Credit used wisely can help families in management problems, but if used carelessly can cause grief and even discord in families. Many people do not bother to find the cost of credit. A thoughtful buyer should be sure that he knows the dollar cost of credit and the condition of payment. A more careful buyer will know even the interest rate being charged. He will explore the resources for credit and know when he buys that all conditions are favorable and agreeable with all parties involved. Are you using credit wisely?

What is "SR"? What is the new soil release finish now being put on many durable press fabrics? The textile and garment industries describe "SR" as a finish that releases all water and oil-borne stains; prevents or fights soil redeposition in the laundering; provides cleaner, brighter fabrics; and may also act as an anti-static agent. Watch for SR finish.

Floor wax helps keep a floor smooth, makes it more attractive and protects the surface. Two basic waxes are polishing and self-polishing.

Polishing waxes come in paste or liquid form and contain a solvent base. They must be polished on them on wood and cork tile but not on asphalt and rubber because the oils and solvents will damage them.

Polishing waxes do not have to be removed before a new coat is required.

Self-polishing waxes have a solvent base which harms wood floors. They work best on smooth floors such as linoleum, vinyl, vinyl-terest, asphalt and rubber tile. This type of wax is easy to apply usually dries in a shiny film. To move the wax before applying a new coat. Built-up coats cause yellowing or yellowing and become difficult to remove.

Homemakers can try several polishing waxes to find the one that works best on your floor.
