Texas Public School Week was launched Monday night in Hico with a Parent-Teacher Association meeting, and open house following.

A. L. Flowers presided. The occasion was given by Mr. V. Jenkins.

The second grade presented the program. In keeping with a theme of spring, Mrs. Avo Rutledge, director of the program, introduced Mrs. J. C. Braune who sang "Spring" accompanied by Mrs. Rob-Lee at the piano. The children presented a St. Patrick's Day play, concluding with songs about spring.

District Judge Truman E. Roberts, guest speaker for the evening, was introduced by Mr. Robert Jackson, chairman of the program from the Masonic Lodge. Mr. Jackson introduced Sherman Roberson, representing the Clairette Lodge, Dr. A. T. Blackstock, Worshipful Master of Hico Lodge.

Judge Roberts directed his remarks to individual citizens and their responsibility toward the laws of the country, and enforcement of

He stated that the number one problem in America is crime at home, and the reason being that people, as individual citizens, living in a nation of change and discord, have forgotten that the nation was founded on the belief in a Supreme Being. "We have forgotten to love our neighbors as ourselves," the speaker said. "We have forgotten that we are a nation governed by laws which are to be respected and obeyed. We have forgotten to encourage and demand respect for our law enforcement officers. We have forgotten that it is every citizen's responsibility and privilege to serve on a jury when called on to do so."

In closing, Judge Roberts stated that the type of law available in the community depends upon a concerned group of individuals.

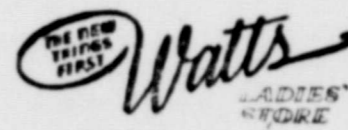

On the Home Range

Rarely is a piece of furniture used by itself. Instead, it is arranged in relation to other pieces to achieve comfort and convenience and in relation to the space and architectural features of the room to achieve good design.

To achieve good design in furniture arrangement keep in mind the following: balance, scale, proportion, contrast or emphasis and unity. Balance heavy pieces of furniture and dominant colors must be distributed so that no one area is over-emphasized. Groupings within the room should also balance. A

combination of formal and informal balance is usually pleasing.

Each piece of furniture should be proportioned to suit the room, the space it will occupy in the room and the other furniture. This does not always mean one should select large furniture for large rooms and small furniture for small rooms. For example, a full-length sofa in a small room looks more spacious than would three or four separate chairs.

The second session in the Housing Seminar will be held on Tuesday, March 11 at 2 p.m. in the Hamilton

REA Building. "Furniture Arrangement" will be discussed in detail by the home demonstration agent.

Selecting top-quality fruits and vegetables is a good start toward a good salad. Fresh food has more taste appeal. If you prepare salad ingredients ahead of time store them without dressing in the refrigerator.

Add a golden glow to your luncheon menu. Serve "Sunshine Salad." Use canned grapefruit juice as liquid when preparing orange-flavored gelatin. Add diced, finely shredded carrots, plus orange and grapefruit sections.
