## Hico Kin Are Tragedy Victims During Week

Accidents last week in different parts of the state took the lives of three persons who were relatives of Hico residents.

Involved in the tragedies were 7-year-old Marcus Holloway of Mineral Wells, stepson of Doyle Nix and step-grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Nix of Hico; 14-year-old David Chadwick, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Chadwick of Sugarland, and grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Roy Seal; and A. W. Rachug of Fairy, who was the father of Mrs. Mack Hicks of Hico, and was manager of Duncan Ranch.

Young Holloway and Chadwick succumbed Tuesday, and Mr. Rachug died Thursday after suffering injuries in an accident near Hamilton.

Details of three tragedies follow:

### David Chadwick

Funeral services for Christopher David Chadwick, 14, of Sugarland were held at 2 p.m. Friday, June 13 at the Hico Church of Christ. Ministers E. A. Willingham and Claude Brock officiated. Burial was in the Hico Cemetery.

Young Chadwick passed away Tuesday after inhaling fumes from a motorcycle gasoline tank. He was born in Ganado April 1, 1955, and had lived in Sugarland for the past two years. He was a member of the Church of Christ in Sugarland.

Surviving are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Bill J. Chadwick of Sugarland; two sisters, Claudia Chadwick and Bennie Joree Chadwick of Sugarland; two brothers, Bill Dan Chadwick and Tommy Don Chadwick of Sugarland; his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Roy Seal of Hico and Mr. and Mrs. Bill Chadwick of Colorado City; his great-grandmother, Mrs. D. E. Sweeney of Okmulgee, Okla.

### August W. Rachug

Funeral services for August W. Rachug, 54, of the Fairy community, were held at 2 p.m. Saturday in Grace Memorial Baptist Church in Clifton, with Rev. Bob Ray and Rev. Curtis Holland officiating. Burial was in Clifton Memorial Park. Mr. Rachug was killed when the pickup he was driving ran under the rear of a large truck two miles east of Hamilton on Highway 22 about 9:30 a.m. Thursday.

Investigating officers said that the truck had stopped on the highway to make a left turn. They said Mr. Rachug was coming over the top of a hill when the crash occurred. The cab of the pickup was sheared off.

John Felan of Hamilton, the truck driver, was not injured. There was only slight damage to the truck. Mr. Rachug was foreman of the Duncan Ranch near Fairy.

He was born in Archer County. He is survived by one son, Rev. Robert Owen Rachug of Clifton; one daughter, Mrs. Mack Hicks of Hico; six grandchildren; two brothers, E. B. Rachug of Fort Worth and Leonard Rachug of Waco; three sisters, Mrs. Oscar Gloff of Fort Worth, Mrs. Ernest Viertel of Cranfills Gap, and Mrs. Hulan Hanson of Clifton.

### Marcus Holloway

Funeral services for Marcus Lee (Mark) Holloway, 7, who was killed Tuesday when he fell from a tractor-towed trailer at his father's farm near Mineral Wells, were held at 10:30 a.m. Thursday in Mineral Wells.

The boy, son of La Nelton Holloway of Mineral Wells and Mrs. Doyle Nix of Weatherford, had just completed his first year in school in Weatherford, and was to spend the summer on his father's farm southeast of Mineral Wells.

The youth fell from the trailer into the path of the trailer's wheels. The father, picking up rock behind the trailer, saw the youth fall and shouted a futile warning at another son, David, 11, who was driving the tractor.

Survivors also include his stepfather, Doyle Nix of Weatherford; grandparents, Mrs. Bennie Cate of San Angelo and Mr. and Mrs. N. L. Holloway of Mineral Wells, also step-grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Henry Nix of Hico.

... Racing Rancher Wins National Top Stock Eliminator Title.

## Hico's 'Racing Rancher' Cops National AHRA Crown

Derel Fillingim, who is familiarly known in racing circles over the country as "The Racing Rancher," culminated a long career of competition recently when he piloted his stock car, "Geronimo" to the National AHRA Spring Races.

Fillingim and his wife, Wilma and two daughters, Kim and D'Ann, were in Bristol, Tennessee from June 5 through 10 where he competed in the nationals.

Winning the eliminations in his class Fillingim went on to cop the big race, "Mr. Stock Eliminator." The title carried with it a cash purse of \$1,965.00, and merchandise totaling \$845.00, plus many fringe benefits.

Other awards for the championship included two trophies, also merchandise including a helmet. The big win has also brought offers from manufacturers of racing equipment, oil companies and others to supply him with everything from cams to spark plugs to racing oil.

The car which Fillingim owns and drives has been acclaimed the world's quickest stock Pontiac. It is a 1958 model, and was named "Geronimo" because of the Indian background.

During his years on the racing circuit, Fillingim shows a record of 150 class wins as compared to only one defeat. He has won 27 Top Stock Eliminator races, and four Street Eliminator races.

In 1968 he placed third in Division 4 Top Stock in the Grand American Drag Racing Circuit using the point system.

He is currently leading in points for the American Hot Rod Association competition for 1969.

His other accomplishments with "Geronimo" fill a full fact sheet, which will probably grow as the months pass.

Fillingim, who operates a farm and ranch near Hico, races as a hobby, and says that drag racing is a competitive and clean sport when run by rules and regulation on a certified drag strip. Mrs. Fillingim is also a race enthusiast, and accompanies her husband to all the meets, along with their two children.

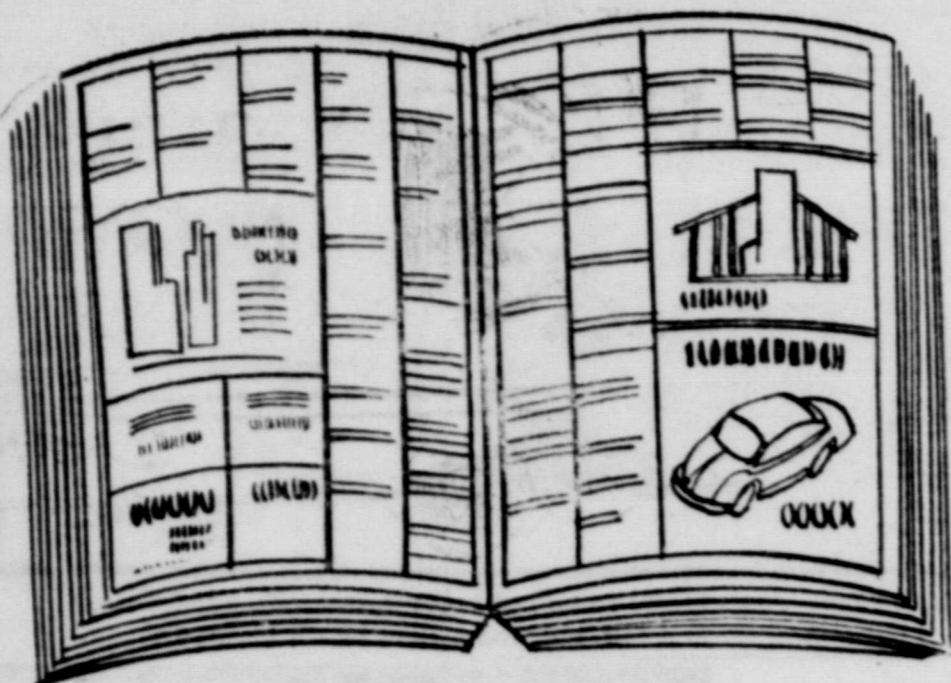
