Sales Tax Approved by 22 Votes

Hico joined 353 other Texas cities in approving a City Sales and Use Tax when voters gave the green light to the special one percent tax in a called election held Saturday.

Interest was at a low ebb, however, with only 118 votes being cast.

Margin of approval was 22 votes—70 for the issue and 48 against.

A slight reprieve will be given local residents, since the tax won't go into effect until October 1. Then merchants will start collecting four percent instead of three on applicable items. Payments will be collected by local merchants, and paid directly to the State Comptroller's office, who in turn will figure the local portion and remit to the city.

City officials estimate that around \$8,000 annually will be derived from the new tax.

A Hippie Generation? We Think Not...

(Ed Note: The following is a speech presented by Miss Barbara Bailey of Hico, Area IV FFA President, in a greeting message at the Area IV FFA Banquet held last Friday night at Tarleton. The speech is her own thoughts, and dispels many beliefs that the younger generation is nothing but a group of "hippies." Read the message thoroughly, and see if you don't gain a different outlook on today's youth.)

In behalf of 4,367 members of Future Homemakers of America in Area IV, I would like to say thank you for inviting me here tonight that I may extend greetings to you, the Future Farmers of America, in hopes that you have a very successful year. I must admit I knew very little about your organization except that it was for boys—and that was enough to interest me.

So in preparing for tonight I was reading your manual and studied your creed, aims and purposes, and your motto. It was most impressive. But I realized that both the Future Farmers and Future Homemakers stand for basically one thing—the betterment of America.

Right now we are an expression of enthusiasm, already we have begun our plans to carry through our duties by studying and producing better land and better homes and learning to build and work with each—for the land and the homes were what America was built upon and what she still consists of to-

day and tomorrow. Tomorrow is our concern. We are the citizens and leaders of tomorrow's America. But we are also the victims of a damaging accusation—that of being "the hippie generation." We live in a time of drug addiction, draft-card burning, protest marching. And all youth are being associated with these few publicized groups.

Unfortunately, they are the part of our generation which does not realize that the American freedom, that so much blood was shed for and so many lives given for, must be preserved even if it means shedding more blood and giving more lives. We are more fortunate in having learned about the ideals of patriotism and love of country, whereas these hippies have grown up in undisciplined freedom. The "rights" and "love" they advocate will not last the test of time, these are just a passing fad. Well, for two centuries truth, freedom, and justice have survived. These haven't faded in and out—they have been stable for they are the true America.

And as long as there are you and I, organizations such as Future Farmers and Future Homemakers that promote these values and principles, although everyone else may doubt the stability and aims of our generation because of what they heard about a few—as long as the "now generation" lives to preserve these—there will always be America.

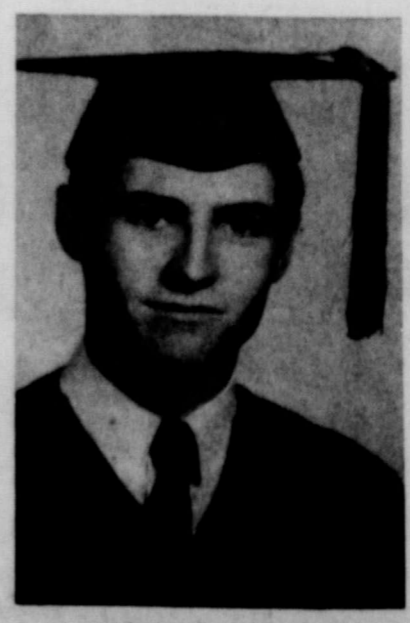

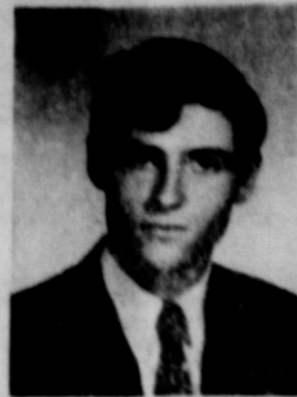
