★ \$2,924.60 is Hico's Take Of Sales Tax

Hico City coffers were enriched by \$2,924.60 last week when a check for that amount was received from the State Comptroller, representing the first quarter payment of the City Sales Tax.

Hico voters approved the tax last year, and collections started on October 1. The check covered the months of October, November and December, three largest business months.

Collections are expected to be down for the first quarter of this year, but the tax should add around \$10,000 annually to city funds.

Little Interest in Saturday Elections

Little or no interest has been shown in Hico's two elections this Saturday, when voters will name two school trustees, a mayor, and three aldermen.

In the school election, names of Bruce Slaughter and Lee Flowers appear on the ballot. Slaughter is

seeking a second term on the board, and Flowers is running for his first public office. Dr. J. B. Putty declined to ask for a second term on the board.

In the city election, Mayor O. L. Davis is seeking re-election, as are aldermen W. C. Howard and Ray Keller. Roy Bates is a newcomer to city politics, seeking the seat being vacated by Jim Jameson, longtime councilman.

A small turn-out is expected for the two elections, both which will be held at City Hall. Polls open at 8 a.m. and close at 7 p.m.

At Iredell.

City politics at Iredell failed to generate any interest this year, as the three vacancies failed to draw a single candidate.

A write-in will be necessary to elect a mayor and two aldermen.

Blackburns Named Top Farm Family in County

C. W. Blackburn and his wife, Carolyn, who live between Hico and Carlton, have been selected as the outstanding farm family in Hamilton County by the Hamilton Chamber of Commerce. The Blackburns have five children, two at home. One son is a senior at Texas A&M and his wife is one of the first women veterinary medicine students in the school.

Blackburn grew up in the Hico area and then worked 25 years as a salesman in the big cities of Texas. Carolyn was reared in the city in the state of Kentucky.

After working all those years in the city, the Blackburns hope to return to Hamilton County. In 1966, they decided to invest their savings, along with a loan from the Hamilton office of the Federal Land Bank, to purchase a 230-acre farm, which was eroded, low in fertility, and an old house which was estimated to have been constructed about 1890.

In the fall of 1967 they filed an application with the Hamilton office of Farmers Home Administration for loan assistance to develop their unit into a dairy farm. The

FHA Committee favorably considered their application but, requested that Blackburn work on a dairy several months for experience and knowledge before he started operating his own dairy, which he did. They obtained a rural housing loan from FHA to construct a fully equipped parlor-type dairy barn, hay barn and shed, calf barn with pens, water system, and new brick dwelling. A soil and water loan was also made for brush control and establishment of 120 acres of coastal bermuda with cost-share assistance from the ASCS. The coastal program was considered the key for success in the planned dairy operation.

Blackburn worked closely with technicians of the Soil Conservation Service. Conservation practices established in 1967-69 included brush control, pasture planting, pasture management, range deferred grazing and proper use, fish pond management and wildlife habitat development. They were one of the first in the county to eliminate an existing dump ground along the public road. The long accumulated trash was buried by a bulldozer.

The Blackburns have about 150 acres of coastal now, and spend about \$15 per acre for fertilizer to

produce a high protein palatable grass for their quality Holstein dairy herds. They have 69 cows, 2 bulls and 48 heifers at present, and plan to build their herd to 75 top quality cows. Their overall milk production per cow last year was 11,900 pounds, which is considered above average for first and second year producers. To be a Grade A producer, cleanliness of the barn and surroundings is a must, and the premises are inspected by state and city inspectors at any time, or a minimum of once a month.

The Blackburns make the dairy a family operation, and spend from four to five hours a day in the dairy barn. The two children at home, Cynthia 13, and Gary 15, actively share in the work. Both Gary and Cynthia plan to take part in 4-H and Gary will take vocational agriculture next fall.

The Blackburns' accomplishments have been due to good management, hard work and their desire to be good citizens. Carolyn says that they prefer the outdoors, their own business and rural living over the city life.

Blackburn is a Master Mason, and the whole family is active in community affairs and members of the Baptist Church.

171 Youths Inoculated For Rubella

Hico youngsters were inoculated against Rubella Tuesday of this week at the school, and State Health Dept. representative Byron Simpson and local Health Officer Dr. B. C. Dayton were highly elated over success of the program.

Sponsored by Hico Civic Club, in cooperation with the two agencies mentioned, 171 children age 1 through 10 received the vaccine.

Broken down, Dr. Dayton said that 50 children in the 1-4 age group received the vaccine against three-day or German measles, 20 in the 5-6 age group, and the remainder in the 6-10 group.

Mr. Simpson said the number was well above average.

Dr. Dayton expressed his appreciation to the local service club for sponsoring the program, and to others who cooperated in any way to make the program a success.

Congressman Formally Announces Candidacy

Congressman Omar Burleson has formally announced his candidacy for re-election to Congress, subject to the Democratic Primary and the General Election in November. The 17th Congressional District, which he represents, is composed of 31 counties, covering approximately 30,000 square miles. Within the area live about 440,000 people.

Burleson says, "During my tenure of office I have followed two guiding principles: First to know the views of my constituents and reflect their sentiments to the greatest degree possible in my actions in the Halls of Congress. Second to inform and advise as closely as I can on those issues which affect our district, our state and our nation."

Burleson termed his approach to Government as one of "common sense," gained through the years of public service. "I have tried to see that the people's tax money is spent as wisely and as judiciously as you would have spent it had you been in my place," he said.

"The record will show that a greater part of the time I have found myself in the minority in opposing the vast spending programs of doubtful value which have been put into effect in recent years. In every session of Congress the record will show my votes for expenditures below that recommended by the Executive Department

and far less than actually appropriated by the Congress, except in the field of National Defense," Burleson said. He continued, "Without meaning to appear boastful, if the Congress had followed those of us who have voted consistently over the years for fiscal responsibility, our financial affairs would not be in the shape they are today."

"In areas providing for the defense of our country, I have always supported those things to make and keep our nation stronger than any other in the world," he said.

"I have been discerning in separating those activities which the Federal Government was not designed to do, from those which are truly its responsibility," he said. Burleson stated that activities of state and local governments, in accordance with the Constitution, should not be infringed and encroached upon by the Federal Government.

"The Federal Government does have specific missions," he said. He gave as examples the conservation of natural resources, the defense of the country and its general welfare.

"At the same time, the Federal Government can not and should not try to take care of everything from Washington, either foreign or domestic. The Federal Government has grown to colossal proportions

Some of the youths were apprehended here after a merry chase in a stable Buck Shepherd. Other youths participating in the search were from Bosque, Hamilton and Tarrant counties, plus a Dept. of Safety helicopter, and later from the State School brought in to aid in searching for the bridegroom, who escaped from Shepherd after the auto driving had been stopped at the First National Bank.

The youths who escaped from the bank were later apprehended at 7:45 p.m. when Bill Doty caught them a ride near his home on Highway 6.

The incident began when the bride and sister accompanied the bride to Gatesville so the wedding ceremony could be held by the school chaplain.

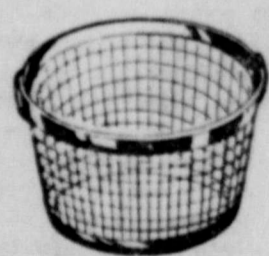

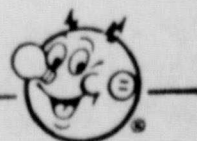

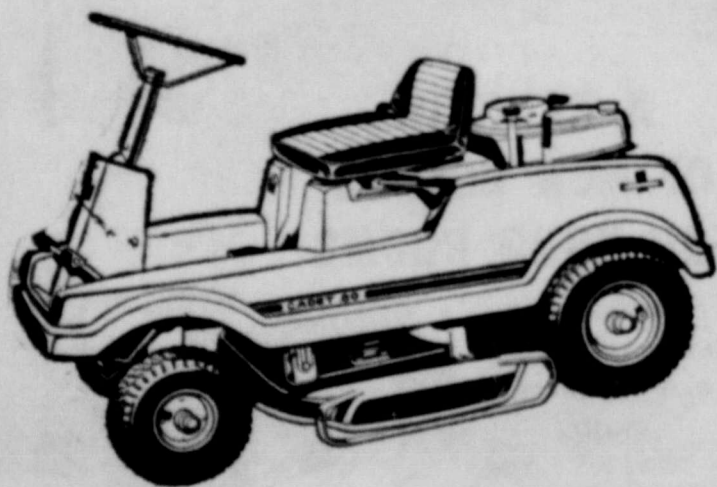

and centralized power in Washington has increased." Burleson pointed out. "To this, I am opposed and my record is clear in this respect."

Burleson is among the senior members of the U.S. House of Representatives in point of service. He was elected to the 80th Congress from the 17th District and has been re-elected to each succeeding Congress. He is a member of the Ways and Means Committee, considered to be the most powerful and prestigious in the House.

Burleson is a former County Attorney and County Judge of Jones County. He was appointed an FBI Agent, and served in a number of assignments over the U.S. He resigned from the FBI to join the Navy in World War II, and saw duty in both the Atlantic and the Pacific.

Burleson ended his formal announcement by saying, "Although not having opposition in this year's election, it is my hope to visit my constituency as opportunity affords. The Congress being in session at this time and expected to be long after the primary election, there will be little time to leave duties in Washington. I expect, however, to get back home at short intervals to do the best I can in seeing my friends and to make new ones. I believe it is incumbent upon a Congressman to know people and that they know him, to have the best representation. This is fundamental to our system."

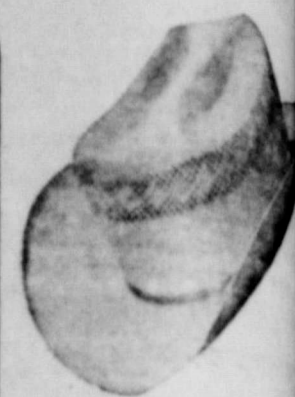

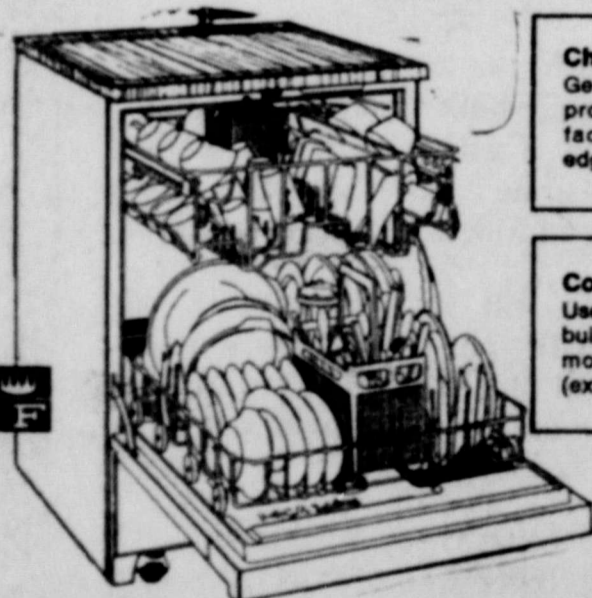
