Husband of Former Hicoan Decorated For Vietnam Service

With the U.S. Combat Air Force, Vietnam—Lt. Col. Louis I. Lawrence, whose wife, Frances, is the daughter of C. M. Langham of Hico has been decorated with the Distinguished Flying Cross for air action in Southeast Asia.

Col. Lawrence, a B-57 Canberra navigator-bombardier at Phan Rang AFB, Vietnam, flew a night armed reconnaissance mission against a heavily defended enemy truck convoy carrying supplies to enemy forces. Despite intense anti-aircraft fire, mountainous terrain and adverse weather conditions, he destroyed four trucks, caused six large secondary explosions, four small explosions and started ten secondary fires.

The Colonel is in a unit of the Pacific Air Forces, and is a veteran of World War II and the Korean War.

Hico Voters Turn Down All But Three Amendments

Hico voters, 153 strong, approved the old-age amendment in Tuesday's election, No. 5 on the ballot, and also No. 4, exemption of non-profit water systems, and No. 7, assistance to wives and children of governmental officers.

But they turned down the other six amendments.

Amendment 4 received local approval by a 77-72 margin; amendment 5 received the largest margin, 115 to 47; and No. 7 was second

in line with a 92-55 vote.

Amendment 1, to repeal obsolete provisions in the constitution, was defeated 75-72; Amendment 2, the water proposition was defeated 78-70; and Amendment 3, raising the salaries of Legislators, went down 107-45.

Amendment 6, removing the constitutional rate limitations on interest, was defeated 93-52; Amendment 8, loans to students, was defeated 86-66; and Amendment 9, providing for annual Legislative sessions, lost out locally by an 87 to 60 margin.

Mrs. L. J. Chaney served as presiding judge in the Tuesday election.

Hico Schools Scheduled to Open Sept. 2

Hico Public Schools will open for the 1969-70 term Tuesday, Sept. 2, at 9 a.m., with a general assembly in the auditorium, according to Supt. O. C. Cook. Mr. Cook extended an invitation to all parents and friends to attend the assembly.

Following the assembly, a full day schedule of classes will be held. Lunch will be served the first day, and the same policy will be in effect concerning lunches as in the past. Students may eat in the lunchroom, bring their lunch, or go to their homes.

Lunch Price Increase
Since the lunchroom fund has been going into the "red" for the past two years, and all surplus

money has been used, the school board had no choice but to raise the price of lunches five cents for the coming school year. "Fewer government commodities, advance in food prices, and rise in cost of labor," was cited by the superintendent as reason for the increase.

Price for grades one through five will be 35c; grades six through 12 40c, and adults 45c. Mr. Cook said, "The school board urges parents to support the lunchroom. It is through large participation that the cost can be held to a minimum."

Pre-Registration.
Pre-registration for high school students will start Friday, August 29 at 8 a.m. Elementary students will register the first day of school on Tuesday, Sept. 2.

Birth Certificates.
All first year students are required to have a birth certificate to present the first day of school as proof of age.

School attendance is required for students through the age of 17 years.

Faculty Meeting.
The first faculty meeting for teachers will be held Saturday, August 30 at 8 a.m. in the High School Library.

T.B. Certificates.
All school personnel are required to get a certificate signed by a doctor revealing that they have been examined for the disease of tuberculosis before Sept. 1. Also students in the first and seventh grades are to be examined for the same disease. The State Board of Health shall provide this. Parents should wait for further notice in regard to this matter.

New Students.
"It is with a great deal of pleasure that we welcome the students coming to our school from the Carlton district," Mr. Cook said. "We are sure they will be an asset to our school and we in turn want to help them in any way we can. We extend a hearty invitation to all patrons and parents to enter into all of our school functions," the superintendent concluded.

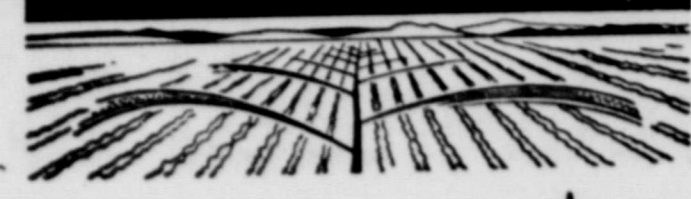

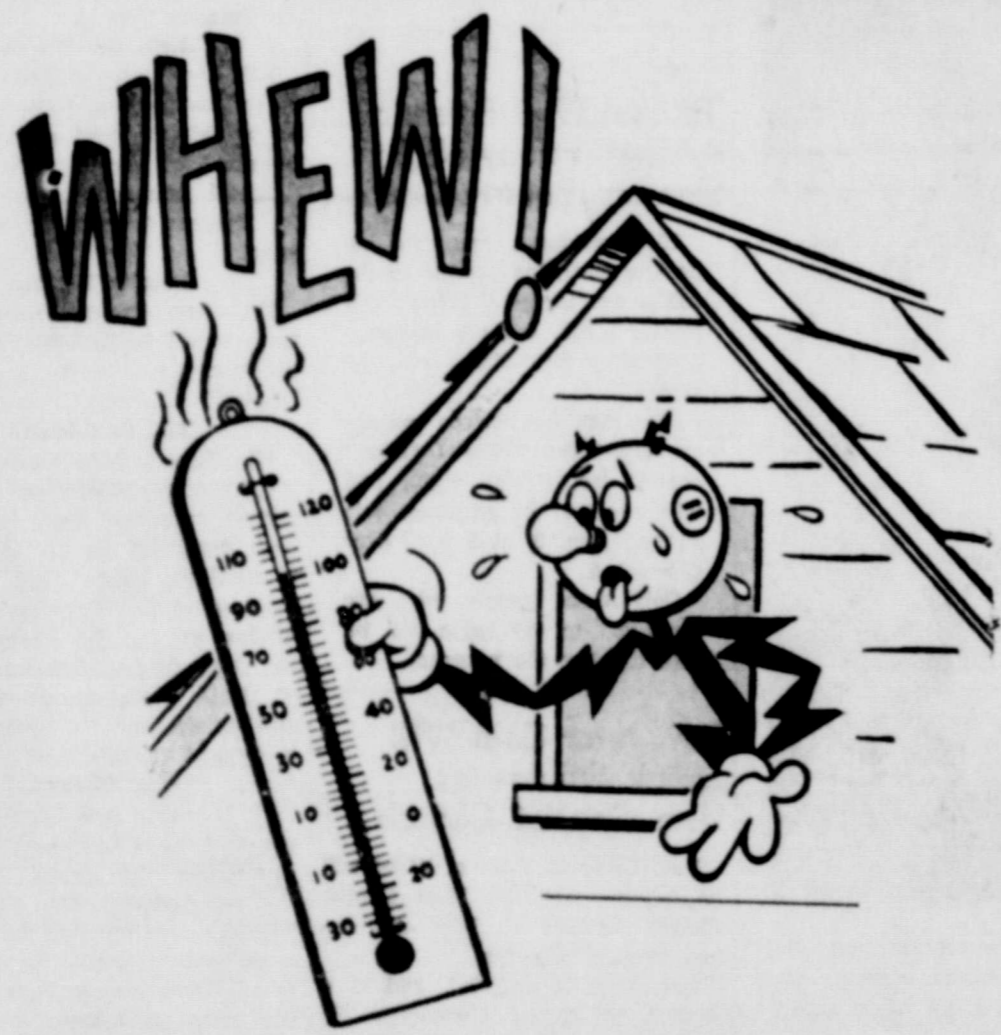

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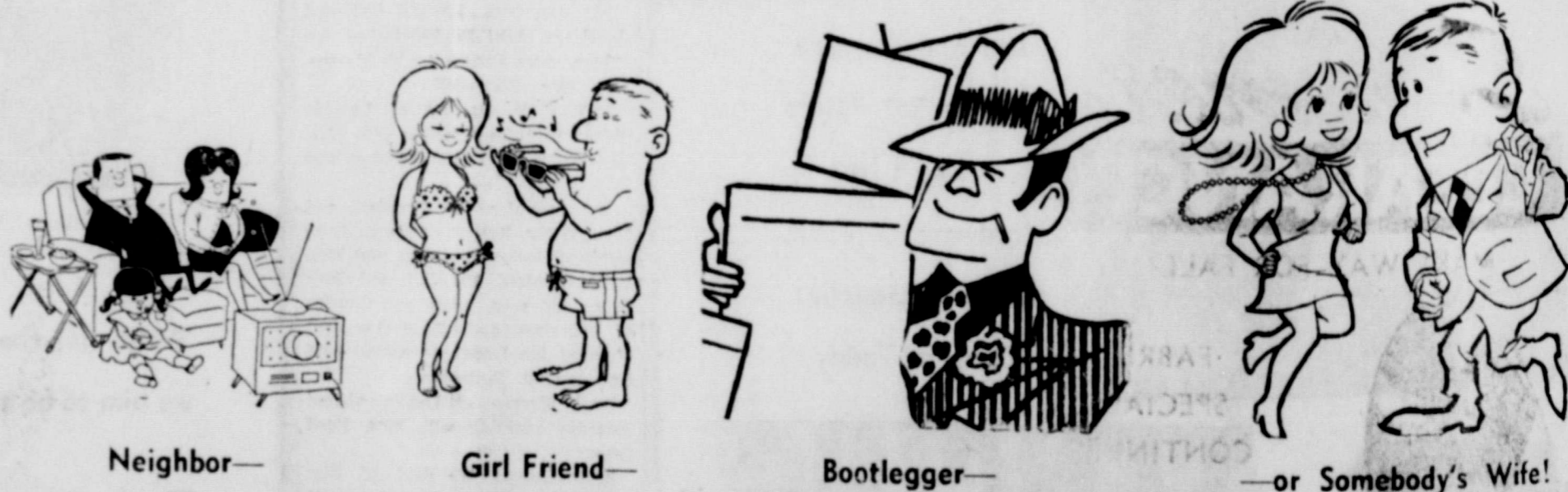
