## Election Judges, Clerks Go To School on New Laws

The Secretary of State has urged County Clerks to conduct schools on election laws and procedures with the approval of the Commissioners Court in each county throughout the state.

A school of this type was held Tuesday night in the District Courtroom in Hamilton for all election judges and clerks. Miss Louise Blair, Democratic Chairman for Precinct 3, and Mrs. S. W. Everett attended the school.

The handbook for election judges and clerks for use in Primary and General elections for state and county officers in precincts using paper ballots was reviewed by four election officials, followed by a question and answer period. A list of recent changes in the election laws were of special concern and interest to local election workers.

Listed below are two of the recent changes in the election law which voters are urged to read and

comply with in the forthcoming elections in 1968:

"Affidavit of lost registration certificate: Every voter must either present his voter registration certificate to the election judge or clerk at the polling place or make and leave with the election officer an affidavit that his certificate has been lost, mislaid or left at home. (Beginning with the 1968 elections, no one is exempt from registration.)"

As a result of the above change all voters are urged to bring his or her registration certificate to the polls when voting.

"Also, an amendment has been made which prohibits write-in votes in the first primary except for the party officers or precinct chairman and county chairman. (Write-in votes have never been permitted in a runoff election.) Write-in votes are still allowed in the general election."

With the Democratic Primary election coming up next Saturday, May 4, Miss Blair urged all voters to locate and bring registration certificates with them when they vote.

## ★ TIME CHANGE IS SUNDAY; CLOCKS MOVE HOUR AHEAD

It is nearly time again to change time and thereby save time—daylight time.

At 2 a.m. Sunday, move your clock ahead one hour to 3 a.m. You can make the change before going to bed, or even after getting up Sunday morning, but you better not wait until Monday or you will get to work an hour late.

All summer you will have an extra hour of daylight because your clock is set ahead. If you get off work at 5 p.m., for example, your clock will say 5, but the sun time will be 4.

It all comes out even next October 27, when standard time will go back into effect at 2 a.m.

## Dr. Lamar Johanson Presents Paper at University of Georgia

Dr. Lamar Johanson, Associate Professor of Biological Science, Tarleton State College, presented a paper entitled "Effect of Sodium Substitution for Calcium on Translocation of Carbohydrates in Excised Cotton Roots" at the University of Georgia April 18. He was one of 214 scientists presenting results of both applied and basic research at the Southern Section of Plant Physiology meeting in conjunction with the Association of Southeastern Biologists.

An abstract of Dr. Johanson's paper has been published in the April 1968 issue of the ASB Bulletin. This bulletin is the official quarterly publication of the Association of Southeastern Biologists.

Dr. Johanson accompanied a group of plant physiologists from Texas A&M University to the meeting held in Athens, Georgia.

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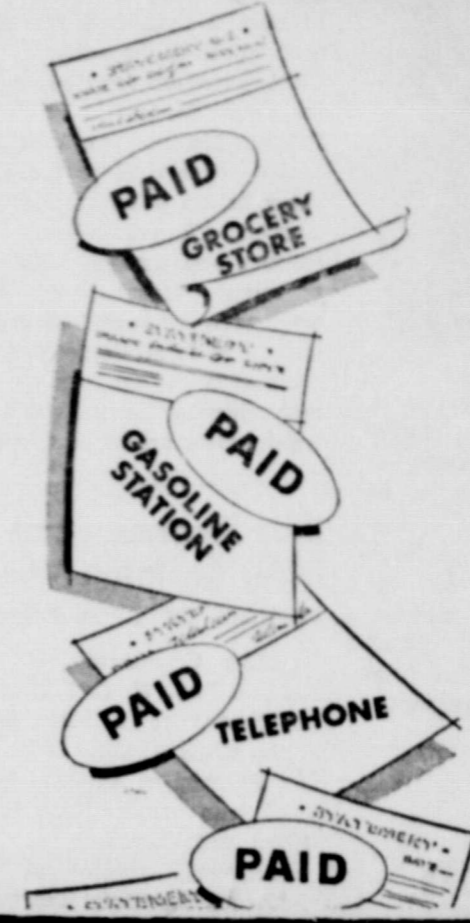

**On the Home Range**

Delight your family with a variety of flavorful fruits. They're bright in color, light in calories, and right in nutrition.

A recently released study by the United States Department of Agriculture shows that only half the households in the U.S. have good diets from a nutritional standpoint. One of the nutrients lacking in diets is Vitamin C.

All fruits contain some Vitamin C, but in varying amounts. Fruits rich in Vitamin C are oranges, grapefruit, cantaloupes, papayas, and strawberries. Fruits containing smaller, but worthwhile, amounts of Vitamin C are fresh apricots, avocados, bananas, blackberries, blueberries, pineapple, red raspberries, and watermelon. Serve fruits liberally.

Most of them are available in one form or another the year round. However, fresh fruits are

generally highest in quality and lowest in price when in season. Fresh fruits can be used at any of the three meals of the day and they are excellent for between meal snacks.

Look for the label when shopping for clothing. A good label should have information on: fiber content of garment and trim; construction features such as reinforced knees; washing and drying care of the garment; name of manufacturer, the retailer; and information on colorfastness, ironing and resistances.

Color forecast for spring and summer 1968: pastels—not pale, not hot, but bright. Yellows, pinks, blues, greens teamed with dove grey.

Look for greater awareness of shape and more fit. Waistlines, whether high, low, or natural, will be clearly defined. The belt is coming back. Skirts will be styled for mobility, with pleats, gores, shirring, paneling and insets to allow freedom of movement.

Fabrics are becoming more supple, heavier and more drapable. Added emphasis will be given to textured yarns of all variations, such as creped, twisted, slubbed, or mubbed.

# Fractured 'Filosophy...

## "Texas Terrapin Trail"

Several cattle trails across Texas have played an important role in the development and growth of this great state. A great deal of historical glamour, drama, and romance are associated with the old Chisholm Trail, the Goodnight Trail and others that did not figure so prominently in the big longhorn drives North to the railheads in Kansas during the last quarter of the nineteenth century. However, the story of the Texas Terrapin Trail has not gained any public attention, and yet no drive has been of more remarkable significance.

As the first buds of green began to show in the early Spring of 1964, I received an urgent message from my good friend Lirpa Loof. My friend requested I make immediate plans to be away from my home for several months, and meet him as quickly as possible in a little

Texas town about 65 miles west of the state's Capitol. I made all haste to meet my friend as requested, and on March 10 I arrived at the designated place.

I had no idea what the urgent summons was about, but I learned very soon after my arrival. Lirpa Loof was already on the scene, and with him were 15 well chosen drovers. We shall not attempt to name all those who were to participate in the most unusual movement of creatures that had ever been undertaken, but we shall try to briefly relate the highlights of the only terrapin drive in the history of our nation.

Catch Bobinlie had been selected as the trail boss, and the rest of us were to round up, and drive more than 6,000 Texas terrapins to Austin. Here they were to be flown by air freight to the nation's capitol in Washington. A short layout of plans and the roundup got underway. We rounded up those smelly tortoisoes on a ranch close to the little town, and in less than two weeks we had gathered the entire number of terrapins needed.

The drive got underway in all seriousness, and our next seven and one-half months were to be spent driving those Texas terrapins to Austin. We traveled route U.S. Highway 290, and we divided the mass

of terrapins on either side of the heavily traveled pavement. Our progress would have seemed unbearably slow, even to those old time cowboys of the earlier cattle drives, but we adjusted our gait to the speed of a terrapin, and moved along. An average day of terrapin travel we learned was around 500 yards. We poked and prodded terrapins from dawn to dusk, then bedded down with our herd under the Texas stars at night. All went exceptionally well on the drive, and 228 days later we turned our herd of terrapins up Congress Avenue, headed directly toward the capitol building. Here on the capitol grounds the terrapins were to be created for their flight to Washington.

We had driven up Congress Avenue almost six blocks, when something we had never counted on happened. Did you ever witness a terrapin stampede? Cattle may be bigger and faster, but they cannot be more determined to make their getaway. Terrapins clumsily tumbled in every direction making a bid for freedom. Some crazily plunged in open sewer drains, others stumped along into buildings, or under oncoming traffic, while some headed for the safety of the Colorado River.

Our drive ended in complete failure. We lost our entire herd. We

## COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By BILL McCUTCHEON

There's really no secret to producing peaches which are worm-free at harvest time. But if you want them that way, it's time to take action.

The insects which produce the worms can be controlled if a good spray program is carried out. Once the insects get a start and worms get into the peaches nothing can be done.

To do an effective job of controlling peach insects, trees should be sprayed when 75 percent of the petals have fallen from the blooms. Then 10 days later when the shuck splits, then three more times at two week intervals should follow the shuck split stage spraying. This makes a total of five spray applications. If you haven't sprayed any to date you are already behind with a spraying or so, but don't let that keep you from starting. Insects are just now becoming very active.

As for the spray, I would suggest using either methoxychlor or malathion. These materials are readily available from feed and seed stores, drug stores or other firms which handle insecticides.

Combinations of insecticides and fungicides may be used on fruit trees and make excellent sprays for use on peaches.

Livestock producers are urged to continue a close watch over all animal wounds. Weather conditions are favorable for screwworm fly development and spread. Stockmen are urged to continue submitting worm samples to the Mission Lab for positive identification. There have been several samples submitted from the county to date. So far all have been negative.
