Capt. Vanwinkle Decorated For Recent Vietnam Heroism

Captain Harlan Vanwinkle, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. B. Vanwinkle of Iredell, has recently received the Bronze Star with "V" device for heroism while serving with the Green Berets in connection against a hostile force in the Republic of Vietnam.

The citation stated that Capt. Vanwinkle distinguished himself on January 29, 1968 while serving as Executive Officer of Detachment A-221, United States Army Special Forces, and advisor to a reconnaissance team of members of the detachment and members of the populace of the Republic of South Vietnam.

While conducting a patrol against North Vietnamese, who had concealed themselves in an area near the combat base at Khe Sanh, he was wounded when they opened fire on the helicopter in which he was riding as soon as it settled on the landing zone.

His element received the major portion of the initial burst of fire and only his valiant efforts averted a major crisis. In trying to maneuver his element into an assault position he was wounded in both legs by grenade fragments, yet he rallied his force in spite of his wounds and continued his mission.

Seeing that his troops were vastly outnumbered, he maintained his position and inflicted serious damage upon the enemy with small arms fire and direction of air strikes. His aggressiveness in carrying a wounded comrade from the enemy zone and his continuous attempt and success to extract his force from extreme danger and overwhelming numbers is an indication of his courage.

Capt. Vanwinkle's high regard of devotion to duty and personal bravery is in keeping with the military service and reflects great credit upon himself, the Special Forces, and the United States Army.

Vanwinkle was a 1968 graduate of Iredell High School, and is married to the former Sharon Humphrey of Seminole, and they have two children, Richard and Michelle. His family was with him during his tour of duty, living in Oklawaha. Following a stay in Ft. Benning, Georgia, he will return to Vietnam in May to complete his tenure.

City Sales Tax Vote Ordered by Council

Hico residents will be asked to join the thousands of other citizens over the state in paying a one percent City Sales Tax.

The action came as a result of a special meeting last Thursday when City Council members voted unanimously to call the election. Date for the special balloting has been set as Saturday, May 10.

The one percent sales tax was authorized by the 60th Legislature, and more than 200 Texas cities have joined in the move to secure additional revenue. Of all the towns that have voted on the proposition, only a scant few have turned down the tax. Officials state-wide have cited the need for additional revenue for cities—both large and small—and the sales tax method has been found to be the most fair way of taxation.

Should the tax be approved locally, officials have estimated that

the city would receive \$6-\$8,000 annually from the collection.

Mayor Cites Needs

Hico Mayor O. L. Davis said this week that extensive improvements made last year, and further impending improvements, was main reason for calling the election. "To date, the City is not in debt, and expects to stay that way," the mayor commented.

He pointed out that the city spent \$7,477.33 on street improvements last year, made necessary by an unusually cold and wet winter. Another major expenditure during 1968 was \$12,594.12 to replace pumps at the City Water Works.

Other expenses listed by the mayor during fiscal 1968 were \$5,799.00 for utilities; \$225.00 for building repairs; fire department expense was set at \$600.00.

Also the City paid \$4,000.00 for the railroad right-of-way, depot

and bridges; \$1,300.00 for truck expense; and \$280.00 for publication and advertising.

Largest single expense was the \$21,190.27 paid in salaries to city employees.

Future Planning

Mayor Davis said that plans were being made to extend a 6-inch water main to the Hillcrest and Cox-Weaver Additions, at an estimated cost of \$16,000.00. Also planned are sewer feeder lines in the same area; right-of-way and bridge improvement to a new section of town; and additional improvements and better maintenance to City Park.

Voter Eligibility

People eligible to vote in the May 10th election are those who reside within the City Limits, and have a valid voter registration certificate. The mayor has named J. R. Bobo as election judge.

Two boys were seriously injured early Sunday morning in a one-car accident six miles northeast of Hico on the Glen Rose Highway.

Eddie Chapman, son of Mr. and Mrs. Carl Chapman of Sweetwater, and grandson of Mr. and Mrs. P. H. Cody of Hico was one of the injured youths. The other was Morris Busby, son of Mr. and Mrs. Vernon Busby of Hico.

Exact time of the accident was not determined, but relatives in Fort Worth said they left their home about 1:30 a.m.

About 5 a.m. the Busby boy went to the Steve Ogle home for help. Mrs. Ogle, a registered nurse, administered first aid, while her husband went to help the Chapman boy, still in the car.

An ambulance was called and the youths were carried to Hico Hospital, and later transferred to All Saints Hospital in Fort Worth.

At last reports, the boys were still listed in critical condition.

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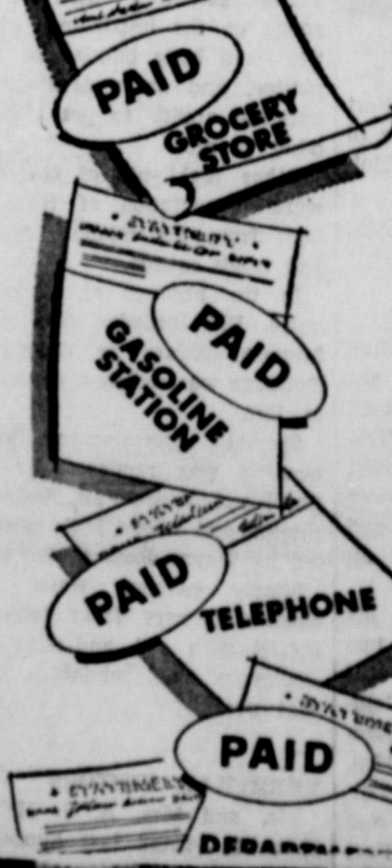


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Fairy Community News

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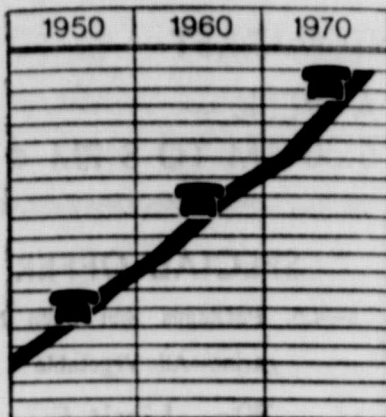

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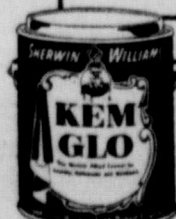

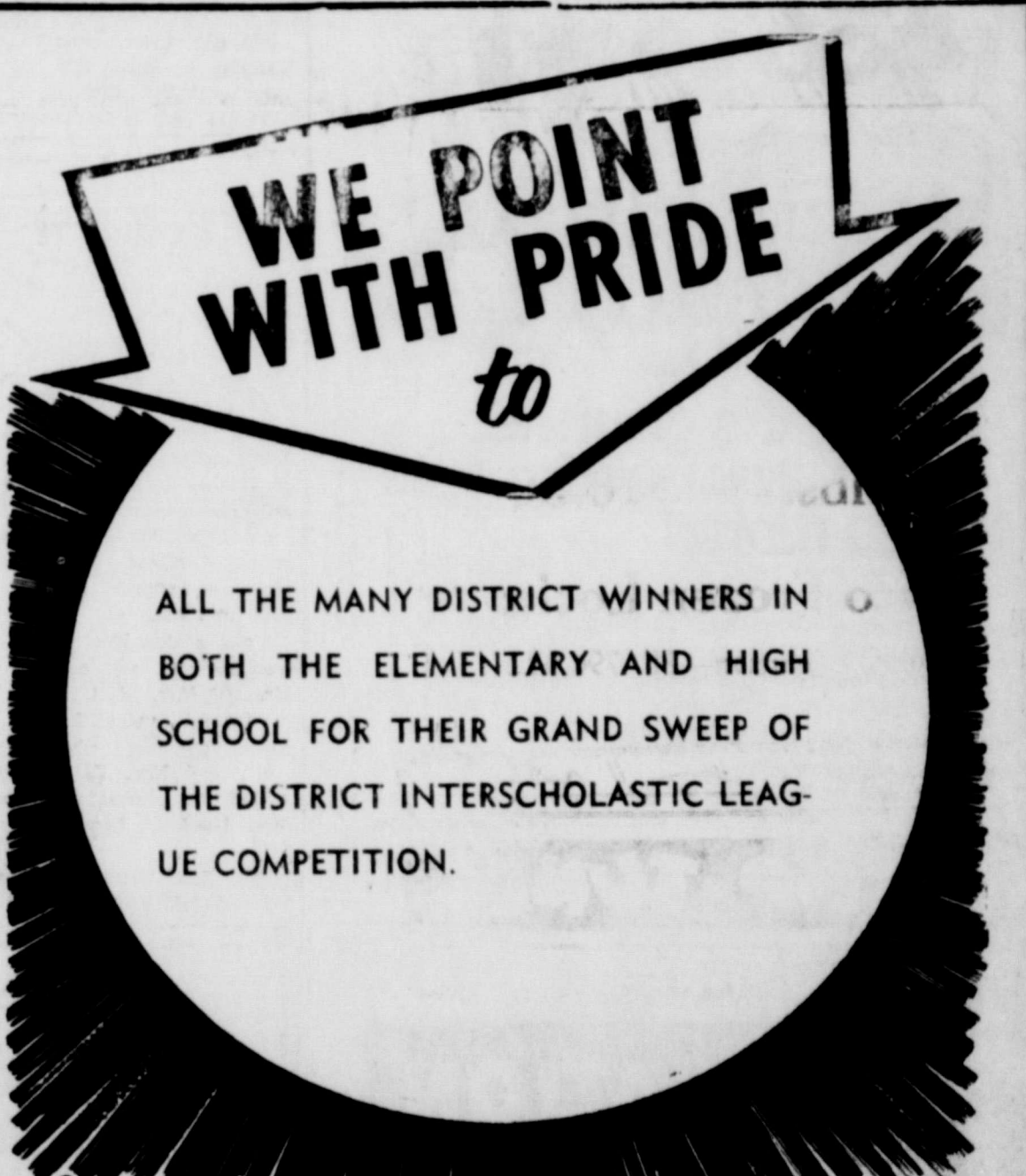

NOTICE OF SPECIAL ELECTION

TO THE DULY QUALIFIED RESIDENT ELECTORS OF THE TOWN OF HICO, TEXAS, AND TO ALL OTHER INTERESTED PERSONS:

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that an election will be held in and throughout the town of Hico, Texas, on the 10th day of May, 1969, on the question of the adoption of a One Per Cent (1%) Local Sales and Use Tax within said Town, in keeping with the following ordinance adopted by the City Council of said Town, as follows, to-wit:

AN ORDINANCE ORDERING A SPECIAL ELECTION TO BE HELD IN THE TOWN OF HICO, TEXAS, ON THE QUESTION OF THE ADOPTION OF A ONE PER CENT (1%) LOCAL SALES AND USE TAX WITHIN THE TOWN; DESIGNATING THE DAY OF THE ELECTION AND THE POLLING PLACE; APPOINTING ELECTION OFFICIALS THEREFOR; PROVIDING THAT ALL DULY QUALIFIED RESIDENT ELECTORS SHALL BE QUALIFIED TO VOTE; PRESCRIBING FORM OF BALLOT; PROVIDING FOR NOTICE OF ELECTION; CONTAINING OTHER PROVISIONS RELATING TO SAID ELECTION; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, Article 1066c, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes (Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 36, Page 62) authorizes the governing body of any city, town or village in Texas to call an election for the purpose of adopting a local sales and use tax within such city, town or village; Now Therefore, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF HICO:

Section One: That a special election shall be held in and throughout the town of Hico, Texas, on the 10th day of May, 1969, at which election there shall be submitted to the resident qualified voters of said Town, for their action thereupon, the following propositions:

"FOR adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city."

"AGAINST adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city."

Section Two: That said election shall be held at one polling place for all qualified voters of said Town, and the polling place and presiding officers for said election shall be, to-wit:

Polling Place: City Hall in Hico. Presiding Judge: J. R. Bobo.

The Presiding Judge at such election shall appoint not less than 2 clerks.

Section Three: That said election shall be held in accordance with the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, and all duly qualified resident voters of the Town of Hico, Texas shall be qualified to vote.

Section Four: That the ballots of said election shall conform to the requirements of Section 2, Subsection G, of Article 1066c, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes (Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 36, Page 62), and to the requirements of Chapter 6 of the Election Code of the State of Texas, as amended, and the language to be printed thereon shall include the following:

OFFICIAL BALLOT

INSTRUCTIONS: Place an "X" in the square beside the statement indicating the way you wish to vote.

— FOR Adoption of a one per

cent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city.

— AGAINST adoption of a one per cent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city.

Section Five: That election judges and clerks are directed to comply with Article 6.06, Election Code of the State of Texas, as amended (Section 2 of House Bill 181, Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 452, Pages 1025, 1028), which provides that a square shall be placed beside each proposition in which the voter is instructed to place an "X" or other clear mark to indicate the way he wishes to vote; but which also provides that a failure of a voter to mark his ballot in strict conformity with the directions on the ballot shall not invalidate the ballot, and the ballot shall be counted if the intention of the voter is clearly ascertainable, except where the law expressly prohibits the counting of the ballot. It is specifically provided that the election officers shall not refuse to count a ballot because of the voter's having marked his ballot by scratching out the statement of proposition for which he does not wish to vote.

Section Six: That notice of the election hereby ordered and called shall be given: (a) by publication on the same day of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation published within said Town, the date of the first publication to be at least twenty-one (21) days prior to the date set herein for such election; and (b) by posting of such notice at the polling place in each of the election precincts of the Town not less than twenty (20) days prior to the date set herein for such election. It is hereby found and determined that the Hico News Review is a newspaper published within the Town of Hico, Texas, and is a newspaper of general circulation within said Town.

Section Seven: Should any part, section or provision of this ordinance be held invalid, this shall not affect the validity of the remaining terms and provisions hereof.

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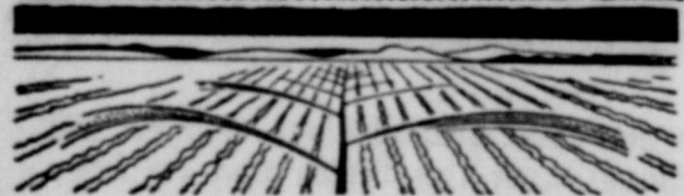
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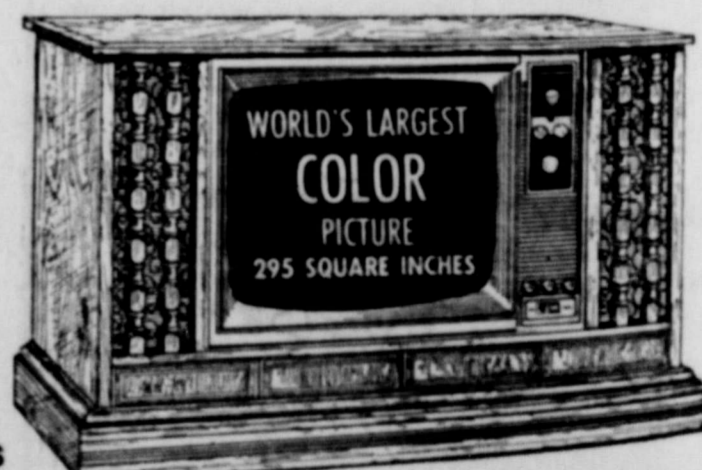

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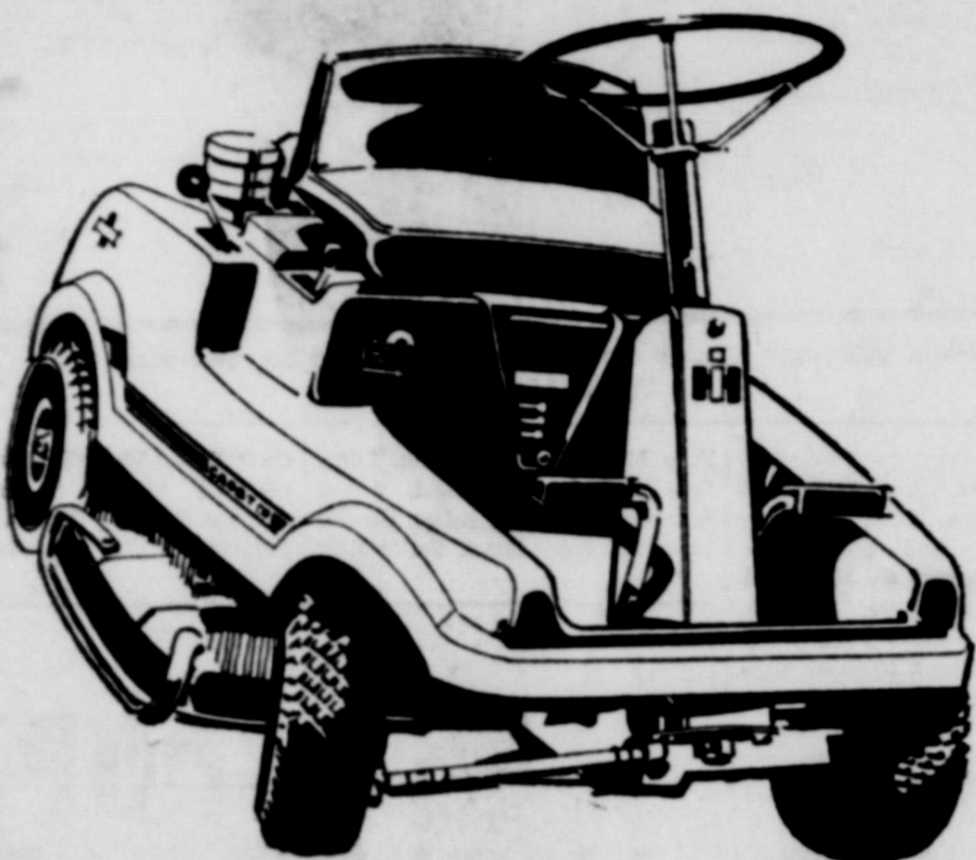
