Hico-Gorman Vie in Season's Final Game

Hico and Gorman, two old foes, will close out the football season this Friday night at Tiger Stadium in a game that really means nothing to either team as far as representing the district in the playoffs.

However, Gorman has an outside chance of tying for the crown with Lometa and Rising Star, but the Tigers were eliminated last week by Rising Star.

Last year, the Tigers went to Gorman in the favorite's role, but the Panthers took a high-scoring duel 54-28. For the season, the two teams have identical records—both 7-2—and each will be trying to improve on this mark in the finale.

Taking the field for their last high school game will be three Hico seniors. And all three have been stalwarts in the starting lineup. Seniors playing their final game are Barry Christian, flanker, Rusty Cryer, guard, and Mike Ferguson, end.

Other district games this week finds Rising Star at Lometa, Richland Springs at Blanket, and Evant at Meridian.

Refund Checks Due Erath Electric Cooperative Members

Members of Erath County Electric Cooperative will receive their patronage refund checks totaling \$41,699.68 in the very near future. Clinton C. Cox, Manager of the Cooperative, stated that those members who received electric service from the Cooperative during the year 1968 will receive a patronage refund check. Over 5,450 checks will be mailed.

This is the sixth consecutive year for the Cooperative to mail checks to its members, making a total of \$250,662.40 that has been returned. The amount each member receives represents over seven cents of each dollar paid for electricity by the member during 1968.

The refunds represent the amount members paid in excess over and above the actual cost of providing electric service to the members-consumers of the Cooperative.

Since Erath Coop is a non-profit corporation, this amount is refunded to the member-consumers as the financial condition of the Cooperative permits. The payment of refunds must be approved by the

board of directors after careful consideration of all aspects of the electric system's operation.

Sufficient reserves must be maintained to take care of unforeseen emergencies and to maintain and improve the distribution system to provide dependable electric service.

Tigers Suffer Second Loss of Year at Hands of Rising Star

A big senior-laden Rising Star Wildcat team put the skids to the gallant Hico Tigers last Friday night, and remained in contention for the district title. Rising Star contained the locals for a 30-14 win to set up the showdown with Lometa Hornets at Lometa this Friday night.

The Wildcats can represent the district in post-season games by downing the Hornets, which could prove a major hurdle.

Rising Star was big and experienced, but not the team that gave Hico its worst licking last year. In the game Friday, Hico was still a contender right up until the final quarter, but when the chips were down, Rising Star always came up with the big play, and stopped the locals.

The game was much closer than the score indicates, as the Tigers led 17-16 in first downs, and had 187 yards rushing to Rising Star's 252. The Tigers completed 12 of 22 passing attempts for 139 yards and had two interceptions. On the other hand, Rising Star completed six of 14 for 138 yards, and also had two passes swiped. However, two of Rising Star's completions were of the bomb variety, setting up two important touchdowns. The first was a 42-yarder to the Tiger 24, and on their next series, a 48-yarder gave them field position at the Tiger 6.

Hico received the opening kickoff, and used 12 plays to march 76 yards for the first TD of the night. The touchdown play was a 16-yard pass from Reggie Grover to Mike Ferguson. Galen Lindsey converted and Hico owned a short-lived 7-0 lead.

Rising Star received, and used but 3 plays to light up their side

of the scoreboard. Tony Long, a standout all night, crashed for 66 yards to the Tiger one, from where James Cook went in for the TD. A two-point conversion gave the home team an 8-7 lead.

Late in the first quarter, Barry Christian intercepted a Wildcat pass to gain possession at the Tiger 34. However the drive faltered at the Rising Star 13 when a Wildcat intercepted a Tiger pass out of bounds.

On the second play in the second quarter, Rising Star fumbled, and Eldon Black pounced on the ball at the Wildcat 15, giving the Tigers a tremendous break, and an opportunity to go ahead. However, on the first play, Hico returned the favor by fumbling, and Rising Star recovered at their own 14. From there the Wildcats put together a 75-yard drive, and scored in 15 plays, with Long going two yards for the marker. Conversion was good, and the Wildcats lead 16-7.

And then lightning struck. On the ensuing kickoff, Barry Christian retreated back to the four yard line to take the kick, and then set sail up the right sidelines for 96 yards and a touchdown. Kick was good and the Tigers were not so far behind 16-14.

An attempted onside kick failed, and Rising Star took possession at their own 46. Five plays later and the Wildcats were ahead 22-14.

Hico had one other opportunity in the first half, working to the 19, but a fourth down field goal attempt was short, and the half ended 22-14.

Starting the second half, another onside kick attempt by the Tigers set up Rising Star at the 48. Seven plays and Rising Star had ended scoring for the night. The TD and two points ipped the count to 30-14.

Hico had its opportunity in the third period, working to the one-yard line. However a penalty set the Tigers back to the six, and after three running attempts, Rising Star took over on their own one.

Hico still had a chance when they took possession at the Rising Star 22 following a short kick, but four plays later a fumble killed the opportunity at the six. The remainder of the game was uneventful, with both teams playing good defensive ball.

Local Church Will Observe 'Bible Sunday' November 23rd

"The Bible has the answer for the cynicism of our day and age," Austin Emery, minister of the Hico Church of Christ said this week in announcing plans for the observance of Bible Sunday on November 23, launching National Bible Week through Thanksgiving Week and Worldwide Bible Reading, Thanksgiving to Christmas.

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

Recent rains and good weather this fall has helped produce some high quality grain pastures.

I would like to suggest some ways for getting the most out of these winter pastures. The first is to permit forage to make abundant growth before cold weather arrives. Forage plants grow very little during December, January and February, due to cold temperatures and inadequate amounts of sunlight. Thus, it is usually a good practice to let pastures accumulate abundant growth before the slow growing season arrives.

When considerable growth has accumulated limiting the time that animals have access to pastures is profitable. This can be done in several ways. One is to permit cattle to graze the pasture only one to two hours each day. When the 2-hour grazing period is completed, the cattle are removed to an area where good quality hay or forage is available.

Another suggestion is to let the cattle graze every third or fourth day. The pasture then serves primarily as a protein supplement, if high quality hay and dry grass is available during the other days.

Small grain pastures and other winter pastures produce high quality forage, which should be utilized by growing and high-producing animals, such as stocker calves and dairy cows. High-quality winter pastures for the commercial beef cow herd can be more profitable if pastures are used sparingly and on a limited and efficient basis.

It's that time of year again when rats and mice move into better quarters for the winter. These pests not only eat and spoil grain but also can carry diseases and in general play havoc around the farm.

Just 50 rats can eat enough grain annually to feed a dairy cow. One rat can eat about as much as a hen but the big loss comes from the waste and contamination they cause.

Property is damaged by their gnawing, burrowing and nesting. Grain bags, paper cartons and wood structures are damaged and their contents spilled and contaminated.

Rats can also start fires by gnawing electric wire insulation and electrical appliances may be damaged by short-circuiting open switches. They use inflammable materials in their nests and their burrows can weaken foundations.

All told, some 35 known rat-borne diseases are a threat to humans and animals. A good clean-up job will eliminate their favorite living quarters but baits or other materials may be needed to bring them under control. Several materials are available at most farm supply or drug stores.

"As it looks from here"

Washington, D.C.—If we owned the only automobile and we were the only driver it would make no difference on which side of the street we drove. We could take our choice of the left or the right or the middle and no one else would have his rights violated.

Since, however, there is more than one automobile and more than one driver, the law requires that we stay on the right side. As there are more people and more complications in living, more law and regulations are required. This is not to excuse some of them. There are constant complaints about the interference of Government representatives in our lives.

We have always had to worry about foreign imports. Since the beginning of our Government there has been the question of quotas and tariffs. As other countries have developed the capability of supplying this country with goods in competition with our own, the problems become acute.

At first blush, the consumers of foreign goods say that they should have the opportunity to buy the cheapest possible and that our door should be open to imports. The trouble is that if our own producers are put out of business by the competition of more cheaply produced foreign goods and commodities, people will lose jobs and finally, when dependent upon the foreign source, no doubt prices will increase.

Oil produced in this country can not compete on an equal footing with oil produced in the Middle East. Our producers of anything must pay higher wages, take the chance of exploration and pay higher prices for equipment.

At this time, there are pressure groups which want our Government to ease up on restrictions on foreign beef imports. There is complaint from the housewife that beef prices are too high and many are inclined to blame the cattle raisers for prices over the counter. The fact is the cattle raisers finds very little relationship to what he gets for beef sold on the hoof and the price of a steak or roast over the counter.

Another factor is added when quality is considered. The Department of Agriculture constantly inspects American produced beef and some way or other it is all added into the final price. There is considerable red tape to it but we don't want billy goat, donkey or mule meat to be falsely labeled.

Just a few years ago, tons of kangaroo meat were sold in Pennsylvania labeled as American beef. After the violators were apprehended and prosecuted, there was a story in the press entitled "Are You Jumpy Today?" A congressman from Pennsylvania replied out of his shock that the whole thing made him "hopping mad."

The Australian Kangaroo has come into sort of bad repute in this country, even to the point of being excluded from prize fighting. Several years ago, a heavy-weight boxer was matched with a kangaroo in New York City. The boxer was piling up a wide lead on points until the kangaroo started using his hind legs. The referee stopped the bout and awarded the decision to the man on the grounds of unsportsmanlike conduct on the part of the kangaroo. If this is found "unsportsmanlike," how much more unsporting it is to pass himself off as a beef steak or a beef roast.

The list of imported items which seriously affect the domestic industry is almost endless. In some parts of the country, 50 percent of all industrial jobs are in the textile industry. Workers receive the minimum wage or more but the goods must compete with textiles from Hong Kong, where employees are paid 25 cents per hour, and Japan, where the wage is 35 cents, and in other areas where as little as 10 cents per hour is paid.

Of course, we need a market for our raw products such as cotton, wool and mohair. This means we
