STORM DOES TEN MILLION DAMAGE

113 Dead Is Toll of Cyclone Which Passes Through Alabama, Georgia, Virginia, Louisiana and Arkansas.

ATLANTA, May 1.—A cyclone tore 1,000 miles through the heart of Dixie Wednesday and Wednesday night. There were 113 known dead, hundreds injured and millions of dollars in property loss. The death list, mounting throughout the night, is expected to exceed the present figures, and in South Carolina, where the cyclone reached the peak of its fury, destruction assumed the proportion of a state wide disaster.

Alabama shared with South Carolina the brunt of the storm's wrath. In the latter state there were eighteen known dead Wednesday night and property damage not yet ascertained. Georgia was the next hardest hit, with four towns hit, and five persons killed.

Fragmentary reports continue to trickle in from the storm area write a steadily increasing list of dead and injured early Wednesday night as the disturbance swept into North Carolina, the fifth state to suffer.

DO NOT INSTRUCT DELEGATES

Texas should not instruct its 40 delegates to the Democratic National Convention to be held at New York in June. Developments the past few weeks show that it will be inadvisable to tie the hands of the 40 delegates with specific instructions as to whom to vote in the convention.

The issue in Texas is going to be three-fold. The fight will be made to instruct either for Senator Oscar Underwood or William G. McAdoo or not to instruct the delegates. The precinct conventions will be held Saturday, May 3, and it is in these matters that the campaign should be opened for an UNINSTRUCTED delegation.

The voters should outline the principles on which they would like to have their delegates elected. Then, it should be up to the voters to elect their delegates based on their willingness to abide by the principles outlined. Delegates named at the precinct conventions should be willing to follow the principles on which they were elected at the county convention.

Texas can do its part by going to the precinct conventions Saturday. The voters should give instructions that recognize the validity of and demand the enforcement of prohibition laws. And above all things, specify instructions should be given against the grafters in Washington. We should do all in our power to rid the capital city of them.

Go to the primaries Saturday. Vote for principles upon which you would like your delegates to go to the National Convention. Then, elect men who will abide by them. Leave their hands free to vote for the candidates who loom as the men of the hour.

10,000 CHILDREN HEAR RADIO TALK ON MUSIC

England's first attempt at education by wireless broadcasting took place recently in London, where Sir Henry Walford Davies, professor of music at University College of Wales, broadcast a lecture on school music. Loud speakers were installed and more than 10,000 children in seventy schools followed the lecture.

Sir Henry was assisted by choir boys, illustrating the examples, taken mostly from Shakespeare's songs. C. P. Trevelyan, president of the board of education, said that he was impressed by the lecture and by the reports received from schools saying that the lecture was easily heard and that the children showed much interest.

FLYER LOST OFF ALASKA

Left Chignik, Alaska, in Face of Terrible Gale Wednesday and Has Not Been Found. Destination Was 400 Miles Away.

After 36 hours of tense search by every agency available, no word has been received from Major Frederick L. Martin, round the world flyer, who at 11 a. m. Wednesday hopped off from Chignik, Alaska, bound for Dutch Harbor, 400 miles southwest. Major Martin left Chignik in the face of a terrific gale which increased in velocity shortly after he took the air, and there is much anxiety over the safety of the globe flier and his mechanic, Alva Harvey, whom it is feared, have been lost in the sea or have met death at some point along the rough shoreline.

The coast guard cutter Algonquin, which has been scouting and assisting the world fliers wherever possible, is directing the search for the missing aviators. Other planes of the globe flight squadron are at Dutch Harbor awaiting their commander.

BUSY B'S.

The Raid on the Treasury.

LESS than four months of the session of the present Congress have witnessed the introduction of 12,000 bills and resolutions, most of them appropriating public funds. Of this number more than 1,000 call for appropriations in addition to those estimated for in the President's annual budget as required for the proper maintenance of the Government during the approaching fiscal year. These extraordinary appropriation bills carry a total of \$3,329,000,000, according to an analysis prepared for the National Budget Committee.

These legislative efforts to exceed the budget by nearly three and one-half billion dollars are only a part of the probable extent of Congress' appropriations program. Other items which may be added are \$100,000,000 for a department of education, \$500,000,000 for a bureau for marketing agricultural crops, and other "farm relief" measures proposing expenditures aggregating more than \$2,250,000,000. There are 795 public buildings and waterways bills whose cost would run into hundreds of millions of dollars.

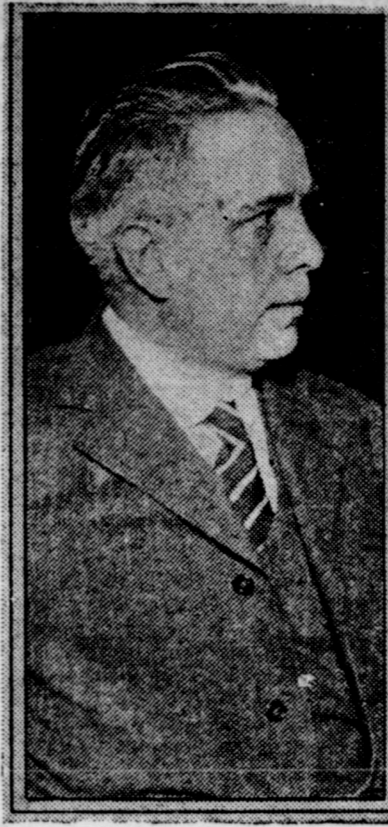
All these huge sums which Congressmen are seeking to withdraw from the public treasury, it must be borne in mind, would be expended for purposes entirely apart from the authorized activities of the Government which have been considered in the budget. If it should come to pass that all these bills were enacted, the activities of the Federal Government would be trebled, and the services of 1,500,000 employes would be necessary to carry on the work. At present, the force on the federal payroll, exclusive of the army and navy, is approximately 550,000. Tax reduction not only would be impossible, but levies would have to be raised beyond the wartime level to meet the huge Government expenditures.

"The introduction of these bills," says William P. Helm, Jr., who made the analysis for the National Budget Bureau, "is the greatest raid on the Federal Treasury in the history of our national life. In frenzied finance this session of congress apparently is the wildest that ever rode to Washington."

Thus Congress meets the national demand for economy in government and lower taxation.—Fort Worth Star-Telegram.

GOV. NEFF IS LIKE M'ADOO

Texas Executive and Ex-Secretary Are Alike in Many Ways. Neither Smoke—Both Joke.

Governor Pat M. Neff, of Texas, and William G. McAdoo are much alike. Whoa! Neff's friends rise up and demand a retraction of this statement. So do McAdoo's friends.

Still, here you are: Both men are over six feet, neither smoke; both are anything but showy in their dress; both have an inexhaustible supply of anecdotes; both shave themselves; both are lawyers; both natives of the south; both dry progressives; both dry enough to suit even Bryan; both are democratic Democrats.

There may be a little difference. For instance, Neff wants the Texas delegation to go to the New York Democratic national convention uninstructed for any candidate, while McAdoo prefers that Texas tell them whom to vote for. There are other slight contrasts. Neff wearing a big black sombrero and McAdoo a Fedora half the size of the governor's hat. And it is very noticeable that while Neff specializes in negro jokes, McAdoo tells them on himself. There's a little difference between the two, though for some reason the public seems to be all wrought up because the delegates should be uninstructed according to the gospel of Neff and instructed, according to the creed of McAdoo.

Here is Pat Neff's favorite negro joke, which never fails to make an audience laugh, even when such a serious question as instruction to delegates is being discussed.

"A negro woman sent to prison for 10 years for killing her husband," said the Governor, "was a trusty cook in the home of a prison commissioner. One morning she engaged in a quarrel with a negro man servant. 'Look heah, nig-gah man,' she said, 'does you all knows Ise sent heah for 10 years for killin' a nig-gah? If youse don't git away from heah mighty quick Ise goin' to make this mah permanent home!'"

WILL ESTABLISH FREE AGENCIES

AMARILLO, Texas, May 1. (U.P.)—Free employment agencies will be established in many cities of the state this year to facilitate the handling of laborers for the wheat growing sections, according to State Labor Commissioner Joseph S. Myers. The commissioner has established headquarters here.

Heretofore much delay and trouble was occasioned in getting laborers during the harvesting season. Now local officers of the organization are busy collecting data to act as a guide for the placing of the labor supply on hand.

Gasoline Is Lost In State Train Crash

MUSKOGEE.—Twenty-four thousand gallons of gasoline flooded the prairie near Inola at 8 o'clock last Thursday night when five cars of a Missouri Pacific freight train went into a ditch. The damage is estimated to be \$50,000. A broken truck on a car of molasses was fixed by the officials as the cause of the wreck. All trains were detoured by the way of Wagoner and Claremore.

TO ERECT MONUMENT.

CANYON, Texas, April 30. (U.P.)—A fund of \$1,000 is being raised by local citizens to erect a monument on the site of the Adobe Walls battle, one of the famous Indian engagements of the Panhandle.

About \$250 has already been raised. Committeemen said the contributions were being received from Oklahoma, Western Kansas, New Mexico, Texas and other states.

3,000 RABBITS ARE KILLED IN CAMPAIGN IN SWISHER COUNTY

TULIA, Texas, April 31.—The merchants and farmers of Swisher county staged a rabbit hunt with the result that more than 3,000 rabbits were killed in the county. Rabbits have become so numerous that they are destroying grain crops. Another day will be selected in the near future and another drive put on.

MOTHER'S DAY.

WE are coming again to the observance of Mother's Day when our thoughts turn more especially to the one whom, of all living human beings, we owe the most—the one whose love is never failing and who never knew too great a sacrifice, when the happiness and welfare of her children are concerned.

Mother's Day is observed on the second Sunday in May, this year falling on the eleventh, when everyone who wants to do homage to motherhood will wear a bright flower for the

mother dead. The carnation is favored over all flowers.

Mother's Day was originated by Miss Anna Jarvis, of Philadelphia, who founded the Mother's Day International Association, and the sixty-third congress passed a resolution fixing the Second Sunday in May Mother's Day and making it the duty of the president to proclaim it.

The late President Wilson issued the first Mother's Day proclamation in 1914. States also have given recognition to the day. In 1913 Nebraska designated Mother's Day as a state flag day; in the same year Pennsylvania made Mother's Day a state holiday, and since 1912 governors of Texas have annually pardoned deserving inmates of prisons on Mother's Day.

The original idea of Mother's Day embraced the simultaneous observance in every part of the world of the day and an acknowledgement of the love and reverence all men and women owe to their mothers.

In addition to the wearing of flowers as tribute to their mothers, those whose mothers are living, but from whom they are separated, are urged by the promoters of the observance to visit or write them upon Mother's Day.

Though we stress the second Sunday in May as Mother's Day, it really should be every day in the year, for it is a background in every heart. The love felt by a mother for her children and by her children for her are things apart. They are proved by service and sacrifice, not by words. They need no special emphasis.

STATE FINANCIAL REPORT SHOWS BIG IMPROVEMENT

AUSTIN, May 1.—The first day of May finds the state in a much stronger financial condition than it was a year ago, according to C. V. Terrell, state treasurer. At the close of business yesterday, the general revenue fund had on hand \$1,172,817. On May 1 last year this fund was empty, the state then being on a deficiency. The deficiency is not likely to return until July 1, Mr. Terrell said. During May and June \$617,000 came into the State treasury. If the same amount is received this May and June this year and there are no large appropriations to pay out the present cash basis will continue until July 1, Mr. Terrell said.

The total amount on hand in all funds, including special and general, at the close yesterday, was \$11,230,000. The last special fund is that of the highway department which has \$5,630,923.
