Stock Show Officials Hope for Fair Weather

Barring inclement weather, a large number of entries are expected here Friday for the 23rd Annual Hico Livestock Show. Activities get underway at 9 a.m. at City Park.

Sponsored by the Hico FFA Chapter, the show is a popular event, with breeders from all over the area entering animals. Entries usually run well over the 300-mark.

Show officials are hopeful for fair weather for the event, which also draws a large number of spectators throughout the day.

The Homemaking Division of the Hico Livestock Show will be held Friday in Community Public Service Building. Highlight of the event will be "Galaxy Gazing," an afternoon fashion show at 3 o'clock in Hico Theatre. Mrs. JoAnn Solomon, Fashion Coordinator and Charm School Instructor for Montgomery Ward in Fort Worth, will commentate the fashion review.

Official count of homemaking division entries were 130 students participating and 390 entries.

Art-Handwork and Food entries will be judged at 9:30 Friday morning. CPS will not be open to visitors during the judging, but will be open for display after judging.

Rubella Vaccine Will Be Offered Here March 31

Rubella, commonly called "three day" or "German" measles, is destined to join the almost obscure ranks of such infamous diseases as smallpox and polio. The death sentence was handed down on rubella with the licensing of an attenuated live virus vaccine on June 9, 1969. It is now up to parents of children ages one through ten years to carry out this sentence by having their children immunized against rubella.

An immunization program will be carried out in Hico on Tuesday, March 31 at the local school for children in this area. Inoculations will be given from 10 a.m. until noon.

The program is being sponsored locally by Hico Civic Club in cooperation with the State Health Department and City Health Officer Dr. B. C. Dayton.
