## JUDICIAL SECTION—

### Judge Roberts Nominee for State Bar Vice-Chairman

Austin (Spl.)—District Judge Truman E. Roberts of Hamilton is the unopposed nominee for vice-chairman of the Texas State Bar's judicial section for 1967-68, the Bar announced.

Other officer nominees, also unopposed, are Justice Jack M. Langdon of the Fort Worth court of Civil Appeals for chairman, and District Judge James McCarthy of Dallas or secretary-treasurer.

The judicial section is comprised of more than 300 state judges whose courts range from domestic relations to the Supreme Court of Texas.

Ballots mailed to the judges give them opportunity to approve the nominating committee's choices, or to write in their own candidates. The judges also will vote on nominees for the executive committee, and will choose between McAllen and San Antonio as the site for the annual judicial conference scheduled the last week of September, 1968. Ballots must be returned by Nov. 6.

The 52nd Judicial District, over which Judge Roberts presides, includes Hamilton, Comanche, Coryell and Bosque counties. Prior to his appointment to the bench in 1961, he was district attorney for the 52nd District.

In 1960, Roberts served as president of the Texas District and County Attorneys Association. He is a graduate of Baylor University School of Law and was admitted to the Texas Bar in 1949. He has been on the judicial section's executive committee for the past 12 months.

## Game Warden Gives Additional Information on Deer Season

With the opening of deer season November 11, 1967 in the Possum Kingdom Regulatory Authority Area, Hamilton County will reach a milestone in game management and harvest procedure.

For the first time, a limited portion of the County will be opened to antlerless deer hunting by permit only. State law defines an antlerless deer as any deer, regardless of sex, which does not have a hardened antler protruding through the skin. The County area designated for antlerless deer permits is that which lies East of Farm Road 1602 bounded on the North by a point Northeast of Hico and bounded on the South by a point North of German Valley. A County map showing the affected area is posted in the Courthouse. It will be unlawful to hunt antlerless deer in any other area of the county.

In compliance with Senate Bill 295, passed by the last Legislature, antlerless deer permits will be issued to qualified landowners on Oct. 27 between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. at the Hamilton County Courthouse. Affected landowners desiring these permits must appear in person or designate an agent to appear for them. A designated agent must present a signed letter of authorization from the landowner to obtain

permits. Permits will be issued, at no cost, on the ratio of one to each 200 acres. A landowner must have a minimum of 200 acres to receive one permit. All acreage claims may be checked at any time with the county records. Each permit is good for one antlerless deer only, and may not be re-used.

The landowner is not required to use his allotted permits after securing them. He may, at his own discretion, issue them to hunters with or without charge or he may use them personally, adhering to the laws on licensing, tagging and bag limits. The permits are valid only upon the person's land to whom they are issued and are not transferable. Also, a permit is not valid unless signed by the landowner or his designated agent to whom the permit was issued. Hunters must secure these permits from the landowner or his agent and should bear in mind that it is a violation of the law to take or possess an antlerless deer without a valid permit. Landowners charging any type fee for hunting on their premises must secure a \$5.00 Shooting Preserve License before such hunting commences. These licenses will be available at the time permits are issued.

The decision by the Parks and Wildlife Department to hunt antlerless deer in the county this sea-

son was based upon accumulation and analysis of deer census line data previously gathered in September. This data reflected that deer were present in numbers sufficient to justify a dual sex harvest in the affected area. Such decisions to remove surplus deer from particular ranges is a vital part of deer herd management.

Common sense tells us that harvesting both sexes is sound and practical on some ranges. Selling only the bulls, the rams, or the billies from herds of domestic livestock is an impractical way to manage domestic livestock. Unless both sexes of livestock were marketed, our pastures soon would become so overstocked with females that the range could not produce enough forage to feed them. It works the same way with deer since they produce as many females as males each year. Poor deer management or no deer management will result in starvation for the entire herd. The surplus must be removed or the herd will exceed its food supply on a given range.

By applying proper deer management, which includes keeping numbers in balance with the food supply and preventing overuse of range resulting in serious encroachment on livestock and agricultural monetary returns, we can be proud of our deer herds in the future.

FORMER CORRESPONDENT WRITES TO OLIN HOMEFOLKS

Dear Mrs. King and Friends:

This week has marked our second year here in Gatesville. It doesn't seem like it's been that long since this family left the farm to move into town. It was a big change for all of us but the children readily adjusted. It would be hard to ever get the "country" out of Ed and me since country life is all we've ever known.

Thanks to Editor Meador of the Hico News Review for sending me the paper every week because I am a former correspondent. I appreciate this courtesy so very much. It enables us to know about the news around Hico and, of course, to know about our Olin friends from your news column, Mrs. King. We

share some part of the paper with friends just about every week.

There may be a hint of nostalgia in this letter because we can not think of Olin in any other way. We feel that we have so many good friends there. They were just wonderful to us and helped us in so many ways. We keenly felt their Christian witness because that's the area in our life we most needed help. They surely did not fail us. Maybe because of their interest in us and their concern for us, we can be of the same benefit to others.

Our children are growing up fast. Gary is 14, a freshman in High School. He is almost 6 feet tall. Believe it or not, the last pair of socks I bought him were size 13. What do you do when their feet

get bigger? Just let them wear a shoe box, maybe? He loves all sports. This past summer in track he entered the state meet at Richardson and was the only 14 year old to place in the high jump event. He is surely looking forward to basketball season. At present he is raising two black Angus heifers as his FFA project. Also he helped his daddy build a pigeon "hotel" in our back yard. Judy is now 11 and plays piano like a "pro." She is in Junior High and studies hard. She thrives on competition, and is an honor student. Jim Bob is a second grader, almost 8 years old. You know, a second grader doesn't have many problems or responsibilities yet so he's a happy one and has a big smile for everyone. He's a real daddy's boy.

Gatesville does have a wonderful school system and a good school spirit. By the time one finishes high school here, they are well equipped for college. I'm so glad many of our Olin young friends are in college. In this day and time a college education is a must. After all what is a few years spent in preparation for their lifetime of work ahead. I'm proud of our youngsters and wish for them the best.

We are members of the Live Oak Baptist Church, Royce Christmas is our pastor. The church is located just off the Temple highway about 1 1/2 miles from town. It's a large country church built among the oaks, very restful and peaceful. This church, like Olin, is a spiritual church with an active membership. We have many and varied activities for the young people, an extension department for the senior citizens and shut-ins, and jail services every Sunday afternoon. Our children have not missed a Sunday in Sunday school and church.

Just a word about our work here. Things have worked out so nicely for us that I am reminded of Romans 8:28, Ed is Youth Activity Supervisor I at GSSB, working





## On the Home Range

Do you purchase and eat potatoes often? Potatoes are an excellent source of food energy. They contain many minerals and are an important source of Vitamin C, little of which is lost if the potatoes are properly cooked. They also have some protein.

For best nutrition, potatoes come to dinner with their jackets on. This preserves the valuable vitamins.

Of the two ways of cooking in their jackets, boiling conserves more vitamins. If you must peel them, do so just before they're cooked. Never let them soak.

When you buy potatoes, look for clean, uniform-sized ones that are free from cuts, decayed spots, and have only a few shallow eyes. Sun-burned potatoes have spots of greenish flesh which may create a bitter taste. If you buy several pounds at one time store in a cool, dark, moist and well ventilated place. Buy the right kind for a particular occasion. For example, mealy potatoes are best for baking and mashing. Waxy ones hold their shape better, so they're best for salads and for creaming.

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Using washable wools instead of dry cleaning them can be an important money-saver for teenagers, college students and younger children. The "Wurlan" process for making machine washable wools shrink less than 1 percent and not require much pampering. Most of these wools today are made by similar processes.

To keep sterling silver flatware always ready for use, store it in a convenient drawer lined with washable cotton carpeting. The thick pile will cushion and protect the silver from scratches—and this type of storage chest is hygienic because the lining can be removed and sudsed by hand or machine as often as necessary.

Deer season is just around the corner and already the fever is running high. On November 11th it will sound like the Middle East war is next door in parts of Texas as thousands of eager hunters, including quite a few from Hamilton County, try to bag one to brag about.

Presuming that all the local dead-eyes bag deer, the next step, which is field-dressing, is all important. This should be done immediately after the kill.

If you need help to carry the carcass to camp or if you cannot carry it out immediately, hang it to a tree branch so the carcass will cool in the shade. Prop the body cavity open with a stick for better air circulation.

When carrying the deer to camp be as conspicuous as possible—you don't want to be shot by an over-anxious hunter. When buck-fever strikes some may shoot at anything with horns.

I would like to wish good luck to all Hamilton County hunters, including myself. I plan to be in a stand the first day or so of the season also.

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

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
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# Fractured 'Filosophy...

There was nothing unfair about the release of news by the Administration that an Anti-Missile Defense System was to be built. In fact, it was the hope that this column would provide the "scoop" but Defense Secretary McNamara made his announcement a few days earlier than expected.

Any way, here is more on the subject.

A hero out of Greek Mythology might have a name like SABMIS, but in this case it stands for Sea-Based Anti-Missile Intercept System. If developed it will mark the start of a new naval defense role. Its concept is to force potential enemies to spread their nuclear pattern, providing us with a greater in-depth defense.

The SABMIS plan is to place ships directly off the coast of Russia and China, equipped with intercepting Anti-Ballistic missiles. If enemy missiles can be intercepted relatively close to their launching, the

theory is that a nuclear attack against the United States would be blunted in the beginning. As mentioned, the Soviet Union is known to be developing a multiple warhead missile which breaks open at some point near the end of its trajectory and, hence, a warhead against several targets. By early interception, a single SABMIS could destroy all of them at one time.

The SABMIS ships would be intended to complement land-based NIKE-X installations in the United States.

When and if such a system is approved, Naval strategists believe that a mobile system could do for our defense what the Polaris submarine is capable of doing for our offense.

In support of the SABMIS idea, many men believe that moving seaward will compensate for the difference in size of the land area between the United States and Russia. Since Russia is approximately 2 1/2 times larger than the United States, targets for our missiles in Russia are, therefore, 2 1/2 times less vulnerable than are ours. In other words, we have 2 1/2 times less opportunity to protect our cities and strategic military installations than does the Soviet Union.

By placing anti-missile defenses forces at sea, nuclear fire would be drawn away from the industrial and population concentration of our cities. By the same action, the survival of our defense and offensive capability is enhanced.

In this age of nuclear weapons, the first strike against our Country must be directed against our military installations rather than a civilian population.

Enemy planners would obviously concentrate first efforts to reduce our power to retaliate.

Consequently, much of an enemy strike would have to be directed to SABMIS ships and Polaris submarines in a pre-planned nuclear attack. The result would be fewer nuclear warheads reaching our shores. In addition, the fallout as well as the destructive blast would be way out to sea and away from our population centers. No one suggests or apparently believes that there will be anything developed to guarantee absolute defense, but the theory of intercepting an ICBM early in its flight from an enemy base makes obvious sense. If workable, and our naval military strategists think it is, a sea-based system of defense would make it easier for the land based NIKE X to furnish remaining protection.

A secondary feature of the SABMIS defense system is the reduction of the need for proliferation of nuclear weapons. In other words countries friendly to us would not need to develop nuclear weapons, either offensive or defensive. If these nations are automatically under our protective umbrella of mobile SABMIS ships, their need for defensive armament would, at least be reduced if not eliminated.

Costly—yes. Everything is which relates to war and war possibilities. We can't afford it, but maybe we can't afford not to.
