Two Auto Accidents Last Week Causes Extensive Damage

Two accidents in Hico last week sent two persons to the hospital with injuries.

Thursday morning of last week, at the intersection of Highway 220 and N. Mesquite, a car driven by Mrs. Robert Ogle was involved in an accident with a car driven by Mrs. B. C. Basham.

Mrs. Basham was admitted to Hico Hospital with a broken arm and bruises. Mrs. Ogle suffered a broken hand, and her granddaughter, Tracey Murray, who was a passenger in the car, was hospitalized for observation, but only received bruises.

Both vehicles were heavily damaged.

Another accident Friday afternoon of last week on Highway 281 North involved a truck driven by Jack Jones of Stephenville and a car driven by Robert Scott of Hico. The truck, enroute to Georgetown with a load of dairy cattle, overturned in the front lawn of the John Trammell residence, injuring some of the cattle. There was no personal injuries, but the truck received extensive damage.

Stock Show Is Success Despite Drop in Entries

A bright, sunny day greeted exhibitors at Hico's Annual Stock Show last Friday, quite a contrast from the weather picture of past years.

Normally, one can expect a cold, wet blustery day for the popular event, but this year everything turned out just right.

Despite the beautiful weather, entries were down somewhat from past years, but officials said that quality of animals shown here was as good or better than in previous years. The beef division was especially strong this year.

Bill Rutledge Receives Bronze Star Medal For Vietnam Duty

Bill Rutledge, son of Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Rutledge, who received his discharge from the Army Medics last fall, was cited for valor during his one-year tour of duty in Vietnam.

Young Rutledge received the citation, the Bronze Star Medal, this week. The award is the nation's fourth highest, and is presented only for combat duty.

The citation read:

"Citation by direction of the President, the Bronze Star Medal, is presented to Specialist Five William W. Rutledge Jr., of the United States Army, who distinguished himself by outstandingly meritorious service in connection with military operations against a hostile force in the Republic of Vietnam.

"During the period October 1967 to Oct. 1968, he consistently manifested exemplary professionalism and initiative in obtaining outstanding results. His rapid assessment and solution of numerous problems greatly enhanced the allied effectiveness against a determined and aggressive enemy. Despite many adversities, he invariably performed his duties in a resolute and efficient manner. Energetically applying his sound judgment and extensive knowledge, he has contributed materially to the successful accomplishment of the United States mission in the Republic of Vietnam. His loyalty, diligence and devotion to duty were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service and reflect great credit upon himself and the United States Army."

Rutledge served two years in the Army, one of which was spent in Vietnam.
