## DPS Appeals to Public For Information on Hit-and-Run

Austin (Spl.)—The Texas Department of Public Safety this week issued a special public appeal for any kind of information which might lead to the apprehension of a hit-and-killed a young highway patrolman and killed a young highway patrolman on US 80 east of Weatherford at 2:43 a.m. Sunday, December 7.

Patrolman Douglas Thompson, 26, married and the father of a five-year-old son, was killed by the hit-and-run car while standing at the side of the road interviewing a traffic violator. The car sped on at a high rate of speed after the impact without any sign of hesitation.

Specifically, the DPS is seeking information that might help locate the killer car which has been identified as a white 1960 model Ford Fairlane or Fairlane 500 4-door with damage to the right front door. The damage included the loss of the right front fender ornament, which was found at the scene, along with a 43-inch long chrome strip from the right front door. Also found at the scene were the first two letters—"Fa"—which had been knocked off the "Fairlane" emblem on the side of the right front fender.

Reason for the renewed appeal for assistance in locating this car, said Col. Wilson E. Speir, DPS Director, is the belief that several reported "leads" which didn't prove out may have led people to think the death car had been located.

"We again earnestly solicit the help of anyone who might recall having seen such a vehicle in the past four or five weeks on the road, or perhaps being repaired at a repair shop, back-yard garage, or some seemingly inconspicuous place," Speir explained.

"We are determined to continue the search for this vehicle and its driver whose wanton act of lawlessness in leaving the death scene should be dealt with accordingly."

The DPS called upon any citizen who might have information he thinks would be helpful in this case to contact either of the following:
