But unlike history's minstrel, Bill Wardoff cares only for the enjoyment he gives and obtains for himself by his unique concert.

School children, villagers, track laborers and all the isolated dwellers on small New Jersey farms have learned to wait for his tunes.

NO DEVICE ON THE WHISTLE
Leaving Camden on the Reading railway in the morning at 11.30, his run takes him to Atlantic City. The return trip is made late in the afternoon, with a laden train.

"All he uses is the whistle rope and the single tube whistle," declared fellow engine-men in the Camden round-house.

The company officials gave orders for him to stop. They do that quite often, it's nothing new. They don't mind Bill, it's his imitators that cause the difficulty.

"Whistling Bill" is 45 years old. Good nature is written all over his wind-toughened face.

"I've been railroading twenty-one years," he declared. "This whistle music just occurred to me one day. That's all. After awhile I got the hang of it. FIRE ATTRACTS BOLL WEEVIL

New Orleans Man Attracts Them With Bright Light And Burns Them.

Claiming that after years of study he has discovered a new method of destroying the boll weevil, E. Se. Amant, a New Orleans florist, has invited government agents, studying this enemy of the southern cotton farmer, to make an inspection of his method.

The florist insisted that his method works like a charm. The idea is very simple, he said, and consists of placing a strong light in the center of the field at night to attract the weevils' natural impulse to fly toward light. Around this light he would place a contrivance of his own invention, from which issues a strong fire which kills the weevil instantly.

"I have studied the weevil," continued St. Amant, "and have learned that for about one month during the life of the adult in the summer it is bothered by light—so much so that it won't work on the cotton bolls in strong moonlight.

"Working on this observation, I fixed up a fire in the field around a strong light with a contrivance that will kill the weevil the instant he reaches the light. Following my experiments, I have seen them lying dead by the millions around the light.

"One light will clean them out of a field two or three acres square. I found that it will kill a lot of other pests, too. It would surprise a planter to be shown the great quantity and variety of destructive insects that are attracted to the base of this light after a few days' operation."

St. Amant declared that if the government will place it at the disposal of the light to draw the weevil merely a discovery," he

stated, "but the contrivance that kills the pests, once they are attracted by the light, is my own invention."

WASHINGTON, March 26.—The Senate oil committee turned today from its public inquiry to consideration of pending legislation, but there were several developments incident to its labor outside of the committee room.

The contempt case of Harry F. Sinclair, lessee of Teapot Dome before the oil committee, is to be presented tomorrow to the District of Columbia supreme court.

The Treasurer accepted the resignation of Clarence C. Chase, son-in-law of Albert B. Fall as collector of customs at El Paso, Texas, but the House judiciary committee failed to act on the Senate resolution contemplating the impeachment proceedings of his refusal to respond to questions before the oil committee.

THE FARM

HAVE YOUR COWS TESTED FOR TUBERCULOSIS

You can have your milk cows tested for Tuberculosis by paying only the cost of the tuberculin. This will amount to \$.75 (Seventy-Five Cents) per cow. The services of the Agricultural Instructor are free. If you desire a test made of your cows, send in your name and I will form a circuit and save a little time by making the rounds. If I can group the cows it will be much easier to get around.

Send in your names at once. It is not advisable to make test on cows that are just ready to calve or on cows that have just calved. Wait for three or four weeks after calving before making the test.

Farm Poultry Profitable

The Vocational Agriculture Class of the Muleshoe School made a trip to Rogers, N. M. Monday and inspected the farm of Mr. Holland. Mr. Holland has an ideal country home with every modern convenience and equipment necessary for successful farming. He has a flock of 1270 pure-bred White Leghorn hens from which he received a farm labor income last year of \$200. The average farm labor income in the state of New Mexico last year was less than \$200, which shows he was far above the average.

The best growers of Texas had a year. Diversified good flock of poultry every farm. Every farm at least 200 good lay-arm. Take care of feed you.

By the way, Mr. Holland stated that he received Five Cents per dozen above the market price for his eggs the year around.

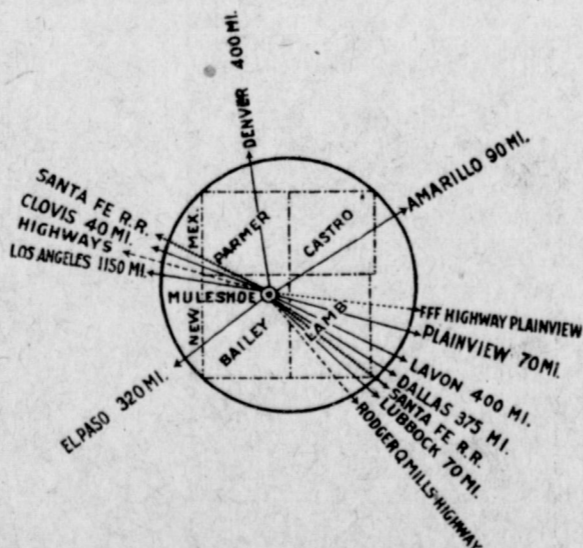
