## Contest Rules

Rules for the pageant were listed as follows:

- Two divisions will be held, a Little Miss Reunion division for girls age 3-6 and the regular senior division for girls age 14-18.
- Both divisions are open to any area girl. Local area is considered to be Hico and trade territory, including Iredell, Fairy, Duffau, Clairette, Olin, Carlton and Chalk Mountain.
- The young division is open to girls age 3 through 6 who have not attended school. They will not be sponsored, but must be entered by parents and pay registration fee.
- Senior division is open to local area unmarried girls age 14 thru 18. The contestants must be sponsored by a Hico business firm or area organization.
- Deadline for entry is Saturday noon, July 26.
- Older contestants will be judged in formal or semi-formal wear, and younger girls will be judged in street dress attire.

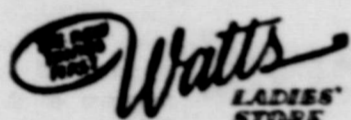

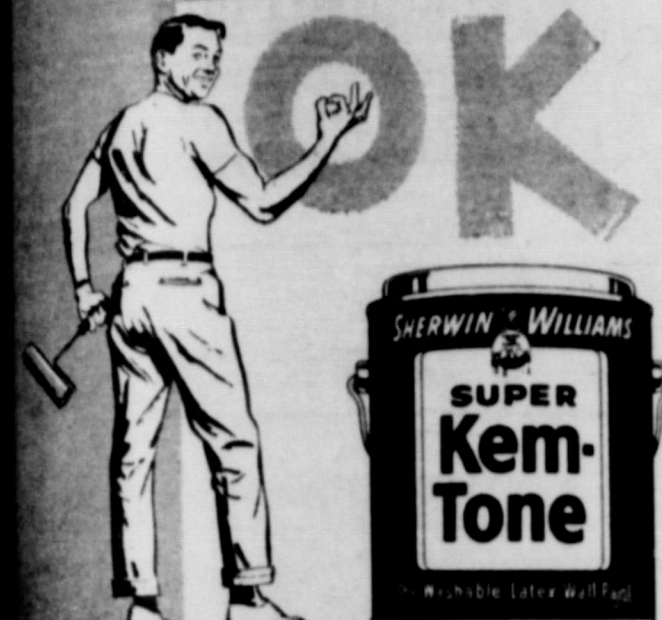

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# A Look at the Past

## 38 YEARS AGO—JULY 1911

Hico's Annual Reunion is scheduled for August 6, 7 and 8. Manager S. J. Cheek said plans were being made to make this Reunion the most successful yet. Burdick's All-Texas Shows has been engaged with nightly entertainment under the new pavilion that was built last year.

The home of F. S. Latham on the hill north of the school caught fire about daylight Sunday morning. The house and all its contents were a total loss.

The J. E. Bureson Grocery will move to the Storey Building next door to the First National Bank this week. Due to growing business new modern quarters were needed. J. H. Goad and his corps of carpenters did the carpenter work, and Spaulding and Son did the painting and papering. Barnes & McCullough Lumber Company had the contract for materials.

Miss Zella Mirm Duncan, who with her mother and brother recently moved to Clifton from Hico, has accepted a position with the H. W. Gossard Co. of Chicago with her headquarters in Dallas.

Patricia Jones was her sister-in-law. Bridesmaids were Miss Barbara Casey of Hico,

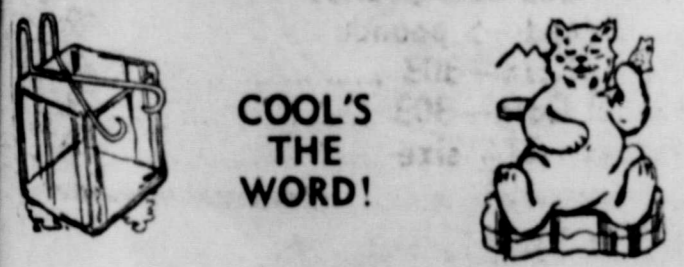

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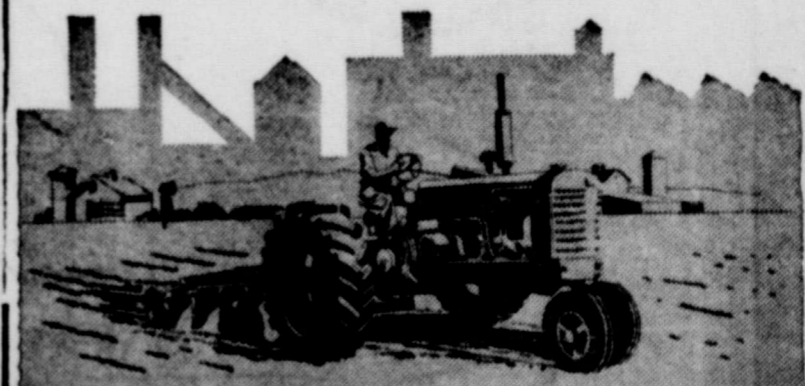

## COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By BILL McCUTCHEON

Except for a few years in Germany and in Extension work in Lynn and Eastland counties, I have lived in this area of the state for a big part of 30 years, and this is the first time in my memory that we have failed to make a grain sorghum crop. Crop failure this year seems imminent.

It doesn't seem to make much difference what part of the county you check—they are all about the same this year.

This dry weather is good for one thing. This is an ideal time to kill mesquites with basal application of 2, 4, 5-T and diesel or kerosene; or with diesel or kerosene alone. The group is dry enough that this

material will soak into the ground around the trunk and give an excellent kill of the dormant buds below the ground line.

Farming operations are about stymied until we get moisture so this would be an excellent excuse to tear yourself away from the air conditioner.

Hamilton County has something going for it in the hog industry it seems. Certainly prices have been favorable for the past year or so

and promise to continue. Also, many farmers have found it necessary to diversify their operations and the swine industry promises a good return per dollar invested.

Swine populations in Hamilton County have almost doubled in the past five years. Texas livestock statistics show 6,825 head of hogs in the county in 1964, and place the figure at 11,000 head in 1965. I personally expect these increases to continue. Hog operations could fit in quite well with quite a few farm operations.

The most critical time for newly planted trees and shrubs is during the first summer. Because of the reduced root system many plants have difficulty getting established. This is especially true in areas where rainfall has been abundant, then suddenly it turns dry and hot before the roots are well established. Rather than frequent light waterings, give the plants a thorough soaking to a depth of 8-12 inches. Allow the soil to dry in the upper two inches before watering again. A mulch over the root area will aid in moisture conservation and in keeping soil temperature down.

With all of the century old liveoaks around Hamilton County I have in past years had the mistaken opinion that very few insects and diseases attacked these monarch and that they would live come drought or high water.

This is certainly not true as evidenced by the many dead and dying trees over the county. Liveoak decline, a virus for which there is no known remedy, has taken quite a few of these and now many of these have another problem.

On most of the trees being defoliated I have found an abundance of black spotted aphids. I have sent a sample of these to Texas A&M Entomologists to see if my suspicions are true, but in the meantime I have sprayed some of the trees in my yard to stop the defoliation if this is the problem.

### July 20-26 Proclaimed Farm Safety Week By Gov. Preston Smith

Texas Governor Preston Smith has proclaimed July 20-26 Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Week and called on rural residents to make use of the new SMV emblem on slow moving agricultural vehicles as added protection when traveling highways.

He also urged rural residents to take advantage of modern technology designed to remove many of the hazards in agricultural enterprises and cited that in spite of a declining rural population and advances in agricultural technology, farm and ranch accidents in Texas continue to steadily increase.

Last year 297 persons in Texas died as the result of farm accidents, an increase of six percent in the number of fatalities over the previous year. Injuries for the past year are estimated at 33,200 as compared to 31,400 in 1965.

The Texas observance coincides with National Farm Safety Week, proclaimed by the President, to focus attention on farm accident prevention throughout the nation.

During this special week, a unified statewide farm accident prevention education program will be undertaken by a number of Texas organizations. "Such a campaign can do much to call attention to the need for accident prevention among our rural residents," the Governor said.
