Giant Meet Set May 1-3 Capitol City

Fourteen Hico High School students, and their sponsors, will invade Austin May 1, 2 and 3 to compete in various events of the State Interscholastic League Meet.

The number of students representing Hico is about 15 percent of the entire high school.

Qualifying for the huge Austin meet was the one-act play, golf team, two track team members, and two students in literary events.

Hico's one-act play, under the direction of Mrs. W. B. Hill, won first place in the regional meet held at Stephenville last Friday night. Seven schools were entered.

Members of the play cast are Mike Davis, who was best actor of the regional, Louise Fails and Brad Braune, named to the all-star cast, and Frank Bonner and Carolyn Doty.

The golf team, coached by Jimmie Ramage, ran away from the field of ten teams last Thursday to win the regional title.

Mike Davis fired an 80 over the Stephenville course to take the individual title. Other team members are Rusty Cryer, Mike Ferguson, Reggie Grover, and Lee Ramage.

In the literary meet, held Saturday at Stephenville, Frank Bonner qualified for the state meet by winning first place in Poetry Interpretation, and James Gosdin will represent Hico at Austin by winning first place in Number Sense.

Hico's track team will be represented at the state meet by Jim Wolfe and Mike Ferguson. Wolfe will compete in the 330 intermediate hurdles, and Ferguson will run the 880.

Hico scored a total of 38 points to finish third in the team division out of 38 teams competing. Charles Coan is coach of the track team.

Events at Austin will begin with one-act play competition Thursday, with the golf tournament held Friday and Saturday, and the track meet Saturday.

At 2 a.m. Sunday, move your clock back one hour to 1 a.m. You can make the change before going to bed Saturday, or even after you get up Sunday, but you better not wait until Monday or you could be an hour late to work or school.

All summer you will have an extra hour of daylight. If you get off work at 5 p.m., for instance, your clock will say 5, but the sun time will be 4.

It all comes out even next October, when standard time will go back into effect at 2 a.m. the fourth Sunday.

TO THE DULY QUALIFIED RESIDENT ELECTORS OF THE TOWN OF HICO, TEXAS, AND TO ALL OTHER INTERESTED PERSONS:
NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that an election will be held in and throughout the town of Hico, Texas on the 10th day of May, 1969, on the question of the adoption of a One Per Cent (1%) Local Sales and Use Tax within said Town, in keeping with the following ordinance adopted by the City Council of said Town, as follows, to-wit:

AN ORDINANCE ORDERING A SPECIAL ELECTION TO BE HELD IN THE TOWN OF HICO, TEXAS, ON THE QUESTION OF THE ADOPTION OF A ONE PER CENT (1%) LOCAL SALES AND USE TAX WITHIN THE TOWN; DESIGNATING THE DAY OF THE ELECTION AND THE POLLING PLACE; APPOINTING ELECTION OFFICIALS THEREFOR; PROVIDING THAT ALL DULY QUALIFIED RESIDENT ELECTORS SHALL BE QUALIFIED TO VOTE; PRESCRIBING FORM OF BALLOT; PROVIDING FOR NOTICE OF ELECTION; CONTAINING OTHER PROVISIONS RELATING

TO SAID ELECTION; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.
WHEREAS, Article 1066c, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes (Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 36, Page 62) authorizes the governing body of any city, town or village in Texas to call an election for the purpose of adopting a local sales and use tax within such city, town or village; Now Therefore,
BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF HICO:

Section One: That a special election shall be held in and throughout the town of Hico, Texas, on the 10th day of May, 1969, at which election there shall be submitted to the resident qualified voters of said Town, for their action thereupon, the following propositions:
"FOR adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city."
"AGAINST adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city."
Section Two: That said election shall be held at one polling place for all qualified voters of said Town, and the polling place and

presiding officers for said election shall be, to-wit:

— Polling Place: City Hall in Hico.
— Presiding Judge: J. R. Bobo.

The Presiding Judge at such election shall appoint not less than 2 clerks.

Section Three: That said election shall be held in accordance with the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, and all duly qualified resident voters of the Town of Hico, Texas shall be qualified to vote.

Section Four: That the ballots of said election shall conform to the requirements of Section 2, Subsection G, of Article 1066c, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes (Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 36, Page 62), and to the requirements of Chapter 6 of the Election Code of the State of Texas, as amended, and the language to be printed thereon shall include the following:

OFFICIAL BALLOT
INSTRUCTIONS: Place an "X" in the square beside the statement indicating the way you wish to vote.

— FOR Adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city.

— AGAINST adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city.

Section Five: That election judges and clerks are directed to comply with Article 6.06, Election Code of the State of Texas, as amended (Section 2 of House Bill 181, Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 452, Pages 1026, 1028), which provides that a square shall be placed beside each proposition in which the voter is instructed to place an "X" or other clear mark to indicate the way

he wishes to vote; but which also provides that a failure of a voter to mark his ballot in strict conformity with the directions on the ballot shall not invalidate the ballot, and the ballot shall be counted if the intention of the voter is clearly ascertainable, except where the law expressly prohibits the counting of the ballot. It is specifically provided that the election officers shall not refuse to count a ballot because of the voter's having marked his ballot by scratching out the statement of proposition for which he does not wish to vote.

Section Six: That notice of the election hereby ordered and called shall be given: (a) by publication on the same day of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation published within said Town, the date of the first publication to be at least twenty-one (21) days prior to the date set herein for such election; and (b) by posting of such notice at the polling place in each of the election precincts of the Town not less than twenty (20) days prior to the date set herein for such election. It is

hereby found and determined that the Hico News Review is a newspaper published within the Town of Hico, Texas, and is a newspaper of general circulation within said Town.

Section Seven: Should any part, section or provision of this ordinance be held invalid, this shall not affect the validity of the remaining terms and provisions hereof.

PASSED AND APPROVED, this 10th day of April, 1969.

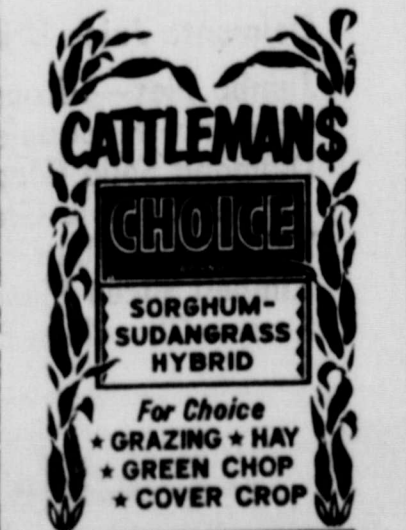

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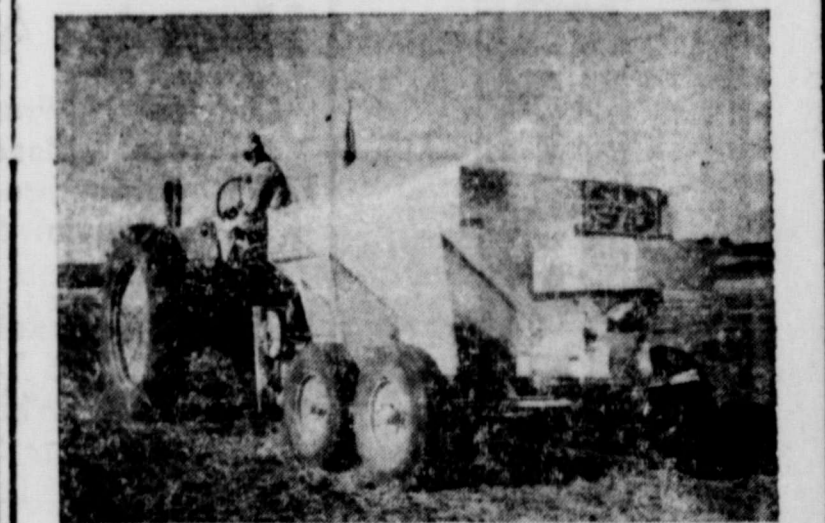

On the Home Range

Want to serve something different to your family this week? The easiest way is to use cheese. Cheese added to a white sauce makes creamed dishes extraordinary. Cheese combined with salads, such as potato or aspic salad makes them more hearty and flavorful.

Cheese can add a taste-worthy difference to each course of the meal. Perhaps one reason for this is the large variety of cheeses readily obtainable. The different types of cheese number several hundred. But there are only about 18 distinctive types or kinds of cheese. None of these are made exactly the same; the processes are varied to produce characteristics and qualities peculiar to each kind of cheese.

Cheeses are classified as to consistency and as to method of ripening, if ripening has occurred. Parmesan, romane and sapsage are a few of the very hard, ripened cheeses which are grated for cooking use.

Cheddar, swiss and ruvere are some of the ripened hard cheeses. Brick, munster, port du salut, gorgonzola and blue are semi-soft ripened cheeses, while bel phase, brie and camembert are soft-ripened cheeses, and ricotta, primost, cottage and cream cheeses are

soft, unripened cheeses.

Are you confused by the variety of steaks you see at the meat counter? These tips can help you. Cuts from the rib and loin section of the animal will always be more tender than those from the active muscles such as the shoulder—known as "chuck"—flank and round.

Broiling steaks? Then use tender cuts. The most tender cuts of steak are tenderloin, usually sold as "filet mignon," porterhouse, T-Bone, strip loin, club, sirloin and rib steaks.
