Telephone Company Is Granted Rate Increase

From 50¢ to \$2.25 More Will Be on January Billing

Gulf States-United Telephone Company, citing the fact that the company was earning less than four percent on the Hico investment, asked for, and was granted, a rate increase at the Monday night session of Hico City Council.

The increase is effective with this month's billing. Meeting with the city governing body was Rolla Johnson of Tyler, general manager of the company, and Tom Venable of Hamilton, district manager.

Part of the increase is minor, but still other phases of the increase could be considered of major proportion. The increase ranges from fifty cents for a 4-party set to \$2.25 for business phones. No increase was asked for on extensions, residential or business.

In making the request, Mr. Johnson also cited the fact that this was the first rate increase

received by his company since 1958, when the system was changed to modern dial. Since that time, the company has added more than 250 phones to the system, and extended service into the far rural areas.

Mr. Johnson also showed where Hico's old rate structure was among the lowest in the entire system, and compared to rates in the few systems owned by the company that had not been converted to dial.

In comparison, the new Hico rates are still lower than neighboring towns. Hamilton's business phone rate is \$12.00 monthly, as compared to the new rate of \$11.00 for local businesses. Residential rates are about the same. Stephenville rates are also in line with the Hico-Hamilton structure.
