(Ed Note: The following letter was written by a soldier from Illinois serving in Vietnam, and was submitted to the News Review by Sherman Reed.)

MY GOD, how can it be,

That one boy lies rotting from malnutrition and torture in a jungle prison camp in North Vietnam—and another boy spits and tramples on the flag of this country on the steps of a university of learning.

That one boy lies sightless in a U. S. Naval Hospital from Communist inflicted face wounds—and another boy uses a Communist flag to drape himself in defiance of the laws of this country.

That one man of medicine begins his 30th straight hour standing over an operating table in pursuit of life for men serving this country—and

another man of medicine implores crowds of young men to refuse to serve their country

That one Negro holds the face of his dead white comrade in his arms and cries pitifully in a dirty mud hole in Vietnam—and another Negro screams with hate against his white brother on the streets of countless American cities.

That one boy lies in a coffin beneath the ground because he believed in duty to country—and another boy lies on a dingy cot giving blood to the enemies of his country.

That one man of God shields a wounded boy from an enemy bayonet with his body and dies—and another man of God uses his cloth as a shield to preach hate, dissension and lawlessness.

Game Hearing Set Tuesday, June 11th at County Courthouse

Austin—Interest in the 1968 hunting season will get a shot in the arm June 10 when the Texas Parks & Wildlife Department begins holding public hearings in some 213 counties throughout the state.

Hearings will be held in only those counties where the Department has been delegated the authority by the Legislature to regulate the taking of wildlife and fish.

At the hearings, Departmental personnel will present the recommended seasons and bag limits for species under regulatory authority of the Department.

Sportsmen, landowners, and other interested persons are invited to attend and participate in these meetings. Department biologists and game management officers will be on hand to answer questions concerning the proposed seasons, bag limits, and means and methods of taking wildlife species.

Erath County, June 11, 10 a.m., City Recreation Hall.

Soil Surveys Made on 19,258 Acres in County by SCS

Soil surveys were made on 19,258 acres in Hamilton County in the Hamilton-Coryell Soil and Water Conservation District last year by soil scientists of the SCS. They covered 62 individual farms located throughout the county. Soil surveys are part of a long-range program to survey the entire county, according to Bomer Harris, Work Unit Conservationist with the SCS at Hamilton.

Soil scientists J. W. Huckabee and David Thompson examined the soils and associated land features and recorded the information on aerial photographs. They study landscape features, relief, vegetation, and the materials from which the soils have formed, to aid them in predicting the kinds of soils they will find and in locating boundaries between each type of soil. To study the soil adequately, they walk over each field and dig or bore holes deep enough to examine the underlying layers.

Characteristics shown for each soil include surface and subsoil texture and structure, thickness of the soil, kind of underlying material, slope of the surface, significant losses by erosion, stoniness and evidence of poor or imperfect drainage or flooding.

Other information needed by the users of the soil survey is included with the soil information on the aerial photos. The map shows the drainage pattern, position of lakes, ponds, rock outcrops, roads, railroads, farm houses, schools and churches.

Hico Voters Go For Smith By Large Majority

Preston Smith, seeking a first term as Governor of the State of Texas, lead the ticket in his bid to defeat Don Yarborough by more than 130,000 votes.

Nearly one and a half million Texans went to the polls to express their preference, a satisfactory number considering that the governor's race was the only one on the ballot in many Texas counties.

In the Hico box, a total of 222 people were interested enough in the future of the state to take time from work and play to cast their ballots. And they favored Conservative Smith over Liberal Yarborough by a 159 to 63 margin. The vote for a run-off election was one of the largest ever recorded here, considering that only one issue was on the ballot. Records reveal that it was second only to the record 401 votes cast in 1966 when a hot

Smith must now make an even third campaign this year, as he will be opposed in the November general election balloting by Republican Paul Egers of Wichita Falls. Also on the November ballot will be a large number of Constitutional Amendments, part of which will be published at a later date in the News Review. And not to be forgotten is the November Presidential election.

For the time being, however, the political front will be relatively quiet, with only the special session of the Legislature that convened at noon Tuesday, left to create "coffee talk." And that session could be something!

Hamilton FFA Rodeo Scheduled June 13-15 at Sheriff Posse Arena

The first annual Hamilton FFA Chapter Invitational Rodeo will be held June 13, 14 and 15, starting at 8 o'clock each night at the Sheriff's Posse Arena, according to Gail Christian, Chapter Advisor.

Twelve elementary and high school events will be held. Twenty-seven area schools have been invited, including Hico, Stephenville, Dublin, Cranfills Gap, Carleton, Irredell, and Clifton.

Entry forms and minor's releases can be secured from the agriculture teachers of these schools or by writing to Hamilton FFA, Box 146. Deadline for entries is Monday, June 10.

Eighteen trophies, plus ribbons through five places will be awarded.

Commissioners Will Consider Pay Raise For Some Officials

(Hamilton Herald-News)

The Hamilton County Commissioners Court has ordered a notice to be published that it "desires to raise salaries of elected County officials by 15 percent." A public hearing to discuss the matter is scheduled for 10:30 a.m. Monday, June 10, as part of the Court's regular monthly meeting.

County Judge Herman Standifer said Tuesday he understands that it has not yet been established that all elected County officials will receive the 15 percent raise. He said the Commissioners will discuss the matter in the June meeting in the light of the County's financial condition as it exists then.

According to the Judge, the pay raise matter may take any one of several turns. There may be no raises at all. All elected officials may receive a 15 percent increase or an increase of some lesser

amounts. Some elected officials may receive a raise while others do not if sufficient cause develops. Some course of action other than those suggested here may turn out to be the result of the meeting.

In any event the meeting is open to the public.

Significantly absent from the list of officials in line to get the 15 percent raises are the four commissioners themselves. They had a raise of that amount in January, 1967, when each of their salaries was boosted from \$281.67 per month to \$323.92 per month. The salary of the district clerk was also boosted in 1967, from \$208.34 to \$239.58 per month.

An excerpt from the minutes of the meeting of the Commissioners Court on January 17, 1968, transcribed directly from the Minutes Book in the County Clerk's office, is as follows:

"Salaries of all elected officials paid out of General Fund and Officers' Salary Fund are scheduled to be raised 15 percent to become effective June 1, 1968. County elected officials who will be entitled to the raise are as follows:

"Bradford D. Corrigan, Janie Conner, H. A. Leaverton, Tom Odom, Edgar Sparks, H. W. Standifer, Pearl Williams, Woodrow Young, Genevieve M. Clark, Erma Maddox, W. W. O'Bannon and Grover Renfro."

In the same minutes, the present annual salaries of the above officials are listed as follows:

Bradford D. Corrigan, County Service Officer, \$600; Mrs. Janie Conner, County Treasurer, \$2850; H. A. Leaverton, County Attorney, \$4350; Tom Odom, Constable at Hico, \$1680; Edgar Sparks, Constable at Hamilton, \$360; H. W. Standifer, County Judge, \$4350; Mrs. Pearl B. Williams, Tax Assessor-Collector, \$4350; Woodrow Young, County Sheriff, \$4350; Mrs. Genevieve M. Clark, County Clerk, \$4350; Mrs. Erma Maddox, District Clerk, \$2875; W. W. O'Bannon, Justice of Peace, Precinct 1, \$2700; and Grover Renfro, Justice of Peace, Precinct 3, \$1680.

The total of present salaries of these officials comes to \$34,495 a year. An increase of 15 percent would amount to \$5,174.25 more annually.

23 Hico People Receive Social Security Benefits

There are 623 persons in Hico receiving monthly social security benefits, according to an announcement by Jack Calvert, district manager of the Temple Social Security Office.

The amount of these cash benefits total \$35,822 each month, or \$864 each year.

In Hamilton County, 2,020 persons get monthly checks at the rate of \$133,862 monthly, with a yearly total of \$1,606,344.

These benefits are only cash benefits, and do not include Medicare benefits paid to hospitals, doctors, clinics, other suppliers and patient.

Many people still think of social security as being only for elderly, retired people, Calvert said. But he states, of the 22,265 persons in the six counties of the Temple district, 1,922 are receiving disability benefits. In addition, 4,937 are receiving either young widow's, young wife's, or children's benefits. All these 6,859 persons are under age 65.

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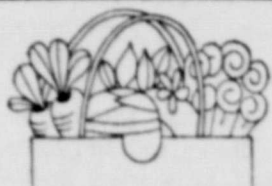

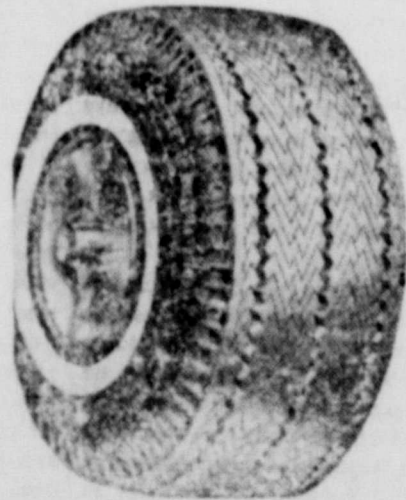

Fairy Community News

received a phone message us of the death of his brother-in-law, Walter Phillips of Temple. Mr. Phillips had had a spell and black-

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ed out while visiting at Scott & White Hospital with our sister, Mrs. Myrtle Enger early last March. At this time he was rushed to emergency and given first aid, but would never return for further treatment. He didn't believe in doctors or medicine and it was said he never was hospitalized in his life and he was 81 years old. His parents were long-life people. His parents lived to be up in years. He lost a sister in 1967 who was 76, another sister last March who was 92 and a daughter-in-law, Mrs. J. W. Phillips of Irving in March. He has one sister living now who is the last of the Phillips family.

The Walter Phillips lived a year in the Altman community north of Carlton around 1920 to 1925. He had hoed out his garden Friday morning and complained at noon of being tired. After lunch his wife got him to lay down awhile, but he was soon up and outside again. His wife stepped outside at 2 p.m. to check on him, and found him dead under a tree he had been trimming. He stayed quite busy most of the time keeping his lawn mowed, garden worked and looking after a few fruit trees. He had helped to build a new Church of Christ where they worshipped this spring, and the minister who held his funeral commented on the work he could do to be his age.

Funeral services were held at 2 p.m. Sunday at Temple, with Ministers Don Ashley and Wayne McCamey officiating. Walter M. Phillips was born March 16, 1887, being 81 years, 2 months and 15 days of age. He was married to Miss Ora May in 1907, who survives. To their marriage were born five sons and one daughter, Foy of Wichita Falls, Gerald of Temple, Orville of McGregor, J. W. and Oddis of Irving, and Mrs. Laverne Hayes, who was killed in a car wreck some 15 years ago. He is also survived by a number of grandchildren and great-grandchildren; one sister of Mission.

Mr. Phillips was baptized into the Church of Christ in 1908 and had

lived a devout christian life. The beautiful floral offering bore tribute of love and respect for the deceased. Burial was in Bellwood Memorial Park Cemetery in Temple's west city limits. Our deepest sympathy is extended to our dear cousin, whom we had visited so often while our sister and other relatives were hospitalized at Temple. They lived at 1505 So. 33rd St. a few blocks from the hospital and we would run by their home most every day and let them hear from our sister.

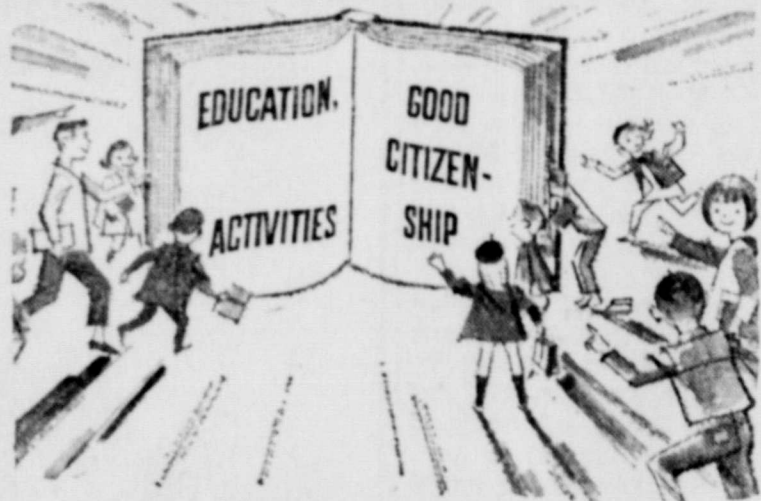

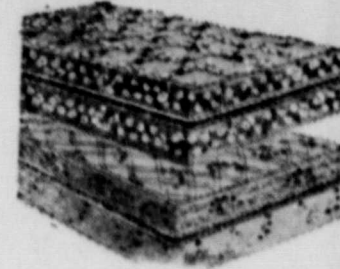

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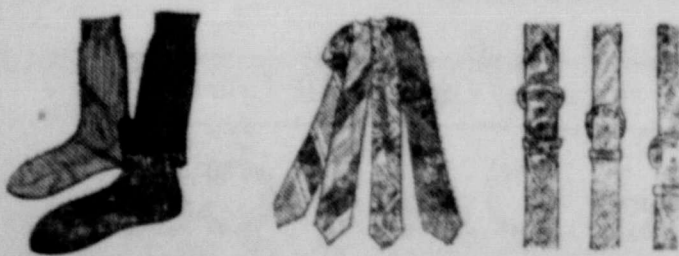

June is Dairy Month, and this is a fitting time to pause and recognize the Hamilton County dairymen and their families. I include families because the entire family is involved in dairy farming. One only has to look around the Hico area to realize what the dairy industry can mean to a community. 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The dairy cow produces "nature's most nearly perfect food." We never outgrow the need for milk and other dairy products. Fresh, fluid milk is one of the basic foods in any diet—for losing, gaining or maintaining weight by all age groups. Milk is an excellent between-meals beverage which provides balanced nutrition and refreshment. It will reduce that hunger feeling and prevent over-eating at meal time. A glass of wholesome milk is a fast replacer of energy, and it is a food bargain. Dairy products can provide 28 percent of the essential food nutrients for only about 19 cents out of each food dollar.

Several persons recently have expressed interest in the greenhouse tomato business. If you are interested, you'll want to attend the 5th Annual Greenhouse Tomato Grower's Short Course at A&M June 24-25. This activity gives growers and interested persons an opportunity to meet and exchange ideas, get the latest information from research and associate with others interested in the same projects.

Now is a good time to control aphids by using disulfoton (Di-Sy-ston) as there is adequate moisture to allow uptake of this material.

Disulfoton has proven effective in controlling the black pecan aphid and the yellow or honeydew aphid. The black pecan aphid can cause foliage damage which can affect yields for several years; honeydew aphids secrete an annoying substance which can support sooty mold growth that interferes with photosynthesis.

Aphid damage occurs most often in mid or late summer and the control needs to be applied early enough to prevent this summer buildup.

Producers may apply disulfoton either in the granular form or as a liquid. It is recommended that the control be applied in six-foot bands under the main drip areas of trees. If grass is present in groves then the systemic should be worked into the soil about six to eight inches to allow trees to absorb the material before the grass takes it up.

Application should be timed to coincide with rains so that it may be readily transmitted to the pecan trees. If possible irrigation

should closely follow application of disulfoton.

About 60-90 days of control can be expected, and only one application is allowed per season—this application must be made at least 80 days prior to harvest.

Livestock owners are again reminded of the importance of checking stock for any wounds and treating them immediately. They are also advised by officials of the eradication program to take worm samples from wounds and send them to the Mission Lab for positive identification. Sterile fly production has been increased in an effort to halt the increase in screwworm cases. Weather conditions continue very favorable for the spread of the pest.

Iron chlorosis has been showing up in many lawns and ornamental plants in the county this spring. Symptoms are generally a yellowing of the green foliage due to failure of chlorophyll to develop normally. The chlorosis occurs in susceptible plants where and when iron is not available to them. This lack of iron may be due to a deficiency or to the iron being unavailable because of alkaline conditions. In either case, iron supplied by ferrous sulfate or iron chelates will be beneficial.

Ferrous sulfate can be applied as a foliar spray at the rate of two teaspoons per gallon of water, plus a spreader-sticker. A teaspoon of household detergent can be used as the spreader-sticker. The spray should be applied in the afternoon (late) to avoid leaf burn and should be repeated in 10 days if the yellowing persists.

The iron sulfate can also be ap-

plied to the soil as a fertilizer. Apply to trees and shrubs in holes made in a circle just inside the spread of the branches. A five-foot tall shrub requires about a fourth of a pound. A tree should have three-fourths of a pound for each inch of trunk diameter. In the case of highly alkaline soil, the foliar spray is more effective than soil application.

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Fractured 'Philosophy...

"Resurrection City, U.S.A." Resurrection City—resurrection of what? The Poor People's march into Washington, D.C. is another of those uncalled-for, and very unnecessary demonstrations. The idea behind the march, and the building of a temporary tent city for thousands to live in, while attempting to carry out another demonstration that is so grievously plaguing our nation is but further evidence of the sad plight of today's generation. The element who insists on the changes that are being so savagely imposed on our land today are not willing to put forth the effort required to secure those changes.

Suppose we look briefly at some simple arithmetic. Not counting the many more thousands who shall come and go during this farce, but consider those who live in the tent dwellings built for this purpose. Each day those idle people are losing 24,000 man hours that could be used to some benefit for the betterment of mankind. Multiply this daily loss by thirty, and we come up with the staggering figure of 720,000 wasted man hours. Almost one million useless hours spent to no one's gain. I firmly believe that any able bodied person who seriously wants to work can find employment. Every community is faced with a critical labor shortage, and if any person wants to work, there is some job that he or she can do.

What is the ultimate end? There is only one conclusion. America is doomed if some control is not enforced on this faction of our population, and this cannot be too
