

# Work Will Begin On New 47-Bed Nursing Home

#### New Care Facility Will Be Located in Blair Addition

Plans were revealed this week for a new 47-bed ultra-modern nursing home to be built here. Construction will start just as soon as weather permits leveling of the building site.

Owners of the new home are George H. Barron of Stephenville, who now owns Hico Nursing Home, and Mrs. Louise Rushing, Administrator of the existing facilities.

The new care home will be built on property acquired from Robert C. Laughton, formerly known as the Blair property in the West edge of Hico, Mr. Barron and Mrs. Rushing acquired a 240x240 foot building site between the old railroad right-ofway and the homes that have been constructed in the Blair Addition over the past few leaves room for additional expansion if future needs demand. Access to the home will be by a new street on the railroad right-of-way.





Weed control is not profitable

when applied to rangeland. .This sounds like a drastic state-

ment, but look at the facts, the weed to be controlled. A big number of weeds in the district are desirable forage plants. They proprotein forage for a short period of time during the growing season. Some of these plants called weeds are choice grazing for deer, goats, not furnish grazing but do furnish cover to old retired fields and trampled areas.






