Rev. E. E. Dawson Succumbs Monday

Funeral services for Rev. Edward Eugene Dawson were held at 3 p.m. Wednesday at the First Baptist Church in Bellmead. Dr. M. L. Rhodes officiated, with graveside services and burial at Hico Cemetery later in the afternoon.

Rev. Dawson, 88, passed away Monday afternoon, July 7, at the Regis retirement residence in Waco. He was born January 12, 1881 in Ellis County, son of Martin J. and Laura Hampton Dawson. He was a member of Hico Baptist Church.

He was married to Nora Myrtle Hooser, who preceded him in death Dec. 21, 1964.

Rev. Dawson went to Waco in 1965, after retiring in 1944 from a career as an evangelist and pastor that began in 1916.

He served Baptist churches in Merkel, Tullia, Coleman, Kingsville, Del Rio, Balmorhea, Fort Davis, Valentine, Hico, Goldthwaite and Paint Rock during his long career.

In addition, he was editor of the Western Evangelical Newspaper, and from 1928 until 1932 did evangelistic work. He also served as a trustee at Howard Payne College, Brownwood, and Wayland College, Plainview.

From 1955 until he moved to Waco, Bro. Dawson wrote a weekly column for the News Review, entitled "It Happened—Here or Near," and gained a large readership of the feature.

Bro. Dawson is survived by two sons, G. S. Dawson of Waco and Joe W. Dawson of Palm Springs, Calif.; three daughters, Mrs. Cogie Roberts of Artesia, New Mexico, Mrs. C. E. Williams of Ingleside, and Mrs. G. E. Holladay of Hico; four brothers, Roy Dawson of Frost, Harold Dawson of Austin, Oliver Dawson of Brownwood, and Dr. J. M. Dawson of Corsicana; and four sisters, Mrs. Cenia Wallace of Waco, Mrs. Rheta Hooser of Frost, Mrs. Gilbert Hale of Houston, and Mrs. Leslie Attaway of Hewitt.

Miss Durham is New Regional Director For Welfare Program

The Texas Department of Public Welfare moved this week to realign its organizational structure and adopt a new regional plan, reducing the number of regions to 16. Welfare Commissioner Burton G. Hackney named directors to administer all departmental programs in each region.

Included in the new program was appointment of a former Hicoan, Miss Baylor Durham, as director for the Waco region. The region include the counties of Mills, Hamilton, Bosque, Hill, Lampasas, Coryell, McLennan, Limestone, Freestone, Bell, Falls, Milam, Robertson, Leon, Burleson, Brazos, Madison, Washington and Grimes. Miss Durham is the daughter of

Mrs. Pearl Durham, with whom she makes her home in Waco, and the late S. O. Durham, early settlers in the Clairette-Hico community. She is a graduate of Hico High School, Tarrant State College, and Texas Tech. Miss Durham has been with the Department of Public Welfare since 1946.

The realignment, which went into effect July 1, will streamline administrative functions and aid the Department's cooperative activities with the other agencies at the city, county, region and state levels. It will also merge child welfare services with the program of aid to families with dependent children.

2. Both divisions are open to any area girl. Local area is considered to be Hico and trade territory, including Iredell, Fairy, Duffau, Clairette, Olin, Carlton and Chalk Mountain.
3. The young division is open to girls age 3 through 6 who have not attended school. They will not be sponsored, but must be entered by parents and pay registration fee.
4. Senior division is open to local area unmarried girls age 14 thru 18. The contestants must be sponsored by a Hico business firm or area organization.
5. Deadline for entry is Saturday noon, July 26.
6. Older contestants will be judged in formal or semi-formal wear, and younger girls will be judged in street dress attire.
7. Entries will be judged on poise, personality and beauty.
8. Registration fee of \$3.00 must be paid in advance to the Reunion Association, and contestants will not be qualified until fee has been paid. Registration fee will be paid to committee when contestant is entered.

Hico Man Seriously Burned

Young Loudermilk's condition was listed as still being poor Tuesday afternoon, but he was responding to treatment according to relatives. He remains in intensive care at Parkland Hospital, Dallas, and family members said that it would be 13 to 15 days before his condition could be fully determined.

Loudermilk, who had been registered at the motel for two days, was treated at Peter Smith Hospital in Fort Worth for second and third degree burns over 70 percent of his body, and was later transferred to Parkland.

Haltom City Fire Capt. Bob Dyer said firemen pulled Loudermilk out of his burning cabin. Dyer said the cabin was damaged heavily.

The fire marshal said that cause of the fire was still being investigated.

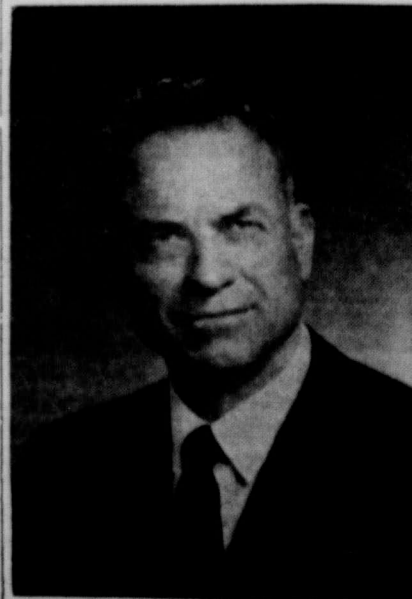

An open installation of officers for Masonic Lodge No. 477 will be held at Masonic Hall Thursday, July 10 at 8 p.m.

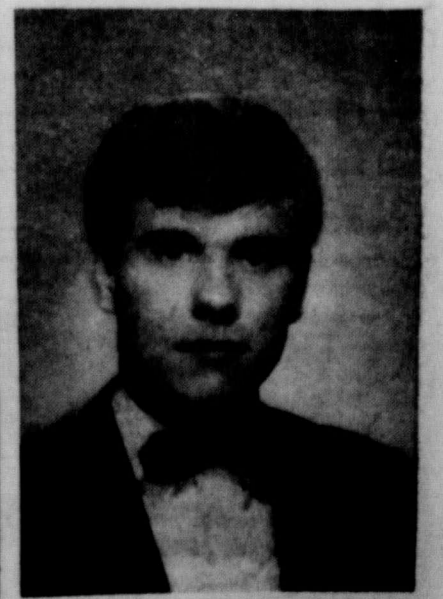

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

It certainly looks like we are going to have our share of dry weather this summer. The last rain received in Hamilton County was on June 6 and the moisture had not been overly abundant before this time.

Crop prospects look quite poor at present as the grain sorghum has been suffering quite severely for several weeks, hay crops are burned, and cotton is just surviving. Pastures have deteriorated quite rapidly also, and I'm sure some will be feeding livestock in the near future if we don't get some much-needed moisture.

Don't forget to water young and newly planted fruit trees, shrubs or other perennials. You can lose a tree almost overnight if it is not fully established.

When watering a tree or shrub be sure to water thoroughly, soaking the ground well out to the drip line of the plant. Too many people water at the trunk of the tree and expect good results. The feeder roots are at the end of the limb spread and this is the point that most of the moisture and plant nutrients are absorbed. Don't stand there with the hose in hand and expect to thoroughly water a plant. Turn the hose on slowly and go off and leave it for several hours.

Talking about watering trees, watering fruit trees just before the fruit ripens can be quite beneficial. Fruit such as peaches double or triples in size in a week or so as it begins to mature if water is available. Quite a few of our peach varieties are about to this stage

now and if it is where you can water you could get excellent results from a good two to three inch watering. Again be sure to apply the water at the drip line of the tree and not at the trunk.

If you have been watering your vegetable garden properly and your tomatoes and other vegetables are dying anyway, chances are good that red spider mites are causing most of your problem. These minute insects can kill plants in a short period of time and frequently build up to damaging numbers in dry weather. They are difficult to see, but can be seen on the underside of the leaves with close inspection. Other symptoms are webs on the leaves and mottling of the leaves.

They are difficult to control as it is hard to get the spray material on the bottom of the leaves. Some of the better insecticides for spider mite control on home gardens are Malathion, sulfur, and Kelthane. Be sure to follow instructions on the label.

The season of water spouts is at hand and it is reflected in the number of accidents being reported. Boating and other water sports can be fun, relaxing and safe when conducted according to water safety suggestions.

Though we have a boat safety law, boaters do not always take the time to become familiar with its provisions. One mistake in a boat can mean big trouble or even a disaster.

Here are some suggestions for making water sports safer. Never overload a boat with passengers. It has a rated capacity which should always be observed. Always have an extra paddle or oar in the boat in case one is broken or lost. Before leaving shore, ask an informed person about hazards in the lake or stream.

Wear clothing and shoes which can be easily removed in case the boat sinks or capsizes. Have an approved life preserver available for every passenger and see that it is worn. If a motor is used, make certain it is the proper size and horsepower for the boat. Be cautious when steering the boat as when steering a car. Learn and observe the rules of water safety such as speed limits, yielding the right of way and forbidden zones.
