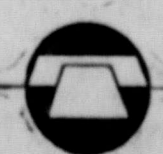

Social Security

Questions & Answers
By JACK CALVERT

QUESTION: I started getting my social security retirement check about 2½ years ago. I have been offered a part-time job and would like to know if I still have to pay social security taxes if I take the job? Will my work affect my social security monthly check?

ANSWER: Yes, you are still subject to the social security tax. There is no exemption from paying the tax because of age—either young or old—or because you receive, or are eligible to receive, a monthly social security check. You will still get your monthly social security check if your total yearly earnings will not be more than \$1680—that's gross pay, before any deductions. If your gross pay is more than \$1680 a year and not more than \$2880 for the year, you can still get some social security benefits for the year.

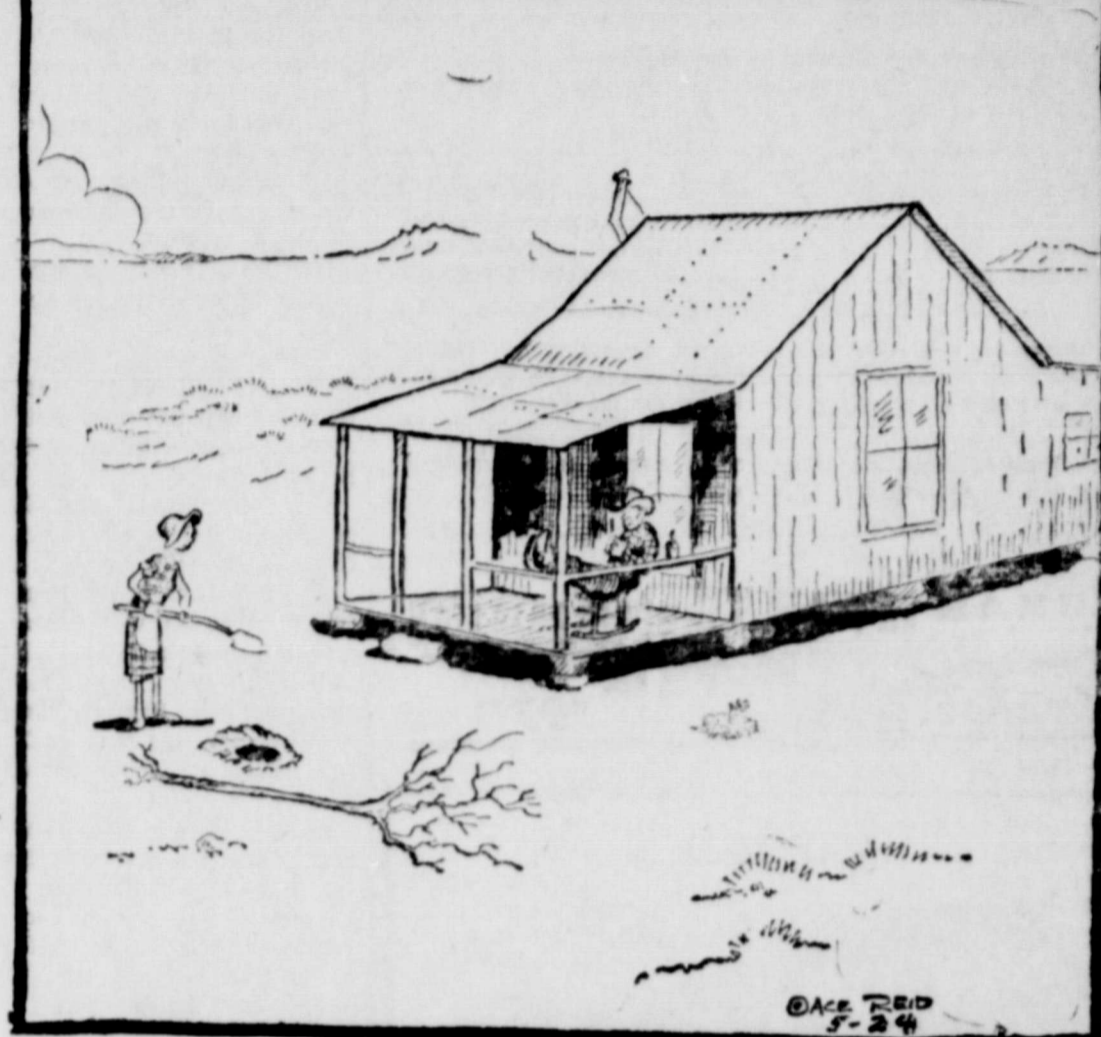

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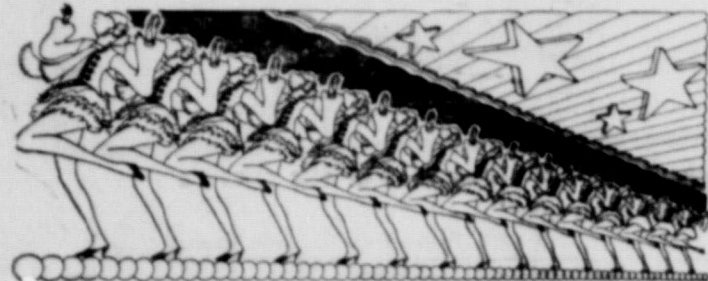

COUNTY AGENT

By BILL McCUTCHEON

Channel catfish farming is something that is creating a lot of interest and there is a new wrinkle in the business that just may make it more practical in Hamilton County.

This new wrinkle is the "Cage" operation. I was skeptical about this initially but the more I learn about it the more I believe that it has some real possibilities.

The cage operation makes possible high density fish populations, easy feeding and feed regulations, enhances disease and parasite control, and makes harvesting a much easier and simple operation.

You don't have to drain a pond to harvest fish. You can harvest at leisure and you don't have to harvest all the fish at the same time.

There is a little more initial expense as it takes about \$40.00 to construct a cage capable of handling 1,000 fish but your investment in a cage is a long time investment and the benefits far outweigh the disadvantages of the cages.

Tuesday night, May 26 at 8 p.m. at the Vocational Agriculture classroom in Hamilton, Dr. H. R. Schmittou, Fisheries Specialist with the Extension Service will present a program on channel catfish farming and will cover the cage operation.

Dr. Schmittou has had a lot of practical experience with cage operations and is highly qualified on the subject.

I have had many calls about St. Augustine lawns this Spring. There are dead spots and unthrifty grass in almost every lawn.

This is due largely to the extremely hot dry summer we had last year and a relatively rough winter. A lot of grass was killed due to this adverse weather and much more was weakened.

Unless the grass was completely killed it will come back with good management. I would suggest a good fertilizer application using a complete fertilizer and in cases where Chlorosis is severe an application of iron in the form of copperas or Iron Chelates.
