Wildlife Lease Program Needs Available Property Listings

Work was begun this week on securing listings on property in this area for purpose of lease to sportsmen for hunting and fishing rights.

The program, sponsored by Hico Civic Club, is an effort to promote this area as a potential sportsman center.

A committee composed of Harold Walker, M. I. Knudson, E. V. Meador and Tommy Johnson is working on the project, and will be assisted by Clydie Jackson, who will maintain a list of available lands for lease in the area.

Main goal of the program at this time is to secure adequate land listings in the area in order that

an advertising program can be carried out publicizing the availability of suitable leases here.

The Civic Club committee will act as a directing agency only, and any lease agreement will be made between the landowner and sportsmen.

The program was initiated last year at Hamilton during the dove hunting season, and proved highly successful. Reports from that area indicate that sportsmen spent several thousand dollars on leases and other goods.

Plans here call for listings for dove, quail, deer, and fishing leases. Farmers and ranchers who have available lands that they would like to lease for any or all of the above hunting rights are asked to contact any of the committee members and fill out an information card. Inquiries will be directed to respective landowners.

A copy of the land listing card is printed below. There is no charge to the landowner for the service.

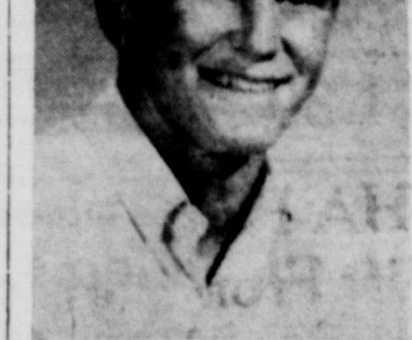
FIREMEN HAVE MEETING MONDAY NIGHT
