Entries Down Some, But Stock Show Was Still a Success

A cold blustery wind blew most of the day Friday, but failed to hamper spirits of entries and spectators alike at the 21st Annual Hico Stock Show held at City Park.

A total of 279 entries were recorded in the show, down some from the normal 300-350, but quality of stock more than made up for lack of numbers.

A record number of entries in the swine division got the show off and running at 9 a.m. Friday. The goat division, which normally draws a large number of entries, was down considerably this year, with 32 head entered. The sheep entry list showed 53 head as compared to 80 last year, and 120 the year before.

A strong beef division recorded 60 entries, and 41 head of dairy dairy animals were entered.

Fifteen dogs were entered in three divisions, and an exhibit of three Santa Gertrudis cattle from Surprise Valley Ranch brought the overall total to 282 head. One of the animals on exhibit was the grand champion at Fort Worth this year.
