## Building Sites Are Approved For Housing

Bernell Jernigan, Executive Director for the Housing Authority of the City of Hico, was notified Wednesday morning that two site locations had been approved for the 30 low-rent housing units to be built here.

The approval came from the Department of Housing and Urban Development in Fort Worth.

Site A is located on former railroad right-of-way, and Site B is property owned by Hico Civic Club at the edge of town on the Glen Rose Highway.

The local project was originated last year, and officials here viewed the approval of sites as the largest step made toward securing the housing.

Glenn Ross is chairman of the Housing Authority. L. J. Chaney is vice chairman, and other members of the board are J. R. Bobo, Hershel Sherrard and Sherman Robertson.

## Lt. McClure Completes Army Nurse Corps Officer Basic Course

Fl. Sam Houston, Tex. (AHTNC)—Army Nurse (Second Lieutenant) Mary A. McClure, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Boyd McClure of Hico, completed the Nurse Corps officer basic course Sept. 26 at the U.S. Army Medical Field Service School, Brooke Army Medical Center.

During the five-week course, she received basic branch training and orientation for newly commissioned officers. Instructions were received in medical records and reports, field medicine and surgery, field medical service, preventative medicine, neuropsychiatry, supply procedures and military law.

Lt. McClure received her B.S. degree in nursing in 1969 from Baylor University.

## T. W. Zeiss is Cited By Texas Water Utilities Association

Austin (Spl.)—An official State Health Department citation for work proficiency has been awarded to T. W. Zeiss, plant operations specialist for the Hico water distribution system.

Signed by the State Health Commissioner and authorities of the Texas Water Utilities Association, the certificate of competency is awarded only to those utility plant operators who have successfully demonstrated their skill and knowledge in modern principles of plant management.

To qualify for certification a plant operator must have accumulated a prescribed amount of actual work experience. He must also have attended both regional and statewide short schools at which the techniques of water treatment and waste disposal are taught, and must have passed an examination given by State Health Department sanitary engineers.

State law requires that at least one operator per shift be certified for competency by health department engineers, but many operators seek certification on their own time and at their own expense to increase their efficiency as key public servants to their community and state.

## Separate Accidents Take Lives of Two 11-Year-Olds

### Terry Jordan Last Rites Held Thursday Afternoon at Carlton

Funeral services for Terry William Jordan, 11, who was killed in an accident near Anaco, Venezuela October 25, were held in the Carlton Baptist Church Thursday at 2 p.m., with Rev. Francis Wilson of Lubbock officiating. Burial was in Carlton Cemetery.

Terry was born in Snyder Nov. 8, 1957 and is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Fern Gene Jordan, who are now living in Anaco where Mr. Jordan is employed with an oil supply firm.

Young Jordan was killed in a pickup-truck accident in which five other American children were killed and the others critically injured.

The group was enroute to a picnic when the accident occurred about 2:30 Saturday afternoon.

According to reports from family members, a trailer broke loose from a truck on a hill 10 miles south of Anaco and collided with the pickup truck carrying the children. Driver of the pickup was Calvin Mathis, an oil company employee, whose daughter, Kathleen, was also one of those killed. The outing was sponsored by Mathis and his daughter.

Police in Venezuela said that after the trailer broke loose, it ran downhill, hit one truck then slammed into the pickup carrying the children. Police were seeking the driver of the truck, who left the scene.

Children other than Jordan and Miss Mathis who were killed were listed as Ellis Smoucher, Bobby Snyder, Tracey Day, and Miss Everett, whose name was not available. All sixteen children involved in the tragedy were members of the sixth grade.

A charter plane brought the bodies of the victims, and their families, to New Orleans Monday, from where they were dispatched to their various homes.

Young Jordan is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. F. Gene Jordan of Anaco; one brother, Byron Jordan of Anaco; paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Fern Jordan of Waco; maternal grandmother, Mrs. Hiram Briggs of Midland, and great-grandmother, Mrs. J. W. Jordan Sr. of Carlton. Serving as pallbearers were Ron Briggs of Dallas, A. C. Grigson Sr. of San Angelo, George Wright Jr. of Houston, Bill Wright of Abilene, Jim Massengill of Houston and Eugene Hamilton of Pampa.

Funeral services for Landis Craig Saylor, 11, who passed away last Friday in a hospital of injuries received Oct. 13 when he was struck by a horse, were held Tuesday morning at 10:30 o'clock in the Hico Church of Christ, conducted by Bro. Austin Emery. Burial was in the Hico Cemetery.

The youth, son of Mr. and Mrs. Landis W. Saylor of Fort Worth, was hit in the left temple by a hoof. The boy's father said another child was riding the horse when the saddle broke. The horse fell, dumping the saddle and child.

Young Saylor tried to catch the animal, according to reports, but as the horse came to its feet, it stepped on him. The youth fell to the sidewalk, striking his head.

A neighbor said the family acquired the horse Oct. 12, one day before the accident.

The boy was a sixth grade student at William James Middle School in Fort Worth.

meant so much to me. In our letter to the Herring's we told them of the boy I knew as Lonnie who played the songs. In a few weeks here came the answer to our letter from his wife, Clara, telling us her husband was the Lonnie Herring who lived next to us in 1901. Lonnie was at our home in May of 1902 when the Duffau band members had a picture made just outside the yard. I have one of these pictures but seems our last memory of him was only at our Duffau home. Although we were only about 9 years old we remember this quite clearly. Our family moved to a new home on Duffau Creek now known as the Hancock place. My father and the late John Ray of Hico built the house in the fall of 1901. We lived there about 2 years. We only got to visit the Herring's about 30 minutes as they were going to the funeral of a friend. Lonnie is coming to Hico Clinic once a month for checkups. We hope to see them again and discuss our old days.

Friday afternoon as we returned from Stephenville we noticed 3 girls, age around 7 to 12 by the west side of the highway near the CIC Motel. We kept our eye on them for fear one would try to cross the highway. As we got almost to them a little girl around 10 raised her head and shoulders. 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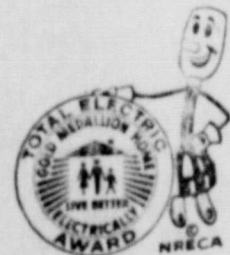

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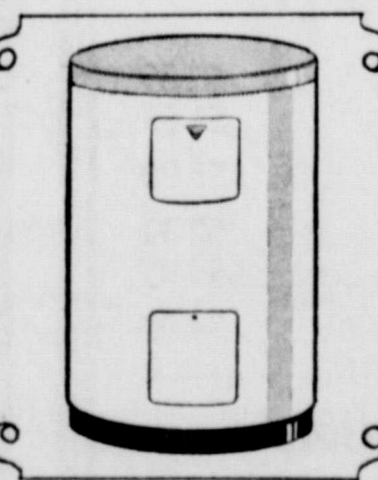
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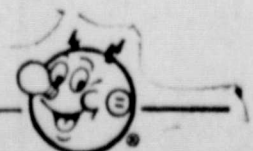

The juniors and seniors of Hico High took a poll this week concerning opinions of the recent Moratorium. The seniors had a two-third majority which were completely against the moratorium and would definitely not participate in any way. A third of the class said that they thought the moratorium was constitutional because all people have the freedom to demonstrate if done in a peaceful manner. This minority also felt that they would participate if they felt strongly about the issue.

Most of the students felt very strongly against violence of any type and wanted to have peace, but did not want to end this conflict in Vietnam by complete withdrawal of our troops. The majority is standing behind our country's leaders and their decisions in order to preserve freedom for their children tomorrow.

About half of the junior class was completely against the moratorium and felt that it was useless. This percent also agreed that they would not participate in such an activity.

One of the class members went along with the view of the moratorium and agreed that we should get out of Vietnam, while one other felt that the people participating in the moratorium had a right to do so. Both of these agreed that they would participate.

The remainder of the class had mixed feelings about the moratorium, but as a whole the class was against the moratorium.

We are the leaders and the followers of the future. Our opinions today are tomorrow's decisions.

Here are three outstanding and different views, which we chose to publish because of their individuality and deep thought on the moratorium:

I think they had the right to demonstrate peacefully even though their ideas are not reasonable. Most everyone wants out but an immediate pullout would be impossible.

Even though we have no business there, actually, I wouldn't participate in the demonstrations. I might if it was to end the war as soon as possible, which I believe Nixon is trying to do.

The real results of the moratorium of last Oct. 15, and of future ones is hard to see. I believe it will have some effect on President Nixon's plans even though he says different.

There isn't much anyone could do if they were peaceful and didn't bother anything. A person would simply have to ignore it or they could peacefully anti-demonstrate.

I think there would be a surprising number who might want to come back from Vietnam, but who probably wouldn't march in a moratorium. Of course, numbers will find reasons why we should stay.

After nine years of large participation in the war I believe it's time for us to get out. I don't mean we should have pulled out when the Viet Cong could simply take over. But by now, the South Vietnamese should be able to fight for themselves and they can. But there are people in South Vietnam who are making millions in selling U.S. supplies on the Washington market. Also the U.S. manufacturer's profits are climbing, thanks to the war supplies. Are our men's lives being used now so that the military industry complex may be satisfied?

To me the moratorium was an expression of some people's feelings toward the war. I feel that they had the right to express themselves, and it was done in a peaceful way. It showed just how many are against the war.

If I felt strongly against the war, I would participate and might anyway. I don't exactly agree with the war but now it's too late to do anything but stay and fight.

There probably won't be any results except publicity. They expressed their opinion, but that won't automatically change things. I wouldn't do anything. The ones who oppose the war should participate and no problems arise. The ones who don't want to, shouldn't.

I think the boys feel let down—what are they fighting for? For us! Who isn't supporting them? Us!

I don't like the war and I wish it could be stopped today, but as I said, it's too late for that. Too many boys and men have died during the war. If we leave now they died for nothing! We have to "stick it out" or just forget the men who are dead and apologize for the wasted time. We have to stand behind our country, right or wrong. I think it's fine for the people to show that they want the war to end—this is a free country. But violence will not end the war, bring our men back or revive our dead. There's a way somewhere to end the war and someday we'll find it, but until then

we have to show our country and our men in Vietnam that we're behind them and that they are fighting for something.

This is the opinion of a senior girl.

I don't see anything wrong with the moratorium. It is a group of people merely showing their feelings about the Vietnam war. It is not as bad as Negroes demonstrating and burning whole city blocks so I don't see why everybody raised such a ruckus over it.

I would participate in a moratorium if I felt there was anything to gain by it.

I don't believe anything will happen that will affect the war because most of the high officials try to ignore these things.

If the moratorium came to Hico, I would probably participate in it because I am having to face getting drafted in about a year and I don't want to go.

I don't think the boys in Vietnam like it because many of them were drafted against their will. I think if they were home, many would probably participate in the moratorium.

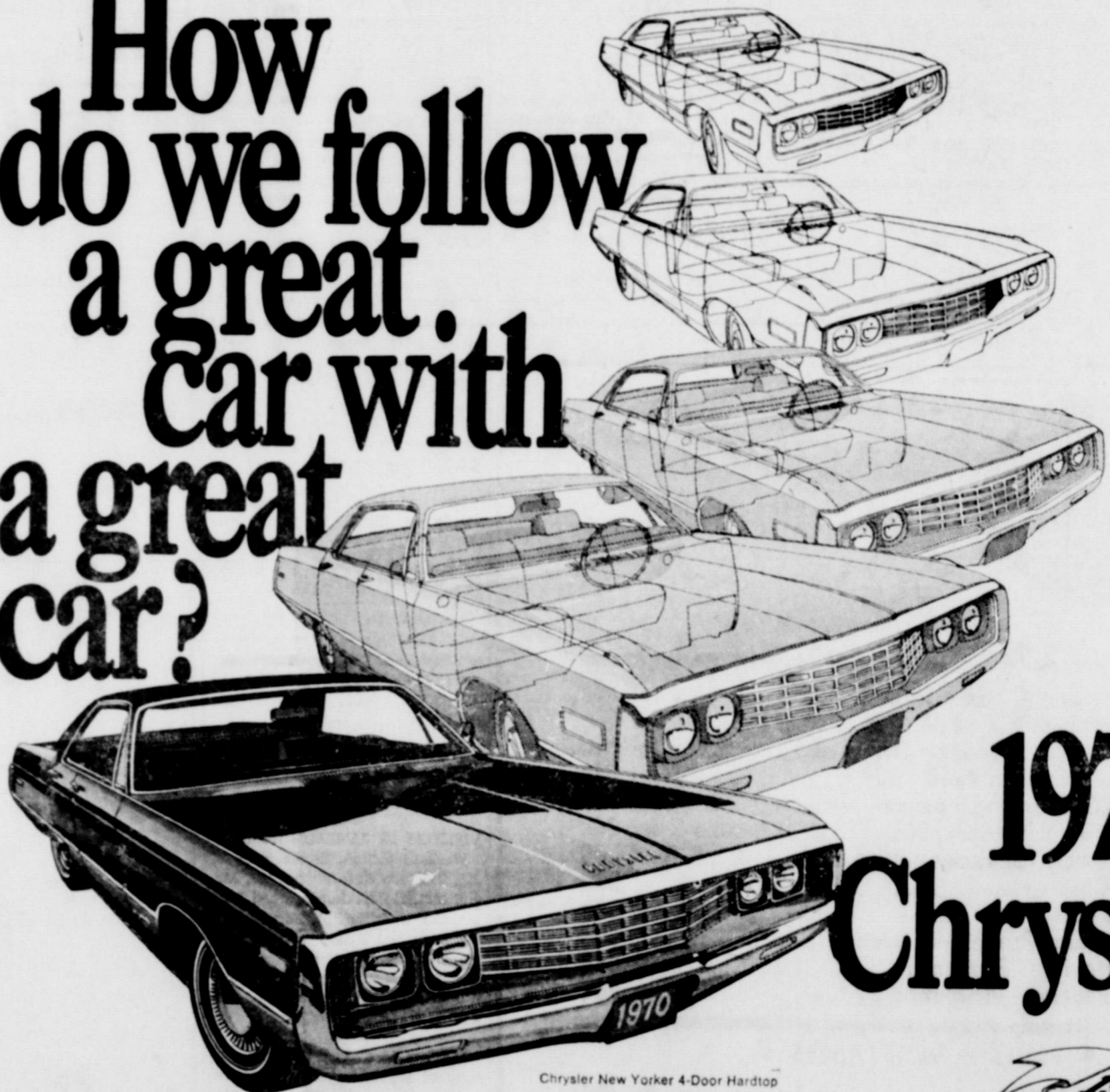

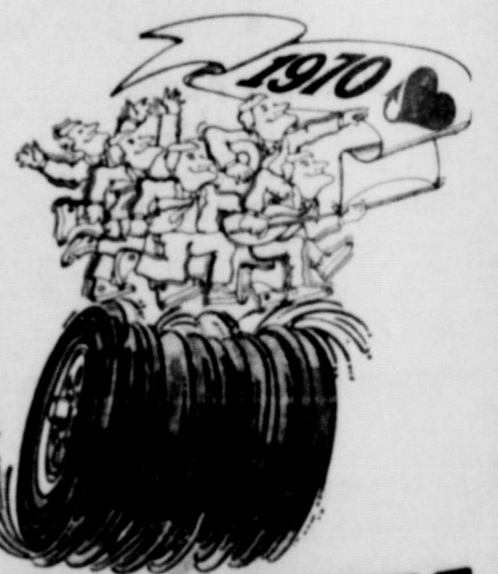
