New City Officials Installed Tuesday

W. C. Howard, Hico mayor the past two years, presided as his last official act as head of the city government by swearing into office new mayor O. L. Davis and councilman Ray Keller in a called meeting Tuesday evening.

Davis in turn took the chair to swear in Howard as councilman, and Jim Jameson, who was re-elected to a seat on the council.

Davis was unopposed in the mayor's race, and Keller, Jameson and Howard won seats on the council over three other candidates, in-

cluding incumbent Tommie Pierce. The voting was as follows, with 141 total ballots cast:

Prior to swearing-in ceremonies, Howard read the following statement: "The duties of the council is to evaluate and canvass the recent election. The election judge submitted a tally of 141 votes. In accordance with the law of the Texas Election Code, the names making up this total have been checked with the County Clerk to see that all voters had registered, and it was found all names had been properly registered. Next, these same names were checked with city records to see if all voters resided within the city limits of Hico. Let it be entered in the minutes that five (5) ineligible votes were found. These five being residents outside the city limits. As Mayor, it is my duty, as previously stated, to submit

these findings to the council for their action."

After reading of the above, motion was made and seconded that election returns be certified, said motion carried.

After taking the chair, Davis complimented the mayor and council for their past work, and asked for cooperation of the body in the work ahead. He also said that he considered it an honor to serve as mayor, and that he wanted to be a good official.

School Election.

Voting was equally as light in the school trustee election. Only 145 ballots were cast. There was no opposition in the election, with three names on the ballot for three places to be filled.

Receiving votes were: Guy Bulman, 142; Tommy Johnson, 142; and D. L. McCoy, 140.

Those elected will take the place of M. I. Knudson, Bobby Needham and Chester Land.

V. H. Jenkins received all 145 votes cast for county trustee of Precinct 3, and Lagree West polled 141 votes for trustee at large.

Annual Dog Shoot Held Last Wednesday

Every dog had a chance to have his day in the Hico area Wednesday of last week, when Hico FFA Chapter sponsored the annual dog vaccination day.

Dr. Johnny Putty offered his services to the local high school organization, and vaccinated a record number of 134 animals.

Government Commodities Are Now Available to Residents

The State Department of Public Welfare, Commodity Distribution Division, has executed a plan and contract through the County Judge and the Commissioner's Court for USDA commodities to be made available to low-income families in the county.

The plan in no ways effects, nor will it decrease the amount of assistance received by recipients of Public Welfare, Social Security, or compensation received by veterans from the government.

There are standards that are applicable to each individual home according to size and total income of each home, according to Beryle A. Turner, County Supervisor of

the program.

The allowables are:

Family Size	Income Maximum
1	\$100.00
2	\$150.00
3	\$170.00

(Above three persons, add \$20.00 to each additional person in the family through ten. Add \$15 to each additional person in the family above ten).

Resources allowable for a family to be eligible for commodities were listed as follows: homesteads; necessary household goods; essential transportation; cash or loan value of insurance up to \$1,000.00 or less per person; livestock necessary and sufficient to provide produce for the family; and tools of trade are not considered. All other resources must be considered including loan and/or sale value of real estate other than a homestead; cash on hand in a bank or elsewhere; bonds; excessive life insurance, and excessive livestock.

The resource maximums are: One person, \$300; two persons, \$450. Turner urged all families in the county who think that they can meet the standards set forth to make application. The office is located at 313 North Bell St., Hamilton. Arrangements may be made at a later date to set up a sub-office in Hico for distribution of the commodities.

Students Exhibit Science Projects at Regional Fair

High School science students exhibited their class projects at the Central Texas Regional Science Fair at Baylor University April 10-12. Hico projects were among the best displayed in the Rena Marrs Gymnasium. The fair, held at Baylor University, gives Hico students an opportunity to meet other interested students and professional scientists. The local students obtained permission to attend the fair and exhibit their projects at the local fair held during Public Week.

Students participating in the fair were Miss Cherry Ramage, Billman and Mike Robinson, science students. Also Misses Robinson, Johnette Walker, Walker, and Jim Ferguson, biology students. Ramage's project, "What You Really Done to Your Hair" in the chemistry division project received an honorarium, and she was presented Certificate of Award and Achievement.

Walker's project, "Flying Saucers" placed second in the Mathematics Engineering Division. "Lift Test" was the title of Robinson's project and it appeared in Army and Air Force personnel. Robinson received an honorarium to visit Fort Hood as a member of the U.S. Army.

Biology students competed in the high division. Miss Robinson exhibited "Plants in Gases" for the purpose of determining the effects of gases that pollute the air on plants.

Walker's project, "Oxygen in Plants," was set up to determine the amount of oxygen developed in plants. "Plant Branding" was exhibited by Johnette Walker. Her project demonstrated the newest type of dye which does not retard hair growth but only kills the color cells and the brand appears white.

Robinson's "Kaleidoscope" was set up to learn the effects of heat escaping from a heat trap moving over colored cellophane. Ferguson received a letter of commendation from the Baylor department commending him for the artistic aspect of his project. Projects were judged Thursday and were on exhibit for public viewing Friday. Exhibitors were to be with their projects for the weekend, then they were given an award and were able to take their projects to the Baylor campus and exhibit individually with scientists and

We can well remember finishing picking our cotton around Christmas and we helped our dad finish up his cotton in March, 1920. We had to pick it all as there were no gins as well as we remember, that could gin cotton in the burr. The burrs were quite rotten from the wet weather. Threshers were used to harvest grain. The shocks were green with growing grain before the crops were threshed in October or November.

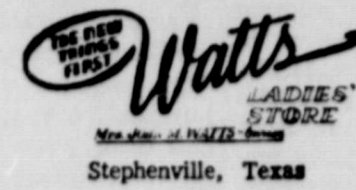

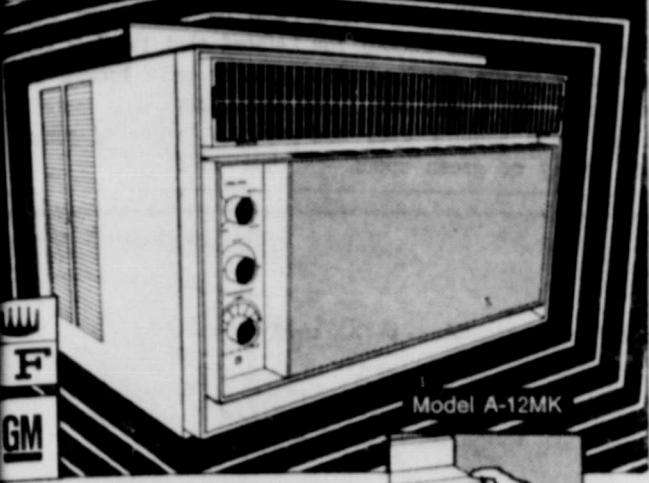

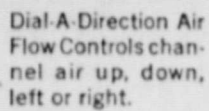

Fractured 'Filosophy...

By J. Rayford Wooten

"OUR HOPE IN CHRIST"

"Let not your heart be troubled: ye believe in God, believe also in me. In my Father's house are many mansions: if it were not so, I would have told you. I go to prepare a place for you. And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again, and receive you unto myself, that where I am, there ye may be also." (St. John 14:1-3). Thus spoke Jesus to His disciples shortly before His betrayal, mock trial, and crucifixion. What a promise! What a hope! And yet, those disciples who were permitted to share daily living with the Saviour were not able to comprehend what He was talking about. It was still a fervent desire of the people who had association with the son of God on this earth, that He would set up an earthly kingdom. To accept the fact that Christ was talking about a heavenly kingdom, and life after death, they could not understand.

I am sure we all know the Scriptural account of the events that followed: How Christ was betrayed by one of the disciples; how, before Pilate, the Roman Governor, He was brought in bonds, and accused of many things by the chief priests of the Jews, and how the mobs cried out that one (Barabbas) should be released unto them on this feast day, and that Jesus should be crucified. We also know the Bible story of how Christ was nailed to the cruel, Roman cross to die, and after He had given up the ghost, He was buried in a tomb, and the tomb was sealed with a great stone, and a guard of soldiers were on watch to keep the tomb secure. (Jesus had foretold of His resurrection on the third day, and the Romans were determined this should not happen, by some of His followers stealing the body away). The story is beautifully told in St. Mark 16: 1-8.

We quote, "And when the sabbath was past, Mary Magdalene, and Mary the mother of James, and Salome had brought sweet spices that they might come and anoint him. And very early in the morning the first day of the week, they came unto the sepulchre at the rising of the sun. And they said among themselves, 'Who shall roll us away the stone from the door of the sepulchre?' And when they looked, they saw the stone was rolled away: for it was very great. And entering into the sepulchre, they saw a young man sitting on the right side, clothed in a long white garment: and they were affrighted. And he saith unto them, 'Be not affrighted: Ye seek Jesus of Nazareth, which was crucified: He is risen; he is not here: behold the place where they laid him.'"

The brief story narrated here, and the testimony of an Angel of God to the risen Lord cannot be set aside as anything but the glorious truth that He arose as He proclaimed He would, and that He will

On the Home Range

When the recipe calls for one ounce of chocolate, you may substitute 3 tablespoons of cocoa and one tablespoon of fat.

To prevent spoilage, place opened jars of preserved fruit products, such as jellies, jams and preserves and opened cans of fruits and fruit juices in the refrigerator. Any of these may be stored safely in the original container, glass or tin, but it's best to cover the top.

Potatoes are the most popular vegetable sold in the grocery store. They are available in many forms, but for economy, buy them fresh. There is a variety of forms to select from in planning the family's menu—canned, frozen, instant and fresh.

Bagged potatoes usually sell a little less per pound than loose ones, but read the label and make your selection carefully. When selecting potatoes in small lots, choose the size according to the way you plan to cook them. Best ones are firm and clean, have shallow eyes and no cuts, decay or green spots.

The characteristic flavor of potatoes will vary with the variety of potatoes. Potatoes stored for a long time, especially in a paper or plastic storage container, should be cool, have no green spots, and be free of light. The potatoes should be kept dry.

Potatoes cooked along with other foods in a variety of ways avoid the monotony of food being used often.

Increased Vocational Program Advocated By Herman Stone

"It has been suggested that I deal in so-called political double-talk," said Herman L. Stone, a Democratic candidate for a seat in the Texas Legislature.

"I've been told that I should talk a lot, and that when I get through I should not have said anything that could be construed as a campaign promise.

"But I don't believe in that political theory," he continued. "I consider myself an independent thinker interested only in serving to constantly improve the economic, educational, law enforcement, and future growth of the 54th Legislative District.

"That's why I feel compelled to speak loud and clear to the people of Bosque, Hamilton, Johnson, Mills and Somervell Counties. I don't want a misunderstanding as to what I stand for, what I believe in, and what will strive to accomplish as your next State Representative," the Route 1, Cleburne, candidate said.

Among those subjects on my list of things to do is to help improve our educational program. I've learned a lot since I made my decision to enter the race for State Representative. I went to Austin to confer with the senior people of our state educational system."

Stone said "I was informed that about 15 percent of our high school graduates enter college. That's fine, and I wish them every success. But they really don't concern me as I know they'll make it—they'll emerge from college as well-educated, well-oriented men and women who are mentally and socially prepared to meet the problems of the world.

"My prime concern is the 85 percent who, for one reason or another, are unable to enter college. I'm confident that most of them would like to enroll in college, but can't because of the high cost of tuition, books, living and other expenses."

The long-time Arlington General Motors plant employee said "The lack of a well-grounded education in this day and age spells almost certain doom for the youngsters entering the world from the high school classroom. Actually, they aren't truly qualified to do any specific job other than manual labor. They lack marketable skills. Their knowledge of careers available to them is limited. Most of them don't know where to go to train for jobs of their choice. They don't know how long it'll take to acquire the skills necessary for them to qualify for a well-paying job."

"I learned in Austin," Stone said, "that the state educators agree with my philosophy. They are slowly getting into technical and vocational training. But the high schools must request it on a voluntary basis.

"I firmly believe that a comprehensive technical training should be included as a part of the scholastic requirements for a high school diploma. I believe the high school student should be equipped to do more than enter today's chaotic world with nothing but a diploma to show for his high school efforts. He should be trained to do something that will make him eligible for immediate and satisfactory employment upon graduation."

"As it now stands," Stone continued, "the high school program is aimed at preparing students for college—not life. Most of the 85 percent of high school graduates who are unable to enter college would like to go there. Others, however, are not interested in furthering their education."

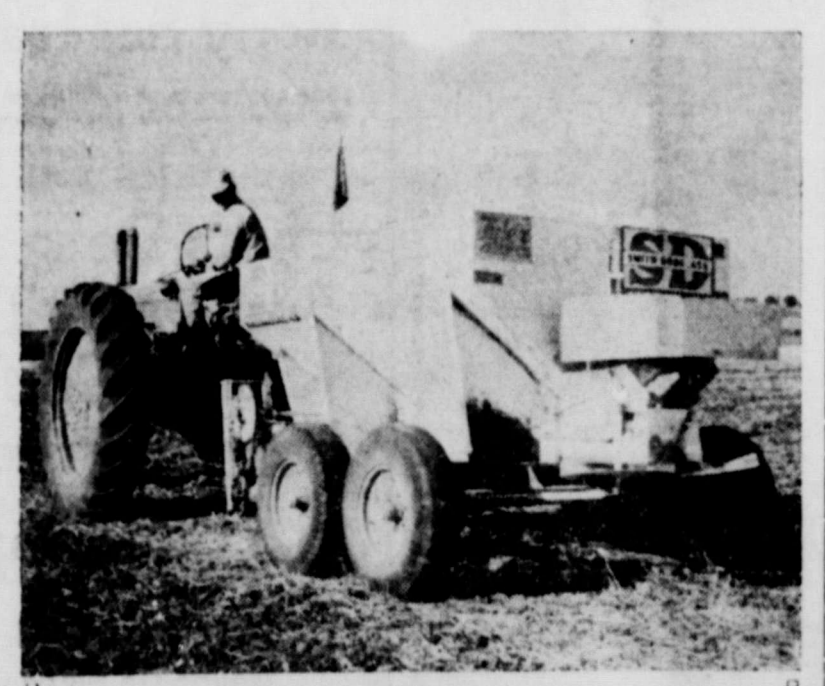

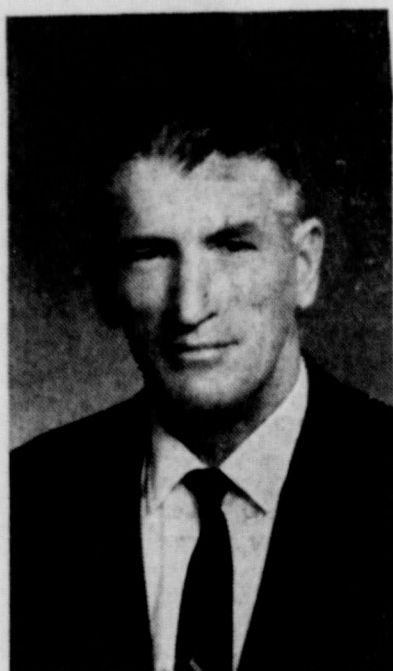

"At the same time," he said, "the Federal Government can not and should not try to take care of everything from Washington, either foreign or domestic. The Federal Government has grown to colossal proportions and centralized power in Washington has increased." Burleson pointed out. "To this I am opposed and my record is clear in this respect."

Burleson is among the senior members of the U.S. House of Representatives in point of service. His seniority has carried him to the Chairmanship of the potent House Administration Committee, and to the second position to the Chairman on the powerful Foreign Affairs Committee. In addition, Burleson serves on two important Joint Committees formed from senior members of the House and Senate, as Chairman of one and Vice Chairman of the other.
