American Heritage Program Presented at P-TA Meeting

Bert H. Lawrence, Executive Director and Secretary of the Texas Bureau for American Understanding, of Dallas, featured speaker at the Hico P-TA meeting Monday evening. The Texas Bureau for American Understanding, of which Lawrence is one of the incorporators, has been promoting and conducting deep studies of American Heritage of Great in public schools across the state since 1948. It is their contention that unless the reasons for America's supremacy among all nations are re-learned hurriedly and thoroughly, the superior way of life may well be lost forever. Lawrence stated that the purpose of working with today's youth is to help them discover the truth and the importance of the one in which individuals believe in God and the power of prayer. He asked parents and teachers to help students realize they live in a nation that has a heritage never before known by any other society; and that socialism could become a real peril of this nation. Jan Daehnert Will Receive Masters Degree From Seminary

Wm. Jan Daehnert of Belton will receive his Master of Divinity Degree from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary during the annual winter commencement exercises December 21 in Truett Auditorium. President Robert E. Naylor will present degrees in church music, religious education, or theology to 119 candidates. They will join over 11,000 Southwestern Seminary graduates serving every continent. Dr. Elvin Skiles, president of Hardin-Simmons University will deliver the commencement address. Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, owned and operated by the Southern Baptist Convention, is the largest evangelical seminary in the world. Pittman of Stephenville and Mrs. Buster Duncan of Hico; two brothers, J. D. Seago and Perry Seago, both of Waco; and five grandchildren. Funeral Services Held Wednesday at Hamilton For Sam W. Butler

Sam Walter Butler died Dec. 4th in the Hamilton County General Hospital after suffering a heart attack two days earlier. Funeral services were held in the Presbyterian Church on Wednesday, Dec. 6, at 2 p.m., with Rev. Bill Caldwell officiating. Burial was in Oakwood Cemetery at Hamilton. Mr. Butler was born in Atoka, Okla. on July 20, 1913. He was married to Miss Kathleen Kaye Kelton in Oklahoma City July 4, 1940, and they moved to Hamilton from San Antonio in 1950. Car Titles Will Be Required to Get 1968 License Plates

Mrs. Pearl Williams, County Tax Assessor-Collector, said this week that automobile titles will be required when 1968 license tags are bought. The change in procedure is statewide and was brought about by the institution of a computer system in the license bureau. Because the computer demands accuracy and license receipts often contain errors, tags will no longer be issued from last year's receipt. It will be necessary to present either the original or a duplicate title in order to obtain new tags. 1968 license tags go on sale Feb. 1 of next year. Mrs. Williams and her deputy, Mrs. Glenda Jones, attended a five-county school for explaining new license regulations at Lampasas Nov. 21. The school, like others held over the state, was part of the advance training and information on the State change-over on vehicle registration titles which will go into effect in 1968. Certificates of title to a motor vehicle will change in size and information as the vehicle is sold or a new title is needed. The new title forms will be rectangular in shape. Cost of license plates will be increased. The schedule of registration fees has changed from 100 lb. weight groups as in the past to 1,000 pound weight groups for passenger cars. They will be divided into four classifications: 0 to 3,500 pounds, \$12.30; 3,501 to 4,500 lbs., \$22.30; 4,501 to 6,000 lbs., \$30.30; and 55c per hundred pounds for cars weighing over 6,000 pounds. All license plates will be reflectorized and 30c of the fee will go for that purpose. Beginning in 1969 the registration receipt will be mailed to owners of vehicles from the Texas Highway Department Motor Vehicle Division. This will speed up the pre-registration at places where license plates are sold. This means that errors on 1968 titles should be corrected so that owners will receive their receipts for 1969.
