

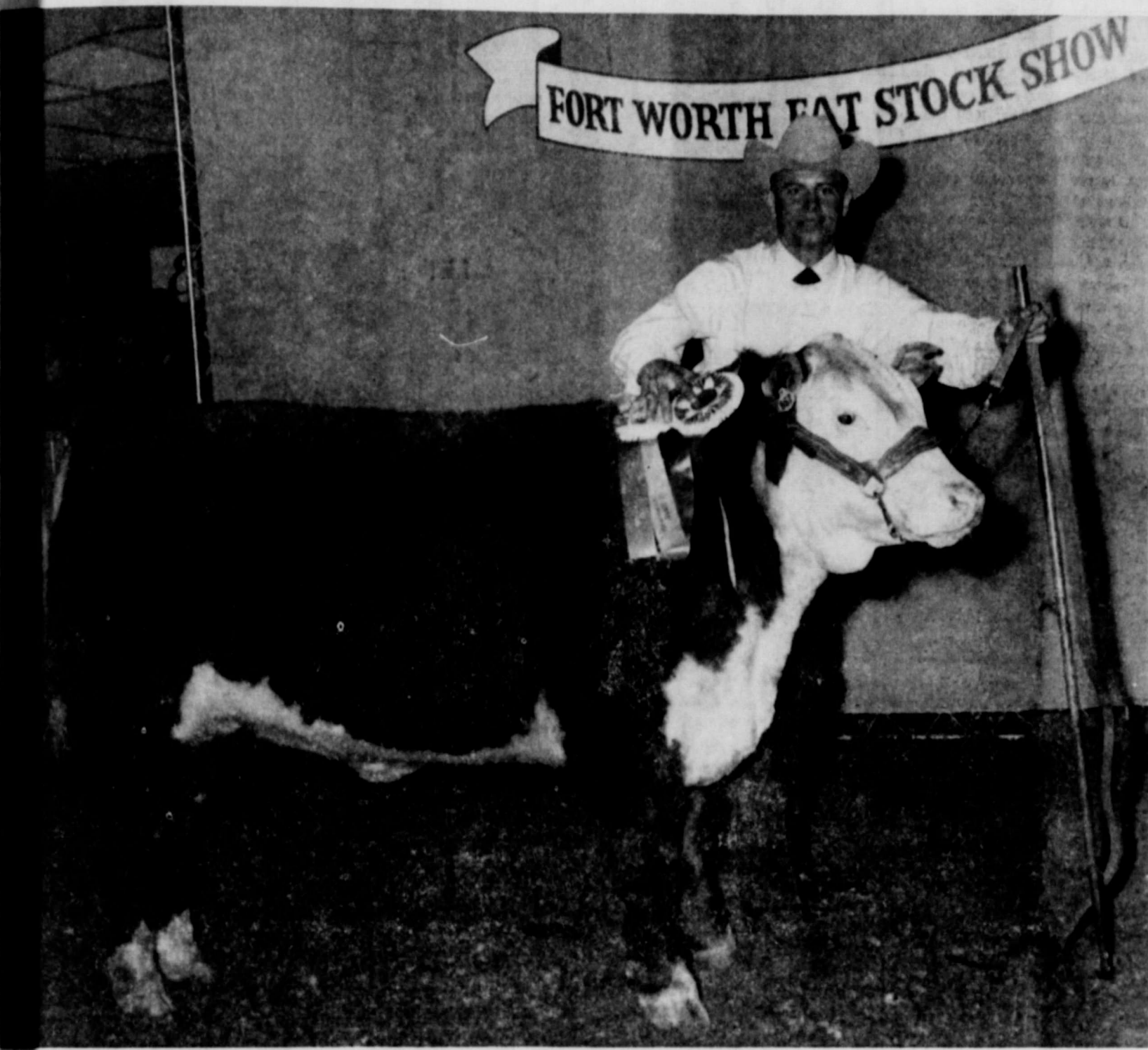

Billy Stearman and "Yellow", Fort Worth Reserve Champion Steer

## Billy Stearman Shows Reserve Champion at Fort Worth

William C. Stearman III of Rt. 4, Hico, had his Polled Hereford steer, "Yellow" named Reserve Champion of the breed in the Junior Division of the Fort Worth Fat Stock Show last Saturday.

The 895-pound steer is a yearling, and showed as a junior steer, placing first in its class.

In the judging for champion, a Coleman County steer which had previously won the Senior Steer Show, was picked, with the Stearman calf beating out the summer yearling class winner and other champion honors.

Stearman, a senior student in Hico High School, had another steer in the senior class which placed fourth. This is the first time for a distinction between the Hereford class with the Polled Herefords showing as a separate breed.

These steers, along with the two Herefords exhibited by Stearman's father, Lucy, were all bred on the Stearman Ranch here. Mr. Stearman has gained a good reputation for equality by his Performance Testing program, and in the breeders' feeders shows and sales. Although most of the Stearman herd are horned cattle, some are the "Gollihar" bull which the ranch purchased a number of years ago.

Young Stearman has won a number of honors showing his FFA projects at major shows over the state. He is a Lone Star Farmer, and is currently serving as president of the local chapter.

He plans to sell both steers at the steer auction in Fort Worth.

Other local exhibitors included Robert Owens with a Hereford heifer, and Barry Christian with a Santa Gertrudis. The heifer calves will be shown at the Houston Show next month.

County Judge H. W. Standifer appointed Mrs. Fred Rainwater to fill the unexpired term of her late husband as County Commissioner of Precinct 3. The judge made the appointment Wednesday afternoon.

The appointment is for the remainder of 1969 and 1970, when a commissioner will be elected for the remaining two-year unexpired term of office.

The appointment is effective immediately. Judge Standifer said that eight persons made applications for the post, two on a tentative basis.

## Fred Rainwater, Longtime Commissioner, Buried Here

Funeral services for Fred Levi Rainwater, 67, were held at 3 p.m. Monday, January 27, 1969 in the First Methodist Church. Services were conducted by Rev. Hubert Taylor, Rev. R. E. Tatum, and Rev. W. T. Reynolds. Burial was in Hico Cemetery.

Mr. Rainwater, a longtime county official, passed away Saturday, Jan. 25 at 10:20 p.m. in All Saints Hospital in Fort Worth. He had been ill only a short time, and was carried to Fort Worth by ambulance early Saturday morning.

Mr. Rainwater was born July 13, 1901 in Bosque County, the son of Joseph and Mary Mills Rainwater. He had spent most of his life in Hico. He was a member of the Baptist Church.

The public servant was Commissioner of Precinct 3, and had served in that position for 12 years.

Mr. Rainwater was elected to office in 1956 after conducting a vigorous write-in campaign for the post. He was well known and re-

spected in county government associations. He was re-elected during last year's balloting, and took oath of office January 1 for another four-year term.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Marguerite Rainwater; his mother, Mrs. Mary Elizabeth Rainwater of Hico; two daughters, Mrs. W. F. Funk of Fort Worth and Mrs. Von Scott of Hico; one son, James L. Rainwater of Fort Worth; two sisters, Mrs. Charlie Wieruscheske of Austin and Mrs. W. W. Busby of Dublin; three brothers, Claude Rainwater, Jess Rainwater, and Jim Rainwater, all of Hico; and 11 grandchildren.

Serving as pallbearers were employees of Precinct 3, Paul Lane, Chock Little, Eugene Smith, Willie Turner, Herman Sowell, and Andrew Hutton.

Honorary pallbearers were Judge Herman Standifer, J. R. Hayes Jr., Bob Adams, Charles Coston, G. W. Hurley Jr., and Hubert Harris, all present or former county officials.

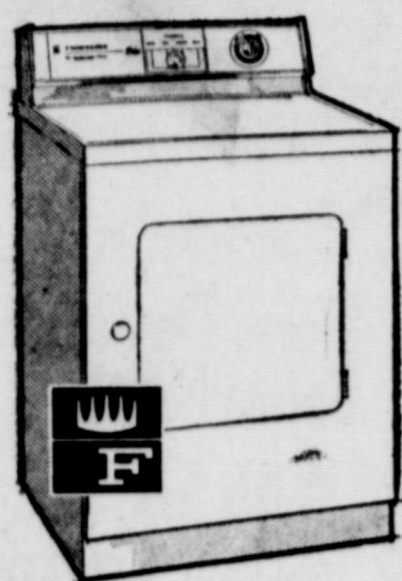
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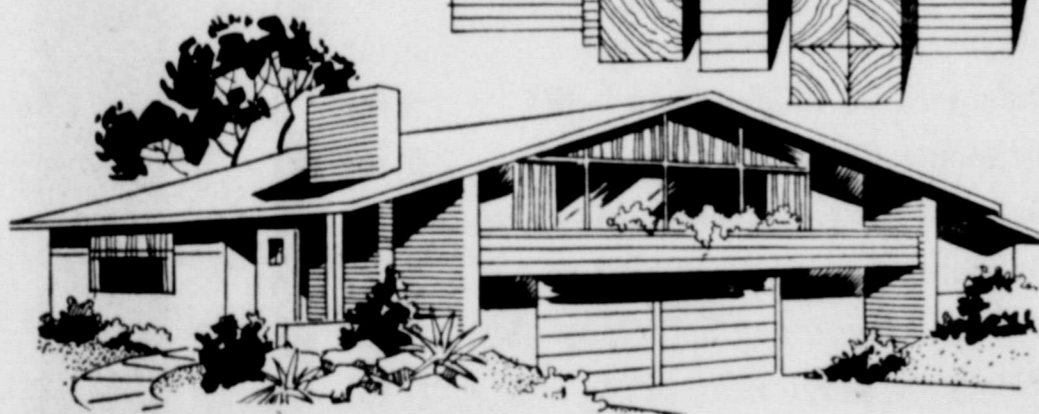

**School Census Deadline**

Saturday, February 1, is the deadline for enumerating all children of school age.

Results of the census will determine the number of per capita payments each school will receive from the state for 1969-70.

All children who are now five, but who will be six on or before September 1 1969, should be listed on the census blank, as well as those who have become six since September 1, 1968. Also children who won't be 18 before September 1, 1969 should be listed, including married teenagers who are eligible and should be listed.

Supt. O. C. Cook is census officer for Hico Schools, and he has urged everyone knowing of eligible children who have not been enumerated to please call him at the school.

## On the Home Range

By SONDRA CRAIG

Home Demonstration Agent

Through cultivation and breeding, the bitterness of wild celery has been replaced by a delightful flavor. Over the years, the leaf stalks have become longer, less stringy and in many instances, more numerous.

Celery is now plentiful in most markets. To select the best, look for obviously fresh, crisp, and clean celery of medium length, thickness and solidity. Stalks should be brittle enough to snap easily. At home keep celery cold and moist. When wrapped in a plastic bag in the refrigerator, for example, celery will retain its good qualities five days or longer. Celery based salads, creamed celery, and celery-accented stews, soups, poultry dishes or sandwich spreads are only a hint of the potential uses of this vegetable.

The cutting blade of an electric can opener needs cleaning frequently. To do the job quickly and

easily, coat a pipe cleaner with soap or detergent lather and work it around the blade and between the blade and the gear.

A shallow pan is better than a deep one for roasting. Use of a shallow pan allows the heat to circulate around the roast.

If frozen meat is not thawed before cooking, allow extra cooking time. The extra time needed depends on size, shape and thickness of meat. Frozen roasts may take one and a half times as long to cook as unfrozen cuts of the same weight and shape.

Metal window glides and sliding door tracks—especially prone to sticking when dirt and grit accumulate—are easy to keep clean by scrubbing with a narrow bottle brush dipped into thick soap or detergent suds.

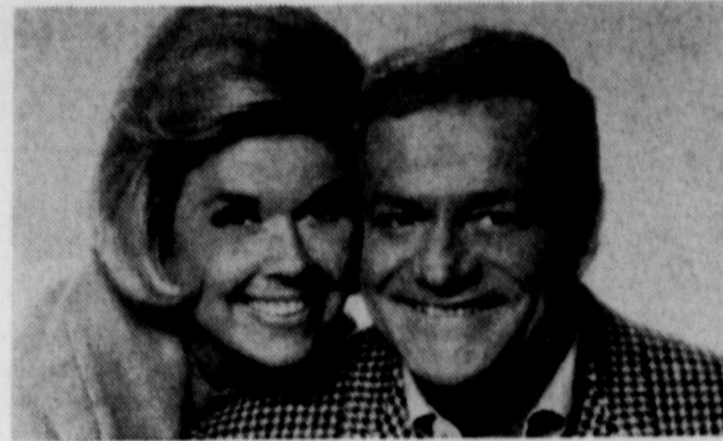

### COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

Those of you who attended the 1969 version of the Hamilton County Livestock Show won't be too surprised to learn that Hamilton County steers and beef heifers placed in the top echelons at the Fort Worth Stock Show.

Youngsters from the Hamilton and Hico 4-H, and the Hico, Pottsville and Hamilton FFA Chapters exhibited livestock in the Southwestern Exposition last weekend.

In the Fort Worth junior steer show, Billy Stearman of Hico FFA had the Reserve Champion Polled Hereford steer, and a fourth place Polled Hereford steer. Lucy Stearman of the Hico 4-H Club had an 18th place Hereford steer, and Brent Williams of Pottsville FFA had a 16th and 17th place Charolais cross steer. All of the steers mentioned were in the prize-winning category and are qualified for the premium sale.

In the heifer show, Mike Harris of Hamilton 4-H had a 3rd place Hereford, and his brother, Lonnie, Hamilton FFA had a third place Angus heifer. Keith Thomas of the Hamilton FFA had a ninth place Hereford heifer, and Robert Owens of Hico FFA placed his heifer 13th. This should be a preview of things to come as many of the fine beef calves exhibited at the county show have not yet been exhibited in major shows. Some are entered in San Antonio, with the big majority entered in the enormous Houston show in late February.

I have had several complaints in the past few days of rabbits severely damaging fruit trees and other yard plants. Lack of winter weeds and clover is causing the bunnies to eat second choice vittles and it would be to your advantage to protect your plants.

The easiest way to protect them is to wrap the trunk or branches to a height of about 12 inches. Aluminum foil or corrugated paper work quite nicely.

Don't be in a hurry to prune back your rose bushes, even though they may be an eyesore in the winter landscape. They may be partially pruned back to prevent damage by winter wind but the heavy pruning should be done later in winter or early spring just before the major growth begins. Heavy pruning early in the winter will often force new growth during a prolonged warm spell which makes the rose bush extremely vulnerable to a sudden drop in temperature.

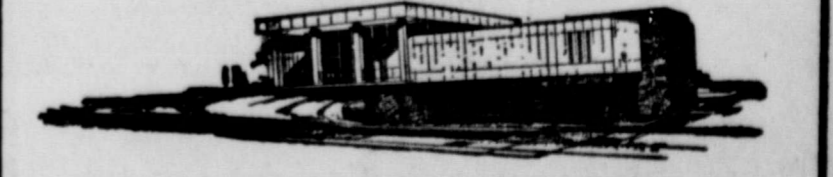

## Kleingrass Shows Promise For Hamilton County Area

A new high-yielding grass variety has been approved for certification by the State Seed and Plant Board and released for public use, Bomer B. Harris of the local Soil Conservation Service, has reported.

Called Selection 75 Kleingrass, it is a palatable, drought resistant tame pasture grass which is being released for certified seed production, Harris said. SCS and the Texas Agricultural Experiment Stations joined in the release after both agencies cooperated in making evaluation plantings across the State.

Harris said the newly certified grass is one of the most promising ones developed in Texas in recent years. He pointed out, however, that it will never replace top grasses already in use—it just gives livestock men another good grass to choose from when planting improved pastures.

Selections of Kleingrass were introduced in 1951 from a 15- to 18-inch rainfall belt in South Africa for planting at the SCS nursery in San Antonio.

After extensive evaluation at the James E. (Bud) Smith, Plant Materials Center at Knox City and in soil and water conservation districts across the State, Selection 75 was picked as the one strain best adapted to Texas conditions.

The grass is adapted to a wide range of soils, but on dryland it does best on sandy loam to clay. Kleingrass 75 recovers quickly from droughts after a rain. Established plants are hardy almost anywhere in the state, although first-year plants have winter-killed in the Panhandle. Second-year plants have withstood a hard freeze—18 degrees below zero—at Tahoka. The plants green up early in the spring and stay green late in the fall.

Kleingrass 75 produces high yields of top quality forage. Hay yields have exceeded three tons on dryland at Tahoka and more than eight tons under irrigation at San Benito and the Knox City plant center. It apparently will not produce as much Coastal and other high yielding grasses, yet grazing studies

made by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Beeville showed livestock making better daily gains on Kleingrass 75 than on Coastal. At the McGregor Station, average daily gains were better on Johnson grass than Kleingrass 75, but neither Coastal nor Johnson grasses produced as much total gain per acre under low to medium fertilizer applications.

Near Hico, on the W. B. Beeman Ranch south of town, Kleingrass was planted about 1962 in a mixture of sideoats grama, little bluestem and Indiangrass to determine how it would work on Grand Prairie soils. It was decided, after a four-year trial, that Kleingrass is well adapted to these soils and fits in well with this grass mixture.

The grass has also done well at such widely scattered points as Spur, Knox City, Fort Worth, Mineola, Rusk, Temple, Ballinger, San Antonio, Corpus Christi, Victoria, San Benito, and Angleton.

The plant has fine stems and green to bluish green leaves and it grows about four feet high. It is related to blue panic and switchgrass. The seeds are small and shatter easily, which restricts seed yields.

Quail, deer, and other wildlife also find Kleingrass attractive. Quail eat the seeds, and deer relish the forage, especially in the early spring when few other plants are green.

Breeder's seed are produced at the SCS plant center at Knox City. Foundation seeds were grown in 1968 and will be available in 1969 through the Foundation Seed Section, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, College Station. Limited amounts of certified Selection 75 will be available in early 1969 for spring plantings.

About 1½ to 2 pounds of pure live seed per acre are usually drilled for broadcast plantings, Harris said. For row plantings, about one pound is used. For further information, contact technicians of the local SCS office located at Hamilton, Ph. DU 6-3218.



## WASHINGTON

"As it looks from here"

Washington, D.C.—On two occasions during the past two years, the need of reform in methods of electing the President and Vice President of the United States has been discussed.

On Nov. 30, 1967, reference was made to the Constitutional Convention of 1787 which established the

Electoral College system. On Mar. 21, 1968, comments and speculation was made on the possibility of the 1968 Presidential election being thrown in the Congress for a decision. Fortunately, this situation was averted but the possibility remains that such could occur in the future.

As the new administration begins, Congress is once more faced with the issue of improving the method of electing our two highest officials. Our present system was designed to preserve the importance of all States, large and small, in electing a President and Vice President.

The idea behind the Electoral College was to combine the two principles of representation worked out as a great compromise of that Constitutional Convention. Each State was admitted to the Union on an equal basis. Each State was granted two Senators and two votes in the Electoral College to reflect this equality.

The framers of the Constitution recognized that the States were unequal in respect to population. For this reason of un-equality, each State was granted members in the House of Representatives of the Congress in proportion to its population with one electoral vote for each and additional electoral votes for the two Senators. Thus, the Electoral College is apportioned not only according to population but also a bonus of two votes to protect smaller states. The electoral strength of more than one-third of the 50 States benefits by reason of this special bonus.

Present day problems arise because the framers of the Constitution could not at that time foresee the "winner take all" situation created by modern political parties. The winning Presidential candidate in each State gets all the electoral votes of that State. A bloc of a few thousand votes can turn an election one way or the other.

The disproportionate strength of a small block of votes has come about because all States have adopted the practice of voting for a slate of electors at large. Under the system, the political party obtaining a plurality of votes, even if less than 50 percent, obtains all electoral votes as a matter of custom and practice.

To correct this situation which has evolved over the years, reform is urgent. A number of proposals have been introduced in recent Sessions of the Congress and already several plans are being proposed in the new session.

One approach is to abolish the Electoral College entirely and hold a nation-wide, direct election of the President and Vice President. On the surface the plan has appeal but under such a system a popularity contest could easily develop. One vote could decide an election. Some popular figure, such as a football hero or other notable of passing fancy, could emerge as President. The problem of "winner take all" could easily be multiplied instead of cured.

Two other proposals appear to offer the best solution, at the same time preserving the intent of the Constitution. One is called "The Proportionate Plan." Under this proposal, the electoral vote would be distributed in each State in proportion to the popular vote received by each candidate. Nationwide the electoral vote total would reflect the popular vote. Under the "District Plan" each State would be divided into districts of near equal population, probably using present Congressional District lines, giving each voter exactly the same weight in selecting their electors, one for the District and two State-wide. This plan would insure rural, suburban and urban areas alike of having their distinctive interest expressed.

Early Hearings are planned by committees of the Congress on these several approaches.

## Fractured 'Filosophy'...

"Life is For Living"

Mounted on the wall of a great cathedral in London, a beautifully decorated tapestry reads "Life is For Living." At a glance this statement does not seem to present any serious thought, or stimulation of imagination, but should we consider with deep reflection the true significance of this philosophy we may readily grasp the expressiveness of what is intended.

One may ask "What is life?" This question might be answered or interpreted in as many ways as the numbers of those who make the inquiry. However, should we seek the truth, we shall search our own hearts, and the interrogation of our search leads us to know that life has only one primary purpose. The Bible sets forth the answer. "But one in a certain place testified, saying, What is man, that thou art mindful of him? or the son of man, that thou visited him? Thou madest him a little lower than the angels; thou crownedst him with glory and honour, and didst set him over the works of thy hands." (Hebrew 2:6-7). The position and purpose of man is explicitly given, and our failure to recognize the importance of man's life, degrades the infallibility of the Wisdom of God. What then is the fullness of life for man?

Our answer lies in the very nature of God himself. Those qualities that compose the characteristics of God tends to set the pattern for living. In 1 John 4:8, we are told that "God is love." Any acts, thoughts, or intentions are inadequate that does not take into account the boundless love of God. In our effort to perform the works which God has set for us to do, and we fall short of love, we have missed the mark completely. If love abounds in our life, we then have no difficulty contributing the other characteristics of God's nature. Our standard demands we be compassionate, merciful, humble, sincere, and understanding. God is mindful of us all, and this denies that any man is to be elevated above his fellow-beings. The Bible speaks of three types of love; the love of God for man, man's love for God, and love between men. The life that bears a reverent love for God, and a compassionate love for his fellow-man is loved above all by God the Father.

Those stained characteristics of life that tend to lead us away from the love of God, often renders a verdict of desolation. Man is weak in that he errs along the path, but the merciful Grace of God draws us back to the fullness of life. Life is for living, and if we live in the Grace of love we have the hope of life everlasting. Death hath no dominion over the life that has lived in the sunshine of God's eternal love. True, we must experience a transition from the mortal to the immortal, but the primary purpose of living is completed, and love reigns supreme.
