If we are away from home consult one of our neighbors, as we are not always here on Sunday afternoon. I was at the cemetery early Sunday morning and also later in the day.

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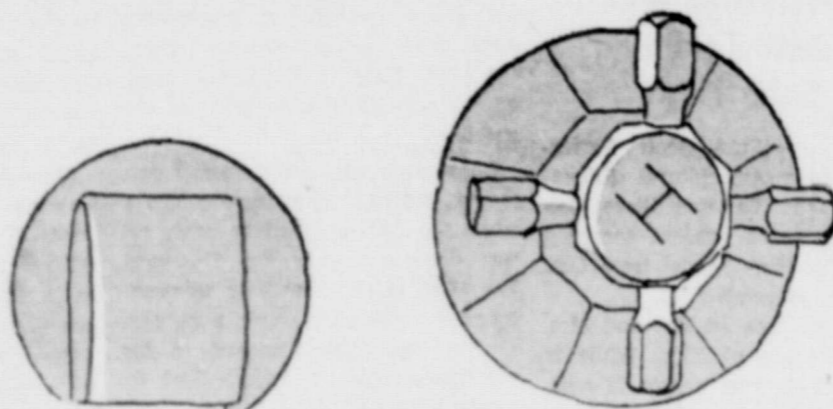

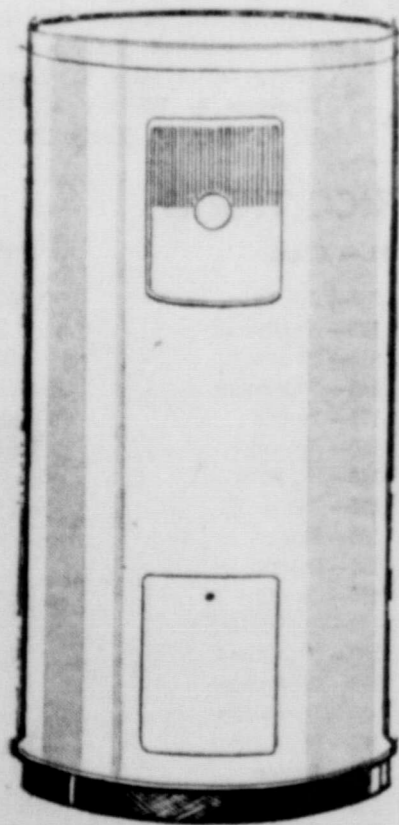

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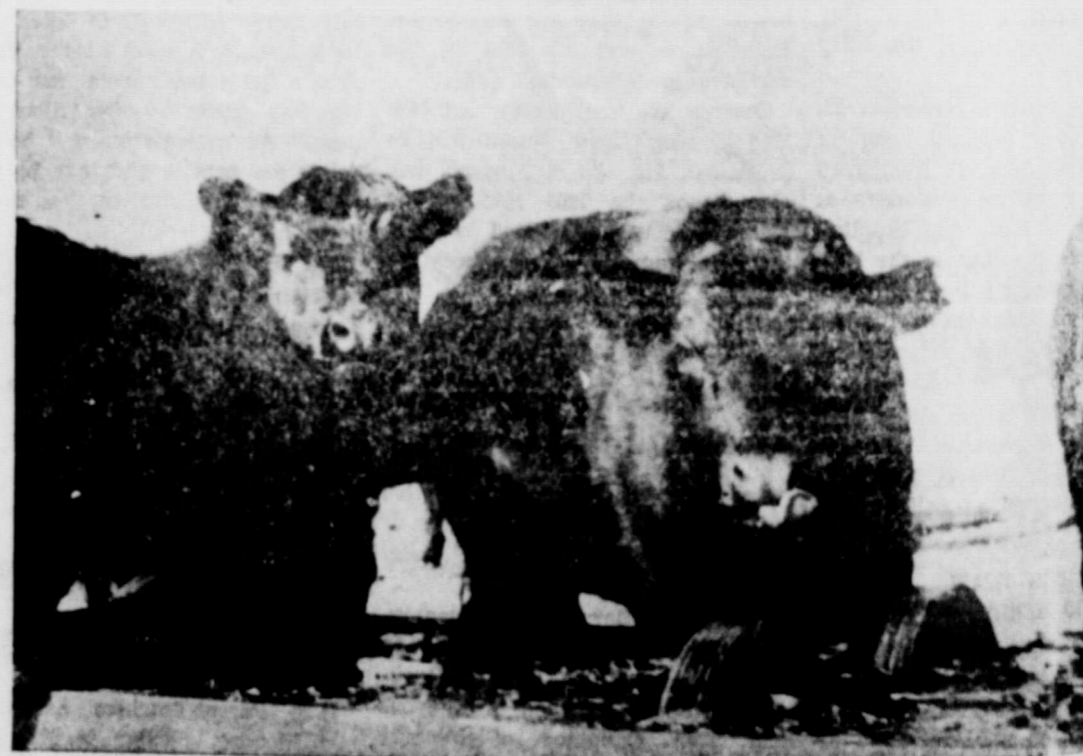
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# Items of Interest From Iredell . . .

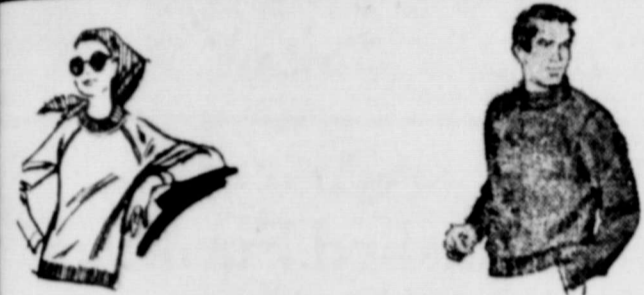

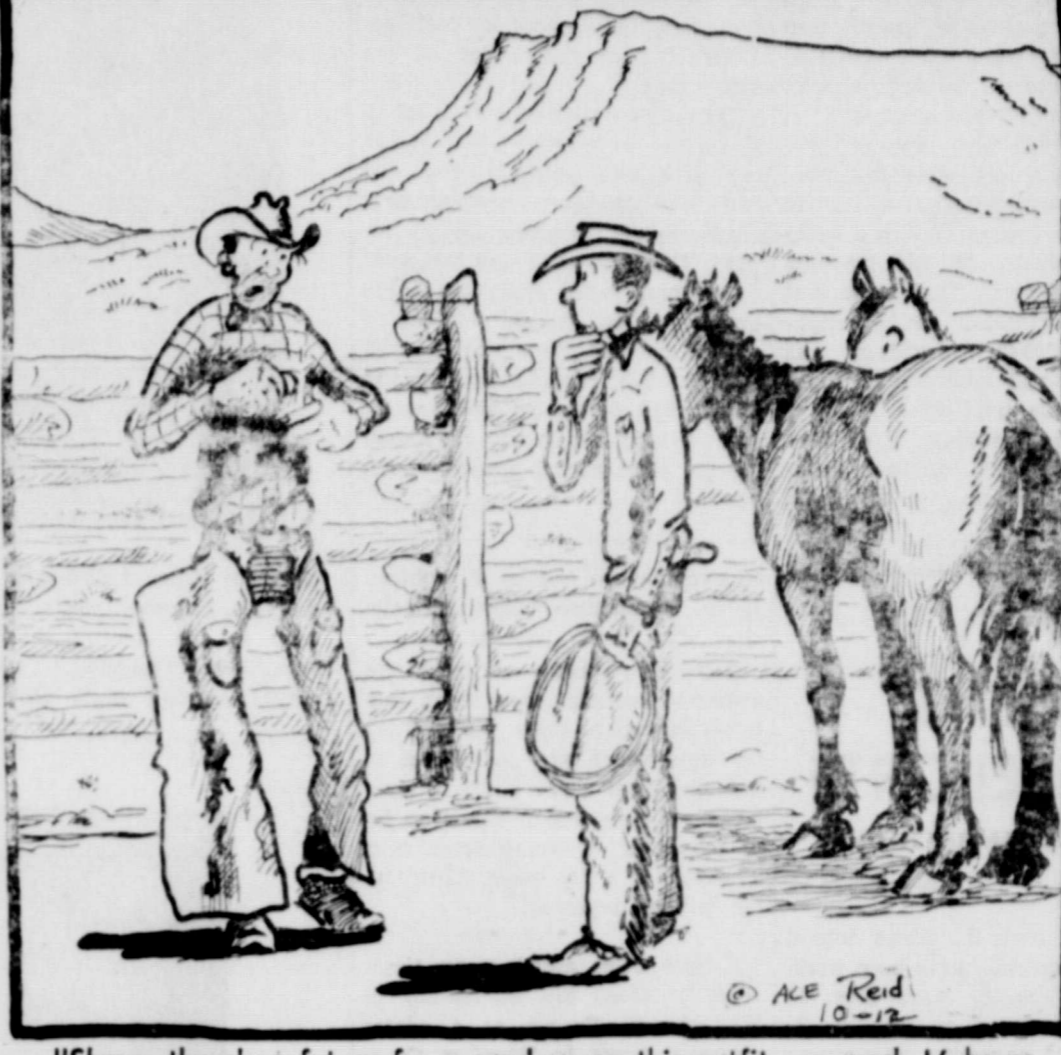

# Harmon Trammell Gets Top Production on 80 a. Coastal

Grazing an average of 77 cows with calves on 80 acres of coastal bermuda grass for 6 months each year puts beef on the table fast for some ranchers.

That is what Harmon Trammell, south of Olin is doing. The grass has made reasonable growth thru the growing season, even though no rain was received for approximately two months this summer.

He applied 60-0-0 fertilizer per acre in April and started grazing May 1. Seventy-two animal units of cattle were grazed until the latter part of August. At this time he turned in 30 more. During the first week in September another application of 300-40-0 fertilizer was made. This will grow enough grass for his cattle until frost.

A good ground cover of at least 6-inches of growth has been maintained on the grass at all times

and will be left at the end of the growing season for winter production and increased organic matter.

Trammell has the 80-acre pasture divided with a partition fence. This helps him put better grazing distribution and if necessary cattle can be rotated from one pasture to the other. The partition fence crosses a farm pond, so cattle in either pasture can water at the same time.

The grass will produce 12,000 to 13,000 lbs. of usable green forage per acre this year. A cow and calf will consume approximately 27,000 pounds of green forage per year. This amount allows for what they tramp down and waste. His production on coastal is almost enough to feed these cattle for 6 months. His rangeland, that has been rested during the growing season, will furnish plenty of forage for the remaining 6 months of the year.

## COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

Personnel from the Texas Animal Health Commission have been working in the county since Sept. 23 and will be here as long as it is necessary to re-certify the county in the Brucellosis eradication program.

I think that all of you who are familiar with the program realize its worth and will want to cooperate in re-certification.

Commission personnel have been working in the Pottsville-Indian Gap area for the past few days.

The fall Armyworm population shows signs of increasing in Hamilton County. Many small grain fields have been sprayed and I would urge everyone having small grains to check their fields daily for this destructive insect.

The fall Armyworm is not hard to control but early detection is very important.

Internal parasites may be robbing you of cattle profits. Through your cattle don't look wormy they may be. We don't have as big an internal parasite problem as the cattlemen in East Texas but management can often aggravate this problem.

Probably the number one cause of internal parasite in beef cattle in this area is malnutrition. Although cattle have an inherent high resistance to parasite damage, this is lowered by malnutrition.

Another cause is sanitation. Keeping water, feed and grazing areas clean will go a long way toward reducing internal parasites.

A third cause of internal parasites is improper pasture management. This comes from over-grazing and high stocking rates. With over-grazing, animals are forced to clip the plants close to the ground where more larvae are to be found.

On highly developed pastures where stocking rates are high, contamination of the pasture from ex-

cessive manure can be a problem. It is in manure where parasite eggs often hatch into larvae.

Once the parasites are inside the animal's stomach, they reach maturity in two to three weeks. They lay eggs which are passed out in manure. Eggs either hatch in manure on the ground and develop into the infective larvae stage over a period of a few days. Their cycle is then repeated.

I have been asked many times recently about the desirability of Kentucky 31 Fescue as a winter perennial grass in Hamilton County. To put it bluntly, Kentucky 31 is simply not adapted to this area of the state because of rainfall and temperatures we have during the summer months. It has been a good grass in East Texas, Louisiana and Arkansas for many years but it is not well adapted here.

I was at the McGregor Experiment Station recently and had a chance to talk to M. J. "Shorty" Norris, who is in charge of the grass program there. Shorty said that they have worked with Kentucky 31 for many years with disappointing results. He said that the first year they generally lost from one-fourth to one-half of their stand and within three years the stand was completely gone.

If you are looking for a good winter perennial grass check into TAM Wintergreen Hardgrass. It has been proven at the McGregor Station for many years and seed is now available. Fall plantings in Hamilton County should be before October 15.

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Washington, D.C.—Just 20 years ago, the then Secretary of Defense Louis Johnson, acting on his own initiative, made severe cuts in military preparedness.



## WASHINGTON "As it looks from here" OMAR BURLESON Congressman 17th District

The strength, balance and capability of our armed services were seriously and dangerously impaired. Secretary Johnson acted in the face of strong opposition from the Congress, which appropriated money he refused to use.

The same thing is happening today—except in reverse. This time, because of pressure for more social welfare spending, the Congress is clamping down on funds for the military.

Defense Secretary Melvin Laird says this will result in "an inevitable weakening of our world-wide military posture."

By the actions of the Congress, over a billion dollars has already been processed from current expenditures. More than three billion dollars is being pared from the 1970 budget request.

Specifically applied, this means the mothballing of at least 100 Navy ships; a reduction of about 300,000 flying hours a year from flight training by the Air Force; the inactivation of at least one infantry division; a shave of 120,000 men in manpower general forces and another 100,000 men in the services.

The Secretary of Defense infers that it may be necessary to close some military bases on a 48-hour notice to Congress before public announcement.

The reduction of our armed forces, decreed in 1949, left us essentially naked to the whims of our enemies at the outset of the Korean war. There is evidence that weakness at that time may have encouraged the North Koreans to launch their invasion of the South. Indeed, there is sufficient rationale to support the belief that the Germans of World War I were led to believe the U.S. would not intervene, just as Hitler thought we would hold aloof from World War II.

Recently meeting in annual conventions were the Veterans of Foreign Wars and the American Legion. The attendance totaled approximately 90,000 veterans. Resolutions were written by men who have come home from war to do the things that silent Americans want most—to finish their education, get jobs, buy homes, raise families and fervently hope their sons and daughters can grow up in a world where wars are only memories.

Out of these meetings they spoke vehemently against attempts to reduce the nation's military effectiveness because the history of their time has taught them that aggressors respect only force; that appeasement and weakness are only a prologue to new aggression.

In the resolutions passed in these conventions, they speak out

in anger against a minority of dissenters who ridicule their flag, their institutions, their laws and the educational system they want for their children.

If they emphasize "law and order" and reject radical upheaval in our social fabric, it is because they believe true progress for the disadvantaged can only be achieved through reasoned programs administered through an orderly framework and based on fiscal responsibility.

The voices of these veterans are saying to America that internal dissention is a gross disservice to our country; that it cannot be saved by international weakness nor by risking the future of our children to the whims of foreign nations which choose to remain strong while we liquidate our security.

As has been said here many times, waste and extravagance of public funds cannot be excused on any grounds. Perhaps there are too many generals, admirals and other high-ranking retired military officers in procurement positions with big industries having Government contracts. They know "the

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ropes" and presumably are able to work advantages for their companies. A stop should be put to practices of loose spending by Gov-

ernment, wherever it is. It is entirely another thing when expediency overrules a nation's prudence in matters of survival. To

paraphrase a biblical line, what fifteth a nation to gain all things for itself and to be led either from within or w-
