Fourteen years is a long time to wait.

But, Wilma (Jaggars) Boyd of San Antonio knew what she wanted and she was willing to work for it.

Mrs. Boyd is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. L. A. Jaggars of Hico, and is a native of this area.

In September of 1956, Wilma decided to go to college. On

May 25, her wait ended when she graduated with a bachelor of science degree in business administration from Trinity University in San Antonio.

And, she did it with a 3.45 grade point average out of a possible 4.0.

Wilma, secretary to the general manager of Southwestern Bell Telephone Co., started her college career at San Antonio

College to brush up on shorthand. "It was a question of self-development," Wilma said. "It wasn't really until after I completed eight years of night school at SAC that I became serious about a degree."

For the next six years, Wilma attended evening sessions at Trinity on the company's tuition plan. The plan also had picked up part of her tuition at SAC.

"The company and my bosses have been so helpful and considerate. At times, it wasn't easy to be a business woman one minute and a student the next," Wilma said. "It seems like my college tests always came on my hardest days at the office. Of course, I owe a great deal of thanks to an understanding husband."

Wilma started her career with the telephone company in 1943 following graduation from Hico High School. In her 27 years with Southwestern Bell, she has worked as a messenger, operator, clerk, secretary to the district traffic superintendent, and to the division traffic superintendent on her way to becoming secretary to the general manager.

In addition to being a wife, secretary, and student, she is busy in professional, social and religious activities. Wilma is active in the Travis Park Methodist Church, and holds a life member pin in the Wesleyan Service Guild.

She has held most of the offices in the San Antonio chapter of Executives' Secretaries, Inc., and in 1968 served as a member of the International Board of Directors of the organization.

In January, she was initiated into the Psi Chapter, Sigma Iota Epsilon, the honorary and professional management fraternity at Trinity.

Mrs. Boyd has the distinction of being one of only two female employees in Southwestern Bell in Texas to have earned the Certified Professional Secretary certificate.

I really appreciated J. Evan's editorial a few weeks ago in the Hamilton Herald-News entitled "No Aggie Jokes." I think that some of the people who have been telling Aggie jokes have found that the joke was on them.

Riots and demonstrations are certainly no joke; and I heard over the news media that the bearded student body president of one of A&M's chief rivals has denounced "Capitalism" as he calls it and said that Socialism was the ultimate in government.

Even though the student body elected him to this position I can't believe he represents their views, but while things of this type are going on at other universities I will sure look with disfavor on Aggie jokes.

The high winds and rains have been rough on the small grain harvest. Oat yields looked particularly promising and wheat yields looked good, but the question is, how much will be harvested. High winds have already taken a toll. Wet weather has also delayed cotton plantings over most of the county.

Recent rains have also made it rough on pecan producers trying to protect a good crop from the pecan nut casebearer. Rains were received throughout the prime spraying time for this insect.

I would urge producers to continue checking their pecan groves for the next few days and spray again if necessary.

The wet weather also has its bright side. Pastures and rangeland have seldom been better. The cattle are fat and the prices are good, and beef cattle represent about half of the county's income annually. Recent rains have added a plus to the grain sorghum prospects over the county.

QUESTION: I am 67 years old now and plan to retire August 1. I applied for benefits back before I was 65 to get my Medicare insurance, but I haven't been getting any cash monthly benefits because of my earnings. When should I report that I have stopped work, and where should the report be sent?

ANSWER: The best time to make the report is shortly after July 1. If you make the report at that time, we will be able to get your August benefit check to you on time on September 3. The report should be sent to the Temple Social Security office, or can be made with our representative when he visits Hico. A written notice will be sufficient, however.

Dear Mrs. Johnson:

I don't know if you remember me, and if you do, you probably have visions of a loud kid who was always into something, which is a fairly accurate account of my high school days.

That was awhile back, and now, like many young American men, I'm serving in the armed forces.

According to the press and news accounts we get here (which I am sure are somewhat distorted), the United States is in quite a turmoil as to the moral legality and the intentions of our political military policies. It seems that serving in the armed forces is no longer an honorable call to duty—but rather an interruption in the pursuits of one's goals in his personal life. Personally, I have to disagree with such a philosophy. Even with all the drawbacks of our form of government, and our pre-occupation with world affairs, which seems to hinder our potential's realization, I'm proud to be an American. I am truthfully proud of its heritage, its people, and its efforts toward world peace.

I'll admit that the military is not very easy for a person, but it is the ONLY guarantee this nation can offer to its people for the protection of their way of life. And listening to all the dissent and protesting—the grumbling and griping—and seeing educational institutions literally destroyed—all in the name of "freedom"—it's just too disheartening for words. It all makes our life and our job here a little more miserable.
