## Christmas Bonus Program to Start

Hico merchants will again offer area residents an incentive to do their Christmas shopping locally, by staging the annual Christmas Bonus Days program. Participating merchants will begin issuing tickets this Saturday. No schedule of drawings has been released, but businessmen working on the promotion said that giveaways would probably be held on four separate days. The program has long been popular with area residents, and draws huge crowds to Hico on drawing days. Usually around \$500 in cash awards are presented during the month-long program. Thirty to forty merchants have participated in the program in the past, and a complete list of these merchants, along with drawing dates will be published next week.

Dr. W. F. Hafer of Hico has been elected to active membership in the American Academy of General Practice, a national association of more than 30,000 family doctors. As a member of AAGP, Dr. Hafer will be required to complete 150 hours of post-graduate medical study every three years. The program, unique among medical associations, is designed to help member physicians keep abreast of the latest scientific developments in medicine. Founded in 1947, the AAGP is the country's second largest national medical association.

## Hico Soldier in Vietnam Defends U.S. Fight Cause

Following are excerpts from a letter recently received by Mr. and Mrs. P. W. Hamilton, from their son, Sgt. P. W. Hamilton Jr., who is serving in the combat zone in Vietnam. The letter is being published in hopes that it will give local people a better insight of the conditions, causes, etc. of the American serviceman in Vietnam: "I am sitting here with a beautiful cold, runny nose and all. I spent the 19th, 20th and part of the 21st up in the jungles without a sleeping bag or change of clothes so I expected I would catch something. Normally the Calvary unit who brings us out on a helicopter to the abandoned airfields so that we can do reconnaissance duty in the surrounding area. I evidently forgot the Lieutenant and myself who were working

together. The chopper failed to return for us at the appointed time and we were alone in the rains. It became quite interesting before we found a friendly Vietnamese camp and were able to radio back for a chopper, so we spent two and a half days doing a three hour job, and it rained and continued to rain and we were wet and miserable, but believe it or not, I enjoyed it for the people were grand to us and it was a completely new experience to me and I liked it. "All is well with me over here. Believe me it is a different kind of war than any I have known and it makes it darn near livable to come in after three days in the jungle and take a shower, shave, and put on fresh clothes. This is something we never had in Korea so we are thankful for the small luxury this army provides.

"I have everything I need over here, or at least all the necessary items to exist half-way decent. I am with one of the best units in the country and I am proud to belong to it. We think we have the best commander and the unit has an outstanding record of achievement, plus I am working with my old Calvary unit from Japan and Korea, the 7th Regiment of the 1st Calvary Division. "These boys are fighting a bang-up war, and I wish the people in the States would get behind them and quit fighting against what we are fighting for. "Thanks for lending your ear to our problems as I thought you might be interested to some extent and that you have first hand information from me."

## Blanket Takes 42-22 Win From Tigers

Hico closed the 1967 football season last week, dropping a thrilling 42-22 game to the visiting Blanket Tigers. The game marked the end of a dismal season that saw the Tigers, thinned to a skeleton crew by injuries to key personnel, preventing what could have been a successful season. In the final game, Blanket jumped into a quick 12-0 lead, with the locals bouncing back to make the score 12-8 before end of the first quarter. Pin-point passing by Joe Tooley got the TD, with Jim Wolfe snagging the 36-yard scoring pitch. Howard Srader, playing despite a broken hand, banged in for two points, and the Tigers were just four points behind. Blanket made it 20-8 early in the second quarter, and the same passing combination of Tooley to Wolfe again narrowed the gap to 20-14 with a 15-yard aerial. Blanket came back and made the score 26-14 right before the half. Midway in the third quarter, the visitors upped the count to 34-14, and added another tally early in the fourth quarter to make the score 42-14. Howard Srader got the last Hico marker on a one-yard plunge late in the game, making the final count 42-22.
