50th Anniversary



of Veterans Day

Monday is Veterans Day, November 11, 1968, a day of hope. Fifty years have passed since the end of one of America's most bloody attempts to ensure freedom and peace for the world. The war has fallen over No Man's Land in Europe at 11:00 a.m. November 11, 1918, ending World War I. This date and the moment for an annual observance by the United States. It was called "Armistice Day."

Monday, fifty years later, we still look forward toward the future and the achievement of a world free of aggression. For eight years, the people of the nation paused on November 11 to pay homage to the million men who represent the United States in this great conflict. There had been 126,000 men who paid the supreme sacrifice. They were remembered in services beginning on Nov. 11, 1921. Five years later, in 1926, "Armistice Day" was made the official name for this observance. Twelve years later, in 1938, a Congressional Resolution proclaimed the date a legal public holiday.

Just one year later, in 1939, the hopes of man were shattered when World War II began. Once again, America responded to the challenge. 16 1/2 million men were called to bear arms for the protection of our allies.

Twice since then Americans have rallied to the oppressed—once in Korea and now in Vietnam. When communists invaded North and South Vietnam, we came to the aid of those suffering men and women who had envisioned a land of freedom.

Today, even though we are in the throes of such aggression, we still maintain hope, as Americans, for peace for the world, and will not accept a peace of slavery, but a peace of honor.

As we celebrate Veterans Day this year, we pause to remember the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, symbolic of all those Americans who paid with their lives, that our freedom might endure. In the past 50 years, over one-half million men have given their lives in this endeavor.

We have inherited a great treasure and are the recipients of a trust which we must keep, or we shall lose this freedom which has been maintained at such great cost. The 39 million men of past wars, all across the nation, have given us this torch to carry. More than 26 million of these fighting men are alive today. We have a great responsibility and we owe a great debt to these men who have given us the freedom that we cherish so dearly.

To these men that we honor as veterans, we owe a pledge of assurance—that we are indeed worthy of the sacrifices they have made in order that we may remain free men.

We face the future with confidence and are filled with hope that peace will come because of the actions of our veterans, of past wars, and our men who today bear our battle in Vietnam.

Today we salute those men throughout our nation who have provided us the incentives and the responsibilities for preserving this democracy. We honor those who have died for freedom's sake, and pledge to those who live that we will remember their contributions to our own freedom.

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Tiger Match Pits Hico and Blanket This Friday Night

A match pitting the Blanket Tigers and Hico Tigers will unfold Friday night in Hico Stadium, with each team fighting to stay in contention for the district championship. Blanket has the better chance for sharing the title, having been defeated only once. On the other hand, there is an outside chance that Hico could get a piece of the title, but the chance is slim.

Blanket has lost only to Lometa in district play, while the Tigers have one loss and a tie marring their record.

The visitors have come on strong the past few weeks, and knocked off highly favored Rising Star only last week. The game promises to be a head-knocker, with the team that wants the win most probably getting the victory. Game time is 7:30 p.m.

1500 Acres Burned in Saturday Fire

A grass fire in the Providence community, 15 miles south of Hico, burned about 1,500 acres of grassland and timber last Saturday afternoon. Biggest loss was on the farms of Johnny Harris and K. Coats.

Fire departments from Hico, Hamilton, Shive, Gatesville and Meridian battled the blaze for several hours. Numerous individual volunteers were also given credit for stopping the blaze.

Due to a high southwest wind, the fire burned out of control for several hours, threatening the home of Mr. and Mrs. Coats. A thunder shower about 6:45 p.m. helped in extinguishing the blaze, but members of the various fire departments worked later into the night in stamping out isolated blazes.

Cause of the fire was unknown. Hico firemen answered another call Monday afternoon of this week at 2:30 to fight a grass fire on the Grice farm in the Falls Creek community.

Dryness of vegetation in the area remains a constant threat, and people should be extremely careful while burning trash and rubbish.

Tigers Bounce Meridian 12-8 In Loosely Played Game

Hico Tigers defeated Meridian Yellowjackets last Friday night for the first time since the late 1940's, but the victory was doubtful right up to the final minute of play.

The Tigers jumped into a 12-2 half-time lead, and then almost let Meridian off the hook in the final quarter before a great individual defensive effort by Dennis Polk saved the game. It's hard to single out any one performer as making a major contribution to a victory, but in this case it was definitely two key plays that wiped out a serious scoring threat by the Jack-ets and preserved the victory.

Leading 12-8, the Jackets took a punt on the Tiger 40 with only a couple of minutes remaining in the game. Working consistently the Jackets drove to the Tiger six yard line. On the next play Polk blitzed and dropped the ball carrier for a 3-yard loss back to the nine, and after two plays, he tipped away a Jacket pass that would have gone for the game-winning TD.

Hico garnered their 12 points with touchdowns in the first and second periods, and then hung on for the victory. They gave up a safety—the second in as many weeks—in the second quarter, and allowed Meridian a TD in the final stanza to notch their fourth win of the year against two losses and one tie. A relatively small voter turnout was recorded locally, with only 471 votes cast. The number compares with 504 cast in 1964, and an even greater number in previous general elections. The turnout here indicates what had been suspected—that people were confused on their choice, thus stayed away from the polls.

In state races, Democrat Preston Smith polled 322 votes to Paul Eggers' 136; Ben Barnes garnered 358 to Doug DeCluitt's 99 in the Lt. Gov. race; Crawford Martin with 329 votes swamped Sprosser Wynn's 94 for Attorney General; and J. E. Ward of Glen Rose received 316 votes for the legislature, while giving up 129 to Republican Charles Isenhower of Clifton.

In the Hico box, six of the 14 Constitutional Amendments carried. Winning a margin of victory here were Amendments Nos. 1, 3, 7, 9, 12, and 14.

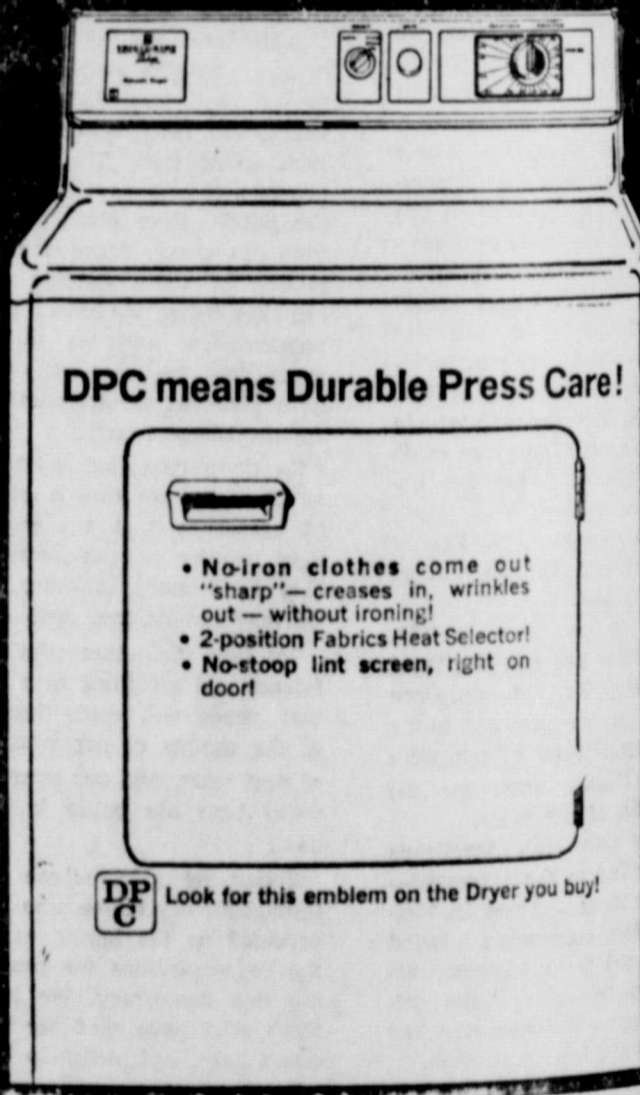

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COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By BILL McCUTCHEON

I attended a Horticultural Workshop at A&M last week and wish to share with you a little of the information gleaned from this experience. As it will soon be the time of year to plant trees, I think a discussion of the best varieties for the Hamilton County area would be appropriate.

There are many good pecan varieties, but most favored by commercial growers in this area include the Wichita, Desirable, Choctaw, Mohawk, and Sioux. These are all pecans with a lot of quality and production ability. They are also disease resistant in this area.

There are eight peach varieties highly recommended for our area. The first of these ripens in mid-May, the last variety ripens the last of July. I will list them in order of maturity. Recommended varieties include Springgold, Earlired, Sentinel, Ranger, Redglobe, Loring and Redskin.

If you are interested in plum varieties try the Bruce, Mothley, Ozark Premier, or Santa Rosa. The Sapa and Hiawatha are excellent cherry plums for this area and are especially suited for juice or preserves.

Recommended pear varieties include the Orient, Kieffer, LeConte, Magness and Moonglow have been recently released by the USDA and show a lot of promise. You might want to try one of these.

Our area of the state is well suited for many other fruits. Apples do quite well here as a local yard will testify. Best varieties are Holland, Golden Delicious, Jonathan and Red Delicious.

Adapted persimmon varieties include Tane Nashi, Eureka, and Fuyu. The Brazos is the best blackberry variety, and Austin is the only recommended Dewberry variety. Strawberry varieties include the white Siebel 9110, and the black Fredonia. Figs that do well here include the Texas Everbearing and the Celeste. Apricots do not do well in our area because of the low chilling requirements of this plant.

If you want an apricot, however, the Bryan or Hungarian would be the best choice.

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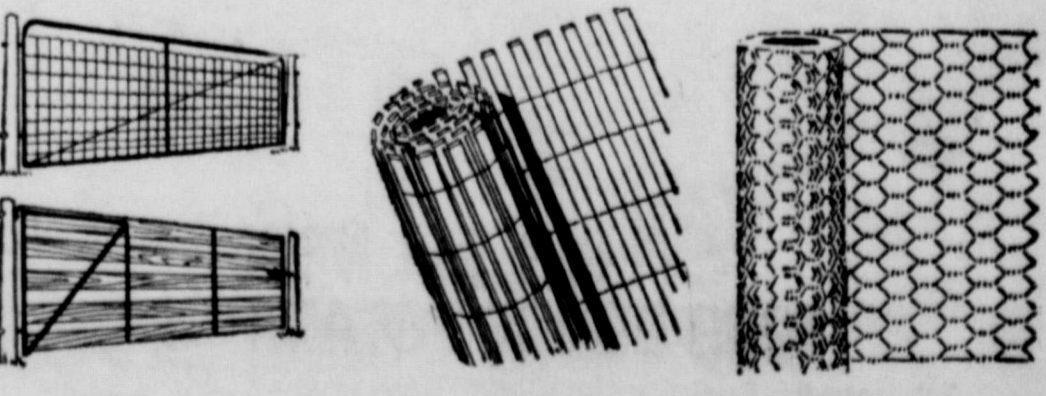
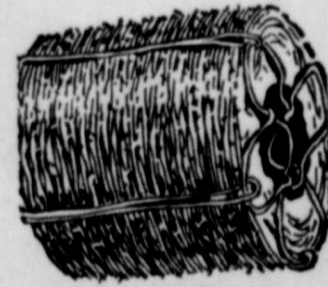

On the Home Range

Hams are being featured in many grocery stores, but before you buy, do you know ham? Test your Ham I.Q.

1. Should you cook ham before eating? Not necessarily. There are two types of ham: fully cooked and those which need to be cooked after purchase. The fully cooked ham, indicated by the label, needs no further treatment. It has been heated during processing.

2. Which part of the ham offers the best value? The butt half of the ham has a smaller percentage of bone and other waste—but the price is higher than the shank half. Center slices have little waste and higher price tags.

3. What is meant by labels reading "ham, water added," and "imitation ham"? Moisture is added during the ham curing process. When hams are shrunk to original fresh weight the label reads "ham." If the product has up to 10 percent added moisture, the label will read "ham, water added." "Imitation ham" has more than 10 percent moisture added.

FREEZING PECANS — Package freshly shelled pecans in moisture-vapor-proof bags, freezer tin cans, freezer jars or plastic containers. Seal or close containers. Sharp freeze and store at 0 degrees.

STORAGE—Place shelled pecans in covered containers and store in refrigerator not longer than 6 months. Store unshelled pecans at

a temperature range of 32 to 38 degrees. They will keep fresh about a year.

To remove a coffee or tea stain, soak it in cool water 30 minutes or longer. If it remains, work detergent into stain, then rinse thoroughly and dry.

To preserve autumn leaves, press them with a warm iron to set the color. Then soak the leaves in a solution of one part glycerin to nine parts water. When thoroughly soaked, remove and press between blotters. These leaves will remain flexible.

Popular in home furnishings are Spanish and Mediterranean styles and red, gold and black colors.

For best quality, select frozen orange juice concentrate that is stored at zero or below in a grocery freezer case. Place it in the home cold storage immediately and keep frozen until used. Frozen concentrate may be kept one week in the ice cube compartment, three months in the refrigerator-freezer compartment, and one year in the freezer.

With leather fabric big on the fashion scene, do not use cleaning fluid on stains. It may take color from the garment or cause rings on it. But don't leave a stain on a garment. If left too long, the stain may set and be hard to remove. Try a professional cleaning job or wipe with a damp cloth.

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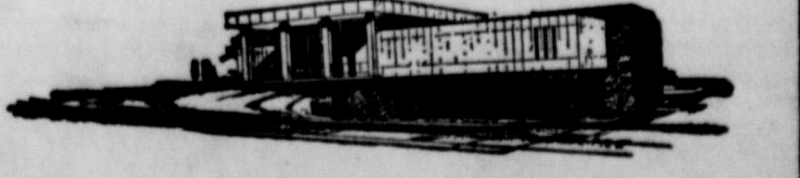
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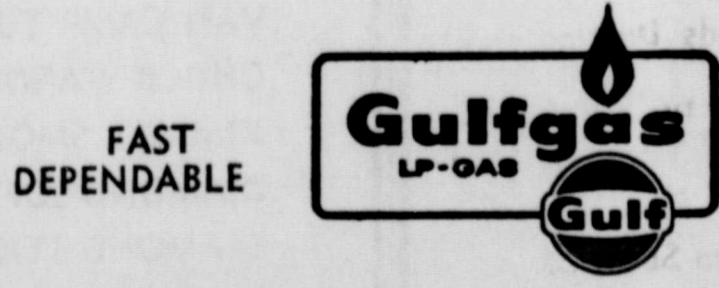
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Fractured 'Filosophy...
