## Two New Faculty Members Employed

Two new faculty members for Hico Schools have recently been employed by the board of trustees, according to Supt. O. C. Cook.

The two new members are Mrs. Don (Betty) Patterson and Ed Pettitt.

Mrs. Patterson comes to Hico from the annexed Carlton School District, and Mr. Pettitt will move here from Stephenville.

Mrs. Patterson is a graduate of Tarleton State College, and has been assigned to the seventh grade in the local system. Her major at Tarleton was English, and she also has an elementary education teaching certificate. She is married to Don Patterson of Hico, and they have three daughters, Kippy, Donna and Julia, who will attend Hico Schools.

Mr. Pettitt, who is married to the former Sylvia Sherrard of Hico, has been in the insurance business in Stephenville the past year. He is a graduate of Tarleton State College where he was a star football player for the Texans. Upon his graduation in 1967, he was signed to a contract with the Dallas Cowboys, and reported to their training camp in California that summer. However, an injury prevented him from pursuing a professional career, and he returned to Stephenville and entered the insurance business.

Pettitt will serve as head football coach, and teach biology, general science, and health education in the local schools. He replaces Charles Coan in the head coaching position. Coan, who served here the past two years, resigned at the end of the spring semester.

Mrs. Patterson replaces Mrs. Charles Coan as seventh grade teacher. Supt. Cook said that the two new teachers filled all current vacancies, and that an extra teacher would be employed later upon availability. Other faculty members had previously been signed to contracts.

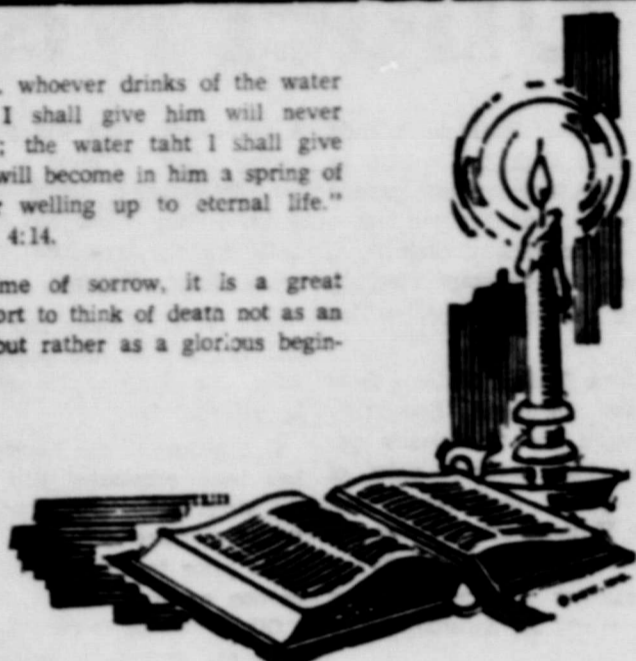

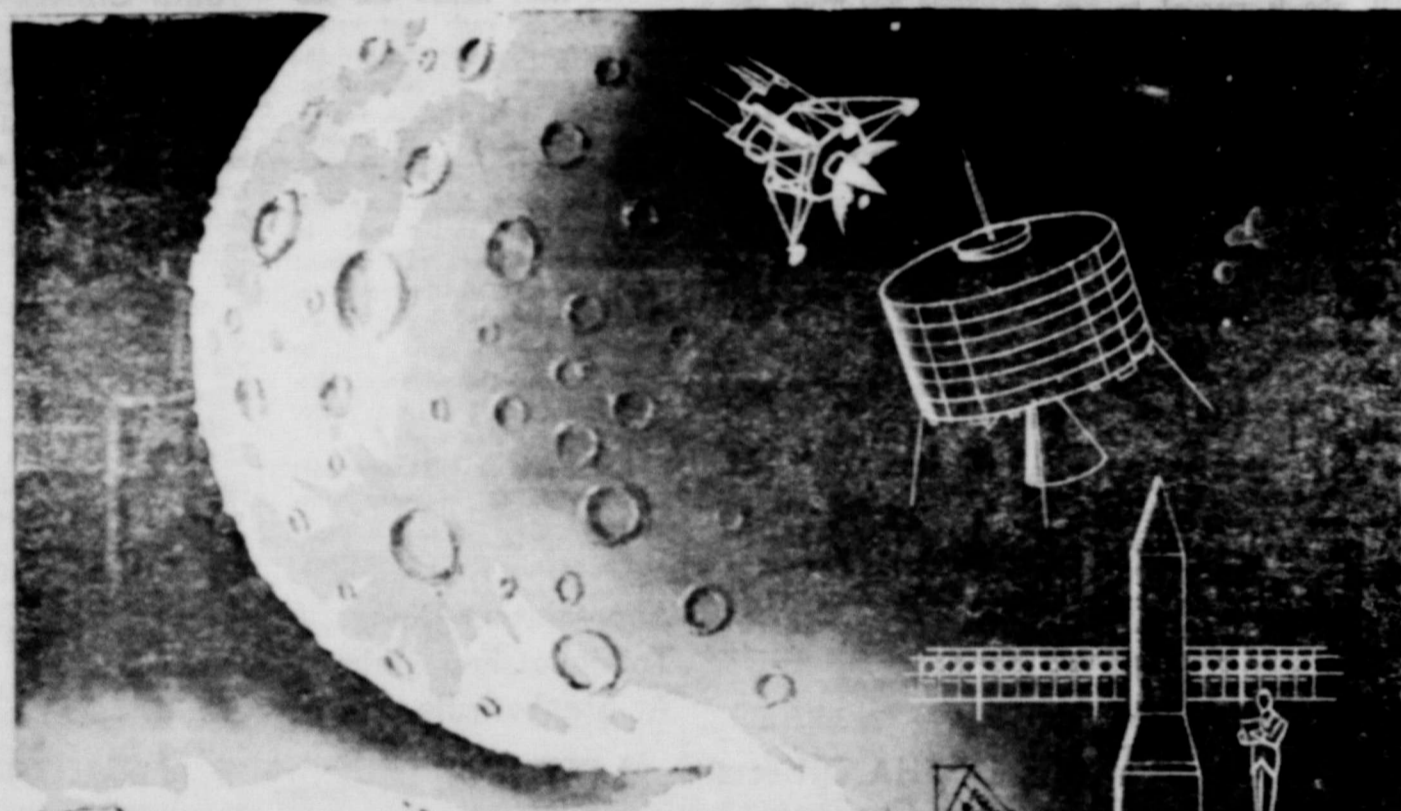

On the Home Range

Bill McCutcheon accompanied the group. While attending the lab 4-H's will learn to better understand themselves and others, work more effectively with young people and adults, and plan and carry through certain lab activities. They will be divided into five groups or committees—group living, assembly, recap, recreation and highlight—where 4-Hers will help carry out activities. Following their return, the 4-Hers will help plan the County Camp that will be held August 4-5. Never place breakfast cereals on a shelf used for soap or other

cleaning products, or with foods having a strong odor. The aroma adversely affect the cereal's flavor. Store packages in a clean, cool dry place. After opening packages, reclose inner wrappings and tops to preserve crispness of the cereals. Dates to Remember: June 26: Family Living Committee Meeting, 2 p.m. July 3: Record Books due to County Extension Office. Whether you strawberry-pick in your patch or a supermarket you should stay away from white-tipped and soft fleshed berries—and handle berries with tender loving care. White tips mean under-ripe tart berries; overripe fruit which has been on the shelf or vine too long lose its brightness, aroma and much

flavor. They prove wasteful in preparation. In the supermarket, a stained container may indicate overripe berries. The fruit is at its best with full red color, firm flesh, good aroma and bright appearance. The current supply from nearby growing areas has only a short season. Remember that size does not affect quality and flavor of the fruit. Generally, small fruit makes more servings. The aristocratic strawberry needs tender loving care; it bruises and decays easily. Buy strawberries last so they will not be squashed in the cart and don't leave them in a hot car. At home, sort berries and remove soft ones to use immediately. Let under-ripe berries ripen at room temperature. Store berries in the container, covered with celophane in the refrigerator. Before using, wash them gently and quickly in cold water. Do not soak. Remove the caps after berries are clean. Strawberries should be used within two or three days after purchase. Versatile nylon net is a fabric of many uses. Here is one handy item you can stitch up in minutes. Sew nylon net onto one side of old terry washcloths. The resulting scrubbers are wonderful for all sorts of quick cleanups, from bathroom fixtures to vinyl tablecloths, from food stained counter tops to children's toys. The cloth holds a good sudsy lather and does the rinsing while the net coaxes away stubborn spots without hard scrubbing. To prevent soil from clogging the fine mesh of window screens, scrub them (including their frames) often. Use a brush with plenty of soap or detergent suds, and rinse with a garden hose. To discourage mosquitoes, wipe the clean screens with kerosene. 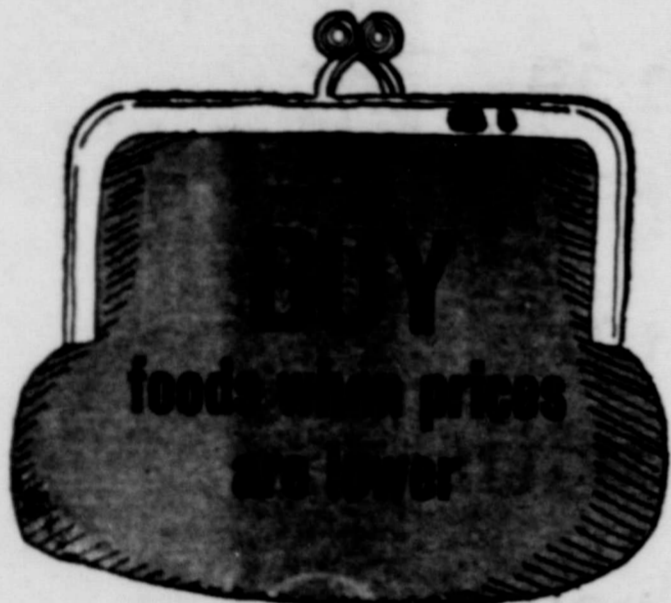

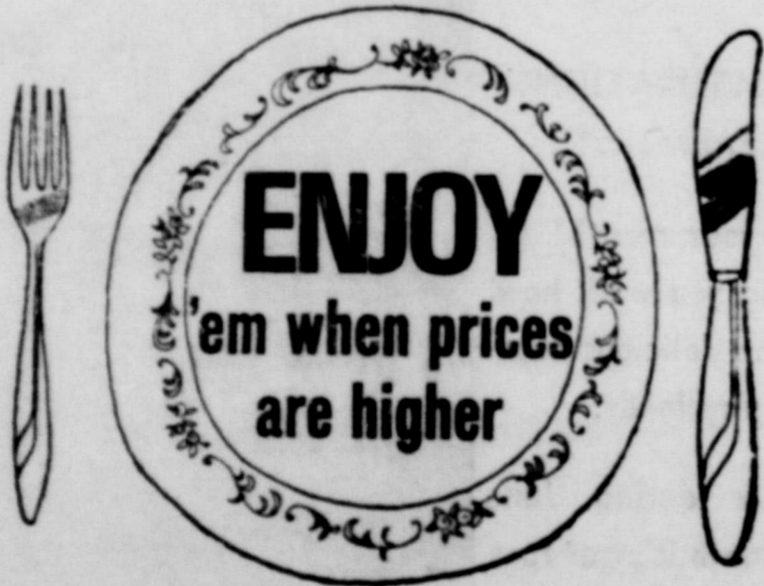

**COUNTY AGENT REPORTS**

By BILL McCUTCHEON

The dry weather is getting quite serious. Grain sorghum is in the "high water" use stage and there is no moisture available. This will be reflected in the yields. Some cotton is still not up due to dry weather and certainly it will have a hard time making good yields. Pastures are also deteriorating rapidly.

The only bright picture is the small grain harvest. It was one of the best in recent years but low prices dampen the enthusiasm.

Things are looking up a little for those who had the tenacity and foresight to hang on to their Angora goats through the rough years of 1965-68. Although the picture is not all roses at present, prices have climbed to a monthly average of 70 cents a pound in May of 1969 as compared to a low of 42 cents in January of 1968.

This has come about because of lowered numbers of Angora goats, increased domestic use, and exports. These trends promise to continue and the market for U.S. mohair is expected to be a little more favorable throughout 1969.

Cattle grubs cost the Texas livestock industry several million dollars each year. Losses to this pest are an important problem in Hamilton County.

Losses occur at all levels in the production and marketing chain. The cow-calf producer is concerned about the reduced milk production by mother cows resulting in reduced weaning weights of calves. The feeder suffers profit losses as a result of reduced gains and a lowered market price for grubby animals. The packer who buys and slaughters grubby animals realizes hide losses, carcass trim, increased handling costs and lowered carcass value. Consequently, cattle grub control deserves the attention of the entire beef cattle industry.

These losses due to grub damage can be virtually eliminated with timely applications of any one of several recommended systemic insecticides. The insecticides are called systemics because they are distributed inside the body of the animal and kill the grubs before damage is done.

Since only one application is necessary, proper timing is all important. Early application of systemic insecticides are considerably safer, and are more effective. You can expect good results with proper applications between May 1 and September 1.

Recommended systemics are Co-Ral, Ruelene, Neguvon, and Troleene. Co-Ral and Ruelene may be used as either a pour-on or spray. Neguvon is to be used as a spray, and Troleene is a material which is to be fed to the animals for the May 1 and September 1 period. Cost of these treatments vary with the method and chemical selected, but generally ranges less than 50-cents per animal in most instances.

The best method of stopping the itching from chiggers is not to get bitten. Before going into an area where the pests may be present, use a repellent. They are available in aerosol containers, as dusts or sprays. Dusting sulfur does a good job but may not be as effective as some of the repellents. Areas, including lawns, may be dusted or sprayed to eliminate the mites. The larvae stage of the insect is the trouble-maker.

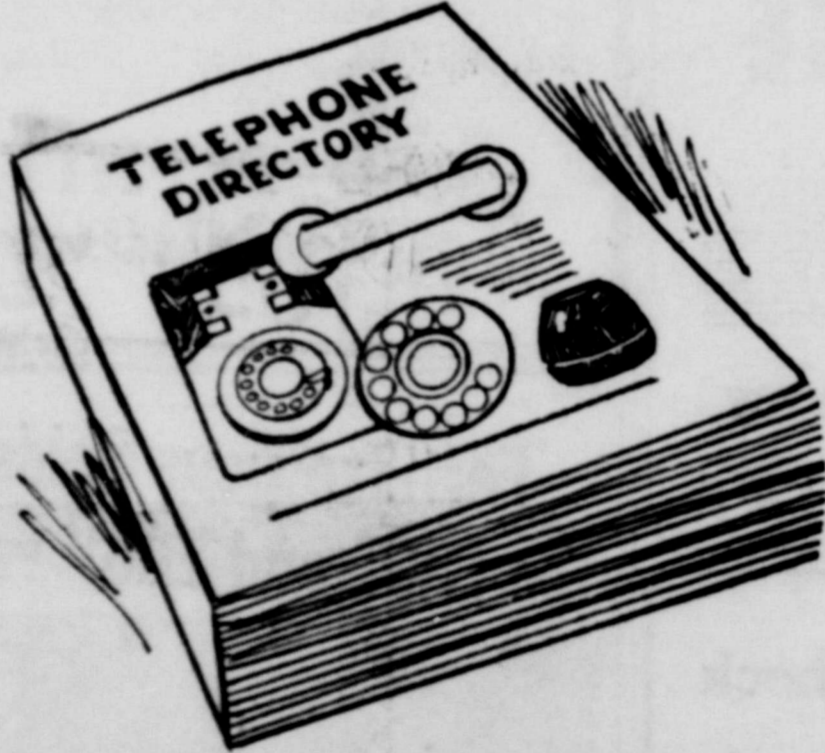
