## Science Fair Winners Named During Public School Week

Physics students at Hico High School displayed their science projects at the annual Science Fair held last week. Under the leadership of Mrs. Lucille Brummett, students selected and assembled projects which were displayed in the science lab. Tarleton State College professors Drs. Robert Fain and Lamar Johanson judged the projects.

Miss Gail Reynolds, a senior, and daughter of Rev. and Mrs. W. T. Reynolds of Waco, was the first place winner. She constructed an electrostatic precipitator in order to help prevent air pollution. The precipitator showed the principle of filtering colloidal particles out of the air, and Miss Reynolds noted that such devices could be placed on cars and in industries to aid in the reduction of air pollution.

Second place winner was Miss Judi Putty, a junior and daughter of Dr. and Mrs. J. B. Putty. Miss Putty performed an ovariohysterectomy on a cat. Not only did she learn the anatomy of the cat, but she studied various types of suture patterns. Her project was documented with pictures taken during the actual surgery.

Third place winners were Misses Rebecca Sue Martin and Johnette

Walker. "What Is Hidden From You?" was the title of the experiment conducted by Miss Martin, a senior and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Chester Martin. Miss Martin compared the same objects that boys and girls see in a picture and determined if their state of mind, age and vision had any effect upon what they saw and how many objects they found. She concluded that age did have an effect on the number of objects found in the picture and that the higher the scholastic grade the greater the number of objects one found.

Miss Walker, a Hico junior and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Walker, studied various branding procedures. She worked with a rabbit using the freeze, acid and heat types of branding. Miss Walker sought to experiment with decorative designs which could be used on pets as means of identification.

"Chromatography of Color" was the fourth place project constructed by Miss Rita Robinson, also a junior and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Dan Robinson. She separated various colors into their component colors using two methods of chromatography, the paper column and the elution method. She stated that chromatography is a very effective way to analyze substances.

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

## On the Home Range

To keep a topcoat or overcoat in shape always use a hanger, never hang it by the collar loop for any length of time. New models of jackets have lower buttoning to show more shirt and tie. This appears on single and double breasted coats.  
 To reduce foaming when cooking beans or whole peas, add one tablespoon meat drippings or other fat to the cooking water for each cup of beans or peas.  
 Give boiled vegetables an added touch. Sprinkle lemon juice or herb vinegar on them for a pleasantly tart taste.  
 Use a thin white sauce with starchy vegetables such as peas or beans. A medium white sauce usually is best with other vegetables.  
 The term "spices," as generally used, includes the herbs as well as true spices. Herbs are leaves of aromatic plants grown in the Temperate Zone. Spices come from aromatic plants grown in the Tropics.

After the wedding trip the bride wore a blue and white two-piece dress with white accessories, and the groom wore a dark suit and white shirt with a tie.

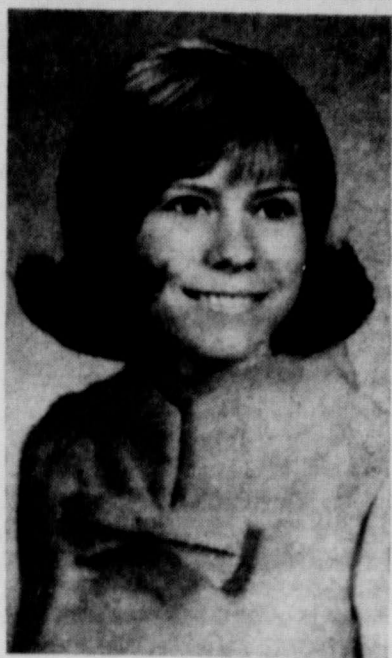

**WASHINGTON**  
"As it looks from here"

Washington, — "The President, Vice President and all civil officers of the United States, shall be removed from office on impeachment for, and conviction of, treason, bribery or other high crimes and misdemeanors." This is Section 4, Article II of the Constitution.

There has been much discussion over the years as to what constitutes impeachable offenses. For many years the theory was maintained that indictable offenses only were impeachable. This theory has been stoutly defended and stoutly denied. Only one case appears to exist for impeachment on an offense not subject to indictment.

Mostly we think of treason, bribery or, for that matter, any crime, as being clearly a matter of black and white. If any criminal trial in our courts, intent often determines convictions, acquittal or mitigation. Intent and motive is at the heart of solving crime as well as prosecution. The courts have held that to convict one charged with advocating the overthrow of government, an overt act must be proved. In other words, action must be connected with statement of the accused.

Justice of the Supreme Court, William O. Douglas, has recently written a 97-page booklet entitled "Points of Rebellion." It is a tirade against the "American establishment"—the Pentagon, the FBI, the CIA, Police, employers and educators. One of the strongest sentences is that "violence may be the only effective response of outraged youth."

Justice Douglas compares our today's establishment with King George III of England. "George III was the symbol against which our founders made a revolution, now considered bright and glorious," Justice Douglas wrote. The Justice says in his book, "We must realize that today's establishment is the new George III. Whether it will continue to adhere to its tactics we do not know. If it does, the redress honored in tradition is also revolution."

Throughout his treatise, Mr. Douglas offers a justification for violence. In an appraisal of his writings, he acknowledges that riot has no constitutional sanctions but says that "injustices may pile so high that violence is the only answer."

In other passages, the Supreme Court Justice advises American protesters to risk arrest because the police have no right to interfere with their freedom. (Can you imagine this?)

Mr. Justice Douglas excoriates the military, FBI snooping and other law enforcement agencies trying to get at lawlessness and writes an indictment of our society in general. To this criticism alone,

he is entitled to his personal opinion.

It is quite a horse of another color when he attempts justification of violence and revolution directed at influencing the overthrow of the government of the United States of which he is a part. Reading his words there seems to be no distinguishable difference between "the system," "the establishment," and established order under law.

Justice Douglas writes that he hopes the revolution he is talking about will not be like the one of 1776. The revolution that is coming, he says, will arise from "the search of youth for ways and means of making the machine—the servant of man." Just exactly what this means is a little difficult to interpret.

The interpretation is less vague when he encourages violence and says that it bothers him that the establishment may not be wise enough not to use "its stockpile of arms" to suppress the dissenters, for he thinks that will bring on an awful ordeal.

Data is being collected in certain efforts to determine if impeachment proceedings will stand up against Justice Douglas. Included in the collection of evidence is Mr. Douglas' past association with a private foundation alleged to be tied to racketeers.

"Points of Rebellion" is being added to a Bill of Particulars against Justice Douglas. At least he should resign from the Supreme Court, which he must also hate even in its recent years of applying the extreme liberal philosophy. Apparently the Justice has prejudged cases which could possibly come before him of a nature involving revolutionary activities.

**QUESTION:** I retired and started getting reduced retirement benefits from social security when I was 62. This was nearly two years ago. I had a heart attack in September 1969 and I am now totally disabled. Is there any way I can now get disability benefits?

**ANSWER:** Since you apparently became disabled more than 6 months before you will be 65, you should file an application with us for disability benefits. If your disability is established, this will increase the amount of your monthly benefit check from social security. You cannot get both retirement and disability benefits under social security. See our representative when he is next in your town, or write or visit our office.

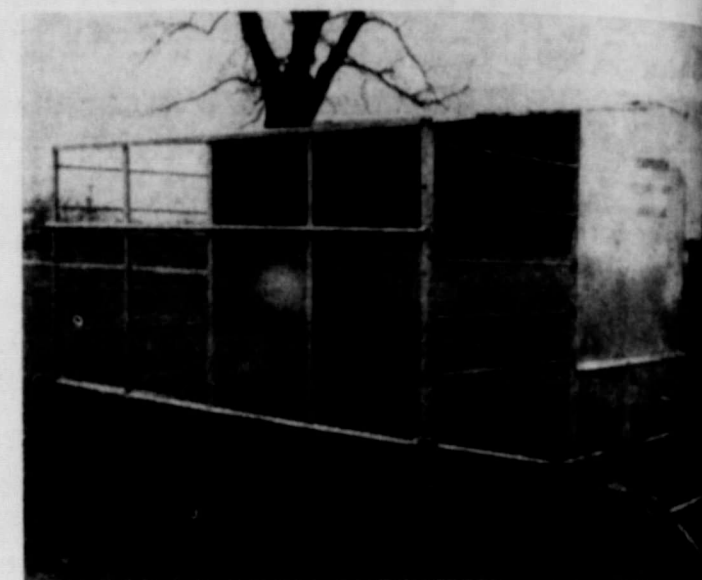
