



Oscar J. Adcock, 87, longtime Merkel resident, early day postmaster, and longtime elder in the Church of Christ, died at 5 a.m.


Funeral services were held at :30 p.m. Wednesday in Merkel Church of Christ, with the minister, Billy Patton officiating. Bu-
