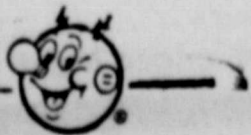

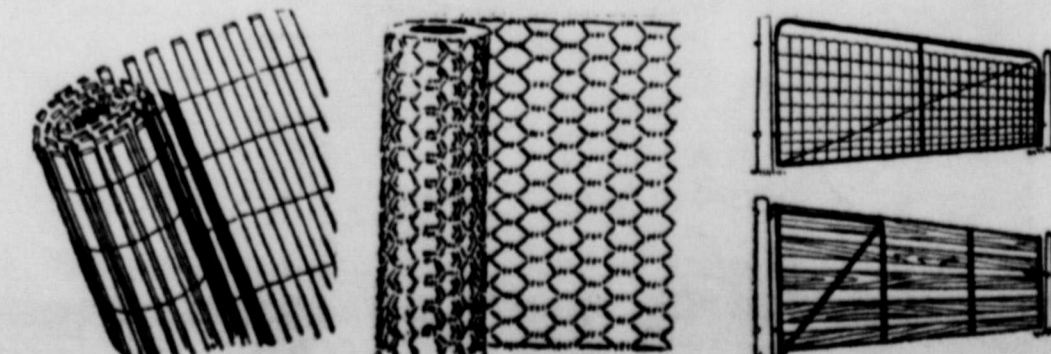
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Cheerleader's 'Slave Day' Activities Planned Here June 2 thru 6

VALEDICTORIAN OF KOPPERL EIGHTH GRADE CLASS

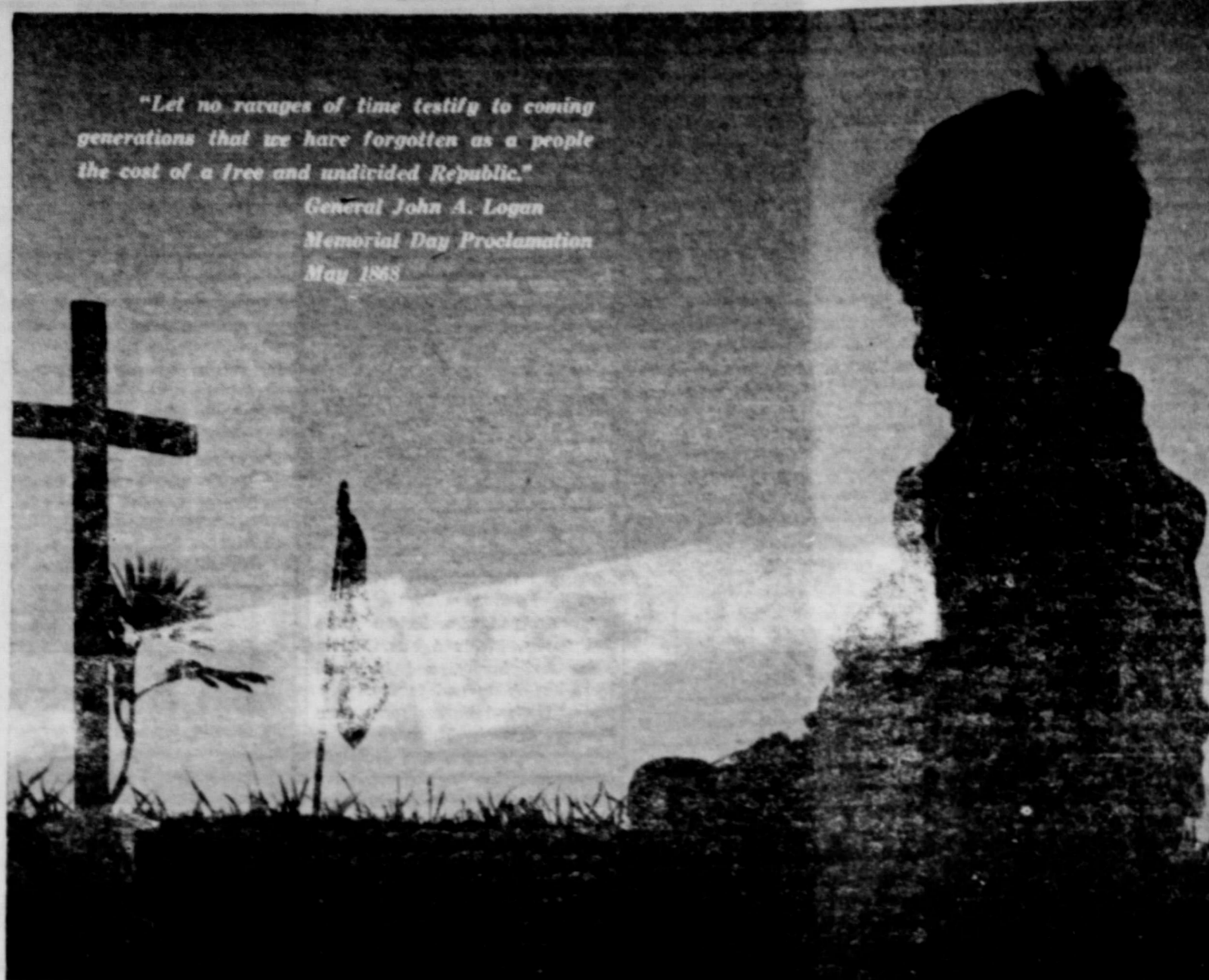

On the Home Range

It seldom pays to buy perishable fruits merely because the price is low. Unless the lower price is a result of over-abundance of the fruit, the so-called bargain may be undesirable.

Mild Cheddar cheese has been partly ripened or cured, usually for two or three months. It has a mild or slightly developed characteristic Cheddar flavor and firm body.

It's been said that breakfast is the most important meal of the day because your body has probably gone without food for at least 10 to 12 hours.

One excellent way to assure your-

self of getting a hearty breakfast is to add cereals. Cereals are made from grain products and are good sources of food energy at a relatively low cost. Store cereals in a cool, dry place. To restore crispness, heat the cereal in a shallow baking pan in a pre-heated oven at 360 degrees for about five minutes.

You are as old as you eat. This is especially important for the older person who may think that he no longer needs proteins, vitamins and minerals. But, comes this reminder during National Senior Citizen Month, all life long you need nutrients and food for fuel and for nutrients. The right food helps the body to be at its best and, in case of illness, a well-nourished body responds better to treatment than one in a run-down condition.

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COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By BILL McCUTCHEON

NOW is the time to spray for pecan nut casebearer. County spray dates are May 28-June 1.

It has been an accepted fact for many years that the pecan nut casebearer is Texas' most costly pecan insect pest. The first generation larvae of the pecan nut casebearer feed on and cause shedding of the small nutlets about the time of pollination. A single larvae frequently destroys all the nutlets in a single cluster.

Timing the insecticide application has always been the key to effective control. The greenish-white eggs are laid on the nutlet tips. Eggs assume a reddish appearance in two to three days and hatch in 4 to 5 days. The young larvae feed on buds for 24-48 hours before entering the nutlets. It is at this time that the pecan nut casebearer is most vulnerable and insecticides should be applied dur-

ing this period or slightly preceding this period.

I am watching the progress of the casebearer closely at this time and it seems as though it may be some time before we will need to spray in Hamilton County. I would urge you not to listen to reports from other areas as they may confuse you. Dates differ from county to county and timing is all important.

From reports that I have received and from my own observations it looks like spray dates for Hamilton County will be May 28-June 1. Weather conditions may alter this slightly but this is the best estimate at present.

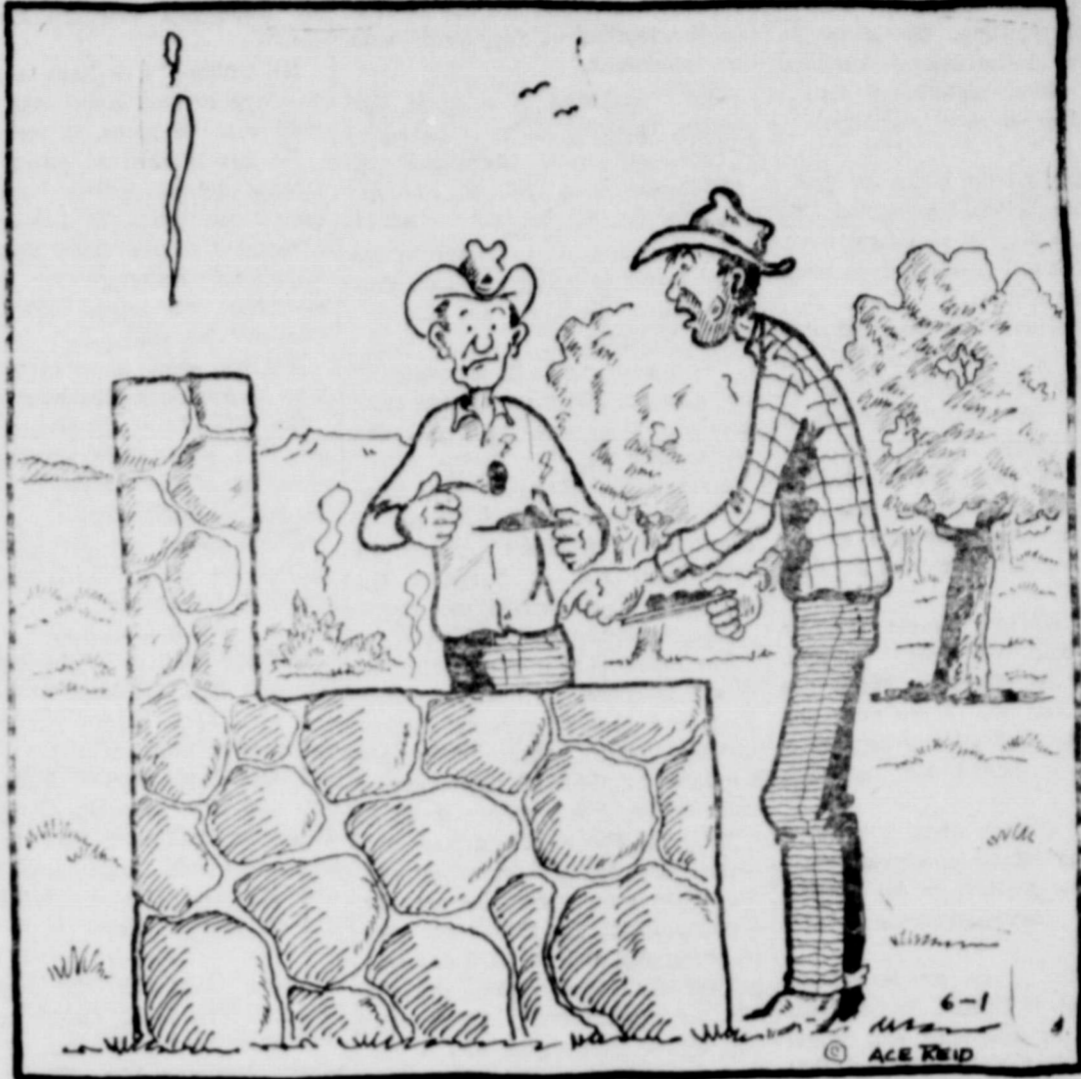
The pecan crop is short this year and the casebearer crop is quite large, so I think it is safe to say that you will have to spray if you expect to harvest any pecans this fall.

"If you can't whip it—join it." This is a good rule to follow if Johnson grass invades your hay pasture. Spot Brazil has been an advocate of this idea as long as I have known him. He is always asking me how to get better response from his Johnson grass.

Nutrient value of Johnson grass is comparable to many of the cultivated grasses grown for forage or hay and livestock can use it as well. Costs of herbicides to

control Johnson grass are much more than fertilizing costs.

If Johnson grass is to be bailed it should be cut in the boot stage, or right before the seed heads form. An application of fertilizer according to soil tests will help it grow rapidly and maintain nutrients.

I am somewhat hesitant to recommend Johnson grass because of the ingrained prejudice I acquired on the end of a hoe handle. It is important to keep in mind that you must keep Johnson grass under control and not allow it to enter cultivated row crops.

Officials of the Screwworm Eradication Program advise livestock producers to "spray herds, doctor all wounds, and collect larvae samples of all worms found within wounds and send samples to the

Mission Laboratory for positive identification." Twelve cases were confirmed in Texas during the first 12 days in April and conditions continue favorable for further trouble.

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RETIREES AT ODESSA—

H. H. Miller Calls It 'Quits' After 42-Years Teaching

(Ed Note: Following is a story concerning H. H. Miller, former Hico teacher, who will retire from public service this year after 42 years of teaching. The story was published in the Odessa American, and is being reproduced here in the interest of local readers.)

A young Marine home for just a short time before leaving for Vietnam found time to visit Lamar Elementary School and a former teacher, Henry Miller.

Miller retires this year after 42 years as a coach, principal, superintendent and teacher. Over the years he has taught thousands of boys and girls.

"Many of my former students have become heroes in war and peace," he said. "Several of my boys have given their lives for their country."

"Some of my former students have become ministers, lawyers, ranchers, and farmers. Many are teachers. And one of my girls told me that best of all she became a mother," he added with a quick smile.

And no matter what they have become, one thing is certain: most of them—like the young Marine home on leave—remember "Mr. Miller."

"Not only is he an inspiration to everyone at Lamar, he has been successful as counselor and friend to the student body. We feel that Mr. Miller is an asset to Ector County and a great person to be associated with," said a recent newsletter from Lamar.

Last week, another teacher, a mother, a principal, and a student all agreed that "Mr. Miller" is a good teacher—one of the best.

One small boy pointed to Miller and said proudly, "My teacher, last year." A sixth grader, a girl who had never been in Miller's class, came up to him one day at recess. "Guess what I made in history?" she said.

"I can go into almost any town in Texas," he says "and find someone I've taught just by walking down the street. Education has been and is my life," he adds. "It's great to be a teacher. I don't know of any other place where I could get my ideas over as fully."

Miller encourages young people to become teachers. "I'd encourage them to teach in elementary. It's a good opportunity to teach, a good opportunity to learn, a good way to live," he explains.

But a good teacher must have a love for children, an imagination, and a sense of humor, he stresses. Miller explained why he became a teacher. "I grew up on a ranch," he said. "It was somewhat isolated and my teachers brought in some light."

His first teaching assignment was a one-room school house. He taught the first through the eighth grades. "Education has changed a great deal since then," he said smiling.

"People had faith in their schools then," he said. "People still have faith in their schools," he explained "but we have more problems today. There's not less faith, but it's expressed in a different way."

He smiled, "I'm not the hero I used to be. There are so many others who've been to college." Parents and pupils are not as close to the teacher as they once were, he concluded.

But "education is a great deal better today," Miller emphasized. "There are more educational opportunities now. All of life has changed for the better," he added.

It was difficult to adapt to the new math, he admits. It took time and effort, he says, but the new math is better.

"The new methods are better," he stressed, "because if you can't teach a child one way, you can try another way."

One of the changes in elementary education in Odessa was a direct result of Miller's efforts. In 1968 Miller was in charge of the committee that revised the report card for elementary students.

The report card measures the student's progress in academic subjects and also in personal behavior and study habits. Miller got the idea for the dual measurement from an Air Force officer in Iowa.

The Air Force officer had two nieces. One was a slow learner and the other was a fast learner, he explained. But the slower one was receiving A's and the fast one was getting B's. The reason was "a lack of application," Miller says. The report card shows why a student is making a certain grade.

Miller wrote the message to parents which appears on the back of the report card. A few words have been changed over the years, but basically it is the same, he says. It begins, "Education is an endeavor that requires the close cooperation between parents and teachers and this is made possible by appropriate communication."

And Miller believes that "if the parents don't help a child, he doesn't have a good opportunity to learn."

Through the years Miller has devised his own method of teaching. And he has written articles on his teaching plan which is based on individual and group leadership, for the Texas Outlook and the NEA Journal, state and national education publications.

"We learn what we live," Miller says. "We learn by insight." He believes in integrated teaching—helping his students learn in many different ways, from many different sources.

"We don't get all wrapped up in books," he says. "We don't use only one media of learning." Miller uses newspapers, teaching machines and other devices in his classroom.

His individual and group leadership method of teaching is based on field theories and psychology and he has used it for 30 years, he said. He divides his students into groups and each group takes turns accepting all the responsibility in the classroom.

Some don't want to be leaders, and I don't force them to be," he said. But it is surprising what children can do and accomplish when they are given the opportunity, he stressed.

What does he plan to do when he retires? Miller says that he wants to "continue to assist in education by leadership, research and service."

He smiles. "I've been a teacher too long to quit now." And he admits that he hates to retire.

He has worked 20 years in the Odessa school system and has taught six years at Lamar. He's a member of Phi Delta Kappa, international fraternity for men in education. "I helped bring it to Odessa," he said.

And his name is listed in Who's Who in American Education.

His wife, Jewel, is also a teacher. This year she's serving as president of the Odessa Classroom Teacher's Association.

"She'll never get old enough to retire," he said. "She'll never admit it," he smiled.

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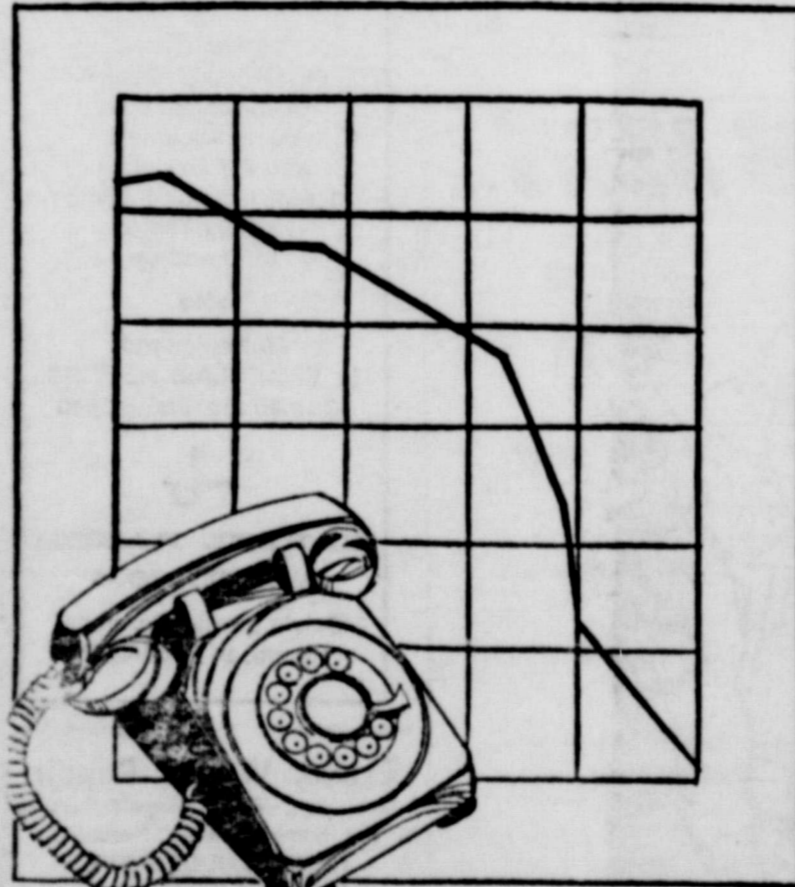
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
