGN

NEW YORK, Jan. 4. (AP)—Robert M. Woolley, former interstate commerce commissioner, has been appointed eastern manager of the campaign for William G. McAdoo for the Democratic presidential nomination. Mr. Woolley at one time was director of the mint. He directed the publicity for the rebel city campaign of former President Wilson and that of the liberty loan drives.

REBEL STEAMSHIP ON ROCKS AND MAY LOSE PASSENGERS

EL PASO, Texas, Jan. 4. (AP)—The rebel steamship Progress is on the rocks between Progress, Tuxton and Vera Cruz, and in danger of losing all passengers, according to an E. O. 8 call picked up by the Fort Bliss radio station. The ship was on the rocks at the time of the disaster, the message said. Government forces are responding to the call for help.

Eleven Men Are Lost In Storm That Raged Off Atlantic Coast

BABYLON, N. Y., Jan. 4. (AP)—The Atlantic off Fire Island continued to subside today from the storm which raged all of yesterday, coast guardmen rescued a boat with the first of nine men who went down last night. Five of the nine were of a rescue party which the other four were shipwrecked. The rescue party was blown off the beach by the storm. The rescuers went out last night to the Electric, a speed boat which had left Rockaway Wednesday in command of C. C. Ecolston of Bay Shore. Ecolston had John Virginia and a man named Williams as companions. The Electric struck on a shoal of the Fire Island bar, about a half mile offshore, on Wednesday night as the storm came up.

UNABLE TO ELECT CHAIRMAN INTERSTATE COMMERCE COMMITTEE.

COMMITTEE CONSIDERS MELLON TAX REVISION

Reassembling of Congress After Holidays Opens Flood Gates of Oratory.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4. (AP)—With congress in recess until Monday, senate and house committee members today shook off the holiday spirit and set about the business of preparing the measures that will occupy the two chambers from now until adjournment.

The senate foreign relations committee today took up the resolution of Senator Borah, Republican, Idaho, calling for recognition of the Russian soviet government, and Senator James H. Doolittle, Republican, Kansas, chief of the committee, is preparing to address the senate Monday on the same subject.

FORT WORTH, Jan. 4. (AP)—Three escaped federal convicts, at Ft. Worth, returned their handcuffs today to local police with "thanks." The men jumped from a train in Kansas last night and crossed from Fort Worth to Leavenworth. The handcuffs were received today in the mail and came from a town in Missouri. The three men still at liberty are T. Baker, Charles Fowler and W. H. Lindsey.

Second Severe Blizzard of Week Strikes North Texas and Oklahoma Colder Weather Coming Saturday

Gripped by a blizzard and one of the most severe winters of the season, northwest Texas and Oklahoma continue to shiver. Freezing winds began sweeping through Wichita Falls about 6 o'clock Friday morning and the mercury began to decline.

Railroad dispatchers reported cold weather along all lines operating out of Wichita Falls and the thermometer read 6 above at Fortgan and Woodward, Oklahoma, Friday morning, according to reports to the Missouri-Kansas-Texas Dispatch. Snow was reported at Texline by the Port Worth and Denver railroad, with the mercury standing at 19 degrees above at Fortgan and at 8 o'clock had fallen to 24 degrees. The decline continued and at 10 o'clock Thursday evening the thermometer at the volunteer government weather station of the Wichita Falls Electric Company, became eccentric. Temperature at that time was 41 degrees. At 4:30 o'clock Friday morning the thermometer registered about 19 degrees and at 8 o'clock had fallen to 24 degrees. The decline continued and at 10 o'clock the thermometer registered 21 degrees. The wind was sweeping through the city at a rate of approximately 30 miles an hour.

ST. PAUL, Minn., Jan. 4. (AP)—Blowing cold from the northwest today with a minimum of 20 below zero, the lowest temperature, 23 degrees below zero. Fargo and Grand Forks, both reported 21 below.

BROWNVILLE, Texas, Jan. 4. (AP)—Rio Grande valley again escaped threatened frost. Frightful warnings were issued Thursday, but a shift of wind Thursday night prevented the temperature from dropping to the danger point.

REACH LONG SOUGHT FOR TREASURE OF ANTIQUITY SARCOPHAGUS KING TUT

LUXOR, Egypt, Jan. 4. (AP)—The sarcophagus of Tutankhamun has been broken to light after ramming for three weeks. The search was preceded with and in the presence of Professor Percy E. Newberry, the noted Egyptologist, and the other members of his staff. Howard Carter, in charge of the exploration, unbolting the doors of the fourth shrine, disclosing the sarcophagus and finally establishing the fact that the last resting place of Tutankhamun had really been discovered.

LONDON, Jan. 4. (AP)—Great Britain has asked the United States for the release from hall of the British and Canadian members of the crew of the British schooner Tomoka, seized on his person when taken in custody, but declared it was his personal funds and not the proceeds of rum sales on that trip.

YOUNG MANUFACTURER HELD IN CONNECTION WITH DEATH OF WOMAN

CANTON, Ohio, Jan. 4. (AP)—Police are holding Louis Griffith Jr., manufacturer, in connection with their investigation into the death of Miss Hunter, 18, whose body was found on a seldom-frequented road near here yesterday. Prosecuting Attorney C. B. McClintock expressed the belief that Griffith can throw some light on the mystery and is holding him on a charge of illegal possession of intoxicating liquor.

No marks were found on the girl's body, other than a few minor bruises, and Coroner H. Short plans to make an analysis of her stomach to determine if she was poisoned. Another theory advanced is that she died of fright.

Griffith admitted, according to police, that he was acquainted with the girl, but denied that he had seen her on the night of her death.

FLOOD WATERS OF OHIO RIVER REACH CREST 27.3 FEET

PITTSBURGH, Pa., Jan. 4. (AP)—Flood waters of the Allegheny and Monongahela rivers pouring into the Ohio reached the crest at 2:45 o'clock this morning when a stage of 27.3 feet was reported at the four bridges by the weather bureau. It was expected the Ohio would remain stationary until noon when the stream would begin to fall.

Streets in the lower north side section were under three feet of water, tracks of the Baltimore & Ohio railroad were submerged, bringing freight movements to a standstill and a number of industrial plants were forced to abandon operations due to the high water.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Jan. 4. (AP)—Rivers at many points in this state were near flood stage today and reports from western Kentucky were that landslides in some portions of the mountains were causing delay to railway traffic following recent heavy rains.

HEIGHT OF SEINE FLOOD NOW 25.26; RISE 8.66 INCHES

PARIS, Jan. 4. (AP)—The height of the Seine flood at the Pont Royal at 9:00 o'clock this morning was 25.26 feet showing that in the past 24 hours the waters had risen 8.66 inches.

The weather forecasters predicted mild, but persistent rain throughout the day and a repetition of the disaster of 1916 seemed probable unless there was a drastic change of temperature before night.

Accuse Bishop of 'Passing the Buck' In Case of Heaton

NEW YORK, Jan. 4. (AP)—Failure to try the Rev. W. Lee Heaton of Fort Worth, Texas, for having of late to remove the stigma upon his name would be a "violation of the American principle of fair play," it was asserted by the Most Rev. Archbishop of the Protestant Episcopal diocese here had decided not to try Rev. Heaton.

This step, taken by the modernists after a long conference, was the latest in the doctrinal controversy that has raged within the Protestant Episcopal and other churches, and that has involved clergymen and bishops as well as laymen throughout the country.

Nelson, Ernest Litzy and Claude Emery, the latter a 15-year-old boy, were arrested in Martwick on charges of murder. They are to be given preliminary hearings today.

Wealthy Oil Man Victim Shooting At Los Angeles New Year Party Has Developed Pneumonia Result Wound

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 4.—With Mabel Normand and Courtland S. Dines patients in the Hospital of the Good Samaritan here, the law prepared for eventualities flowing from the New Year's party at which Dines, as host to the scene, was shot and seriously wounded by Horace A. Greer, Miss Normand's chauffeur, that he may die.

These preparations of the authorities here were taken when they learned Dines is fighting on two fronts for his life—fighting a bullet wound through his lung and pneumonia.

Following a conference with Dr. Guy Cochrane, chief physician for the young clubmen and favorite of cinema queens, George Holla, captain of Los Angeles police detective prepared to take Dines' autopsies statement of the incidents preceding the three shots fired by Greer Tuesday evening in Dines' expensive apartment at No. 325 N. North Vermont avenue.

Accordingly, in the event the condition of Miss Normand's wealthy and able-bodied husband, who is being held ready to be rushed to the hospital.

Another significant activity by the police was the issuance of a complaint by the district attorney's office charging Chauffeur Greer with assault with a deadly weapon with intent to murder Dines.

The complaint was sworn to by Charles Jarvis, detective lieutenant and served on Greer in his cell at the city jail where he is being held with a bail of \$10,000.

The servant who the police assert, shot Dines out of jealousy prompted by a mad infatuation for the internationally famous woman of the silver screen, submitted in evidence as the service of the complaint.

In his cell Greer complained of illness from stomach trouble.

Examination by the police hospital physician confirmed Greer's statement that he is tubercular, and also a victim of heart trouble.

He will probably be arraigned on the complaint issued by the district attorney's office and \$10,000 bail will be demanded.

MISS NORMAND AND DINES PATIENTS IN SAME HOSPITAL

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 4.—Patients in the same hospital, for Mabel Normand and Courtland S. Dines, athletic young clubman, son of one of Denver's first families, came to the end of their "playmate" relationship as the accompaniment of anesthetic, surgeons' knives and burrs.

Shortly before noon Thursday Miss Normand was operated on by Dr. Guy Cochrane, prominent southern California surgeon, for what he described to "United Service" as "chronic" condition of appendicitis.

The surgeon added that the operation was a beautiful and unobjectionable and that his beautiful and celebrated patient should be sufficiently convalescent to leave the Hospital of the Good Samaritan in two weeks.

Almost Miss Normand's last expressed interest before going upon the operating table was to inquire as to the condition of Dines, shot on New Year's night by Joseph Kelly (Horace A. Greer), her chauffeur.

And when the international divinity of the silver shot learned from Dr. Cochrane, also Dines' chief physician, that his friend and host of the tragic New Year's "open house" was in good condition, she "went under" the anesthetic with a smile.

Physicians Not Alarmed.

Dr. Cochrane further told Universal Service that he is not alarmed by the development of pneumonia in Dines' case. "Thus far," he stated, "it is mild, but the bullet wound should be regarded as serious. Greer was scheduled to be at the receiving end of another interrogation by the police and also to be charged with assault with a deadly weapon with intent to commit murder, as the district attorney's office is preparing to describe his assault upon Dines when the chauffeur, using Miss Normand's revolver, fired twice at the wealthy host.

The police have summoned for further questioning Mrs. Edith Burns, Miss Normand's friend, adviser, companion and housekeeper, as they seek, especially, more detailed information regarding her knowledge of incidents that took place at the Normand home, No. 325 West Seventh street, about four blocks from where Dines' simultaneous bachelor apartments were located.

Edna Purviance, the other screen star who, with Miss Normand was Dines' guest New Year's night, had emerged from her attack of "nerves" bordering on hysteria, and denies she is engaged to wed Dines, as she yesterday asserted was the case. INDEPENDENCE FOR PHILIPPINES URGED BY PEDRO GUEVARA

RESIDENT COMMISSIONERS AT WASHINGTON DELIVER ADDRESS IN HOUSE

ARE FIGHTING BATTLE OF AMERICAN PRINCIPLES

Desire to Be Placed On Same Plane As Those Who Have Enjoyed Influence of Flag

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4. (AP)—Delivering his first speech in the house, Pedro Guevara, resident commissioner from the Philippines, advocated independence for the islands today with the statement that the independent Philippines will be stronger for Americans than a subjected Philippines possibly can be.

"No matter how attractive our designs," he said, "a dependent Philippines must be a dependent Philippines. This is not human. You have won the sincere friendship and admiration of China, though you have done less for that country than you have for the Philippines. I am certain you will realize that the Filipino people are fighting the battle of American principles. Our victory will be your victory; our defeat, your defeat. The Filipino people do not ignore the geographical situation of their country. Nor do they ignore the interest of this nation. Our dream is to be useful to their nation, to obey her and the world our gratitude for the unselfish leadership of the American people during our association.

"Our coasts and mountains, our lakes and bays, our rivers and seas will be yours in time of need. Our fortunes, our lives will be at the disposition of this nation should destiny call you again to the fields of battle in defense of the safety of the world, justice and liberty.

Commissioner Guevara declared that the Philippines "aspire to be placed on the same plane as those who have enjoyed the benevolent and humanitarian influence of the American flag."

"Cuba," he continued, "has been freed. Czechoslovakia, Lithuania and Poland are now free, thanks to the moral intervention of the United States. Egypt has recovered her independence through recognition by the British empire of American doctrine. Ireland has secured from England a free state political status. But the Philippines, under the American flag, cannot secure freedom, that priceless treasure of a people which America herself has helped other small countries to acquire."

SELECTS NEW CHAIRMAN FOR U. S. SHIPPING BOARD

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4. (AP)—With selection of a new chairman for the shipping board virtually decided upon President Coolidge is understood also to have worked out many of the points of his general policy with respect to the nation's merchant marine.

Leitch C. Palmer, former chief of the navy department's bureau of navigation, is thought to be the president's choice for the board's chairmanship. He has conferred with the executive three times within a week and his residence in Missouri makes him eligible under the geographical provisions of the merchant marine act.

The nominations of Frederick I. Thompson of Mobile, Ala., and Bert E. Haney of Portland, Oregon, which were withdrawn when it became necessary to elect a new chairman after the senate committee had voted their approval, will be resubmitted, it is understood, when the name of Mr. Coolidge's choice to fill the ship vacancy and the chairmanship goes forward.

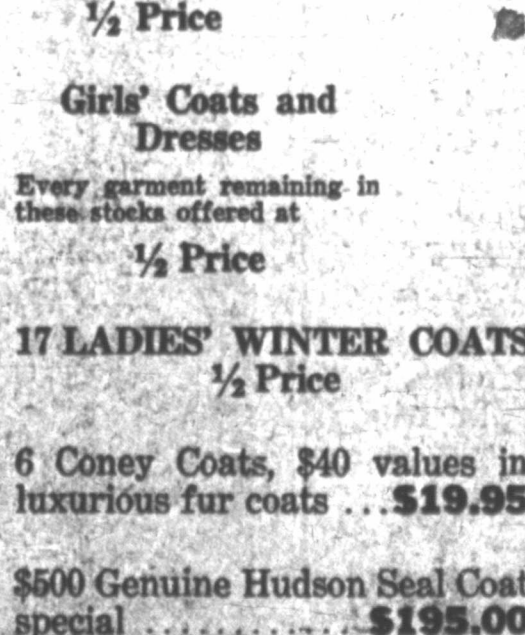

JOHNSON CRITICIZES ADMINISTRATION FOR MEXICAN ATTITUDE

REMINDS LEADERS OF HISTORY OF AMERICAN FIGHT FOR LIBERTY.

PROPOSES SOLDIER BONUS FROM FUND IN TREASURY

Candidate for Republican Nomination Delivers Address at Cleveland, Ohio.

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Jan. 4.—(AP)—Senator Hiram W. Johnson, candidate for the Republican nomination to the presidency, prepared today to receive a few delegates from Ohio and probably from other states. It is planned to form a permanent state campaign organization and to appoint a manager for Ohio.

"We're going to build up a fighting organization that will keep them stopping," Frank H. Hitchcock, the California's national campaign manager, declared.

In his address here last night Mr. Johnson attacked the administration for its past and proposed policies. He proposed a soldiers' bonus "out of the \$150,000,000 now in the United States treasury" and made it plain that besides the soldiers' bonus his campaign issues would include tax reduction, specially income; tax relief for the farmer; the world court; League of Nations; the administration's attitude toward shipment of arms to Mexico; the administration's foreign policy and apportionment of southern delegations to the national convention.

Referring to the Mexican situation Senator Johnson stated that the "United States is furnishing arms and munitions to Obregon in Mexico to fight revolution there."

"It is done, as stated by the secretary of state, to maintain stability and order and constitutional procedure in the neighboring republic," Senator Johnson said. "Our policy is that the United States should not furnish arms to Obregon."

"The United States government finally says to the people inhabiting this continent, if you dare fight for what you deem to be right, if you raise your hand against oppression and wrong, the most powerful nation of the world will come to the aid of those who think your oppressors and will maintain existing power."

ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF AMERICAN RED CROSS

ST. LOUIS, Jan. 4.—(AP)—The annual conference of the staff of the southwestern division of the American Red Cross, which comprises Missouri, Arkansas, Colorado, Kansas, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Texas, opened today. Work of 1923 will be discussed and the conference will continue until the middle of next week.

Love, who has been in Arkansas in the interest of McAdoo, says the strength of his candidate is growing steadily and he is confident that the former secretary of the treasury will be the Democratic standard-bearer.

HEARING ON INJUNCTION AGAINST STANDARD OIL IN CASE AT ATLANTA

ATLANTA, Ga., Jan. 4.—(AP)—An order was expedited today in connection with the hearing on a petition for an injunction filed recently by the Wofford Oil Company, seeking to restrain the Standard Oil Company of Kentucky, the Texas Company, Gulf Refining Company and the Galena Oil Company of Texas from committing alleged violations of the Clayton anti-trust act in connection with the operation of the four companies in Atlanta. Testimony was taken during yesterday's session of the United States district court with Judge Samuel H. Sibbey presiding.

George T. Wofford, president of the plaintiff company, submitted an affidavit in which he alleged that the four defendant companies sold gasoline from tank wagons at most offered secret rebates and in other ways indulged in unfair practices.

The defendant companies denied any violation of the anti-trust law and say their operations here were forced by keen competition.

Affidavits were introduced stating that the stock of the Standard Oil Company of Kentucky is widely scattered and that only three persons own as much as two per cent of the stock.

An affidavit made by I. G. O. Irvine, secretary of the Galena Oil Company of Texas, stated that the ownership of the company was almost entirely in the hands of the Galena Oil Company of Pennsylvania. The affidavits of ownership were brought into the proceedings at the request of the Wofford Oil Company, which alleged there was an interlocked ownership in the four companies.

FURTHER EVIDENCE COMMUNIST PLAN IS MADE PUBLIC

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4.—(AP)—Further evidence of communist propaganda in the United States in the form of a translation of a communication addressed by "American Communists" was published today as part of Secretary Hughes' defense of the administration's policy of refusing to deal with soviet Russia under present conditions.

The communication which appeared in the Moscow Pravda December 14, 1923, was purported to have been "written at the request of the American comrades."

The article declared that after having established a workers' party" the communist party must "become not a guild organization defending only the narrow class interests of the proletariat, but a party of proletarian revolution, of socialist upheaval, of the hegemony of the proletariat" and must conduct a "conquest of the peasantry" or small farmers.

NEW X-RAY TUBE FOR CANCER TREATMENT IS SUCCESS SAY EXPERTS

NEW YORK, Jan. 4.—(AP)—The new X-ray tube for cancer treatment invented by Dr. C. T. Urey, research engineer of the Westinghouse Lamp Company, will be a boon to cancer victims not only in effectiveness, but also in cutting down the high expense of treatment.

This was the conclusion reached by experts after the new tube had been used successfully at St. Luke's hospital during the past three months. Improvements being made on the apparatus are expected to result in great advances in the treatment of the disease.

Simultaneously with the announcement yesterday of the development of the new tube, it was announced from the research department of the Westinghouse company that another process was being perfected which would extend the use of the X-ray to internal organs, for which no electrical treatment has yet been devised.

QUARTER MILLION WILL BE USED FOR LABORATORY WORK

WILKES BARRE, Pa., Jan. 4.—(AP)—Mrs. Isabel Cairns McClintock, former trained nurse, has turned over to the Treasury National Bank to hold in trust the entire estate of more than \$200,000 bequeathed her by her husband, the late Dr. Andrew Todd McClintock, one-half the income of which is to be devoted to laboratory investigation of gastrointestinal diseases as a memorial to her husband. At her death the full income is to be applied to the same purpose.

Dr. McClintock, who died last August, was an eminent surgeon and pathologist. While at college he became interested with colitis which led him to devote his life to a study of gastro-intestinal diseases.

APPARENTLY DEAD FOR TEN MINUTES WOMAN REVIVES

CHICAGO, Jan. 4.—(AP)—After she had apparently been dead for 10 minutes from fright at the thought of a major operation, Mrs. Emma Wolf of Ontario, Ill., was revived by an injection of adrenalin chloride into her heart, according to Dr. Arthur G. Frey, who administered the treatment.

The patient's heart stopped while preparations were being made to administer an anesthetic for the operation, he said. In 30 seconds after the injection her heart resumed beating and she regained consciousness in half an hour.

PLAN TO RESTORE TOMB OF AN INDIANA PIONEER

BEDFORD, Ind., Jan. 4.—(AP)—The tomb of an American Tutanahuman, built for the ages and almost lost in a patch of brush, may soon be restored.

Over 100 years ago Winthrop Poole, an Indiana pioneer, began building the tomb which he said would last as long as the Pyramids. It lies in the heart of the limestone quarrying district here.

Poole's brother, Ziba, was drowned in 1818 and Winthrop died in 1852. Both are buried in the tomb hewn out of solid rock and sealed much as the burying places of the Pharaohs were sealed with a great slab of limestone.

Leaders in the limestone industry and Bedford citizens announced they intend to restore the tomb and make it accessible to the thousands who visit the quarry district each year.

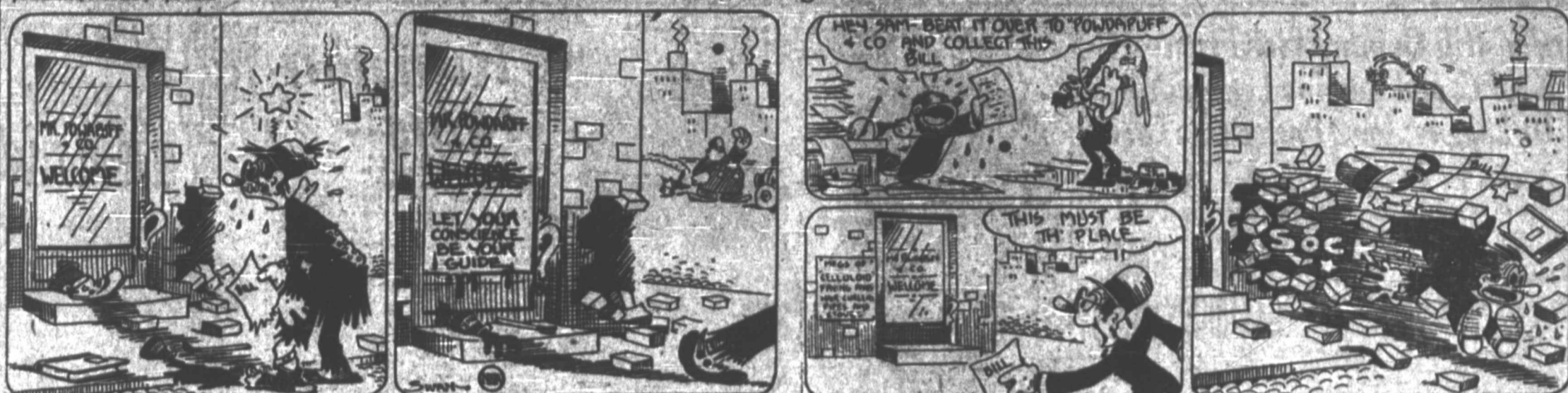

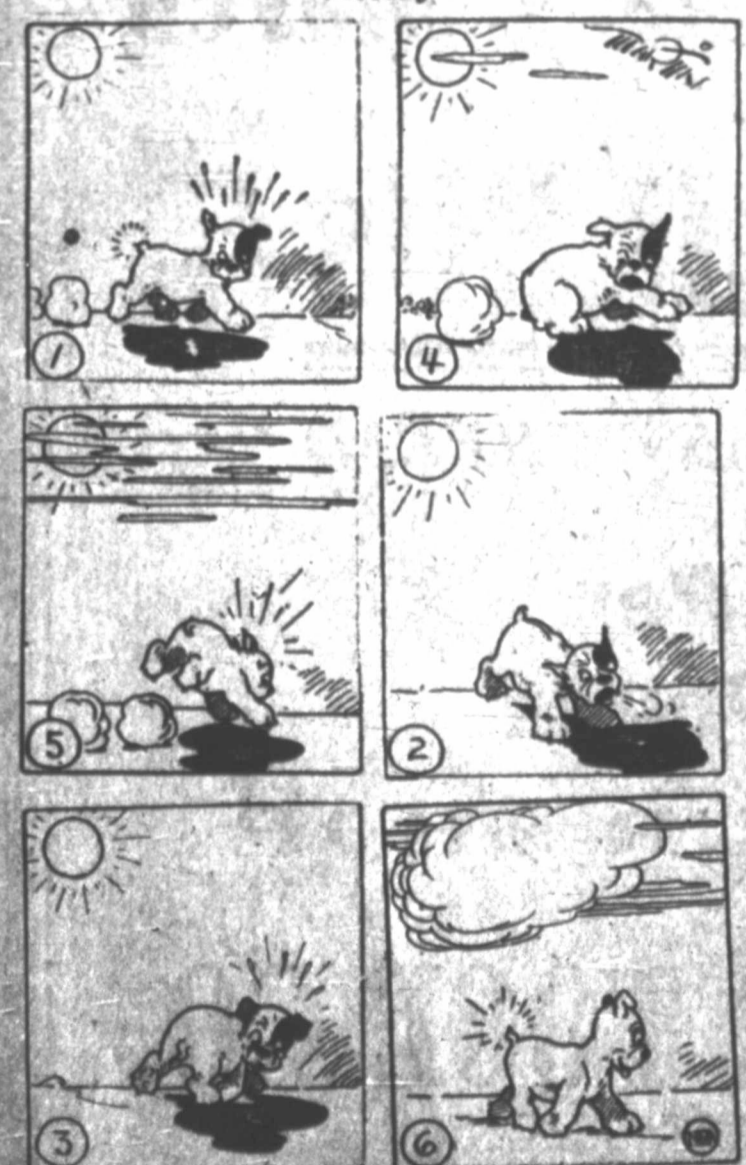

Cooking Fish.
Cod, smelt, halibut, haddock, turbot and scallops are at their best during the winter months. Scallops and scallops are only in season from October to March.

These six delicious, economical foods but too few housewives use them to advantage.

Scallops contain no waste and are really cooked and served in the home kitchen. The same is the "thing" that gives the professional touch to most fine dinners because the actual cooking of fish is of the simplest fashion. Boiling, broiling or deep frying are the approved methods.

There is no simpler way to cook fish than in deep fat. This is very important from the ordinary man frying fish. The intense heat of the deep fat quickly cooks the coating of crumbs and egg. This coating of shell which protects the delicate flesh of the fish from the too high temperature and cooks it perfectly.

The serving of fish adds or detracts much. Broken pieces tumbled into a platter rarely are enjoyed with the family. While neat, whole servings, garnished with sliced or sections of tomatoes are most appetizing.

If you find it impossible to turn a whole or half a fish when broiling it, cut it in pieces that you can handle. These are really fillets of fish and nothing to be ashamed of. Fillets are always prepared for deep fat frying if the fish is of any size at all.

Scallops with tartar sauce are a delicacy that any housewife can enjoy at home as well as in a fashionable hotel.

Fried Scallops.
One pint scallops, 1 egg, fine crumbs, frying fat.

Clean scallops and dry between towels. Season with salt and pepper. Heat egg slightly with one tablespoon water. Dip scallops in egg, roll in crumbs and drop in deep hot fat. Fry three minutes and drain on heavy brown paper. The fat should be hot enough to lightly brown an inch cube of bread from the soft part of the loaf in 30 seconds.

Tartar Sauce.
1/4 cup olive oil, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon mustard, 1/2 teaspoon powdered sugar, 1/2

teaspoon vinegar, 1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce, 1/2 teaspoon lemon juice, 1/2 teaspoon onion juice, 1/2 teaspoon paprika, 1/2 teaspoon celery salt, 1/2 teaspoon cayenne, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 1/2 teaspoon salt.

Mix mustard, salt, sugar, Worcestershire and cayenne with egg yolk. The egg and yolk should be very soft. Add oil with a fork until smooth. Add oil drop by drop, beating constantly. Add vinegar and mustard gradually. The oil may be added more liberally when about half is used. Keep on too until needed, then add remaining ingredients and serve.

One-half cup of mayonnaise is at hand if it is used instead of making the fresh dressing. The apparatus, consisting of glass jar and whisk, are added just before serving.

Scallops are a winter fish that are very popular with many persons. They are a small fish and are easily cooked whole. The same is the following recipe is unusual and delicious.

Stuffed Scallops with Anchovy Sauce.
Four large "scallops" scallops, 1/2 cup white stock, 1/2 cup anchovy paste, 1/2 cup milk and pepper, cream, parsley, salt and sugar, sugar.

Clean shells and lay flat on a hot plate. Add flour to bottom of the pan and stir until smooth. Roll in stock and let stand 15 minutes. Roll in cream and then in flour. Stuffed Scallops.—Select 2 to 3 pounds of round steak, cut 1/2 inch thick. Season with salt and pepper. Roll the meat so as to include the stuffing. Fry the roll with skewers or toothpicks, or if it will spring up as to retain the shape of the meat. Bake in a greased baking dish for 1 1/2 hours in a moderate oven. Pour around the meat a low flame 1/2 cup of water. Remove skewers or string. Serve on a platter.

Spanish Steak.—Select a piece of round steak one inch thick and weighing two pounds. Pound and season with salt and pepper. Lay in a greased baking dish or casserole. Cover with three or four strips of sliced bacon and one sliced onion. Pour around the steak half can of tomatoes. Cover the pan and cook in a moderate oven for two hours. It may also be cooked in a large pot of water, over a low fire of heat two hours. It is sometimes cooked very slowly for a longer period of time. This steak may be served with boiled potatoes, rice or macaroni.

LOCAL GAS SUPPLY WILL BE AMPLE DURING COLD SPELL, MANAGER SAYS

Plenty of gas will be available for every portion of the Municipal Gas Company, except a few of the large industrial users, H. E. McLaughlin, district manager of the company, stated Friday morning, following the arrival of a cold wave in Wichita Falls.

The supply of several of the large industrial users has been curtailed in an effort to give ample supply to other consumers during the cold spell.

Mr. McLaughlin declared that he would talk with officials of the Long Star Gas Company, wholesale distributors in Wichita Falls, during the day to insure the continued supply of gas to consumers in this city.

The Wichita Falls winter gas factory, the largest consumer of the gas, normally uses about 1,200,000 cubic feet of gas a day and the supply has been cut to about 100,000 cubic feet during the cold spell. The Ball Brothers factory,

another large consumer, with an average daily supply of 750,000 cubic feet, has been limited to about 500,000 cubic feet per day.

Other large industrial users have been limited proportionately during the cold weather. The indicators at 5 a. m. Friday showed a pressure of 195 pounds, which is almost normal. According to Mr. McLaughlin, the pressure varies during the day from 35 to 200 pounds, according to the time of day and the amount consumed.

"As far as I can see, Wichita Falls people will have an ample supply of gas during the cold weather," the manager stated.
