Hico voters failed to listen to advance reports that interest was running at an all-time low for last Saturday's Democratic Primary, and went to the polls 458 strong to cast ballots for candidates of their choice.

The vote was only 12 shy of the 470 cast here in 1968, and a like number in 1956.

In the race that created the most interest, that of Commissioner of Precinct 3, Leslie Patterson polled 330 total votes to defeat Paul Lane with 218 and Condred Roberson with 109. Broken down, Patterson received 256 at Hico, 38 at Fairy, 20 at Carlton and six at Olin. Lane polled 169 at Hico, 22 at Fairy, 11 at Carlton and 16 at Olin. Roberson's tally showed 30 at Hico, 13 at Fairy, 54 at Carlton and 12 at Olin. The campaign was for the two-year unexpired term of the late Fred Rainwater.

In the County Judge's race, incumbent Herman Standifer was reelected over challenger James Soules by a 111-vote margin. At Hic) Standifer received 238 votes to Soules' 189. County totals were 1255 to 1144.

Herman Walton of Hamilton edged Frank Hanes of Pottsville by 48 votes for the County Superintendent post. County totals were 1219 to 1171. In Hico there was 16 votes difference, with Hanes polling 219 to Walton's 203.

In the state race that drew the most interest in the county, that of Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals, Judge Truman Roberts of dent, announced the charter of Boy Hamilton swamped opponent Earl Smith of San Angelo by a 2082 to 294 margin. Hico voters favored Roberts 379 to 56.


