Wednesday is Last Chance to Register

With the deadline for registration only a few days away—Wednesday, January 31—Texas voters over 60 years of age have been reminded of a new law which requires every voter to register, regardless of age or place of residence. Heretofore, voters over 60 years old were required to register only if they lived in a city of 10,000 or more inhabitants.

Anyone who is now eligible to vote or who will become eligible by February 28 may register at this time. The 1968 voting year begins March 1 and runs through February of 1969.

Local residents may register at the City Hall, or use the printed application form which appears in this week's issue. If the application is mailed to the County Tax Assessor-Collector, the postmark must not be later than January 31. An application which is mailed too late to be postmarked on that date does not comply with the law, even

though it is deposited in a letter box or post office drop box before the deadline.

The registration form appearing here may also be used by residents of Erath and Bosque counties, and mailed to their respective tax collectors.

Mrs. D. L. McCoy has volunteered to work the last two days before the deadline at Hico City Hall, taking applications which will be mailed to the tax collector. She will also Mrs. A. H. Lackey, City Secretary.

A political calendar elsewhere in this issue reveals the number of elections already slated for 1968, but does not include any number of special elections which could come up during the year.

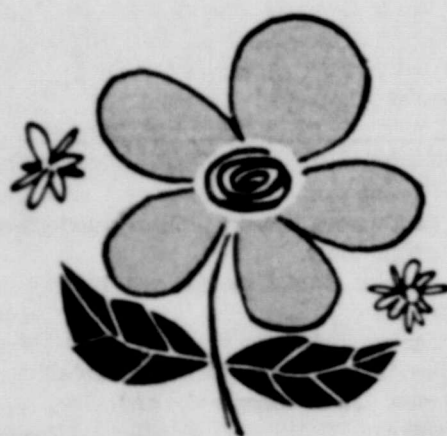

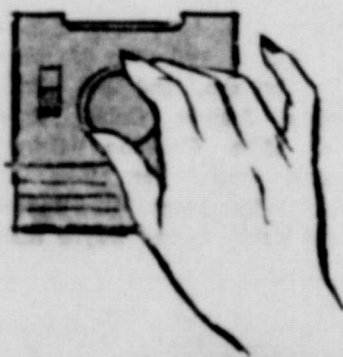

BLACKBERRY JAM CAKE
2 cups sugar; two-thirds cup butter; one cup milk; 3 eggs; one cup blackberry jam; 3 cups flour; one teaspoon nutmeg; one teaspoon cinnamon; one cup raisins; one cup pecans; one cup walnuts.

Cream together butter and sugar. Beat in the eggs, add the jam, then the milk. Sift together the flour, spices and soda. Chop the raisins and the nuts and stir into flour mixture. Then add to the creamed mixture. Beat and mix well. Pour into three greased and floured 9-inch pans. Bake 30 minutes in 350 degree oven. Cool slightly before removing from the pan.

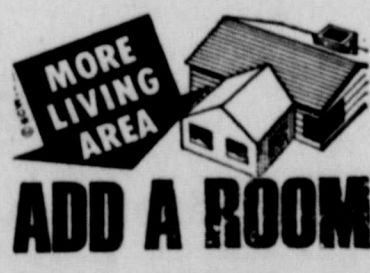
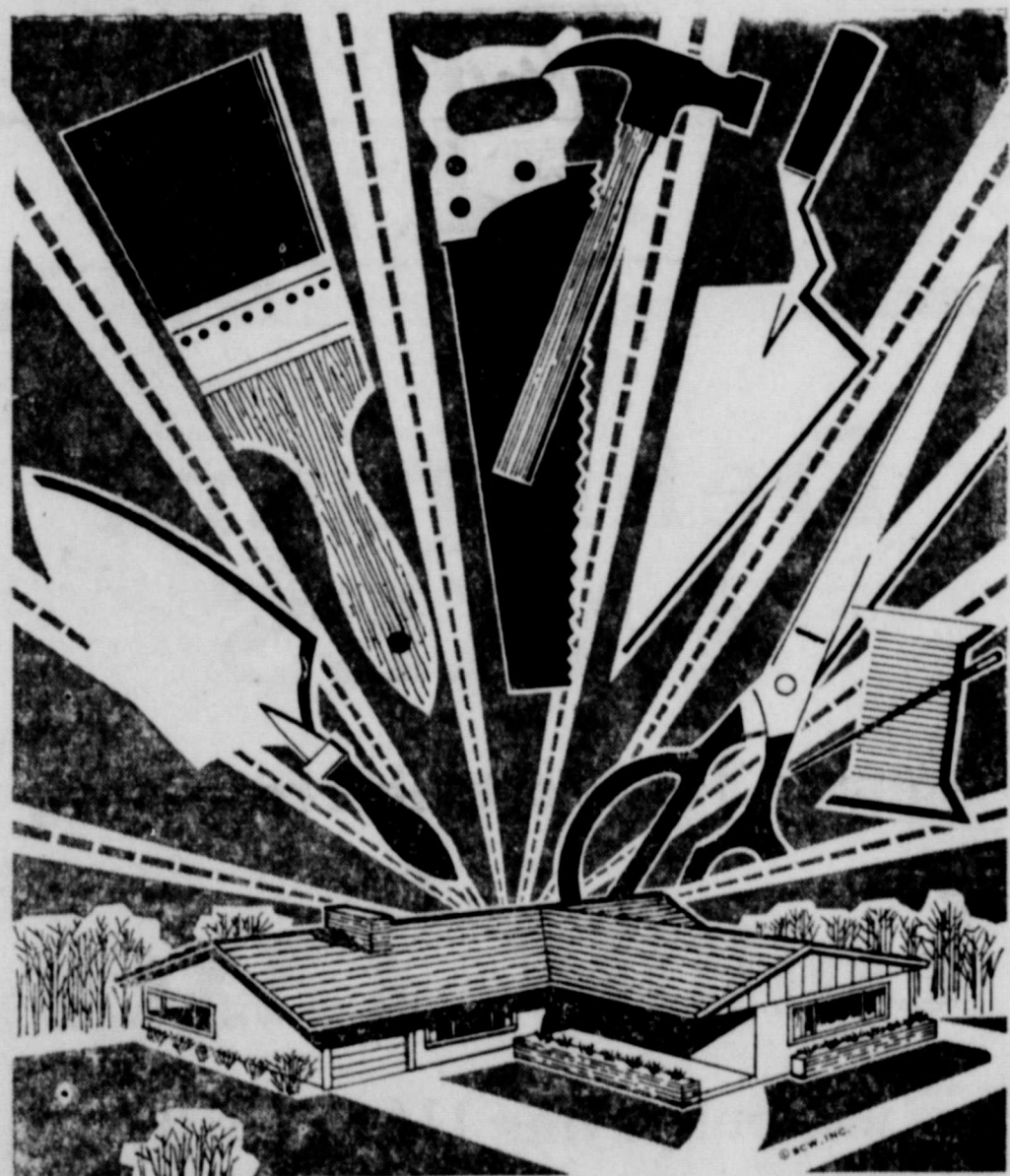

"As it looks from here"

Washington, D.C. — We usually think of our country being self-sufficient in everything and that the import of foreign goods and raw materials is not necessary.

As a matter of fact, we must import 9 of the 15 basic minerals to maintain our progress and standard of living.

An analysis of our needs also supports the proposition that we need to import many finished products, as well as raw materials. In addition, if we expect to have markets for our own goods abroad, there must be some reciprocity.

Having said this, our foreign trade position is becoming more critical as other nations develop their competitive advantage. In some instances we have helped them by Foreign Aid to reach their competitive status.

To bring this matter directly home, we have real stakes in our own area. To mention a few—oil imports which vitally affect independent producers and refiners; watch movements and parts which compete with TIMEX Corporation in Abilene, employing upwards of 700 people, many of whom are women supporting or supplementing family income; Textiles—wool, cotton and mohair—to compete with cotton gloves, manufacturers of men's work clothes, fatigues, women's blouses and other manufacturers located in our 17th Congressional District.

An industry which affects the entire area is, of course, agricultural, which is affected by many product imports. Cotton, wool and mohair are affected by textiles; imported meat is a factor at the moment in the price of cattle and sheep; dairy imports are presently affecting our dairymen.

In the case of oil and watches, the problem for us locally is further complicated by the fact that our own American industry, with plants and production abroad, is able to produce and import more cheaply than they can do so at home.

In the case of cotton, Japan, for instance, is one of our largest customers. At the same time, they are able to produce exports to this country and undersell domestically manufactured textiles. While our textile manufacturers must pay approximately \$2 per hour for their labor, Japan's rate is approximately 78¢. The domestic oil industry is competing against uncontrolled production in the Middle East, with labor costs of about 28¢ an hour.

The most effective and lasting

method of fighting poverty is to assure jobs at all levels of skill and training. While we are concerned with the betterment of all people, it seems we should be attempting to assist in the creation of new and expanding job opportunities for workers of the United States. To permit industries to deteriorate because of foreign competition is not only preventing the creation of new job opportunities, but sacrificing existing jobs. Many jobs, and even some large industries, are being sacrificed on the altar of liberal trade. The prospect is for it to get worse before it gets better.

The executive department has proper authority under the Trade Agreements Act to see that our home industries and the jobs they provide are not injured by excessive imports. This is the job of the Federal Tariff Commission, with all departments of governments having a hand in it from the standpoint of economics and national defense. Congress has the Constitutional authority to regulate commerce with foreign countries. It is not a matter of authority not having been granted, but rather, the administration of the law. Decisions finally rest at the White House.

Unless our government adopts a policy of tighter negotiations and administration on our trade agreements, with the interest of the United States placed before anything else, Congress must assume the responsibility for doing so.

All these considerations are important enough without the problem of the balance of payments, which, in itself, would constitute reason for extreme caution.

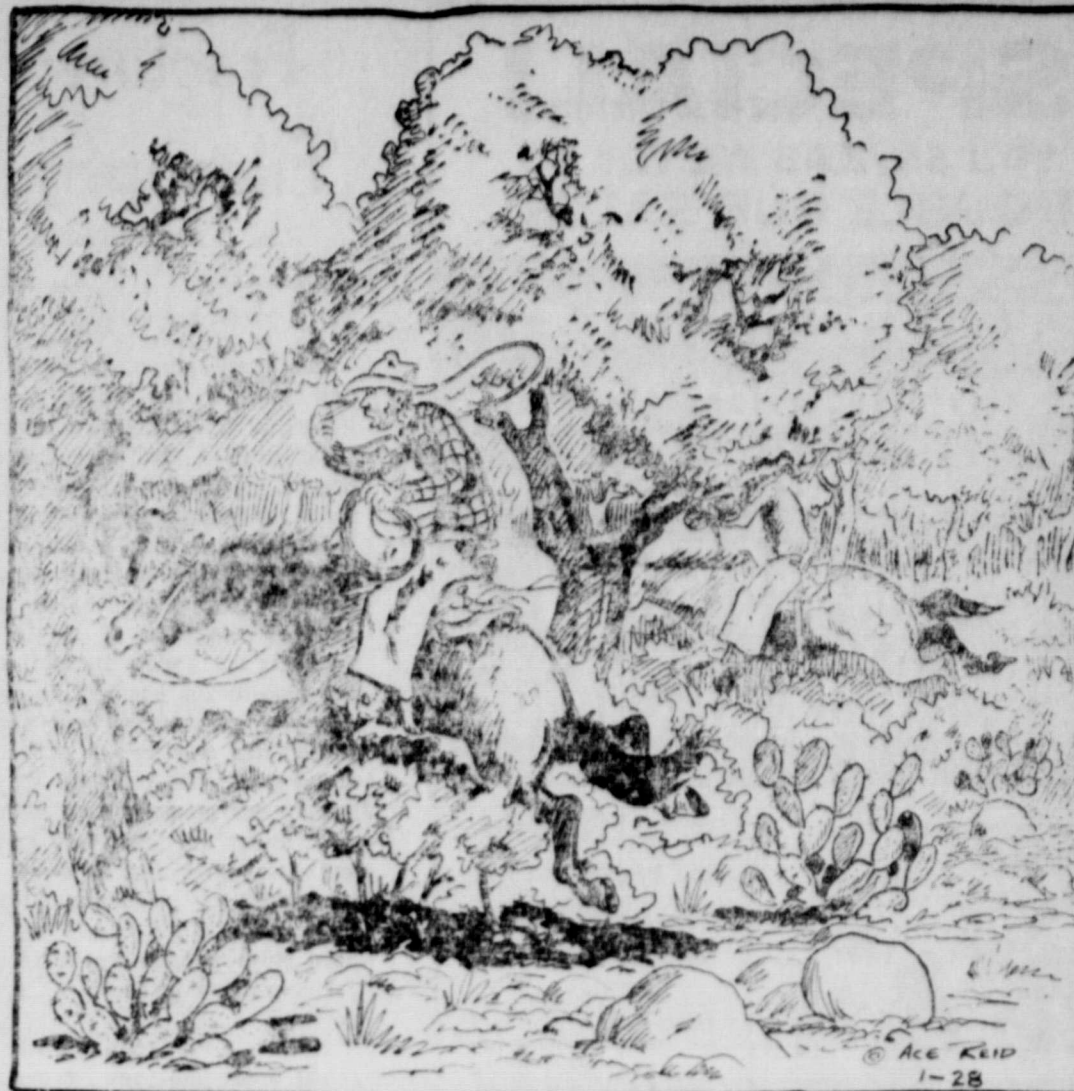

Last day to pay City, School and County taxes is Wednesday, Jan. 31, unless you want to pay penalty and interest after that date. Penalty on city and school taxes is 8 percent, plus one-half of one percent per month for each month thereafter that the taxes are delinquent. In other words, taxes which are delinquent for one year are subject to a total of 14 percent in penalty and interest.
