Dr. Ronald McKenzie Joins Faculty at Texas A & I University

Dr. Ronald F. McKenzie, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. L. McKenzie of Hico, has recently joined the faculty of Texas A & I University in Kingsville. He is serving as an assistant professor in the Department of Education.

The professor received his Doctor of Philosophy degree at the University of Texas, Austin. His specialization was Educational Administration with the dissertation title being "A Study of Racial Integration of Public School Facilities."

For the past two years Dr. McKenzie has been an administrator in the Port Arthur Independent School District. Prior to that he was a teacher in the North East Independent School District in San Antonio, and in the Aransas Pass Independent School District.

Dr. McKenzie is married to the former Bonnie Pierce, who was an elementary teacher last year in Port Arthur. The McKenzies have two daughters, Renee, age 8, and Letisia, age 5.

Tigers Clobber Stephenville B; No Game Friday

Ed Pettitt, felled by an illness, missed his head-coaching debut last Saturday night, but perhaps he wasn't disappointed.

His first football team playing its first game of the season was successful. The score—Hico 20, Stephenville Bees 0.

And if the new coach had been impressed through the month-long drills, then he must have looked at game statistics and smiled, because the team, for the most part, was impressive for a first-game appearance.

Led by first-year halfback Galen Lindsey, and his brother, Eugene Lindsey, the Tigers romped for a second quarter TD, and added two more in the third quarter to insure the victory. The Lindsey brothers accounted for all three scores, and

the major portion of the offense, with the younger of the duo, Galen rambling for 169 yards rushing and two touchdowns, and Eugene collecting another 92 yards and the other marker.

The Freshman Lindsey also ran the second-half kickoff back 60 yards before being dropped on the 18 yard line. The run-back led to the Tigers' second TD, which Lindsey made himself on an 8-yard scamper.

But giving credit where credit is due, the Lindsey boys wasn't all the Tigers had to offer. A stout defense led by the likes of Lee Ramage, Barry Christian, Cecil Holley (a real surprise to fans), Rusty Cryer, David Ashby, Melvin Powers, and Rickie Jaggars also figured in the win. They were "loose" with Stephenville runners on occasions, but when the chips were down, they prevailed.

Quarterback Reggie Grover, starting his first game as the man-under, also stood out, completing half of his passes, and in general, handling the team well.

Hico threatened twice in the first quarter, working to the 27 on the first possession, and to the 12 on another occasion. On the latter drive, two sure touchdown passes were dropped, killing the move.

Hico's first TD came after gaining possession at the Jacket 42 after a short punt. The older of the Lindsey boys ripped off a six-yarder, and followed with a gain of 10 more to the 26. Galen Lindsey took over, ripped for six, and followed with five more to the 15, and then blew through a gapping hole off right tackle or the last 15 yards and the first score of the night, and his first of a very short high school career. His attempted kick was no good, and the Tigers owned a 6-0 lead with only minutes gone in the second quarter.

Two quick touchdowns in the third quarter spelled doom for the visitors. The younger Lindsey started the movement with his 60-yarder with the second half kickoff, and capped the effort with an 8-yard thrust into the end zone. Again the kick was out of range, making the score 12-0.

After the kickoff, Cecil Holley recovered a Jacket fumble to start the Tigers to their last marker. With the ball at Stephenville's 44, the Tigers used nine plays to dent the end zone, with Eugene Lindsey getting into the act, scoring on a one-yard sprint. G. Lindsey had the big gainer in the drive, a 27-yarder to the 17, and a 12-yard pass completion to Barry Christian carried to the five. After the TD, Grover passed to end Mike Ferguson for the 2-point conversion, ending scoring for the night.

No one can evaluate the strength of a B-team, but most fans were of the opinion that this was the best organized team that Stephenville had ever brought to Hico.

The Tigers have an open date this week, and will travel to Godley on September 26 for the next game. A trip to Grandview on Oct. 3 precedes the next home game on Oct. 10 when the Tigers host Richland Springs in their first district outing.

Senator Word Will Serve As 'Governor-For-A-Day'

A busy schedule for his "Governor for a Day" celebration, including several receptions, a band concert and a glittering banquet was announced this week by Senator J. P. Word of Meridian. The celebration is scheduled Saturday, September 20.

At 9:30 a.m., the swearing-in ceremony will be held in the Governor's Reception Room in the Capitol. District Judge Truman Roberts of Hamilton will give the oath to Word.

A reception will be held in the Governor's office from 10 to 12 o'clock during which time Word will greet visitors, make honorary appointments and issue proclamations.

There will be a luncheon with only the family present at the Governor's Mansion at noon.

A reception will be held in the Governor's office from 2 until 5 o'clock.

From 5 until 7 p.m. a band concert will be held on the Capitol grounds featuring bands from throughout the 12th Senatorial District.

Beginning at 7:30 p.m. a banquet at the Terrace Motor Hotel Convention Center will honor Senator Word.

Entertainment, presentation of Senator Word's family, and remarks by Robert Calvert, Chief Justice of the Texas Supreme Court; Attorney General Crawford Martin; and by Dr. Abner McCall, President of Baylor University, will precede an address by Senator Word.

Mike Robinson is First Hicoan To Get American Farm Degree

Michael Den Robinson of Hico was notified this week by Mr. G. G. Scroggins, Executive Secretary of the Texas Association, FFA, that his application for the American Farmer Degree was approved by the National Board of Student Officers. The congratulatory letter also indicated that the National Foundation and the State Association will provide a total of \$200 as a cash award to be given at the National Convention in Kansas City, Missouri on Oct. 14-17.

Mike, as he is known to local people, is the first from the local FFA Chapter to attain this highest degree. The Hico Chapter received its charter in November, 1934, and has a list of 24 Lone Star Farmer Degree winners. Of these former students several are teachers of vocational agriculture, a number are professional agriculturalists, one a minister, one a lawyer, and a number are self-employed in farming or ranching, according to Harold Walker, local vocational agriculture teacher.

The American Farmer Degree represents many years of work and planning, and is not available until at least one year after graduation from high school. Each State Association is allowed one applicant for each one thousand active members. In addition to meeting requirements from his supervised farming program, the candidate must show outstanding ability as evidenced by his leadership and cooperation in student, chapter and community activities, and have a satisfactory scholarship record.

Robinson participated on three different state judging teams at Hico, and had an outstanding project program with beef, goats, sheep, swine and crop enterprises. He is a sophomore Agricultural Education student at Tarleton State College. He lives with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Dan Robinson on their farm near Duffau.

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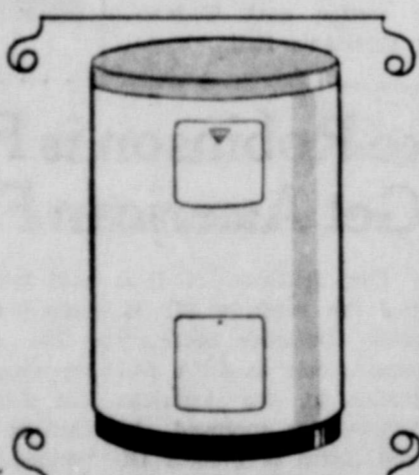

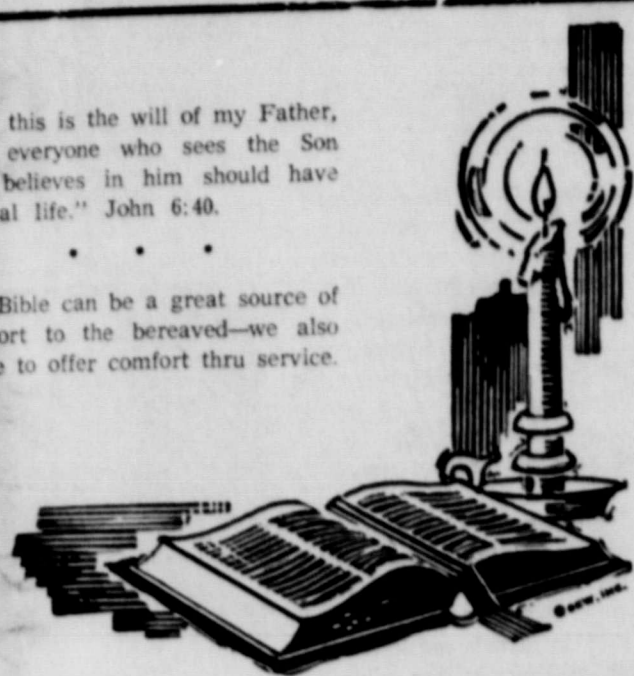

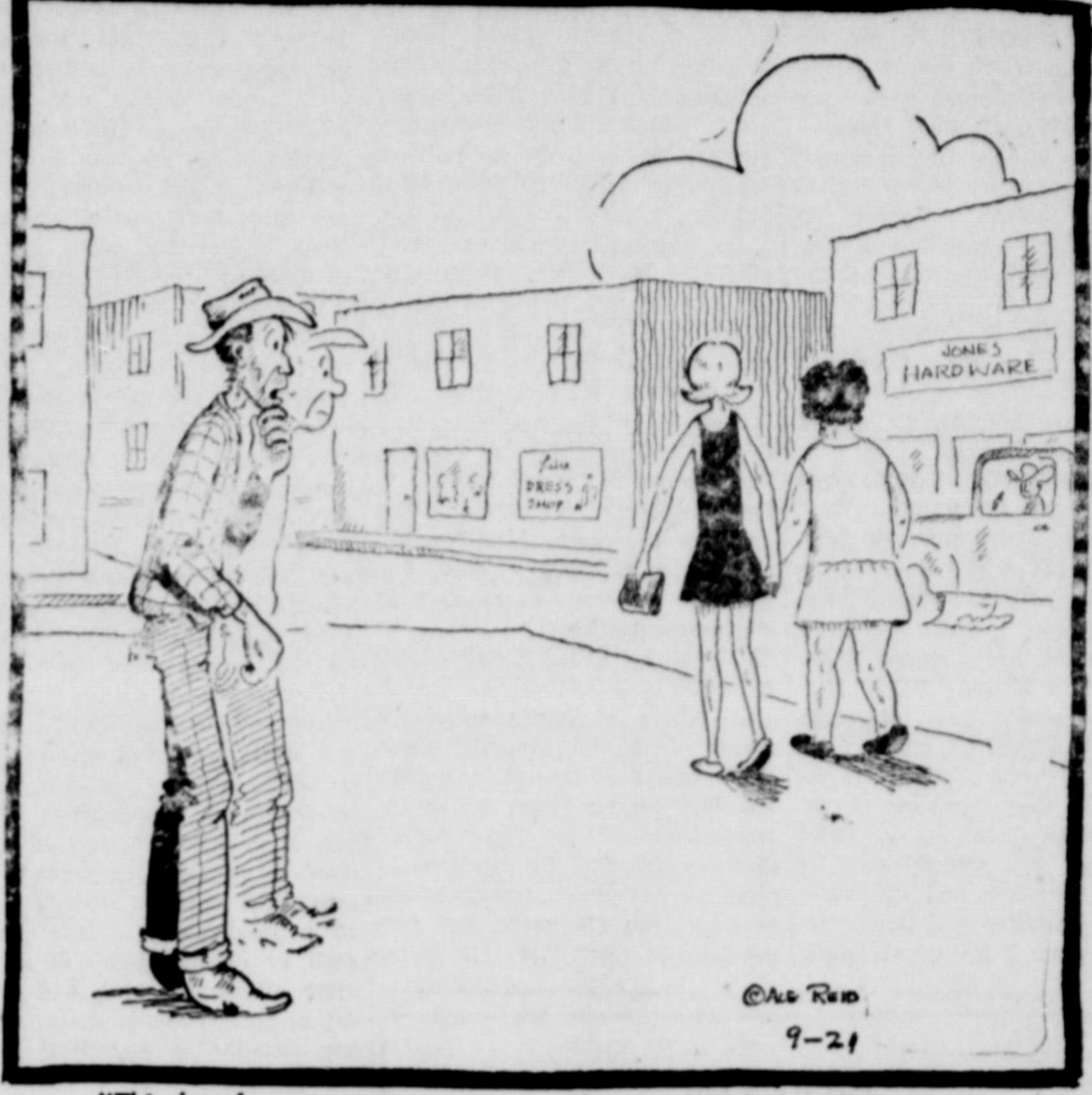

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REVISED ORDINANCE NO. 3
AN ORDINANCE providing for the establishment of minimum health and housing standard by adoption of a housing code for creating and enforcing official including qualifications, duties and inspection powers; creating a board of housing appeals; and providing a penalty, savings, publication and date of effect clauses.

WHEREAS, the elimination of slums and blighted areas and the prevention of their future growth is a matter of concern to the people of the City of Hico, Texas

WHEREAS, in this City there are dwelling structures which are so dilapidated, unsafe, unhygienic, or unsanitary, as to constitute a menace to the health and safety of the people; and

WHEREAS, this City has the right and duty to adopt and enforce such health and sanitary regulations as are necessary in order to prevent the spread of disease.

BE IT THEREFORE ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF HICO:

SECTION 1. ADOPTION OF MINIMUM HOUSING CODE. There is hereby adopted by the City of Hico, Texas that certain health and housing standards known as the Southern Standard Housing Code, 1965 E-65 (Revised 69) Edition Code, of which not less than three (3) copies have been and are now filed in the office of the City Secretary of the City of Hico, Texas as a public record and duly authenticated by the City Secretary and the same are hereby adopted and incorporated as fully as if set out at length

herein and from the date on which this ordinance shall take effect, the provisions thereof shall be controlling on all dwellings and premises within the City limits of the City of Hico, Texas.

SECTION 2. ESTABLISHMENT OF THE OFFICE OF HOUSING ENFORCING OFFICIAL.

(a) There is hereby created the office of Housing Enforcing Official.

(b) This Official shall be appointed by the Mayor subject to confirmation of the City Council. His appointment shall continue during good behavior and satisfactory service. He shall not be removed from office except for cause after full opportunity has been given him to be heard on specific charges.

SECTION 3. DUTIES. It shall be the duty of the Housing Enforcing Official to enforce all laws and provisions specified in the Southern Standard Housing Code, 1965 E-65 (Revised 69).

SECTION 4. RIGHT OF ENTRY. The Housing Enforcing Official, in the discharge of his official duties and upon proper identification, shall have authority to enter any building, structure or premises at any reasonable hour.

SECTION 5. ESTABLISHMENT OF A HOUSING BOARD OF APPEALS.

(a) There is hereby created a Board of Housing Appeals which shall consist of five (5) members appointed by the Mayor subject to confirmation of the City Council. One member shall be appointed to serve one (1) year, two members to serve two (2) years, and two members to serve three (3) years.

(b) This Board shall act by majority vote of the members present.

(c) Said Board shall have the power and be required to hold public hearings in deciding appeals where it is alleged there is an error in law or fact or liability incurred, nor any cause or causes of action accrued or existing, under any act or ordinance repealed hereby. Nor shall any right or remedy of any character be lost, impaired or affected by this ordinance.

SECTION 6. SAVING. Nothing in this ordinance or in the code hereby adopted shall be construed to affect any suit or proceeding now pending in any court, or any rights acquired, or liability incurred, nor any cause or causes of action accrued or existing, under any act or ordinance repealed hereby. Nor shall any right or remedy of any character be lost, impaired or affected by this ordinance.

SECTION 7. VALIDITY. The invalidity of any section or provision of this ordinance or of the code hereby adopted shall not invalidate other sections or provisions thereof.

SECTION 8. PENALTIES. Any person, firm, corporation or agent who shall violate a provision of this code, or fail to comply therewith, or with any of the requirements thereof, or who shall erect, construct, alter, demolish or move any structure, or has erected, constructed, altered, repaired, moved or demolished a building or structure in violation of a detailed statement or drawing, submitted and approved thereunder, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor. Each person shall be deemed guilty of a separate offense for each and every day or portion thereof during which any violation of any of the provisions of this code is committed or continued and upon conviction of any such violation such person shall be punished by fine not less than \$10.00 Dollars nor more than \$200.00 Dollars.

SECTION 9. PUBLICATION. That the City Secretary is hereby authorized and directed to order publication of the descriptive caption of this ordinance together with the penal provision for the time and manner provided by law, as an alternate method of publication.

SECTION 10. DATE OF EFFECT. It being immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health, and safety, an emergency is hereby declared to exist by reason of which this ordinance shall be in force and effect from and after its date and approval.

COUNTY AGENT

By BILL McCUTCHEON

In a week or so personnel from the Texas Animal Health Commission will be in Hamilton County to re-certify the county in the Brucellosis Eradication program. Cattle were initially tested in the county about three years ago and re-certification is necessary at this time.

This has been a good program as it has virtually stamped out a dread disease of cattle and man, and saved an untold number of livestock.

Many of you will be contacted in the near future and asked to cooperate in the re-testing program. Your cooperation in this matter is greatly appreciated and you will be doing a service to yourself, and all of the beef producers in the county.

Small grains are being planted around the country and a lot more will be planted as soon as the weather permits. My advise would be to be sure and apply a complete fertilizer before planting and work it into the soil. If you can't apply fertilizer prior to planting you can put phosphorus down with the seed and nitrogen can be top-dressed

later. Nitrogen should not be put down in contact with the seed because of the possibility of seed damage. A soil test is the best guide for determining fertilizer needs but in lieu of this consider 30-40-40 planting if grazing is desired, top dress nitrogen in the spring.
