Five years ago Vicki Gardner was four years old and weighed 28 pounds.

Today she weighs 49 pounds and is ready for the open heart surgery she could not have 21 pounds ago.

Vicki, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Larry Gardner of 1505 Lackland, Arlington, and granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. Winford Gardner, and great-granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jim H. Davis of Fairy, is scheduled for surgery June 20 at Children's Hospital in Dallas. Sunday of last week she went into the hospital for tests to locate the opening in the lower chamber of her heart which necessitates the open heart surgery. She returned home after a three-day stay at the hospital.

Although Vicki's activities are limited she has finished her second grade in school. Her first year was completed at Mrs. Schaffer's Private School. This past semester she attended

## Senator Word Reports on Special Legislative Session

The called session of the 60th Legislature convened at noon Tuesday, June 4, with many indications that this will not be a very short or smooth special session. Purpose of this 30-day session called by the Governor is for both houses of the Legislature to write and agree upon appropriations and tax bill. As you may remember, last spring during the 60th regular session, an appropriations bill was passed at the request of the governor to cover the state's spending for only one year, instead of the usual two-year budget bill and no tax bill to raise the needed revenue was passed. So now the time has come to face the responsibility of raising new revenue through taxes in order to pay for the services of the state.

Governor Connally addressed a joint session of the Legislature on the opening day and asked the called session to provide \$127.2 million in new money for the state general fund to clear the way for the 1969 fiscal year. The response to the governor's proposals and recommendations for raising the needed revenue by members of the Legislature was only lukewarm. So it may be a long, hot session. I will go into the Governor's program and tax proposals in more detail at a later date.

### More Money Matters.

For many of us our work began before the session officially convened. The Senate Finance Committee met in Austin all the week before the session to hear budgetary requests from state supported agencies and state supported institutions and to study the recommended draft of the appropriations bill drawn up by the Legislative Budget Board. We concluded our hearings at the end of last week, June 7, but the work is now just beginning. We will draw up our Senate appropriations bill and then

work out the differences with the House bill—but that is not an easy job.

Survivors include a sister, Mrs. R. L. Alexander of Spur, and a sister-in-law, Mrs. B. E. Duncan of Hico.

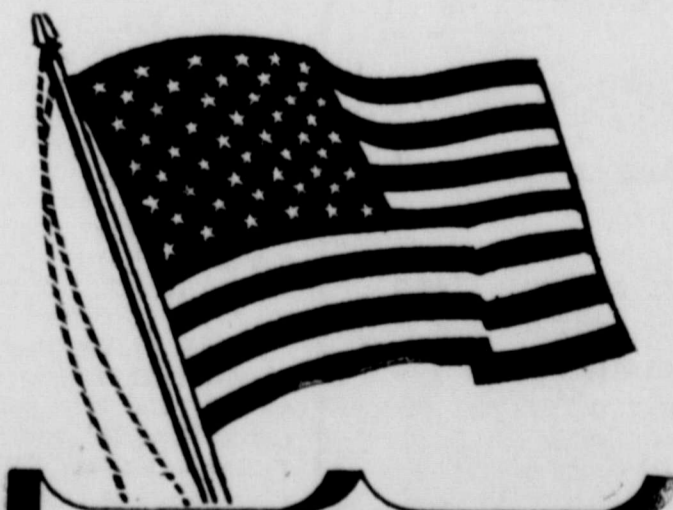

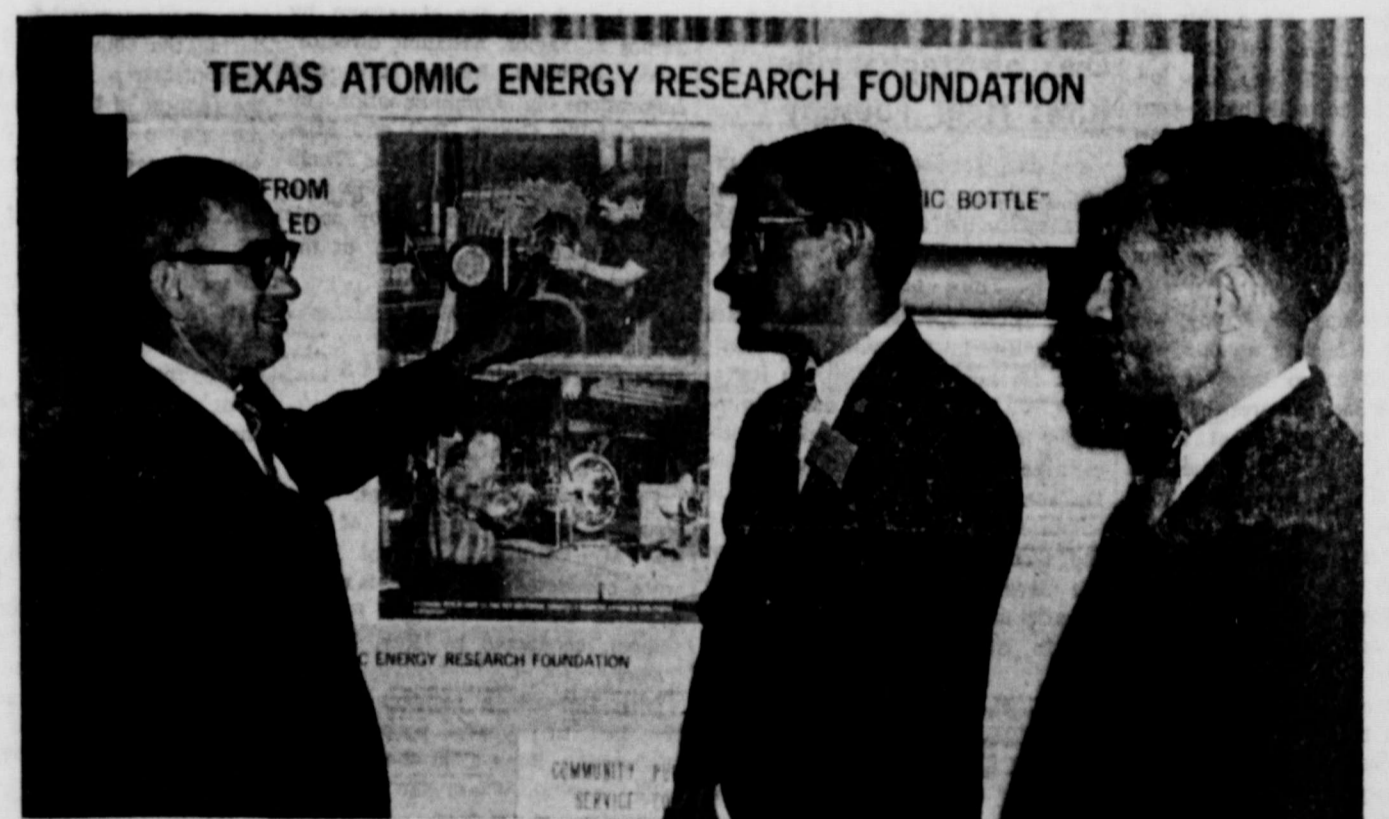

**COUNTY AGENT REPORTS**

By BILL McCUTCHEON

Don't panic if you observe swarming termites in or near your house. Your house won't come crashing down around your ears just because termite swarms are present.

Winged termites are a definite sign of an infestation somewhere, but it may be in a surrounding structure or other wood in the soil. Termites are capable of flying a good distance.

Homeowners should keep a watchful eye for signs of possible termite infestation. Look for detached wings—they break off soon after swarming takes place and are usually present in the swarming areas.

Another important sign is shelter tubes. These are earthen tubes or runways built by the termites on foundation walls, and are used as passageways to the wood food source, protection against natural enemies and as a moisture conserving device. Check the foundation walls, both inside and out, and particularly in the areas adjacent to bathrooms and kitchens where possible water leaks have occurred.

If you find that you have termites don't let this scare you into temporary do-it-yourself measures. It takes a long time for termites to cause further additional damage. It will pay you to spend some time in selecting a pest control firm to do the work. Be sure you know who you are dealing with.

No reliable pest control operator will attempt to impress you with the urgency of immediate action. You will have ample time to investigate the reliability of the company or operator and to compare his diagnosis and estimate of cost with that of other operators. Membership in a National or State pest control association is also evidence that the firm meets certain standards.

Termite inspection requires experience and knowledge about the habits of termites. A correct diagnosis is most essential to successful treatment.

A reliable operator will provide a plan of in the inspected premises, indicating points of infestation and hazardous conditions, and a written statement of the work he proposes to do and its estimated cost.

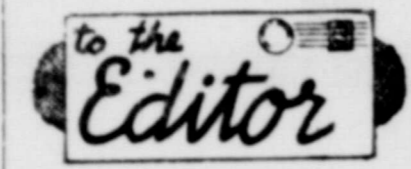

*On the Home Range*

Food poisoning can dampen a picnic spirit quickly—and the only safeguard against it is caution. Poisoning can be caused by handling food too much, improper cooking and leaving food exposed for several hours.

Foods prepared in advance and left outside can be infected with organisms which multiply quickly and do not affect food taste, smell or appearance.

Since you can't tell if a food is safe to eat, extra precautions are necessary. Foods most vulnerable to poisoning are potato salad, egg products, fish, ground beef, poultry, pork products, sauces, dairy products and pastries, especially custards and cream pies.

Food definitely should not be kept at room temperature more than 3 or 4 hours. It may be cooler or warmer but room temperature is critical. Principal cause of food poisoning, staphylococcus bacteria, can be spread by unclean hands and utensils. The cook can spread the bacteria by a sneeze or cough.

Flies, which spread salmonella infection, are another major source of contamination. But when spraying for insects, be sure to cover all food and dishes.

When bananas are covered with little brown spots, they are ready for mashing and mixing into puddings, breads and cakes. To hold ripened bananas for a few days, refrigerate them. But be sure to wrap them tightly in a plastic bag to prevent their odor from spreading. Their skins will turn brown but the inside will stay the same.

When shopping for macaroni, read the label. If it was made from durum wheat or made from semolina this means a high quality macaroni product.

Keep macaroni dry and unopened packages will keep indefinitely. After a package is opened, close tightly or put the macaroni in an airtight glass jar or can.

Buying celery? Look first for freshness and crispness. Stalks should have a solid, rigid feel. Leaflets should be fresh—or only slightly wilted. Look for a glossy surface, stalks of light or medium green and mostly green leaflets.

Snipping dried fruits is a snap.

WASHINGTON "As it looks from here" OMAR BURLESON Congressman 17th District

Washington, D.C.—The Congress is facing action on three separate fronts. The first is, of course, providing what is needed for efforts in Vietnam. The second is the battle against domestic crime and riots. The third to bring about a more sound fiscal policy.

While these three confounding issues hold a serious preoccupation of the Congress, attention is being diverted from the internal security aspect of our Nation. For years we have been intensely concerned about subversive activities but because of the great demands on time, more recent efforts towards an eye on subversive elements have not been adequate enough.

Although opinions differ among people of good intent, many of the disturbances which have been afflicting our land have been inspired by Communists and radicals. Con-

ditions have given them a catalyst and an opportunity to foment civil strife in a most severe form. These are the people who want to see a disintegration of authority, both governmental and moral. This condition has been fed by the trend in our highest courts to tolerate such action and even assume a posture making it impossible to assert authority.

A number of us in the House of Representatives and others in the Senate are now working to formulate legislation designed to plug loopholes discovered in some of our internal security laws and close gaps that have been blasted out by Supreme Court decisions.

As an example of some of these trends, between 1919 and 1942 the Supreme Court accepted jurisdiction in only 11 cases involving Communist subversive activities. Sev-

en of these 11 were decided against the radicals and four sustained their appeal.

Since 1943 the Supreme Court has accepted 147 cases involving appeals by Communists and other subversives. Of these 93 were decided favorably for those charged and 54 against.

The fact that these radicals can win cases shows the impartiality of our judicial system in which the judges of our highest courts can overlook personal repugnance and grant justice when the law demands justice. At the same time these statistics show it has gone far to accept jurisdiction in borderline cases and has tortured the laws in such a way that there is an imbalanced weight against the safety of our Nation.

The Supreme Court recently ruled void the law on the statute books making it illegal for subversive elements or members of an organization found to be a Communist front to hold jobs in defense plants.

We propose to draft another provision which we hope to have enacted into law to cure this situation. In addition, it is hoped to absolutely prevent those who have been identified with subversive groups to hold positions in a labor organiza-

tion, public schools or Federal agencies. The Subversive Activities Control Board, which has been virtually paralyzed since the Supreme Court struck down laws requiring Communists to register will be revitalized. Under our proposal the Board will be empowered to determine who and what is inimical to the best interest of the country. Since the Court's decision on a

number of Federal cases have left a blank for our legal protection in this regard, greater tools are needed for our internal safety.

Other probable features of legislation being drafted are protection of federal employees from reprisals for giving information to Congressional Committees which might implicate their superior's wrongdoing; making failure to surrender a

U.S. passport upon request a penal offense; providing severalties for collusion with foreign governments to evade U.S. port regulations; deny tax exemption status to any organization contributing to any group individual found on the subversive list.
