## Stock Show is Successful Despite Sleet, Rain and Cold

The show went on despite every type of weather imaginable for this time of year, and when the last animal had received its championship, officials declared the 23rd Annual Hico Livestock Show a successful event.

Friday started off on a sour note, with sleet pelting the area during early morning hours. Conditions failed to improve, as cold rain fell throughout most of the day.

However, a surprisingly number of hardy souls stayed with the show during the day, and spectator interest was far more than expected.

Two hundred and twenty-two entries were received despite the inclement weather, which attests to the popularity of the annual event. A record number of beef entries

was attributed to making the show the success that it was. Ninety-four entries were recorded, and each was of the finest quality. Hico FFA Chapter Advisor Harold Walker, sponsors of the show, was especially enthused over this division, and everything points to an even better beef show next year.

Exhibitors were happy, for the most part, and vowed to return next year, come "sleet, snow, high water, or what-have-you."

And while the stock show was having its problems, the relatively comfortable Homemaking Division was experiencing problems of its own. That story may be found elsewhere in this issue.

did it again" in a boastful manner. It really was a good show.

## Rubella Innoculations Will Be Given Tuesday at School

Tuesday is "Rubella Day" in Hico, when the measles immunization program will be carried out at the local school.

Sponsored by Hico Civic Club, the program is designed to eliminate the threat of three-day or German measles, and will be given to children age 1 through 10.

The inoculation program will be conducted from 10 a.m. until noon. Parents of children in the specified age group were sent forms this week by the school, and the forms should be returned Tuesday.

Dr. B. C. Dayton, City Health Officer, said the program was being sponsored by the local service club in cooperation with the State

Health Department, and urged all parents to take advantage of the program.

The physician, and a spokesman from the Civic Club said that there would be no charge for the vaccine, but the organization would take a free-will offering to help defray cost of the vaccine.

Dr. Dayton said that cost to the service club would be around \$1.75, and cost of the vaccine, if taken on a private basis would run near \$10.00.

Dr. Dayton reminded that this vaccine is for rubella, and should not be confused with the vaccine that has been offered in the past few years for regular red or 10-day measles which does not protect against rubella. Also, since many childhood diseases look and act like rubella it is impossible to know for sure that a child has had the disease without a special blood test.

The health officer recommended that all children age one through ten years be given the vaccine even though it is believed that a child has already had the disease.

The virtually painless "Jet Injector" will be used to administer the vaccine.

Parents are urged to remember the date—Tuesday, March 31—and take advantage of the very important program.

A two-car accident about 10:15 Saturday night at the intersection of Highways 6 and 220 sent five persons to Hico City Hospital.

A car headed east on Highway 6, driven by Mrs. Dorothy Trotter of Iredell, was in collision with a vehicle driven by Dale Phelps of Dallas, headed south. Occupants of the Trotter car were her daughter, Dianne, 12, and Mary Kaye Mims, 12, all of Iredell. Phelps was accompanied by his wife, Kathy.

Investigators at the scene, Highway Patrolman Kenneth Duderstadt of Hamilton and local Constable Buck Shepherd said that Phelps was unaware of the curve from 220 onto Highway 6, and his auto

continued south. Impact of the collision forced both vehicles into the service station formerly operated by Johnnie Howerton, taking down both gasoline pumps and causing the roof to collapse. Hico firemen were called to the scene in view of the fire danger.

All five occupants of the two vehicles were hospitalized, with Mr. and Mrs. Phelps and the Trotter girl being released after medical attention. Mrs. Trotter remained a patient in the hospital Wednesday, and the Mims girl was dismissed Wednesday morning.

Both late model automobiles were demolished in the accident.

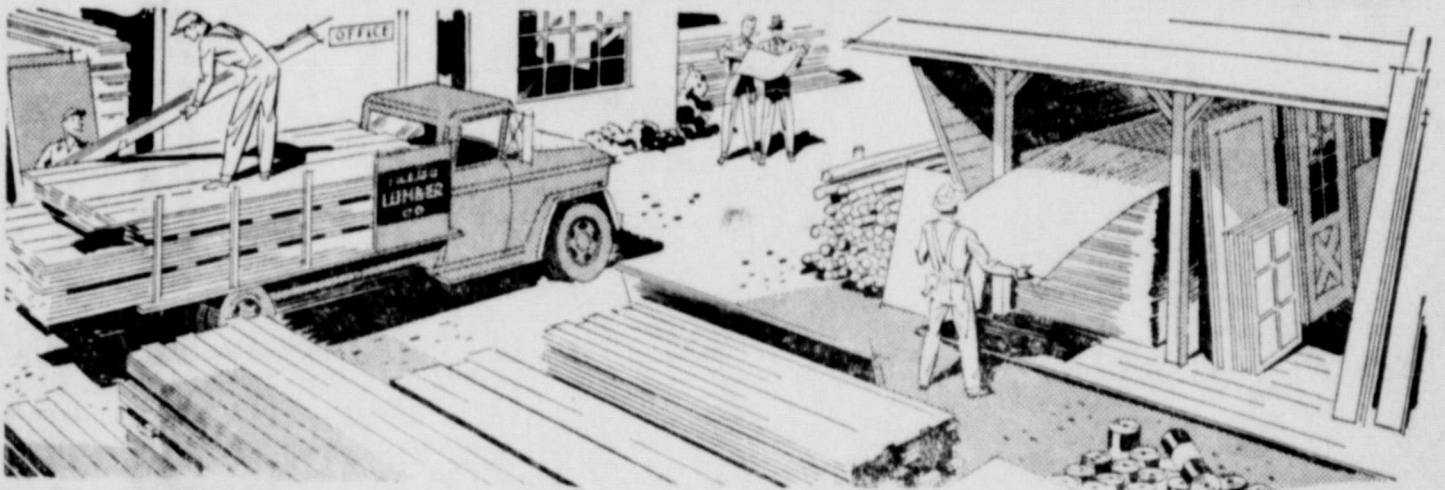

# 20-Year Army Vet Tells of Jump School Experiences

Richard Garza, manager of Bluebonnet Country Club, recently returned from a three-week Basic Airborne Training Course with the National Guard in Fort Benning, Georgia, where he was trained for a parachutist.

Richard had been in the National Guard almost 20 years when he and his family returned to Hico last year from New Mexico. In order to finish his 20-year period, he checked various National Guard units in this area, and found most of them were Airborne units. To prevent active duty with the Armed Forces, and to complete his 20 years for retirement purposes, he was forced to join the Stephenville Unit.

The first week of instruction at Ft. Benning was conducted by the Ground Training Committee. During this week the student learns how to make individual exits from the mock door, which represents an aircraft in flight, the two and four-foot platforms, the Lateral Drift Device, and the 34-foot mock tower. An intensive physical training program is also started during Ground Week.

The second week of instruction, conducted by the Tower Training Committee, teaches the student additional parachuting techniques which he puts into practical use on the 250-foot Free Tower, which gives the student confidence and prepares him for the actual jump.

Jump Week is the culmination of all the efforts of both students and instructors. Prior to starting this week a student is given orientation on the function of the T-10 assembly and procedure to be used in the fitting of the parachutes. He is told and shown how to wear the combat pack.

During the week the student makes five jumps from an aircraft at an altitude of 1,250 feet.

Following is Garza's own version of what a 20-year veteran feels toward his parachute jump:

"After 20 years as an N.G. I find myself reporting at Fort Benning to complete one of the most efficiently conducted and meaningful training phases in the United

States Army. Airborne. I was asked at different times why was I there after 20 years. All I could say was it was not my choice.

"I had my idea of what I was going to do after I was in the plane and 1250 feet above the D.Z. (drop zone). But looking back after hearing those loud words, and seeing this 6' 6" 280 lb. monster showing me his size 16 boot pointed at my 4th point of contact, I quickly changed my mind and decided to venture into space for the first time in my life. Everything went well until I looked down and saw the ground coming up real pronto. I said a few more words in Spanish but nothing helped. I hit the ground like a big cow on a flat rock, but was real lucky and was able to walk and retrieve my parachute.

"Some experience I will never forget, and still think drop zones are for the birds. Received my silver wings and headed for home. "Next time you are around Hico, come by Bluebonnet Country Club for a game of golf and I will tell you the rest of my story, which I would think is somewhat embarrassing. Next time you see me I will be cutting grass at BBCC, and happy as a bird on the ground. The fall doesn't hurt—it's the sudden stop."

## DPS Putting Special Emphasis on Driver License Program

The Texas Department of Public Safety has announced an intensive statewide driver licensing emphasis program on the basis of a study revealing a disproportionate involvement of unlicensed drivers in serious traffic accidents.

Col. Wilson E. Spears, DPS Director, said the drive is in conjunction with Gov. Preston Smith's coordinated traffic safety program to combat increasing deaths, injuries and economic loss in Texas which cost an estimated 3,580 lives, hundreds of thousands of injuries, and upwards of a billion dollars last year.

"In view of the fact that one out of each 17 Texas residents involved in motor vehicle accidents during the period were not licensed, and a higher percentage of fatal and injury collisions in which unlicensed drivers were involved, an increase in enforcement efforts against unlicensed drivers would seem to be justified. It is estimated that there are as many as 400,000 unlicensed drivers in Texas at this time," Col. Spears said.

An intensive, stepped-up program of enforcement by means of frequent periodic license checks are to be made on the road by DPS patrolmen, the director said.

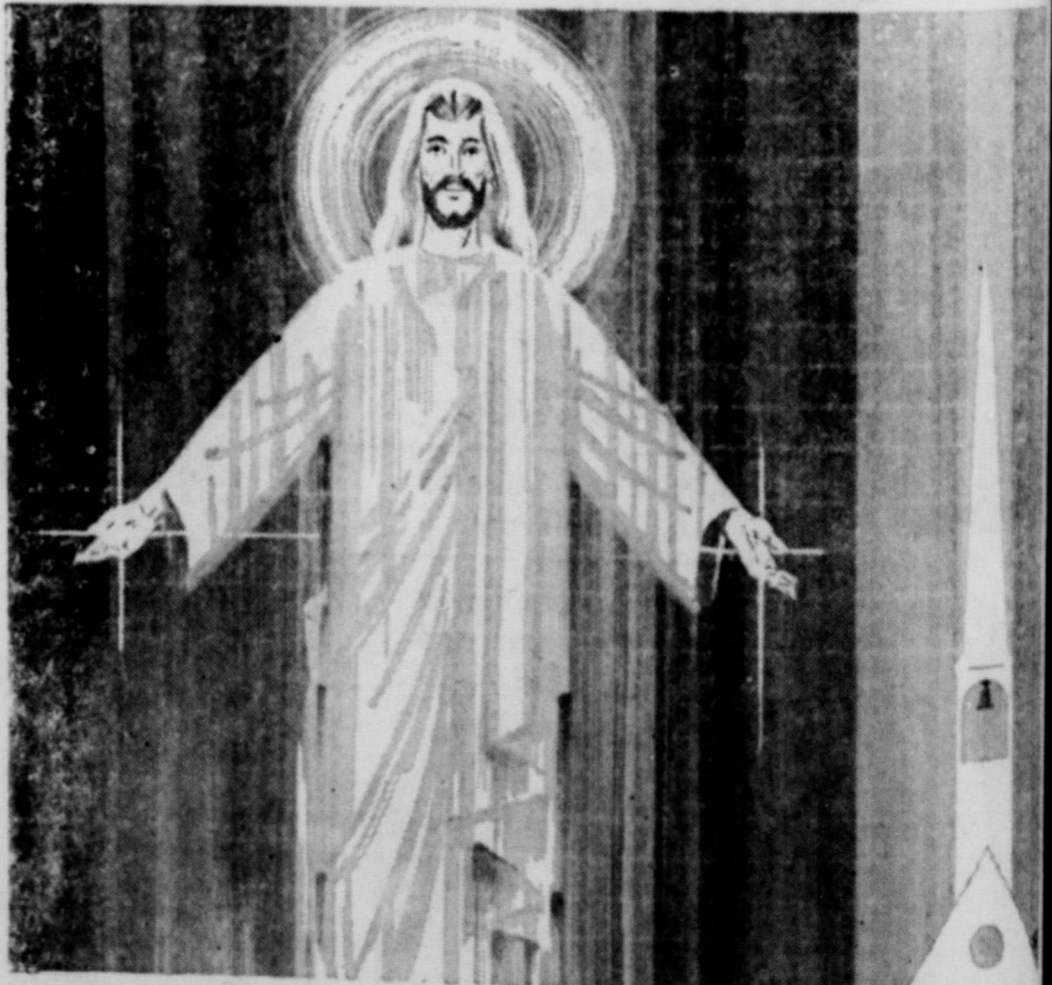

## 'Texas Indians' is Program Topic at Review Club Meeting

The Review Club met March 19 at the home of Mrs. Bryan Angell, who served a dessert plate to members.

The program being on Texas Day, members recited the pledge to the State flag.

Mrs. O. C. Cook talked on Texas Indians. Most Texans are not aware that there are two groups of Indians within the state.

The first Indian reservations were given land by the Texas Legislature. Among other tribes, the Waco, Caddo and Tonkawa were included. This arrangement was not a success, for the Indians refused to live on the reservations, and Texans did not like the idea because of frequent raids. In 1859 the federal government moved the Indians north of the Red River, but this plan did not solve the problem of raids. In 1854, upon the recommendation of Gen. Sam Houston, the state purchased 1,280 acres of land for the Alabama tribe and by special permission the Coushattas came to live in this area. This is the only Indian Reservation in Texas.

Prior to 1928 deprivation hit the Indians hard. At this time their plight was brought to the attention of both federal and state governments, which appropriated funds for the welfare of the people. Since 1965 the reservation has been under the joint jurisdiction of the Texas Commission for Indian Affairs and the Tribal Council. Their objective is to encourage the Indians to become educated, self-sufficient and financially secure within their own right.

Job opportunities are limited. The Tribal Council has established the Tribal Enterprises to promote tourist attractions. A trading post, museum, arts and crafts, and a dining room have been established. There is a special three-mile Big Thicket tour. Other attractions for vacationers are being planned.

The other Indian group is the Tigua Indians of Upleta, El Paso. In 1967 they were formally recognized as a Texas tribe and placed in trust capacity.

Mrs. B. C. Dayton showed a film depicting the beauty of the Big Thicket in all seasons. Accompanied by a commentary and music, superb photography presented breathtaking scenes along a nature trail.

Picture divisions on trees, flowers, water, and inroads of civilization depicted a vivid discourse on the importance of preserving the Big Thicket as a state or national park. If Texas citizens do not act quickly, the state's most beautiful nature spot will disappear forever.

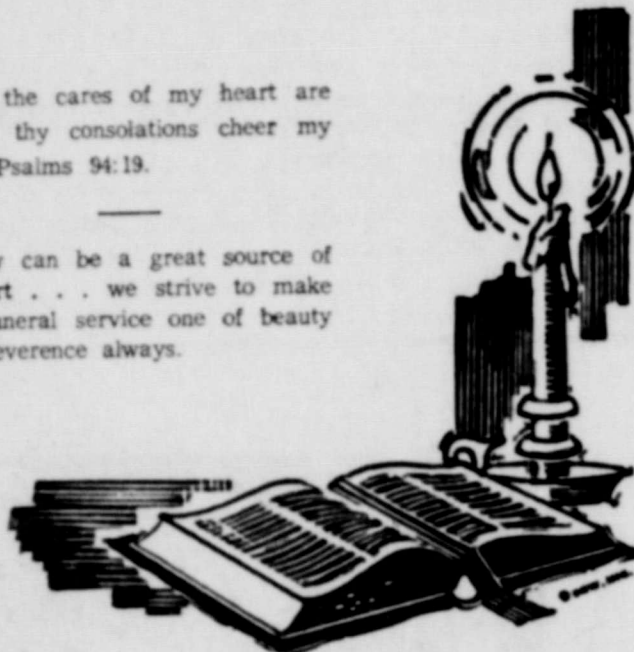

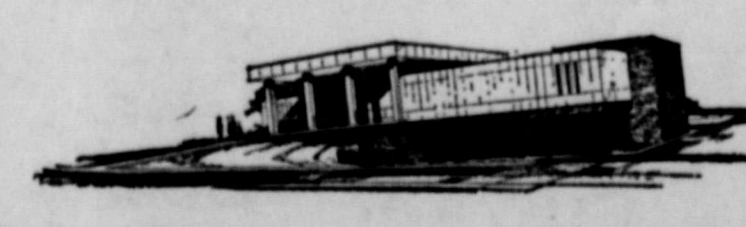

**Social Security Questions & Answers**

**QUESTION:** I have a woman who works for me in my private home. I've been paying her cash wages plus board. I was told the other day that I had to include the value of meals I furnish her. Is this correct?  
**ANSWER:** No. Only cash wages paid to domestic employees are counted for social security. A domestic employee—except a domestic working in or around a farm or ranch home—who is paid \$50 or more in cash wages during a calendar quarter from the same domestic employer must be reported for social security. The domestic employee cannot choose to be reported or not. Domestic employ-
