Wildcat Telephone Strike Not Affecting Local Service

Employees at some exchanges operated by Gulf States-United Telephone Co. have walked off their jobs in violation of their collective bargaining agreement with International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, Local 1692, according to H. Rafferty, Public Relations Director for the company.

Rafferty said that this was a valid and existing agreement which provides that during its term there will be no strikes or work stoppages. Rafferty said that both International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers and Local 1692 have told the company that they do not call the strike, and that they disavowed the action. Local 1692 has agreed with the company that the strike is illegal, according to Rafferty.

The strikers have not contacted

the company or presented any demands.

The company has advised strikers and the Union that failure of employees to report for their regular work will subject them to disciplinary action, including discharge or replacement by newly hired employees. Some of the employees were displaced Wednesday for refusal to report to work, and for engaging in the illegal strike.

The company also announced that permanent replacements had been hired for some strikers, and others are now being hired through its district managers.

The company is experiencing no substantial interruptions in service in the exchanges where the striking conditions exist, according to Rafferty, and all calls are being put through.

With the creation of Hico Housing Authority, members of the City Council took preliminary steps toward securing a low-cost rental housing project for local residents.

The action took place Monday night of this week in a called session of the city governing body.

Along with the proposition creating the local authority, the council adopted a resolution of intention to enter into agreement with the Housing Authority. After expiration of 60 days from May 24, the council will consider whether or not to enter into the agreement with the authority. The 60-day notice is required by the Housing Cooperation Law of the State of Texas.

Two From Here Will Receive Degrees From Tarleton State Sunday

Stephenville (Spl.)—Milburn I. Knudson Jr. and Mrs. Betty M. Patterson are among 135 candidates for graduation at Tarleton State College this month.

Spring commencement exercises for the record-setting class are scheduled for 2 p.m. Sunday, May 26, in the Main Auditorium. Dr. Joe B. Rushing, president of Tarrant County Junior College in Fort Worth, will give the commencement address.

Knudson, son of Mr. and Mrs. M. I. Knudson, is majoring in chemistry at Tarleton. He is a 1964 graduate of Hico High School.

Mrs. Patterson is the wife of Don Patterson of Hico, and is majoring in elementary education.

Also at the Monday meeting, five ordinances were presented and passed, upgrading various phases of the local building code. The ordinances, in the order of adoption, are: Fire Prevention Code; an ordinance providing for rules and regulations for all plumbing; the establishment of minimum health and housing standards; providing for rules and regulations governing construction, alteration, removal, demolition, equipment, use and occupancy, location and maintenance of buildings and structures; and providing for rules and regulations for electrical wiring.

Most of the above ordinances were already on the city books, but the revisions were necessary to comply with requirements pertaining to securing a housing project.

Homer E. Pace, with the firm Pierce, Norris, Pace & Associates of Midland, met with the council at the Monday session, and outlined steps necessary for pursuing and securing a housing program.

Commission to be Appointed.
At the end of the 60-day period, a five man Housing Commission will be appointed by the city government. The commission will be in direct charge of the project, and will work with the council in carrying out the program.

Council members present at the meeting were W. C. Howard, Jim Jameson, Alvin Casey, and Ray Keller, along with Mayor O. L. Davis.

Annual City-Wide Spring Clean-Up Next Week

Monday, May 27 through Friday, May 31, has been proclaimed Annual Clean-Up time in Hico by Mayor O. L. Davis.

The clean-up is later than usual this year, and the mayor explained that the unusual heavy rainfall thus far had caused the delay.

During the special week, trash placed in containers and set at the curb will be hauled off free of charge by the city on two separate days.

Free haul-off days will be Wednesday, May 29, and Friday, May 31.

Mayor Davis has called upon every citizen to render all the aid and cooperation possible during the special week of clean-up, pledging the cooperation of city officials in perpetuating Hico's record for sightliness and healthful conditions.

City officials pointed out that there is always an accumulation of trash about premises of residences throughout town. Constant effort is needed this time of year to maintain sanitary conditions and control the horde

of mosquitos which are beginning to make their appearance. People are urged to cut weeds in ditches, gather up all old tin cans, empty trash barrels, and do anything else that will help the appearance of premises during this period of clean-up.

The mayor emphasized the necessity of placing all trash in containers to speed the clean-up program. All containers should be placed as near a curb as possible to be more accessible to haulers.

ORDINANCE NO. 5—LHA

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR ELECTRICAL WIRING AND APPARATUS BY ADOPTION OF AN ELECTRICAL CODE; FOR CREATING AN ELECTRICAL INSPECTOR INCLUDING DUTIES, PERMITS, AND INSPECTION RIGHTS; FOR LICENSING ELECTRICIANS AND SUCH OTHER MATTERS CONNECTED THEREWITH; REQUIRING A BOND; ESTABLISHING QUALIFICATIONS; PROVIDING A PENALTY; REPEALING CONFLICTING ORDINANCES; CONTAINING A SAVINGS CLAUSE; AND PROVIDING FOR PUBLICATION; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

SECTION 12. Penalties. Any per-

son, firm or corporation found guilty of violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be subject to a fine of not less than \$10.00 Dollars nor more than \$200.00 Dollars together with the costs of court. Each day during which violation continues shall be a separate offense.

The invalidity of any section or provision of this ordinance or of the code hereby adopted shall not invalidate other sections or provisions thereof.

SECTION 16. Publication. That the City Secretary is hereby authorized and directed to order publication of the descriptive caption of this ordinance together with the penal provision for the time and manner provided by law, as an alternate method of publication.

SECTION 17. Date of Effect. It being immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health, and safety, an emergency is hereby declared to exist by reason of which this ordinance shall be in force and effect from and after its date and approval.

ORDINANCE NO. 4—LHA

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR RULES AND REGULATIONS GOVERNING THE CONSTRUCTION, ALTERATION, REMOVAL, DEMOLITION, EQUIPMENT, USE AND OCCUPANCY, LOCATION AND MAINTENANCE OF BUILDING AND STRUCTURES BY ADOPTION OF A BUILDING CODE; FOR CREATING A BUILDING INSPECTOR INCLUDING QUALIFICATIONS, DUTIES, AND INSPECTION POWERS; DEFINING TERMS AND FIRE LIMITS; AND PROVIDING A PENALTY, SAVINGS, PUBLICATION, DATE OF EFFECT CLAUSES AND REPEAL OF CONFLICTING ORDINANCES.

SECTION 9. Penalties. Any person, firm or corporation found guilty of violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be subject to a fine of not less than \$10.00 Dollars nor more than \$200.00 Dollars together with the costs of court. Each day which violation continues shall be a separate offense.

SECTION 10. Date of Effect. It being immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health, and safety, an emergency is hereby declared to exist by reason of which this ordinance shall be in force and effect from and after its date and approval.

SECTION 11. Publication. That the City Secretary is hereby authorized and directed to order publication of the descriptive caption of this ordinance together with the penal provision for the time and manner provided by law, as an alternate method of publication.

ORDINANCE NO. 1—LHA

AN ORDINANCE ADOPTING A FIRE PREVENTION CODE PRESCRIBING REGULATIONS GOVERNING CONDITIONS HAZARDOUS TO LIFE AND PROPERTY AND PROVIDING A PENALTY, SAVINGS AND PUBLICATION; DATE OF EFFECT CLAUSES AND APPEAL OF CONFLICTING ORDINANCES:

SECTION 7. Penalties: (a) Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of the code hereby adopted or fail to comply therewith, or who shall violate or fail to comply with any order made thereunder, or who shall build in violation of any detailed statement of specifications or plans submitted and approved thereunder, or any certificate or permit issued thereunder, and from which no appeal has been taken, or who shall fail to comply with such an order as affirmed or modified by the City of Hico, Texas, or by a court of competent jurisdiction, within the time fixed here-in, shall severally for each and every such violation and noncompliance respectively, be guilty of a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine of not less than \$10.00 Dollars nor more than \$200.00 Dollars. The imposition of one penalty for any violation shall not excuse the violation or permit it to continue; and all such persons shall be required to correct or remedy such violations or defects within a reasonable time; and when not otherwise specified, each ten days that prohibited conditions are maintained shall constitute a separate offense.

(b) The application of the above penalty shall not be held to prevent the enforced removal of prohibited conditions.

SECTION 10. Publication: That the City Secretary is hereby authorized and directed to order publication of the descriptive caption of this ordinance together with the penal provision for time and manner provided by law, as an alternate method of publication.

SECTION 11. Date of Effect: It being immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health, and safety, an emergency is hereby declared to exist by reason of which this ordinance shall be in force and effect from and after its date and approval.

ORDINANCE NO. 2—LHA

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR ALL PLUMBING BY THE ADOPTION OF A PLUMBING CODE CREATING A PLUMBING INSPECTOR INCLUDING QUALIFICATIONS, DUTIES AND POWERS; PROVIDING FOR PERMITS AND BONDING; AND PROVIDING A PENALTY, SAVINGS, PUBLICATION, VALIDITY, DATE OF EFFECT CLAUSES AND REPEAL OF CONFLICTING ORDINANCES:

SECTION 8. Penalties: Any person, firm or corporation found guilty of violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be subject to a fine of not less than \$10.00 Dollars nor more than \$200.00 Dollars, together with the costs of such prosecution. Each day during which violation continues shall be a separate offense.

SECTION 12. Publication. That the City Secretary is hereby authorized and directed to order publication of the descriptive caption of this ordinance together with the penal provision for time and manner provided by law, as an alternate method of publication.

SECTION 13. Date of Effect. It being immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health, and safety, an emergency is hereby declared to exist by reason of which this ordinance shall be in force and effect from and after its date and approval.

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT OF MINIMUM HEALTH AND HOUSING STANDARD BY ADOPTION OF A HOUSING CODE; FOR CREATING AND ENFORCING OFFICIAL INCLUDING QUALIFICATIONS, DUTIES AND INSPECTION POWERS; CREATING A BOARD OF HOUSING APPEALS; AND PROVIDING A PENALTY, SAVINGS, PUBLICATION AND DATE OF EFFECT CLAUSES:

SECTION 8. Penalties: Any person, firm, corporation or agent who shall violate a provision of this code, or fail to comply therewith, or with any of the requirements thereof, or who shall erect, construct, alter, demolish or move any structure, or has erected, constructed, altered, repaired, moved or demolished a building or structure in violation of a detailed statement or drawing submitted and approved thereunder, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.
