The Aggie Muster began April 21, 1903 and has been held annually ever since—wherever A&M men might find themselves on that day. Aggies have mustered aboard ship, in foxholes on the battlefield, in the Swiss Alps, in airplanes, and even on Corregidor, shortly before the Japanese captured the island in World War II. More than 500 Musters will be held around the world this year, including several in Vietnam. For some A&M men, this will be their last Muster. The ceremony is the same in every location. Aggies pay their respect to those who are absent. When names of the honored dead are called from Muster rolls, a friend of the deceased answers "Here."

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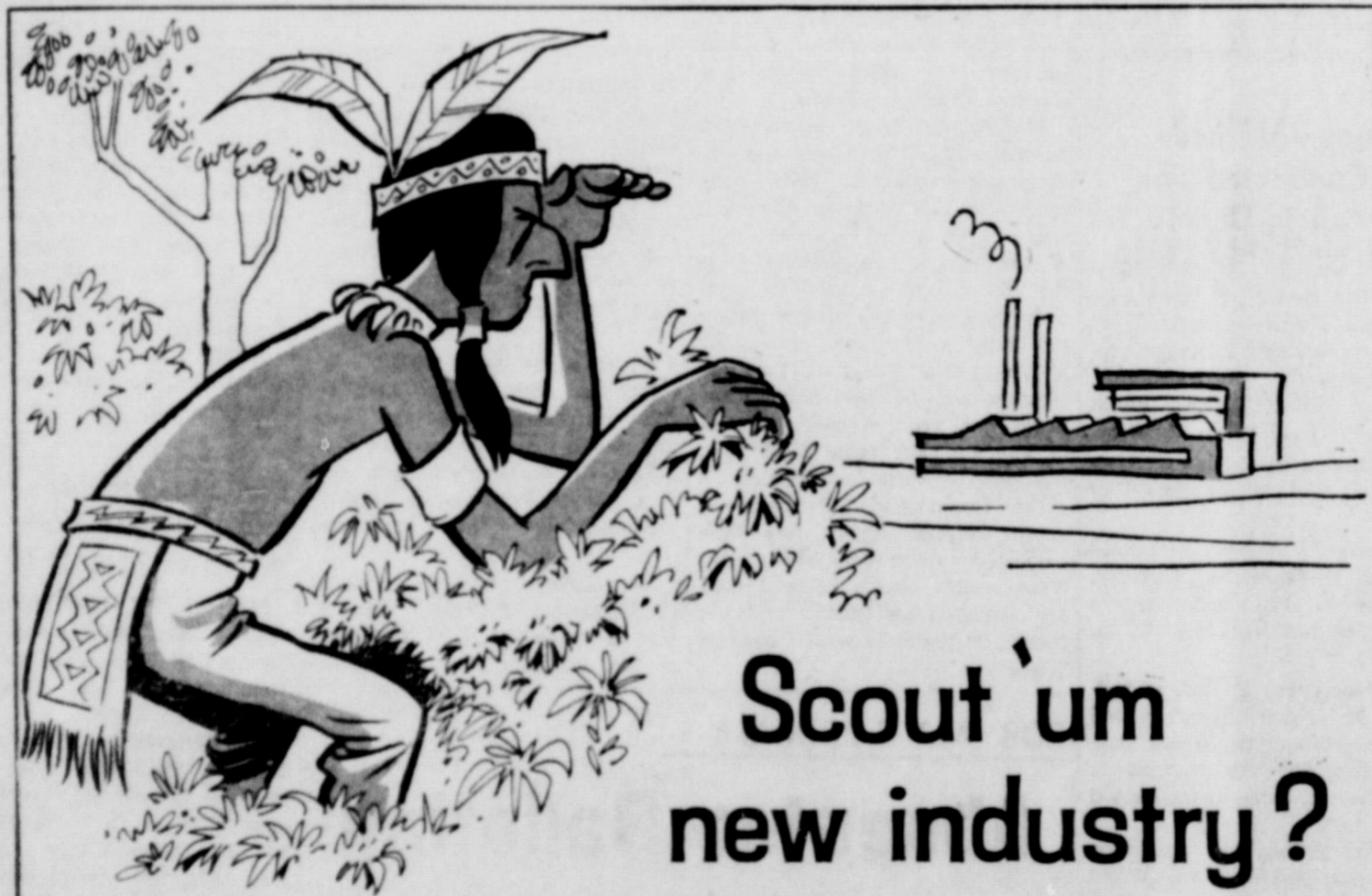

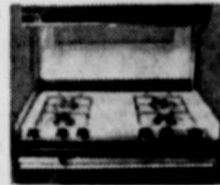

Questions & Answers

QUESTION: Since my husband and I married, I have worked most of the time. We have three children, age 7, 5 and 2. I have averaged making about \$250 per month. What would happen if I were to die?

ANSWER: Your husband, if you and he are still living together, would be paid a lump sum death benefit of \$25. Each of your minor children would get a monthly check of \$68.50 every month until they are 18, or up to age 22 if they remain a full-time student. This would total \$7,344.50 for all three children until your oldest child is 18. Then your two youngest children would get \$87.20 each every month. In all, total benefits to your survivors would be at least \$32,730.40.

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By BILL McCUTCHEON

Very few kernels of corn were planted before the first of April this year. This is definitely the latest I have ever seen corn planting started.

Grain sorghum planting started about the last day of March with the farming land on the rivers and their tributaries being planted first. Most of the upland is still too wet to plant.

I am afraid that many farmers will be in a hurry to get planted and won't take time to fertilize grain sorghum. A complete fertilizer such as 40-30-0 should be put down prior to planting to be most effective, but if you can't fertilize prior to planting, side-dress your grain sorghum as soon as possible. It will pay you to take time to fertilize. Fertilizer is the best investment that a farmer can make. Benefits from fertilizer are about as sure as taxes. It will pay on a wet year or dry year.

I get a lot of questions every year about the control of algae in farm ponds. The questions are usually asked in the mid or late

summer when it is too late to treat ponds without danger to the fish. April and May are usually considered to be the optimum times to control pond algae. The water is still cool enough to retain oxygen even with the decaying vegetation, thus preventing fish loss due to oxygen depletion.

There are several chemicals that will do the job. Some are very economical and easy to apply. As I cannot discuss all of these in this column I would invite you to call or come by my office for more information.

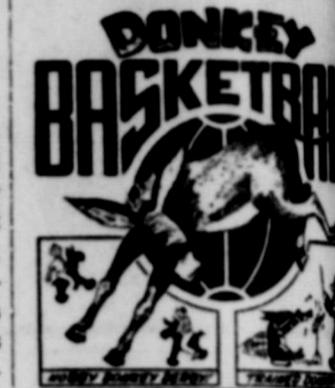

Washington, D.C.—Hearings before the Ways and Means Committee continue on a revamping of medicaid and medicare.

Numerous witnesses have been before the committee, including representatives of the American Medical Association, hospital associations, insurance carriers, private physicians and others who give an appraisal of present operations of these programs and make recommendations for change.

About everyone agrees that failures and weaknesses in medicare and medicaid have not resulted from a lack of dollars from the Federal Government.

As has been mentioned here before, the cost of medicare and medicaid has skyrocketed, much of it due to inflation but other factors have influenced it also. The effort is to search out the difficulties in our health care system and seek ways of remedying the faults.

A doctor member of the Congress proposes that the Federal Government purchase annual insurance for each one qualified for medicare. He suggests that the government pay 85 percent of the average \$400 health care expense and the State

assume the balance.

Under this system the cost to the government would be approximately \$1 billion more a year but would not be subject to unexpected escalation as is the present case. The proposal would actually intend to eliminate medicaid, which is a problem to the States, and to operate one program of medicare.

The cost to those who contribute to Social Security for insurance would be 4 percent of their taxable earnings. All others with salaries or earnings would pay on their income tax return. It is estimated that receipts from this source would total roughly \$2 billion annually which would go into a pool of funds from which Social Security administration would reimburse 90 percent of medical expenses under a prescribed formula. Persons over 65, because they have medicare protection expenses, would apply to the extent of those actually paid by the individual in excess of 25 percent of his gross income.

The present medicare program is heavily burdened with large administrative costs involving processing rather small claims. It takes about as much time and effort to work out a small claim as it does one for catastrophic or high cost illness.

The American Medical Association recommends a type of pre-paid insurance shared by the Federal Government and the various States. Some hospital associations of which there are a number recommend a "group practice" system something like a mutual insurance arrangement. In fact there are a number already in operation—some on an experimental basis. The Kaiser Company operating in the northwest states is the largest. Under this type of organization, individuals simply pay insurance in a group and the managers of the group contract with doctors and hospitals to take care of illness when it occurs.

Whatever changes may result from hearings now in progress there is no doubt about the need for some changes. Two very direct problems should be solved. The cost of health care continues to increase at a rate which will soon be beyond the reach of those who need it. The other is more efficiency at less cost to the Government. Since the Federal Government is in the health care business, along with the several states implementing medicaid, it is a matter of trying to find better answers and to try to improve these programs before the country reaches a real crisis in health care for its citizens.

The one thing that costs the least—and does the most good—is a pleasant smile.

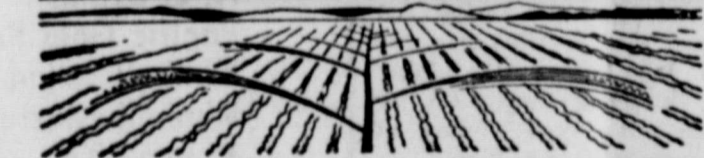

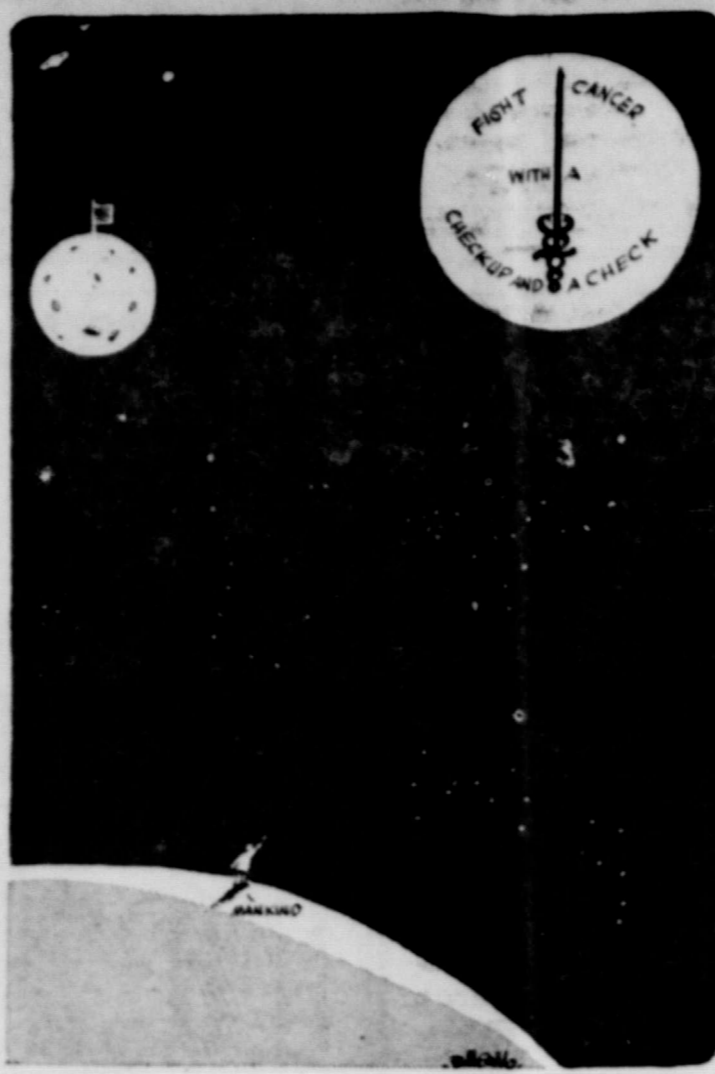
