### Balloting is Saturday

Little, if any, interest has been shown in two local elections to be held this Saturday, April 5.

Voters will go to the polls to elect two city aldermen, and at the same time, will name two trustees for Hico Independent School District.

There is no opposition in either election.

Balloting will begin at 8 a.m. in both elections, which will be held at City Hall. Polls close at 7 p.m. In the city election, Wayne Rutledge and Alvin Casey are seeking re-election as aldermen, and Dr. B. C. Dayton and Derel Fillingim are the only candidates in the school trustee race. They are seeking second terms of office.

In city balloting, eligible voters are those who reside within the city limits, and who have qualified by registering to vote during the specified period which ended Jan. 31. Qualified school voters are those persons residing within the Hico Independent School District, and who have registered for their voting privilege.

A small turn-out is expected in both elections.

# Hico Students Receive 3 Special Science Fair Awards

High School Chemistry and Biology students captivated honors at the Central Texas Regional Science Fair held on the campus of Baylor University at Waco last week. Nine local students exhibited projects at the two-day fair.

Projects to the young scientists were Mrs. Lucille Brummett, chemistry teacher, and Charles Coan, biology teacher.

Monday afternoon the group set projects and were interviewed by a series of judges that evening.

The Hico group explained exhibits to public viewers.

Each student was required to remain with his project for one hour, then during his free hour, Baylor authorities took the exhibitors on tours of Baylor University. After the hour of relaxation, the student returned to his project for another hour of explanation.

At noon Friday, the local students attended a dinner banquet in the Student Union Building. During the banquet and special awards program Friday evening, Hico students received the following honors:

H. L. Hill, Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Hill, was awarded first

place in the Medical-Biology Division. A senior at Hico High School, he received an engraved plaque in recognition of his first place award and an expense-paid trip to San Antonio to exhibit his project, "Physiological Studies of the Perch and Polywog." The San Antonio trip was made possible by the McLennan County Medical Society. Hill also received a second place award in zoology.

William C. Stearman III, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Stearman, placed third in the Earth and Space Science Division, and received an Honorable Mention from the American

Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics. Also a senior, he earned an invitation for he and his sponsor to attend the annual meeting of the AIAA. Aerodynamics of a Flying Saucer was Stearman's project.

Frank Bonner III, son of Mr. and Mrs. L. F. Bonner, was presented first place for his seismograph project in the Earth Sciences Division. A junior student, Bonner's project was rated most outstanding by the Baylor University Geology Dept. The department presented him with a geology hammer in recognition of his achievement.

Miss Rebecca Sue Martin, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Chester Martin, was presented a citation for the most outstanding project in the field of Mathematical Science. Also a junior student, Miss Martin received her citation from the United States Air Force for her project, "Passive Computers."

Brad Braune, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Braune, was awarded second place in the senior division of Botany. His Hydroponics project earned him a silver medal and a book on horticulture of trees.

Miss Elizabeth Gay Black's project, a reaction board, was awarded

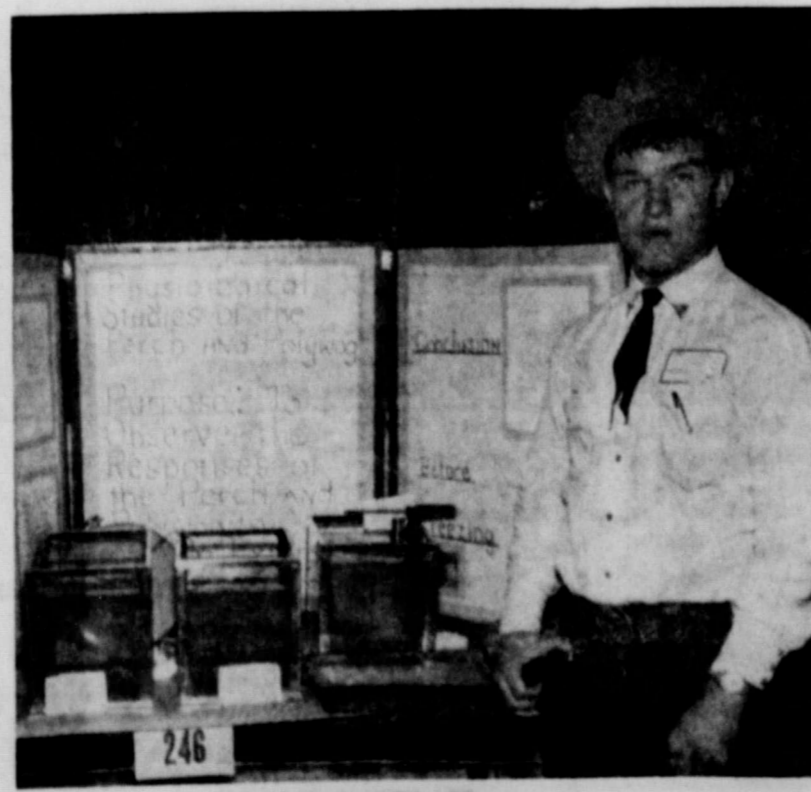
an engraved plaque by the Baylor University School of Education in the senior division. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Black and a senior student.

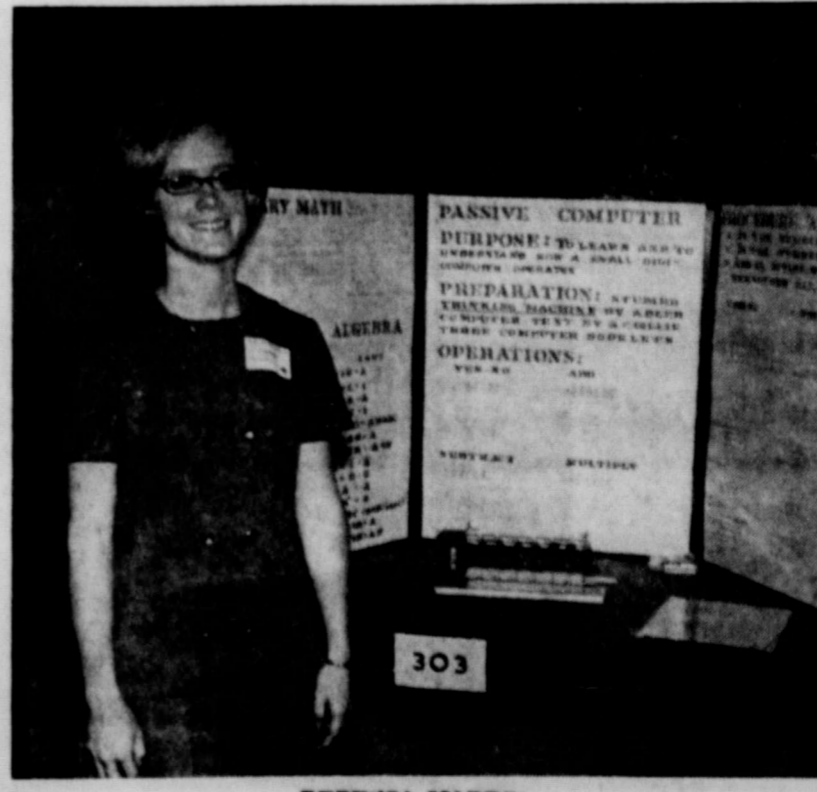
