Student teachers spend eight weeks in the high school during the last half of their senior year under the supervision of the vocational agriculture teacher.

Hico High School is one of 33 schools cooperating with TSC in the vocational agriculture teacher education program.

ASCS Committee Election Will Be Held by Mail Ballot

Election of community committee in all five communities in Hamilton County will again be held by mail. Ballots will be mailed about Sept. 5, and must be returned to the County office by Sept. 17.

Community boundaries will remain the same as in the past. Persons may be nominated by petition. A petition must be limited to one nominee each, and be signed by at least six eligible voters, and must be received in the County office no

later than August 22. Names of persons nominated will be placed on the slate of nominees if found eligible and willing to serve.

Ballots cast for community committees will be counted in public at the County office on Thursday, Sept. 18 at 8 a.m. Counting may be witnessed by any interested persons.

Elected delegates will meet in the county office to elect one county committee member who will serve for a term of three years, and two alternates who will serve for one year. This convention is open to the public.

Within the near future every producer will receive a leaflet which will fully explain the County Committee system and details of the voting.

In voting by mail all producers should follow voting instructions to the letter, according to ASCS manager S. E. Cloninger.

Good Stand of Coastal is Established By L. J. Chaney

L. J. Chaney, a cooperater with the Hamilton-Coryell Soil and Water Conservation District, owns and operates a livestock farm three miles northeast of Hico. He produces good grass to raise more

beef per unit of operation.

In 1968, fourteen acres of mesquite, post oak and greenbriar brush were dozed and removed from the land. Two small gullies were filled and smoothed and a seedbed prepared. In April he sprigged Coastal bermudagrass and fertilized. Hand seeding of NK-37 bermuda followed the sprigging in eroded areas where a quick stand of grass was needed. Weeds were controlled with 2, 4-D.

In May of this year the grass was well established and grazing started. Scattered weeds were sprayed to give grass the benefit of all available moisture.

Chaney has increased production from approximately 2000 pounds to 9 or 10,000 pounds of green grass per acre. Soil erosion has almost completely stopped, and his beef production has increased.

This is not his first time to establish improved grass. He has about 15 acres of older Coastal in production and planted 10 acres of Kleingrass this year. He is working toward a balanced grazing program. Other farmers and ranchers in the district are doing the same thing.

Soil Conservation Service technicians will assist any landowner or operator to establish a year-long grazing program that will suit their needs.
