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Social Security

Questions & Answers

QUESTION: I have been working on social security jobs since I was 17 years old. I am now 29 and my wife is 27. We have three young children. What if I don't live until I'm 65? Is there any protection for my family?

ANSWER: There sure is. Up until you reach retirement age—and you can start getting reduced retirement payments at age 62 if you retire or partially retire—and your family have protection against your disability or your family has protection against your untimely death. In fact, your social security benefits for yourself and your family is probably the biggest cash asset you now have. Your benefits could be worth up to \$150,000 for you and your family if you were to become disabled, and survivors benefits of up to \$100,000 could be paid to your family. Don't forget to include in the spring cleanup empty, unlabeled bottles, cans, bags, aerosols, and boxes which were used for insecticide containers and may still contain deadly residues.

These containers should be removed from the house since they are a potential source of trouble. A curious child in a few unguarded moments with these containers could become the victim of a tragic accident.

During spring cleanup make it a first order of business to inventory all of the insecticides used around the home and garden. Remove the containers which are empty and those with missing labels. Unlabeled containers are a threat to family members and pets. Don't try to guess the contents.

All containers should be disposed of in accordance with the rules of safety and local regulations. Bottles and cans should be rinsed with water and the residue buried. Glass bottles should be broken and cans punctured and buried to a depth of 18 inches in an isolated spot away from water supplies.

Boxes and paper bags may be burned but make sure that the wind doesn't blow the smoke onto grazing areas or into the home or onto plants that might be damaged.

Cleaning up after agricultural chemicals have been applied is an important part of safe use. When chemicals are used according to label instructions they will do the job and are safe to use.

Cut hay while it is young and tender. Young plants are palatable and highly digestible, but become tough and stemmy when they approach maturity.

For sudan, sudan-sorghum hybrids, johnsongrass, native grasses and similar plants cut them in the boot stage or just before the seed heads emerge. Coastal bermuda should be cut after no more than four weeks of growth.

Most spring crops contain high amounts of moisture when cut at the preferred stage. Too, the weather is often rainy, cloudy and cool and the ground moist, thus creating curing problems.

There isn't much you can do about the weather but something can be done about maintaining the quality of the hay. The use of hay conditioners reduce curing time by as much as one-half, thus the crop can usually be cut and stored at the right time with little or no damage from rain.

Fertilizer should be applied after each cutting, especially nitrogen. If production on the first cutting is fairly high, phosphorous may also be needed.

Soil samples taken prior to harvesting will provide the information needed on what plant food or foods to use immediately after the harvest.

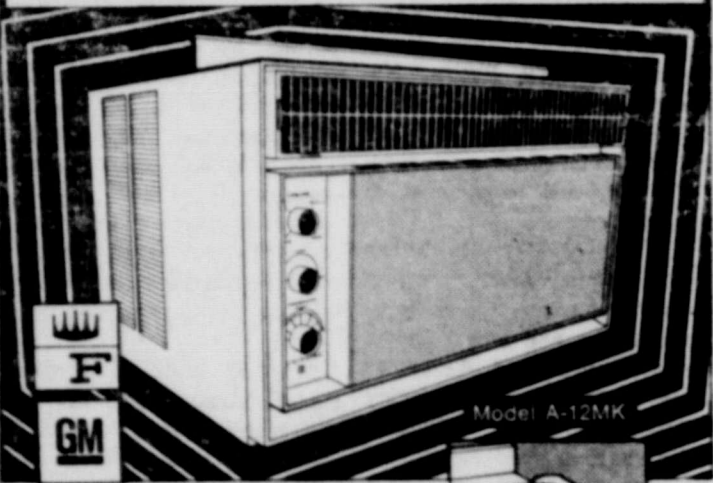
