C., as his friends here know him, worked for us before going into service, but we hadn't heard from him in some time and had been intending to try and get his address and write him, but being away from home so much this spring we seemed to have gotten behind with everything, but we do appreciate his thoughtfulness and will try to get a letter headed his way. We don't know how busy our poor boys are. Hope you're still getting the paper J.C. If so you're hearing from us.

Last Sunday we had a group of young historians visit our home. They were Mr. and Mrs. Chuck Edwards and her two brothers, Russell and K. L. Shelton of Dallas. They all were not far from teenagers. Mrs. Edwards told us her mother's name was Brown, and that Mrs. Winfrey Griffiths of Hico was her great aunt. The group had also visited at Hamilton and Cranfills Gap and Hico, and at Fairy Cemetery, and were trying to get a report here on the history of Capt. Battle Fort. They also enjoyed looking through some 100 pictures of the Pottsville storm when many homes were destroyed. Autos were twisted and bent, church buildings and tabernacles were flattened. Also pictures of the storm near Fairy at the Richards place, now the home of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest McCoy. We failed to write the names of the parties in the pictures at the time and now can identify part of them. That storm did some freakish things such as pick hens clean of feathers, carried a house out in the field minus one room, and carried it back and set it down near the former site. They also enjoyed seeing the pictures of our family and relatives and many of the livestock during the past 50 years. W. E. Goynes was at home and we tried to get the visitors to see him as we felt he had been here longer than ourself and still possesses a very active mind. The boys had a tape recorder and no telling what they went away with. We told of them of many happenings some 64 years to the day of Capt. Fort and his white top hack and team when he peddled piece goods, laces, buttons and such over the community. At

this time he lived in a one room shack near the location of the Martin plaque. They got information regarding the first grave here. Of course we could only give them this by marker 1881, and there could be older graves unmarked or unrecorded in the ledger. We enjoyed their visit very much.
