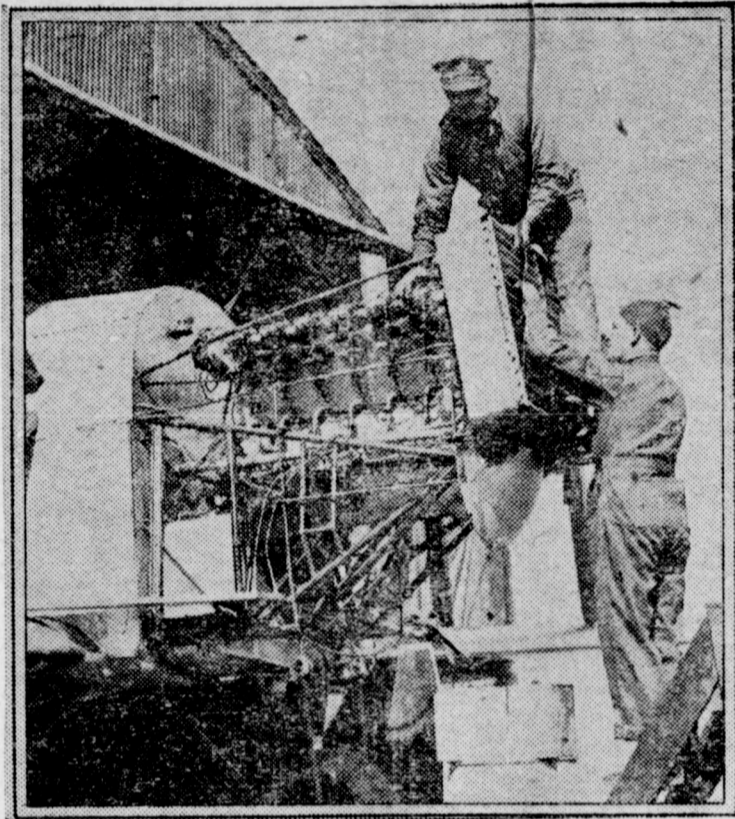

The railroad right-of-way was built by J. H. Heeley, who managed the Rock Island Construction Company, and original plans were to build from Dawson coal mines via Virginia to Montezuma, Mexico. joined in the farm organization work
and have given their support to co-
operative marketing plans, because
they know that by this means they
will be able to increase their farm
revenue.

Making farming more profitable
will make it more attractive to young
men.

The only way to compete with the
big cities that are drawing the boys
away from the farm is to meet them
on their own ground and use the
same weapons—a fair profit and a
reasonable amount of pleasure along
with work.
